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#### "OUR TRIP TO TEXAS IN 1849"

(WARRICK COUNTY, INDIANA TO LOCKHART, TEXAS)

By the Great-grandmother of Mr. John Embree French 4628 Weldon

IN THE YEAR 1849, QUITE A NUMBER OF CITIZENS OF WARRICK COUNTY, INDIANA, MADE UP THEIR MINDS TO MOVE TO TEXAS AND AS MY FATHER-IN-LAW, ABREE LUCE, SR., MAD VISITED TEXAS WHOE TO LOOK OVER THE COUNTRY TO SEE IF IT WOULD DO TO MOVE TO; OF COURSE THEY ALL CAME TO HIM, AND AS HE WAS DELIGHTED WITH THE COUNTRY THEY ALL SOLD OUT TO COME IN THAT YEAR. THERE WAS A LONG TRAIN OF WAGONS STARTED WITH BANNERS FOR TEXAS.

MY FATHER-IN-LAW COULD NOT GET OFF UNTIL LATER AND WAS COMING BY WATERTHE LEADERS OF THIS GROWD ALL AGREED TO WEET AT SEGUIN, TEXAS. THEY ALL BEGGED
FATHER LUCE TO SEND ALL THE LADY FOLKS WITH THEM BUT HE WOULD NOT AGREE TO IT AND
HE REGRETTED VERY WUND BEFORE WE ALL GOT HERE.

ON THE FIRST OF COTOBER, 1849, WE ALL PUSHED OUT FROM NEWBURG, INDIANA, ON THE CHIO RIVER. THERE WERE NO EMIGRANTS IN THE CROWD, BUT FATHER LUGE AND HIS FAMILY CONSISTED OF HIS OLDEST SON, MATTHEW R. AND SAM AND FRANK AND DAVID ALL GROWN AND DAPA TO, 12 YEARS OLD, AND THE LADY FOLKS WAS MYSELF AND MOTHER-IN-LAW AND MISS ELIZABETH AND MISS ARIMINTA LUGE. AS FATHER HAD THREE WHAT WAS CALLED FLAT BOATS, HE HIRD HANDS TO COME WITH US. WE HAD ONE COLORED SERVANT ALONG, AND I HAD BABE, WHO IS NOW MISS. A. A. ELLISON, OF SAN ANTONIO. SHE AND MYSELF ARE THE ONLY LIVIN COMES OF OUR GROWD THAT LEFT FOR TEXAS.

FATHER AND SONS HAD ONE BOAT LOAD OF LIVE STOCK AND WHILE HE RUN DOWN TO NEW ORLEANS TO SELL IT, HE RENTED A FIELD TO TURN HIS HORSES IN AND LEFT US AT A PLACE CALLED GAINSTLANDING, SEVERAL MILES BELOW THE MOUTH OF RED RIVER. HE HAD BOUGHT US THE FINEST HORSES HE COULD FIND, HEAR ONE HUNDRED HEAD, ON WHICH HE LOST, THINKING HE WOULD FILL THIS COUNTRY WITH FINE HORSES, BUT THE PEOPLE PREFERRED THEIR TEXAS PONIES, AND THERE WAS ON SALE FOR FINE HORSES.

FATHER LUDE HAD MADE THE TOWN OF NEWBURG, INDIANA IN EARLY TIMES. HE SETTLED THERE AND THE PLACE WAS CALLED SPRINKLESBURG AND FATHER LAID OFF A NEW TOWN AND CALLED IT NEWBURG AND HAD BEEN A LEADING CITIZEN OF THAT PLACE AND WHEN THE NEWS WENT OUT WE WERE GOING TO START FOR TEXAS, MANY WAS THE FRIEND OR KINSPOLK TO SEE US OFF. I THINK EVERYONE NEAR THERE WAS ON THE BANK OF THE CHIO RIVER TO MAVE US A FARMEVELL. WE COULD SEE FOR THERE MILES AND THEN THEN THERE MADE A TURN AND THEY WERE STILL STANDING THERE. IT LOOKED LIKE A WHITE CLOUD WAVING A LAST FAREWELL.

WE HAD A PLEASANT TRIP DOWN THE OHIO RIVER AND DOWN THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER. SOMETIMES STEAMBOATS WHO KNEW WHO WE WERE, WOULD COME NEAR TO WAVE US GOOD-BY.

Well, as I remarked before, we stopped at Gains? Landing, there they paid off 3 captains \$100.00 a piece and they took a steadboat and well back. Father Luce took two hands and David and went on down, with the stock boat and we lived in our boat for six weeks. There were rich people there, and the old planters were acquainted with father and he told them he left us in their care and we certainly had a gay time. I saw more champagne drank than I ever did before, most too much. Some of the cakes were baked in New York. We went to a party nearly every night and there I did my last Jancing. My husband did not pance, but he would hold the

BABE WHILE I WOULD DANCE. A LADY SAID, "I KNOW WHY YOUR HUSBAND IS SO KIND TO YOU, HE KNOWS HE IS TAKING YOU WHERE YOU WILL NEVER SEE ANYTHING BUT INDIANS."

WELL, FATHER CAME BACK. HE TOOK THE HORSES AND PUT THEM BACK IN THE BOAT AND THEN THE THE BOAT TO OUR BOAT, AND HIRED A STEAMBOAT TO TAKE US BACK TO THE MOUTH OF THE RED RIVER, AND AS FLAT BOATS DO NOT RUN UPSTREAM, WHEN WE GOT TO THE MOUTH OF RED RIVER THEY TOOK THE HORSES OUT OF THEIR BOAT, THAT IS TWO OF THE HORSES. AS THE RIVER HAD A LEVEE ON BOTH SIDES, AND ON TOP OF THAT WAS A ROAD. THEY TIED OUR BOAT AND THE HORSES BOAT FAST TOGETHER AND THEN TIED A ROPE TO THE DOATS AND PUT A HORSE ON THE LEVEE ON EACH SIDE AND STATED UPSTREAM.

WE TRAVELED FAST, AS THE HORSES WERE WANTING OUT AND THEY FAIRLY RAN. WE WENT A LITTLE FASTER THAN WE LIKED, BUT THEY EACH ONE HAD A YOUNG MAN TO RIDE ON HIS BACK TO KEEP HIM FROM GOING TOO FAST.

Well, we went that way until we got to Bayou Lapourche. Then they took the horses off and put them in their boat again. Tied the horse boat behind the family boat and all the men got on top of the boats with spikes to keep the boats from striking shore and started down that bayou like a hurmicame. If was very high and running swift. The people along the shore did not know what it meant. The men baid, those that were hired, that it was the most dangerous piece of work they had ever seen.

WE GOT DOWN TO A BIG PLANTATION IN LOUISIANA WHERE THERE WAS WHAT WAS CALLED A TEXAS ROAD. FATHER AND SONS HAD PREPARED FOR OUR TRIE BY LAND. HAD FOUR WAGONS THAT HAD NEVER BEEN PUT TOGETHER. THEY WERE ON TOP OF THE BOATS. ONE WAGON WAS A FOUR HORSE WAGON AND A FOUR HORSE WAGON AND A FOUR HORSE WAGON AND A TOGETHER, PUT UP THE BOWN BUGGY WITH DOUBLE COVERS AND A NEW HARNESS. EVERYTHING NEW RIGHT FROM THE SHOP. THEY TOOK THE MEN FOLKS QUITE A WHILE TO PUT THE WAGONS TOGETHER, PUT UP THE BOWS AND PUT ON THE GOVERN WHICH WAS MADE IN NEW YORK, NOT A DROP OF RAIN COULD GET IN. THE PEOPLE SAID THEY HAD NEVER SEEN SUCH A TURNOUT BEFORE.

IT WAS A WARM PRETTY AFTERNOON WHEN THEY GOT EVERYTHING READY TO START, THEY CONCLUDED TO GO OUT AS FAR AS THEY COULD THAT EVENING TO SEE HOW THE HORSES WOULD GO, AND THEY WENT PITCHING. THE FOUR-HORSE WAGON WAS THE BAGGAGE WAGON AND HAD OUR TENT IN IT.

WE GOT OUT 8 OR 10 MILES, PUT UP OUR TENT FOR THE MEN TO SLEEP IN, THE LADY FOLKS SLEPT IN THE WAGONS, AND WHEN WE GOT UP NEXT MORNING, IT WAS RAINING AND IT RAINED FOR 21 DAYS. I DO NOT MEAN ALL THE TIME, BUT SHOWERS EVERY DAY. WE WERE IN THE PINE WOODS, HAD TO STAY IN THE BEATEN ROAD OR YOU WOULD MIRE UP. WE FINALLY GOT TO THE SBEWER RIVER, AND EACH ONE WANTED TO BE FIRST TO CROSS OVER TO SAY HE WAS FIRST IN TEXAS.

THE SABINE WAS HIGH, ALL THE BOTTOMS COVERED WITH WATER AND WE HAD TO BE FERRIED 5 MILES, THAT IS WE GOT IN THE FERRY BOAT, AND WENT DOWN STREAM 5 MILES AND THEN LANDED, AND AS THE FERRY BOAT COULD ONLY CARRY ONE BOAT (WAGON?) AT A TIME AND IT TOOK A DAY FOR EACH BOAT, WE WERE THERE FOR SEVERAL DAYS. THE HORSES HAD TO BE FERRIED OVER TOO. AND IT ALL TOOK TIME.

AFTER WE GOT OVER WE WERE IN A WILDERNESS. A MAN CAME TO OUR TERM AND SAID HE COULD SAVE US 40 MILES OF TRAVEL, HE HAD A PRIVATE WAY, AND THEY TOLD HIM THEY WOULD GIVE IT (SIO) WE FOUND OUT AFTERWARDS IT WAS A FOOLISH TRADE. THE ROAD WAS BAD, AND WHILE WE WERE SO WELL FIXED FOR TRAVEL, THE 40 MILES AROUND WERE A GOOD ROAD. WE FOUND OUT THAT WE TOOK THE WORST ROAD, TO LOW DOWN.

THE FIRST TOWN WE SAW IN TEXAS WAS GREENVILLE (?) AND THERE WE MET A FAMILY FROM EVANSVILLE, INDIANA, HE WAS A DEWTIST. WE STAYED THERE UNTIL HE FIXED SOME OF THEIR TEETH. WE GROSSED THE BRAZOS RIVER AT HUNTSVILLE. AFTER WE GOT OUT OF THE PINE WOODS WE HAD A PLESAMST DAILY. WE WOULD OFTEN SPEAK OF OUR FRIENDS THAT STARTED BEFORE WE DID AND WONDER HOW MANY WE WOULD SEE WHEN WE GOT TO SEGUIN, WHERE WE WERE TO MEET, AGREAULE TO PROMISE. WE HAD NEVER HEAD FROM THEM, OR THEY FROM US, AND ON THE 4TH DAY OF MARCH 1850, WE DROVE INTO SEGUIN, AND TO OUR SORROW WE FOUND BUT FEW OF THE GROWD TO WELFORM US, BUT THEY WERE OF HAPPY TO SEE US AS THEV WERE AFRAID THAT WE HAD BEEN LOST. SO MANY THAT HAD PROMISED TO MET US AT SEGUIN HAD DROPPED OUT ON THE WAY, SOME AT ONE PLACE AND SOME AT ANOTHER. THE FAMILES THAT WERE THERE WERE J. J. THORNTON, GEO. DAY, HORACK NEELY, A MM. HANCHEN AND TWO MN. NORTONS, THERE MIGHT HAVE BEEN SOME OTHERS, BUT I HAVE FOROGITEN. THEY ALL TOLD US WHAT A PLEASANT THEY THEY HAD, THEY YOUNG THE INDIAN THE WIND THE MEY BE THEY WERE TO BE HERE.

THERE WAS A SMALL COLONY ON THE CIBOLO RIVER, WE MOVED ON THERE AND STOPPED FOR THE SUMMER. WE FOUND THE COLONY NICE PEOPLE. IT WAS ABOUT 18 MILES FROM SAN ANTONIO, AND WE LEFT WORD AT HOME FOR OUR WALL TO BE SENT THERE, AND THE NEXT THING WAS TO GO TO SAN ANTONIO AND HEAR FROM HOWE IF POSSIBLE. ON ACCOUNT OF INDIANS NO ONE COULD GO ALONE, BUT THEY SOON MADE UP A COMPANY AND WENT AND BROUGHT IT OUT AND IT WAS ENOUGH, THE POSTMAN HAD BEEN TOLD TO KEEP IT UNTIL WE CAME.

I am writing this for my grandchildren and if I was a good writer would love to write them a book on the same subject, but will stop as this is the Best I can be.

I HAD FORGOT TO TELL THAT WHEN WE WERE AT GAINS LANDING, FATHER TOOK OUR FURNITURE AND HOUSEHOLD THINGS TO NEW ORLEANS AND SHIPPED THEM AGROSS THE GULF TO INDIANCIA. IT WAS LATE IN THE SUMMER WHEN WE GOT THEM. SOME WAS LOST AND WE NEVER GOT THEM, IT WAS FOOLISH FOR US TO HAVE SHIPPED SO MUCH. I HAD A \$100.00 PARLOR STOVE THAT WAS RUINED DEFORME GOT A CABIN TO PUT IT IN, BUT OUR CARPETS AND SUCH THINGS WERE USEFUL. MY NICEST CARPET I USED FOR A PARTITION IN THE FIRST HOUSE I LIVED IN. FATHER LUCE KNEW WE WERE BRINGING TOO MUCH, BUT HE WAS AFRAID TO TELL US FOR FEAR WE ALL WOULD NOT COME. HE WOULD SAY, "BRING ALL YOU WANT, I WILL PAY THE FREIGHT".

Well, IN THE FALL OF 1850 WE MOVED TO LOCKHART AND I HAVE LIVED HERE CONTINUOUSLY EVER SINCE. SOME OF THE COLONY MOVED HERE TOO AND WAS OUR NEAR NEIGHBORS AND OF COURSE ALL THE OLD ONES HAVE PASSED AWAY, BUT SOME OF THEIR GRANDOH LDREN LIVE HERE YET AND FEL NEAR TO ME.

I FORGOT TO MENTION THAT FATHER LUGE HAD A SISTER THAT GAME DOWN TO GAINS LANDING WITH US, SAID SHE COULD NOT BARE TO SEE US START, SO SHE TOOK HER SON THOMAS, QUITE A YOUNG MAN, HANDSOME AND GAY.

AUNT NETTY EVERTON WAS VERY PICOUS, SHE MADE THEM TIE UP THE BOATS ON SUMDAYS AND SHE WOULD CALL INTO THE BOATS AND HAVE PRAYERS, MUCH TO THE ANNOYANCE OF THE THREE CAPTAINS. SHE WANTED SINGING, BUT AS THERE WERE NO SINGERS IN THE GROWD, BUT THE CAPTAINS AND WYSELF, AND AS THE CAPTAINS WERE MADE TO HAVE TO STOP ON SUMDAYS, WE DID NOT HAVE WUSIG.

THIS THOMAS EVERTON IN AFTER YEARS MOVED TO TEXAS AND DIED A FEW YEARS AGO AT LULING IN THIS COUNTY. HIS DAUGHTER, MRS. JENNIE CLARK, RUNS

AN ORPHAN'S HOME AT THAT PLACE NOW, WHICH IS A CREDIT TO HERSELF AND COUNTRY. THE NAME OF HER ORPHAN'S HOME IS BELL HAVEN.

I WAS 90 YEARS OLD THE 15TH OF LAST MARCH.

THE LIBRARY HAS MANY FAMILY HISTORY SECTIONS WHICH HAVE BEEN REPRODUCED FROM VARIOUS FAMILY BIBLES AND ARE REQUESTING THAT FRIENDS WHO WANT TO PUT THEIR RECORDS IN THE LIBRARY HAVE PHOTOSTATIC COPIES MAD BEFORE FILING.

WITH A RE-FERENCE TO A VOLUME AND PAGE IN WHICH THAT NAME HAS APPEARED. WE HAVE ONLY A FEW OF THE BOOKS INDEXED IN IT BUT IT IS A MOST USE-FUL GUIDE AS TO WHERE TO LOOK FOR THE RECORDS OF A FAMILY. THEN, TOO, IT IS POSSIBLE TO HAVE THE REFERENCES CHECKED IN THE LIBRARIES WHICH OWN COPIES OF THE BOOKS. THIS RESEARCH MUST BE PAID FOR. THOUGH, UNLESS ONE HAS FRIENDS OR RELATIVES WHO CAN DO THE WORK. LIBRARIANS DO NOT HAVE THE TIME TO DO RESEARCH BECAUSE OF THE OTHER ROUTINE WORK.

## PRESUMPTIONS:

LOGICAL PRESUMPTIONS MAY BE DRAWN FROM VARIOUS BITS OF INFOR-

- A WITNESS TO A WILL EITHER IS A BELATIVE OR A NEIGHBOR. RELATIVES WERE USED WHEN A PARTITION OF A PARENT'S ESTATE WAS BEING MADE OR WHETHER BROTHERS WERE DIVIDING THEIR LAND BETWEEN THEMSELVES. THE NAME OF A NEIGHBOR WAS USED WHERE SUCH NEIGHBOR OWNED LAND AD-JOINING THE TRADT CONVEYED.
- 2) THE DATE OF THE FIRST DEED IN A COUNTY MEANS ONE OF TWO THINGS:

EITHER THAT DATE MARKS THE APPROXIMATION OF THE TIME THAT THE GRANTEE ENTERED THE COUNTY. IF THE GRANTEE'S PARENTS WERE ALREADY IN THE COUNTY, THEN GENERALLY IT MEANS THAT HE HAS RECENTLY MARRIED OR BECOME OF AGE.

#### LAND DIVISIONS IN NORTH CAROLINA:

THE NORTH CAROLINA ARCHIVES HAS PUBLISHED A THREE VOLUME DESCRIPTION OF OFFICIAL RECORDS RECORDED IN THE VARIOUS COUNTIES OF NORTH CAROLIN& ON PAGE\_OF VOLUME 1 IS A DESCRIPTION OF "LAND DIVISIONS". THESE LAND DIVISIONS ARE SOMETIMES FILED IN THE DEED RECORDS AND SOMETIMES ARE FILED AMONG SPECIAL PROCEEDINGS. IT IS MY RECOMMENDATION THAT BOTH BE SEARCHED. DIVISIONS WERE MADE NECESSARY WHERE A PERSON DIED OWNING LAND WITHOUT LEAVING A WILL. UNLESS A VOLUMTARY CONVEYANCE WAS MADE BY THE HEIRS AMONG THEMSELVES, THE COURT APPOINTED COMMISSIONERS WHO DIVIDED THE LAND EQUALLY AMONG ALL OF THE HEIRS. THESE RECORDS ARE MOST VALUABLE AND SHOULD BE SEARCHED FOR VERY CAREFULLY.

#### SURVEY METHODS:

Land is desoribed in deeds of rural tracts of land by reference to metes and bounds. The call gives a direction first followed by a unit of measurement. For instance, N 60 E 100 poles. This means that you put your compass on north and measure sixty degrees in a clock-wise direction on a compass. Such line will mark the direction to be taken for the call. You may then count off the number of poles. For your information, most of the North Carolina Deeds desoribe land by the use of poles. A pole measures 5.5 yards. Sometimes a chain is reference to . A chain represents 22 yards and when chains are used, a measurement of less than one chain is called a link, which measures 7.92 inches. I have found it helpful to diagram these calls and to place process references to stream crossings, trees, hills, and adjoining property owners.

Towards the close of March of the same year, two accessions were made to the number Mrs. John Gorin and his father-in-Law, Mrs. Franklin.
- Page 4 The county was organized in 1799. The first county court was Held at Henry Renick's, nine miles east of Glasgow.

IN NAMING THE EARLY SETTLERS, WE MAY HAVE OMITTED TO MENTION SOME OF THEM, AND OTHERS WE MAY NOT HAVE LOCATED ACCURATELY.

This and the preceding number embrace many settlements made detween the years 1802-1812. The population of Barren County in 1810 was 4,784.
