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# THE "MARROWBONE" ESTATE STORE LEDGER HENRY COUNTY, VIRGINIA - 1806 - 1810

SUBMITTED BY MRS. LILLIAN SCHWERTZ

NAMES FOUND IN AN OLD LEDGER KEPT BY COLL. GEORGE HAIRSTON WHO OPERATED A STORE AT HIS ESTATE "MARROWBOKE" IN HENRY COUNTY, VIGINIA LOCATED ON THE MARROWBOKE RIVER NEAR MARTINSVILLE. THE ACCOUNTS WERE FOR THE YEARS 1806 THROUGH 1810. THESE NAMES WERE GOPIED FROM THE LEDGER BY MRS. LILLIAN SCHWERTZ DURING A RECENT VISIT OF THE MAINSTON FAMILY IN HENRY COUNTY.

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#### BURNET COUNTY'S FIRST CHILD GEORGE A. HOLLAND BORN CCTOBER 4, 1853 NEAR OLD HOLLAND SPRINGS

MY FATHER SAMUEL E. HOLLAND WITH TWO OTHER YOUNG MEN CAME TO TEXAS FROM TROUPE COUNTY GEORGIA OURING THE FALL OF 1846. THEY CAME IN A WAGON DRIVING A SPIKE TEAM OF THREE HORSES, TAKING THEM SEVENTY ONE DAYS TO REACH CASS COUNTY WHERE THEY WERE COMPELLED TO STOP FOR SEVERAL DAYS TO WORK FOR MONEY TO CONTINUE THEIR JOURNEY FARTHER WEST. FOLLOWING THE ORAG OF CIVILIZATION THEY EVENTUALLY REACHED THE THEM VILLAGE OF AUSTIN AND PITCHED CAMP WHERE THE GREAT GRANITE CAPITOL NOW STANDS. THEREAFTER THEY FOUND EMPLOYMENT, CUTTING CEDAR RAILS FOR ONE DOLLAR PER HUNDRED. SOON AFTER HE ENLISTED FOR SERVICE IN THE MEXICAN WAR HIS COMPANY MARCHED TO SAN ANTONIO THEN ON INTO MEXICO WHERE HE LATER WAS ENGAGED IN THE BATTLE OF BURN VISTA AND OTHER ENGAGEMENTS. BEFORE HIS RETIREMENT HE WAS HASTILY SENT BACK TO TEXAS AND RUSHED TO THE FRONTIER OF THIS SECTION TO PROTECT THE FEW STRUGGENETIES.

THUS IT HAPPENED THAT MY FATHER CAME TO WHAT IS NOW KNOWN AS BURNET COUNTY AND BECAME ITS FIRST PERMANENT SETTLER. SOMETIME BE-FORE OLD FORT CROGHAN WAS ESTABLISHED HE EXPLORED THAT PORTION OF THE COUNTRY: HAMILTON VALLEY FROM ITS SOURCES SOME THREE OR FOUR MILES NORTH OR NORTHWEST OF THE PRESENT TOWN OF BURNET TO ITS FALL WHERE OLD MORMON MILL WAS LATER BUILT. FINDING ALL THAT PORTION OF THE VALLEY SOUTH OF THE PRESENT TOWN OF BURNET TO HIS LIKING HE WAS DETERMINED TO POSSESS IT. THE SECTION HE WISHED TO PURCHASE HAD BEEN GRANTED BY THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS TO JOHN ROZIER FOR HIS SERVICE IN THE WAR FOR THE INDEPENDENCE FROM MEXICO AND WAS KNOWN AS SURVEY NUMBER FOUR. IT WAS A CHOICE PIECE OF LAND GREATLY DESIRED BY GEN. HENRY E. MCCOLLOCH WHO WAS LATER CONNECTED WITH THE FORCES AT OLD FT. CROGHAM. ROZIER WAS BY BIRTH A NORTHENER AND AT THAT TIME WAS MAKING ARRANGEMENTS TO RETURN TO HIS NATIVE LAND AND WAS ANXIOUS TO SELL. THE DEAL WAS READILY MADE, FATHER PAYING FIFTY CENTS PER ACRE FOR THE 1280 ACRES, PAYING ROZIER THE \$640 DOWN.

WITH HIS PROPERTY AND A WAGON AND MULE HE STARTED HIS HOME AT WHAT IS NOW KNOWN AS DID HOLLAND SPRINGS AND COMMENCED CLEARING PARCELS OF LAND FOR FARMING. THAT WAS THE FIRST FARM OPENED IN BURNET COUNTY. PARTS OF IT ARE STILL IN CULTIVATION JUST OUT FROM AND ALONG THE BANK OF DELWAKER AND HAMILTON CREEK NEAR OLD HOLLAND SPRINGS. MY HALF SISTER, MRS. JOE BRYAN, NOW OWNS AND HAS CULTIVATED THE GREATER POPTION WHILE SOME OF IT IS INCLUDED IN WHAT IS KNOWN AS "THE WINGREN PLACE, NOW OWNED BY EARNEST FELPS. IN THE LATTER PART OF 1848 FATHER BUILT A LITTLE LOG HOUSE IN THE V-PÖINTED PIECE OF LAND WHERE MUD SPRINGS BRANCH RUNS INTO HAMILTON CREEK, SOME OF THE LOSS USED IN THE HOUSE NOW CONSTITUTES PART OF AN OUTHOUSE ON THE PLACE NOW OWNED BY MY HALF SISTER, MRS. HESTER,

IN FEBRUARY 1852 BURNET COUNTY WAS ORGANIZED AND FATHER WAS ELECTED ITS FIRST COUNTY TREASURER. THE FOLLOWING OCT. 4TH HE WAS MARRIED TO MISS MARY SCOTT, DAUGHTER OF THE FIRST JUDGE, JOHN SCOTT. THEIRS! WAS THE FIRST MARRIAGE IN THE ORGANIZED COUNTY, THE FIRST THE PACE, GEO. JOY, PERFORMED THE CEREMONY. I WAS NEVER THE POLITICIAN NOR A MONEY MAKER LIKE MY FATHER WAS. FRIENDS HAVE

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OFTEN TOLD ME THAT I HAVE ALWAYS BEEN TOO SPIRITUALLY INCLINED AND THAT I HAVE ALWAYS HAD TOO MUCH CONFIDENCE IN MY FELLOWMAN TO EVER ACCUMULATE MORE OF THIS WORLD'S GOODS THAN IS ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY FOR SUSTEMANCE.

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FOR THE FIRST FIVE YEARS OF MY LIFE I HAD NEVER BEEN FARTHER AWAY FROM OLD HOLLAND SPRINGS COMMUNITY THAN TO OAT MEAL CREEK SOME SIX MILES EAST TO VISIT MY SCOTT GRANDPARENTS. MY MOTHER DIED WHEN I WAS ABOUT TWO YEARS OLD AND FATHER WAS MARRIED AGAIN. WHEN AT THE AGE OF FIVE OR SIX MY STEPMOTHER DECIDED TO SEND ME TO SCHOOL. LATE ONE SUNDAY EVENING FATHER SADDLED HIS HORSE, TOOK ME UP BEHIND HIM. GATHERED UP MY SCANTY BELONGINGS AND HEADED TOWARD OAT MEAL CREEK WHERE HE WAS TO LEAVE ME WITH MY GRANDPARENTS SO I COULD ATTEND THE SCHOOL NEAR THEIR HOME. WE ARRIVED THERE ABOUT NIGHT. FATHER ATE HIS SUPPER AND THEN MANAGED TO SLIP AWAY FROM ME. FIND-ING HIM GONE | BEGAN TO CRY AND TRIED TO FOLLOW HIM HOME. GRAND-MOTHER FINALLY SUCCEEDED IN PACIFYING ME AND THE NEXT MORNING I WAS LED TO MY FIRST SCHOOL BUT HAVE FORGOT THE TEACHERS NAME. I STAY-ED WITH MY GRANDMOTHER SIX OR SEVEN MONTHS, NOT GOING HOME FOR A WEEKEND, UNTIL FATHER CAME ON HORSEBACK TO TAKE ME BACK HOME. AT THAT TIME OAT MEAL CREEK AND HAMILTON CREEK WERE AS FAR AWAY AS EL PASO IS FROM TEXARKANA IS TODAY. WHILE STAYING WITH GRANDMOTHER, FATHER SENT ME A SUIT OF CLOTHES BY P.P. PANKEY, A NEIGHBOR OF FATHER'S WHO FOUND IT NECESSARY TO PASS THE OAT MEAL COMMUNITY. THAT WAS MY FIRST SUIT OF CLOTHES, SPUN AND MADE BY MY BELOVED STEP-MOTHER. WHEN FATHER CAME TO TAKE ME HOME HE BROUGHT ME A BARLOW KNIFE; MY FIRST ONE. WHEN I REACHED HOME EVERY ONE AND EVERY THING SEEMED STRANGE-I HAD BEEN GONE SO LONG. I ATTENDED TWO TERMS OF SCHOOL AT HOLLAND SPRINGS FOR BY THE END OF MY SCHOOL TERM AT OAT MEAL TWO MORE LOG HOUSES HAD BEEN BUILT UP THE CREEK FROM FATHER. BY THE TIME MY TWO OLDER HALF BROTHERS WERE OLD ENOUGH TO ATTEND SCHOOL FATHER SENT US TO THE LITTLE VILLAGE SCHOOL AT BURNET, A CRUDE SCHOOL OF THE TIME. AT THAT TIME ALL THE COUNTRY BETWEEN HOLLAND SPRINGS AND THE LITTLE VILLAGE OF BURNET WAS UNFENCED, DE-VOID OF CEDAR AND VERY LITTLE UNDERBRUSH. | WELL REMEMBER THE THREE MILES TO SCHOOL. HOW IT WOUND IN AND OUT AND AROUND UNTIL WE REACHED WHAT IS KNOWN AS THE COKER PLACE.

SOMEWHERE NEAR WHERE THE COKER HOUSE NOW STANDS, WE HIT A WELL WORN COW TRAIL THAT LED US DIRECTLY INTO WHAT IS NOW SOUTH MAIN STREET ON UP TO THE SCHOOLHOUSE. OUT ABOUT TWENTY STEPS NORTHWEST OF THE FRONT GATE OF THE PLACE NOW OCCUPIED BY AUNT SUE JOHNSON WAS A BLACKJACK THICKET WITH TWO BIG ELMS TOWERING ABOVE. IN THAT THICK-ET WAS A LONE GRAVE ENCLOSED BY HOMEMADE PICKETS. THE TRAIL LED DIRECTLY BY THE SIDE OF THE THICKET AND ON A CLOUDY, MISTY OR DARK DAY IT WAS TERROR TO US TO HAVE TO PASS IT; WE WOULD PASS AT A HIGH RUN. IF IT WERE A BRIGHT DAY WE WOULD PEER INTO THE SHADOWS THROUGH THE HIGH PICKETS SAY "BOO" AND RUN AWAY. YEARS LATER THE MORMON MILL, HOLLAND SPRINGS AND MARBLE FALLS ROADS MERGED AT THE THICKET ALL LEADING TO SOUTH MAIN STREET. TIME AND THE ELEMENTS LONG AGO DECAYED THE PICKETS ENCLOSING THE GRAVE; LITTLE BY LITTLE THE BLACKJACKS SOMEHOW DISAPPEARED AND ONLY THE TWO SENTINEL ELMS WERE LEFT, WHEN ONE OF THEM WENT THE WAY OF ALL VEGETABLE MATTER. IN 1925 IT TOO FELL IN DECAY TO RETURN TO DUST FROM WHICH IT CAME. FOR MANY YEARS AFTER THE PICKETS, THICKETS AND ELMS WERE GONE | KEPT THE

GRAVE WELL MARKED. EVEN THOUGH A ROAD ALMOST TOUCHED IT ON BOTH SIDES. FOR I WAS THE ONLY OLD-TIMER LEFT WHO KNEW EXACTLY WHERE IT WAS. PROBABLY MRS. CLANE GIBBS IS THE ONLY ONE WHO COULD POINT IT OUT TODAY FOR I OFTEN POINTED IT OUT TO HER WHILE ON MY FREQUENT VISITS TO MY LATE STEPMOTHER. AUNT SUE HOLLAND, WHO THEN LIVED IN THE HOUSE NOW OCCUPIED BY AUNT SUE JOHNSON. I WAS OFTEN ASKED WHY THE LONE GRAVE WAS THERE. DURING THE OLD DAYS, WHEN FT. CROGHAN WAS IN EXISTENCE. A LITTLE LONE LOG HOUSE STOOD SOMEWHERE IN THE VICINITY OF WHERE WILFORD STEPHENSON AND TIM COX NOW LIVE. A MAN AND HIS FAMILY OCCUPIED THE CABIN. ONE DAY HE LEARNED HE HAD TO TAKE A LONG TRIP ON BUSINESS AND TOLD HIS WIFE HE WOULD NOT RETURN FOR SEVERAL DAYS. ABOUT HALF A DAYS JOURNEY OUT HE MET SOME ONE WHO INFORMED HIM THAT MATTERS HAD BEEN ARRANGED SO THAT IT WAS NOT NECESSARY FOR HIM TO CONTINUE THE TRIP: CONSEQUENTLY HE RETURNED HOME AFTER DARK. HE RODE INTO THE STABLE, UNSADDLED AND FED HIS HORSE AND STARTED FOR THE HOUSE. JUST AS HE OPENED THE DOOR A FT. CROGHAN SOLDIER SHOT HIM DEAD THEN RAN AWAY AND NEVER WAS APPRE-HENDED. THE NEXT DAY THE BODY WAS PREPARED FOR BURIAL AND CARRIED ACROSS THE CREEK AND BURRIED A SHORT DISTANCE FROM THE THEN HIGH CREEK BANK. AT THAT TIME AND UNTIL LONG AFTER I WAS GROWN. THE SOUTH BANK OF THE CREEK WAS STEEP AND WAS WHERE ONE NOW ENTERS THE CREEK BED. THE CUTTING INTO THE EAST BANK FOR GRAVEL HAS CAUSED A COMPLETE CHANGE IN THE CONTOUR OF HAMILTON CREEK WHERE SUE JOHNSON NOW LIVES. | ALSO ATTENDED SCHOOL IN THE OLD BURNET COURTHOUSE. A ONE STORY BOX BUILDING. LATER | ATTENDED A PAY TERM TAUGHT BY A PROFESSOR WILLIAMS. THAT TERM I TOOK PENMANSHIP AS A SPECIAL COURSE. IN ALL I ATTENDED NINE TERMS OF SCHOOL. ALL SHORT TERMS AND ALL IN BURNET COUNTY. IF ANY OF MY SCHOOLMATES ARE LIVING I DO NOT KNOW WHERE THEY ARE.

When I became 21 I went out on my own, working over the country at first one thing then the other. In 1874 father gave me a fine piece of land in Lampasas County. I put in a nice 25 age farm and then rented it out to a Mr. Tom Hines. The next year I went back to my farm, Living at that time with the Hines family; Hines and me putting more land into cultivation. The two years following I and a Mr. McGowen batched and farmed. During that time I met and on Sept. 10, 1878 married, Miss Nancy McWilliams. Six children were born to our union, two dying in infancy.

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ON NOV. 21, T882 I SOLD OUT IN LAMPASAS AND MOVED TO MASON COUNTY WHERE I PURCHASED A NICE FARM, IMPROVED IT AND HAD ONE OF THE FINEST ORCHARDS IN MASON COUNTY, DOING MY OWN BUDDING AND GRAFTING.

On Aug. 17, 1893 my wife died Leaving me with four small children to raise. I kept them together, raised them as best I could in the fear and admonition of their Lord. On Jan. 5, 1914 Minnie, my youngest daughter died at the age of 24. My son and two other daughters being maried | Decided to sell out affer having lived in Mason County for 32 years. For several years I wandered among my mumerous kinsmen. When my health and eyesighthe Ecan to fail I came to Carrollton, Dallas County to make my home with my daughter, Mrs. Mollie Brown.

When about 14 years old my father bought my half brother, Dave a pair of red top brass-tord boots and me a big old heavy pair of brogans; much heavier than Jim McClish remembers so vell. When we became possessors of those shoes we at once sat down, fubblingly got them on, them climslif we got to our feet. Wobbling, we malk-ed for a time and finally learned to run in them; then we would run, fall down, get up and run acain and how we did laugh! Those shoes were a great syeet in our narrowed lives.

OF COURSE I REMEMBER THE DAYS OF THE SPINNING WHEEL, TALLOW CANDLES, OX MAGONS AND HOMEMADE FUNITURE. I REMEMBER GOOSE QUILL WRITING PENS, WHEN INK WAS MADE OF POLK BERRIES OR BLUING, GOURD DIPPERS, WHEN HOMEMADE SOAP REQUIRED THE OLD ASH HOPPERS SERVICES, CRACKLING BREAD. I ALSO REMEMBER HOW WELL THE OCCASIONAL SUNDAY BISCIUTS TASTED, THE RARE CAMP MEETINGS WHEN PEOPLE REALLY GOT HEARTFELT RELIGION, WHEN THE BIBLE WAS USUALLY THE ONLY BOOK FOUND IN A HOME AND FAMILY PRAYER WAS COMMON.

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FOR OUR MEAT SUPPLY WE HAD RAZOR BACK HOOS FOR BACON. IT WAS SELDOM A HOG WAS FATTENED IN A PEN; FOR WITH THE LITTLE BIT OF CORN THROWN TO HIM; PECANS AND ACORNS PUT ON THE FINISHING TOUCHES FOR KILLING. WE HAD HONEY, VENISON AND TURKEY ANY TIME WE CHOSE. WE USUALLY WILKED FROM SIX TO TEN LONGHORN COWS FOR MILK AND BUTTER. IN MY BOYHOOD DAYS WE HAD A LARGE ROCK MILK-HOUSE BUILT ON THE SPRINGS WHERE MY STEPPOHTER KEPT A GOOD SUPPLY OF MILK, BUTTER, HONEY, MOLASSES, VEGATABLES AND FRESH MEAT AND OTHER THINGS REQUIRED FOR HER LARGE FAMILY.

THE OLD SPRING MILK-HOUSES WERE THE ICE BOXES AND ELECTRIC REFRIGERATIORS OF MY BOYHOOD. IT IS REGRETABLE THAT WE OLDER PEOPLE WERE NOT FARSIGHTED ENOUGH TO PRESERVE SOME OF THOSE MANY THINGS THAT FEATURED OUR PLONEER DAYS AND LIFE THAT THIS AND COMING GENERATIONS MIGHT HAVE A BETTER SENSEOF THEIR BACKGROUND AND CONTINUITY.

PERHAPS THE WHOLE ASPECT OF BURNET COUNTY'S LANDSCAPE HAS CHANGED AS MUCH AS THE MANNERS, WORALS, MODES AND CUSTONS OF THE PEOPLE. DURING MY YOUND DAYS BURNET WAS OPEN MODILAND; NO CEDAR, LITTLE UNDERSRUSH. OF COURSE THERE WERE ISOLATED CEDAR BRAKES NEAR SMITHMICK MILL, MORNOM MILL AND A FEW OTHER BRAKES. A CEDAR TREE WAS THEN A RARE THING BETWEEN BURNET AND LAMPASAS. THERE WERE AS FEW SCATTERED CEDAR WEST FROM BURNET. IN THOSE DAYS THERE WERE MANY PASTURES CONTAINING AT LEAST 1,000 ACRES. EVERY MAN WHO OWNED EVEN A COW MAS REQUIRED TO HAVE A RECORDED BRAND. EVERY POOR MAN HAD A FREE CATTLE RANGE. WATER WAS ALWAYS PLENTIFUL EVEN IN THE DRIEST YEARS. MANY SPRINGS THAT WERE THOUGHT EVERLASTING HAVE LONG CEASED TO BE OTHER THAN MET WEATHER SPRINGS, DUE, IT THINK TO THE FACT THAT THE COUNTRY HAS BECOME SO CEDAR INFESTED, MUCH MORE LAND IN CULTIVATION, ETC.

I REMEMBER WHEN OLD CONRAD FUENS, THEN ONE OF THE PROMINENT RANCHMEN OF THE TIME, AND OTHER STATA TAT ONE TIME OR ANOTHER OWNED GRANITE MOUNTAIN AND SURROUNDING TERRITORY WOULD OFTEN COMMENT CONCERNING THEIR WORTHLESS ROCK MOUNTAIN, LITTLE REALIZING THE FORTUNE IT EVENTUALLY PROVED TO BE.

"I WELL REMEMBER THE INDIAN RAID IN WHICH MY FATHER, GOING TO BURNET FROM MORMON MILL, WHERE HE THEN LIVED HAD A RUNNING BATTLE WITH THE INDIAN BAND THAT HAD THE DAY BEFORE RAIDED THROUGH THE SMITHNICK SECTIONS, CAPTURING AND PUTTING TO DEATH A NEGRO GIRL. THE BAND LATER CROSSED OVER INTO LLAND COUNTY AND MURDERED THE WHITLOCK FAMILY. I REMEMBER WHEN OLD MORMON MILL WAS A GRINDING PLACE FOR PEOPLE FROM PARTS OF BLANCO, GILLESPIE, LLAND, MASON AND SAN SABA COUNTIES. I REMEMBER WHEN COURT SESSIONS IN BURNET WERE FROUGHT WITH DANGER TO SHERIFF, JUDGE, JURY, WITNESS, LAWYER OR INDIVIDUAL. WHEN MORE THAN ONCE THE TRIAL JUDGE HAD ARRED CITIZENS STANDING BY. WHEN OFFEN A CATTLE OR HORSE THIEF SERVED AS HIS OWN

WHEN THE OLD COURTHOUSE BURNED DURING THE EARLY 70'S, ALL CATTLE BRANDS WERE DESTROYED; WHICH FACT, GAVE CATTLE AND HORSE THIEVER'S. FOR HAVING NO RECORDED BRAND, AN OWNER COULD NOT PROVE OWNERSHIP OF AN ANIMAL EVEN KNOWING WITHOUT A DOURT IT WAS HIS OWN.

I REMEMBER THE PRECEDING AND THE FIRST DAYS OF THE CIVIL WAR WHEN BUSHWHACKERS WANTONLY MURDERED AND ROBBED SOME OF THE FINEST MEN OF BURNET COUNTY. I MISSED SERVICE IN THE WAR BY TWO YEARS BUT REMEMBER THE HARDSHIP ENDURED WHILE THE SOUTHLAND WAS BEING BLED WHITE. I REMEMBER THE LOYALTY OF THE FAITHFUL OLD SLAVES TO THE FAMILIES OF THEIR MASTERS WHILE THOSE MASTERS WERE OFF SUFFER-ING THE PANGS OF COLD AND HUNGER BECAUSE OF THE SLAVE QUESTION. I REMEMBER WHEN DURING THE LATTER PART OF THE CIVIL WAR A FULL GROWN ROBUST MAN WAS SELDOM SEEN. ONLY OLD MEN. BOYS. CRIPPLES AND SLAVES WERE LEFT TO PROVIDE FOR AND PROTECT THE WAR WIDOWS AND THE WAR ORPHANS OF THE SOUTH. I WELL REMEMBER THE CONSTERNATION OF THE PEOPLE WHEN WORD CAME THAT DAY IN 1865 THAT GEN. ROBERT F. LEE HAD SURRENDERED AND I REMEMBER WHEN THE WEARY FOOTSORE BAGGED CONFED-ERATES. ALL RATHER YOUNG IN YEARS. BUT OLD IN APPEARANCE BEGAN TO RETURN TO THEIR IMPROVISED HOMES. THEN FOLLOWED EVEN MORE GLOOMY DAYS WHEN THE SOUTHLAND WAS INFESTED BY THE KU KLUX. CARPETBAGGERS. POLITICAL SCALAWAGS OF EVERY DESCRIPTION. DAYS, WEEKS AND MONTHS DRAGGED BY AND FINALLY MATTERS BEGAN TO ADJUST THEMSELVES AND THE SUN BROKE THROUGH AND THE WHOLE COUNTRY BEGAN TO TAKE ON A NEW IMPETUS. I HAVE LIVED TO SEE THE COMING AND ENDING OF THE CIVIL WAR, THE SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR, WORLD WAR I AND MANY POLITICAL WARS: EACH IN ITS TURN SHOCKED THE COUNTRY INTO A MORAL, POLITICAL AND ECONOMICAL EARTHQUAKE EACH FOLLOWED BY A NEW ORDER FOR CIVILIZATION.

JUST BEFORE AND DURING THE FIRST DAYS OF THE CIVIL WAR HEART RENDING INCIDENTS TOOK PLACE IN BURNET COUNTY AS WELL AS ELSEWHERE. IF A MAN MERE A UNIONIST OR EVEN SUSPICIONED AS BEING ONE HIS LIFE WAS IN DANGER. AN INCIDENT OF THE TIME WAS WHEN ONE NIGHT A YOUNG MAN LIVING IN THE SOUTHERN PART OF THE COUNTY, AND SUPPOSEDLY UNIONIST, WAS CALLED BY MEN ON HORSE BACK TO COME TO HIS FRONT DOOR; THE YOUNG MAN TOLD HIS SISTER TO RESPOND TO THE CALL. HE GRABBED AS HE FATHERBED RAN THROUGH THE BACK DOOR, ACROSS A CLEARING INTO THE BRUSH, CAME TO A HIGH BLUFF, PUT THE FEATHERBED BEFORE HIM, JUMPED, THEN RAN DOWN THE CREEK AND EVENTUALLY MADE A GETWAMY TO MEXICO. MANY OF THE COUNTY'S BEST MEN, UNIONIST AT HEART, FLED TO CALIFORNIA OR MEXICO. JOHN R HUBBARD, MRS. O. O. CORKET'S FATHER.

BECAUSE OF HIS POLITICAL VIEWS WAS FOULLY MURDERED AND ROBBED BETWEEN COW CREEK AND SMITHWICK JUST A FEW DAYS BEFORE HE HAD PLANNED TO FLEE THE COUNTRY. GRANDFATHER SCOTT, THE COUNTY'S FIRST JUDGE, CAME TO BURNET COUNTY IN 1851 AND SETTLED ON OATMEAL CREEK WHERE HE PLANTED THE FIRST ORCHARD IN THE COUNTY (AND WAS LAUGHED AT FOR DOING SO); PUT IN A CHEESE PRESS AND HAD, UP TO THE COMING OF THE CIVIL WAR, PROSPERED UNUSUALLY WELL. HAVING BEEN BORN IN NEW YORK STATE AND REARED IN NEW JERSEY HE WAS NATURALLY A UNIONIST AT HEART, ALTHOUGH HE HAD FOUR SONS IN THE CONFEDERATE SERVICE AND WAS DOING HIS FULL SHARE IN HELPING TO FURNISH CONFEDERATE SUPPLIES. HE HAD MADE A GREAT DEAL OF MONEY IN THE CALIFORNIA GOLD RUSH BE-FORE COMING TO TEXAS. HIS LIFE HAD BEEN ANONYMOUSLY THREATENED AND HIS FRIENDS HAD ADVISED HIM TO FLEE TO MEXICO UNTIL AFTER THE CLOSE OF THE WAR. STRAPPING \$2,000 AROUND HIS WAIST, BIDDING HIS FAMILY GOODBYE, HE SADDLED HIS HORSE LATE ONE EVENING AND STARTED FOR MEXICO. HE STOPPED TO SPEND THE NIGHT WITH FRIENDS SOME 7 MILES FROM HOME AND THE NEXT MORNING WAS JOINED BY A MAN BY THE NAME OF MCMASTERS, ALSO A UNIONIST AT HEART. JUST BEFORE CROSSING A FORD ON THE COLORADO RIVER BETWEEN SMITHWICK AND MARBLE FALLS THEY WERE HELD UP; MCMASTERS ROBBED AND HANGED, GRANDFATHER SCOTT ROBBED AND SHOT. THEIR BODIES WERE TAKEN SEVERAL MILES AWAY TO THE DREADED DEAD MAN'S HOLE" WHICH IS OUT ACROSS THE COLORADO RIVER SOME THREE OR FOUR MILES FROM THE PRESENT TOWN OF MARBLE FALLS. THERE THEIR BODIES WERE DISPOSED OF. FOR A LONG TIME IT WAS NOT DEFINITELY KNOWN AS TO WHERE THEY HAD BEEN TAKEN. THREE OR FOUR YEARS AFTER THE CLOSE OF THE CIVIL WAR, FATHER, GEORGE DAVIDSON, ELIGA HELMS AND FRED WILLIAMSON, THEN SHERIFF OF BURNET COUNTY, WENT DOWN INTO THE GAS FILLED HOLE AND FOUND THE REMAINS OF THE TWO AND OF OTHERS. GRANDMOTHER SCOTT IDENTIFIED GRANDFATHER'S REMAINS BY A PECULIAR JAW BONE AND TEETH. OTHER SIMILAR MURDERS TOOK PLACE DURING THE DAYS JUST PRECEDING THE WAR AND DURING THE FIRST DAYS OF CONFLICT. NONE OF THE WANTON MURDERERS WERE EVER APPREHENDED: ALTHOUGH IT WAS GUESSED UPON STRONG SUSPICION AS TO WHO SOME OF THEM WERE, LACK OF EVIDENCE PREVENTED THEIR ARREST. OLD NOAH SMITHWICK, UNIONIST IN SENTIMENT WITH THREE OF THE OLD MORMON FAMILIES AND SEVERAL OTHERS, FLED THE COUNTRY AND BRAVED THE LONG DANGEREROUS ROUTE TO CALIFORNIA. BARELY ESCAPING THE FATE OF HIS YOUNG NEPHEW, JOHN R. HUBBARD, WHOM HE LEFT IN CHARGE OF OLD SMITHWICK MILL AND OTHER PROPERTIES HE HAD ACQUIRED DURING HIS COLORFUL SOJOURN IN BURNET COUNTY. SMITHWICK'S HISTORY NOW CONCEDED AS BEING ONE OF THE VERY BEST OF THE NUMEROUS TEXAS HISTORIES, RELATES MUCH PERTAINING TO HIS BURNET COUNTY EXPERIENCES.

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IN 1848 CONSTRUCTION WORK STARTED ON THE GREAT \$1,187,710 WASHINGTON MONUMENT WHICH WAS NOT DEDICATED UNTIL FEB. 22, 1895. THE OUTER WALLS WERE CONSTRUCTED OF WHITE MABBLE BLOCKS WHICH WERE CAREFULLY GUT AND THE INSIDE WALLS WERE CONSTRUCTED OF BLUE GRANIT; THE TWO PARTS OF MASONRY BEING CLOSELY CEMENTED. FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THAT GREAT MONUMENT MARBLE OR GRANITE WAS GOTTEN FROM EVERY STATE IN THE UNION. I HAVE FORGOTTEN IN WHICH YEAR IT WAS WHEN A HUGE PIECE OF MARBLE WAS GOTTEN FROM THE MARBLE QUARRY JUST TWO MILES SOUTH OF BUTNET FROM OFF THE PLACE NOW OWNED BY MY HALF-SISTER-IN-LAW, MGS. S. W. HOLLAND. IT REQUIRED TWENTY OKEN MANY DAYS TO PULL THE SLAB TO AUSTIN (ON GREAT WAGONS CONNECTED BY HUGE CHAINS). IT COST QUITE A LARGE SUU OF MONEY FOR THE LABOR IN CUTTON

AUSTIN TO WASHINGTON, D.C. FATHER DONATED THE GREAT SLAB OF MARBLE AS A FREE GRATIS CONTRIBUTION WHEN ASKED FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF TAKING IT FROM HIS QUARRY. THE BEST EQLOCGISTS OF TEXAS HAVE RECENTLY MADE EXTENSIVE TESTS UPON THAT SAME QUARRY AND HAVE FOUND IT TO CONTAIN AN INEXAUSTIBLE QUANTITY OF A FINE GRADE OF MARBLE. STRONG TRACES OF MAGNESIA WERE ALSO FOUND WHILE THE TESTS WERE BEING MADE.

THE TEXAS MINING AND IMPROVEMENT COMPANY, THE MARBLE FALLS COTTON AND WOOLEN MILL, VARIOUS INDIVIDUAL MINING ENTERPRISES AND OTHER UNDERTAKINGS OF THE O'S AND O'S IN WHICH FATHER AND GEN. ADAM R. JOHNSON, F. H. HOLLOWAY THE RAMSOELLS, CHRISTIANS, YETTS AND OTHERS SPONSORD ARE NOW ALMOST FOROGYTEN BUT HAVING ONCE BEEN THE CHERISHED DREAMS OF THE TIME JUST AS BUCHANAN DAM IS THE CHERISHED TREAM FOR TODAY'S ACHIEVEMENT. BUCHANAN DAM WAS A DREAM OF ONE OF THE COUNTY'S CHERISHED PROBLERS.

A WELL PRESERVED COLLECTION OF FATHERS! MANY OFFICIAL AND LEGAL PAPERS PERTAINING TO BURNET COUNTY, DATING BEFORE 1805 BEGAN THUS: STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF TRAVIS-BURNET COUNTY WAS ORGANIZED FROM THE TRAVIS LAND GRANT. THE PERSONAL SIGNATURES OF GOVERNOR HENDERSON, MODO AND BELL (WHO WAS GOVERNOR WHEN THE COUNTY WAS ORGANIZED) ARE ATTACHED TO SOME OF THE OLD PAPERS. THE SIGNITURES OF PRACTICALLY. EVERY SHERIFF, COUNTY CLERK AND DISTRICT CLERK OF THE COUNTY FROM 1052 UP TO THE EARLY 1900'S IS TO BE FOUND ATTACHBED TO SOME ONE OR MOTHER OF THE PAPERS. THAT OF D.L. LUCE IS ATTACHED MOST OFTEN FOR IF I REMEMBER CORRECTLY, LUCE WAS DISTRICT CLERK FROM THE 1870'S TO THE 1970'S. (E.O. ERROR NOTED).

AMONG THE OLD PAPERS IS A RELEASE GIVEN TO FATHER BY WM. BURNAN IN 1848. THIS RELEASE SHOWS THAT BEFORE FATHER BOUGHT HIS 1260 ACRES OF LAND FROM JOHN P. ROZIER, ROZIER HAD HAD CAPT. HENRY MCCULLOCH HAS TOLL THE LAND TO BURNARM BUT BURNARM HAD NOT MET PAYMENT; CONSEQUENTLY ROZIER SOLD IT TO FATHER. THIS RELEASE WAS SIGNED BY MCCULLOCH AT MCCULLOCH'S STATION WHICH STATION LATER BECAME FT. CROGHAN. MCCULLOCH WAS STATIONED THERE WITH FORCES TO PROTECT THE FEW STRUGGLING SCITLERS FROM INDIAN DEPREDATIONS AND REMAINED THERE AS AS OFFICER OF FT. CROGHAN FORCES, HAVING BY THAT TIME BEEN PROMOTED TO A HIGHER OFFICERSHIP.

ANOTHER OLD RECORD IS DATED JAN. 6, 1854 WHEREIN JACOB CASTLEBERRY OF HANCOCK COUNTY, ILLINOIS MADE FATHER FULL POWER OF ATTORNEY TO ADMINISTER THE B. B. CASTLEBERRY TRACT OF LAND KNOWN AS SURVEY NUMBER THREE.

A BILL OF SALE FOR A NINETEEN YEAR OLD NEGRO SLAVE GIVEN TO MY FATHER BY CHARLES C. C. KAVANAUGH, DATED DEC. 5, 1854 IS AMONG THE OLD RECORDS. FATHER PAID KAVANAUGH \$1,000 DOLLARS FOR NED AND FOUND HE HAD MADE A GOOD BUY. I HAVE FORGOTTEN HOW OR WHEN FATHER PARTED FROM NED. SO FAR AS KNOWN, THIS BILL OF SALE FOR A SLAVE MADE AND GIVEN IN BURNET COUNTY IS THE ONLY ONE PRESERVED.

Another is a contract in which is shown that on Jan. 28, 1867.
FATHER, JOSEPH PAYTON, DAVID WILLIAMS, MARTIN TOWNSEND, JOHN A. COON,
D. C. BARMORE AND R. R. KELLEY (PAYTON, WILLIAMS, AND TOWNSEND
CITIZENS OF TRAVIS COUNTY) ORGANIZED TO ESTABLISH A FOUNDRY THREE

AND ONE HALF MILES SOUTH OF BURNET, ON HAMILTON CREEK TO BE KNOWN AS "THE BURNET IRON WORKS." THE BURNET TO MANUFACTURE IRON AND STEEL PRODUCTS. FATHER FURNISHED \$3,000 CAPITAL AND SO MANY ACRES OF LÂND ON WHICH THE FOUNDRY WAS TO BE ERECTED INCLUDING MATER POWER OF GREAT VALUE. PAYTON FURNISHED CAPITAL OF \$1,000, WILLIAMS \$1,000, TOMENSEND \$1,000, KELLEY \$500 AND COON FURNISHED 100 ACRES OF LAND ON WHICH THERE WAS AND IS TODAY IRON ORE. PATTON HAD COMMAND OF THE ERECTION OF THE FOUNDRY AT \$100 PER MONTH AND WAS MANAGER. AFTER A YEAR OR TWO OF HARD LABOR AND LOSS OF THEIR CAPITAL, THE ENTERPRIZE FELL THROUGH FOR LACK OF SUFFICIENT WATER FACILITIES THE YEAR ROUND. THE HOLE OF WATER NEAR WHERE THE FOUNDRY WAS STARTED IS STILL KNOWN AS THE OLD FOUNDRY HOLE. IT WAS AT THE TIME OF THE ENTERPRIZE A GREAT DEEP HOLE, BUT TODAY IS ONLY A SMALL POOL WELL ADAPTED AS A NICE PLACE TO SWIM AND IS NOW OWNED BY MY HALF SISTER, MISS. HENRY HESTER OF BURNET.

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MANY OF THE OLD PAPERS ARE RECORDS CONCERNING LAND DEALS WHERE-IN INDIVIDUALS BEGAN BUYING PARCELS OF THOSE VARIOUS GRANTS THAT WERE MADE TO VETERANS FOR THEIR SERVICE IN THE WAR FOR INDEPENDENCE FROM MEXICO IN 1836. THERE WERE THE ROBERER, THE ROSIER, THE CASTLEBERRY, THE HAMILTON, THE JACOB DE CORDOVA AND MANY OTHER SURVEYOR GRANTS THAT LAY IN THE TERRITORY THAT EVENTUALLY BECAME BUNNET COUNTY. TODAY THOSE GRANTS CONTAIN-HUNDREDS OF LITTLE INDIVIDUAL FARMS AND RANCHES. WITH ONE, OR PROBABLY TWO, EXCEPTIONS THERE IS NOT A DESCENDANT LIVING IN BURNET COUNTY OF THOSE GRAND OLD MEN TO WHOM THE GRANTS WERE MADE.

- CREATED 1839 AND ORGANIZED 1842 FROM SHELBY COUNTY. NAMED FOR JOHAS HARRISON, LAWYER, WHO SETTLED IN WHAT IS NOW SHELBY COUNTY! AND AIR OF 1837.
- CITIES AND COMMUNITIES: DARCO, ELYSIAN FIELDS, GILL, HALLSVILLE, HARLETON, JONESVILLE, KARNACK, LEIGH, LOTTA, MARSHALL, SCOTTSVILLE, WASKOM, AND WOODLAWN.

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HISTORY: IN MARSHALL WERE THE OLD DWELLINGS USED IN THE EARLY GOV. THOMAS C. REYNOLDS AND STAFF. CIVIL WAR REFUGEES FROM THEIR OWN STATE SET UP HEADQUARTERS AND CONDUCTED AFFAIRS OF STATE. AS A RESULT, MARSHALL, TEXAS, HAS THE DISTINCTION OF HAVING ONCE BEEN THE CAPITOL OF MISSOURI. 

THE COMPONENT PARTS OF A PRESENT-DAY COAT-OF-ARMS CONSISTS BASICALLY OF THE SHIELD, AND THE HELMET, WITH OR WITHOUT CREST-WITH OR WITHOUT MANTLING. SOMETIMES MERELY THE SHIELD AND THE CREST ARE PICTURED. MOTTOS WERE, IN MOST CASES, OF MUCH LATER ORIGIN THAN THE SHIELD AND CREST, POSSIBLY NOT MUCH USED PRIOR TO THE FOURTEENTH CENTURY.

THE SHIELD WAS THE BODY-COVERING, SO-TO-SPEAK, WHOSE SHAPE VARIED GREATLY THRU THE AGES. THE ROMANS AT ONE TIME HAD ROUND ONES. OTHER PEOPLES HAVE HAD TALL THIN ONES. STILL OTHERS ARE ALMOST RECTANGULAR. TO PICTURE THE CORRECT SHIELD, THEREFORE, REQUIRES KNOWLEDGE OF THE TYPE IN USE AT THE TIME OR IN THE ERA IN WHICH OR WHEN IT IS KNOWN THAT THE PERSON OR FAMILY WHOSE IDENTIFY—ING-DEVICE(S) ARE PAINTED UPON IT FIRST USED THOSE DEVICES.

"THE "RIGHT TO BEAR ARNS" DESCENDED, THEREFORE, IN A FAMILY, SOME ROOM MOST ANCIENT DAYS - OTHERS BEING SPECIFICALLY CONFERRED BY A RULER ON A FOLLOWER FOR OUTSTANDING FEATS OR LOYALTIES. THE FIGHT-ING-MEN IN EARLIEST DAYS WERE RECOGNIZED BY THEIR COLORS AND THE DEVICES ON THEIR SHIELDS; THOSE OF LESSER SOCIAL RANK BUSUALLY BEAR-

ING THE ARMS OF THEIR "LIEGE-LORD".

BOTH THE USAGE AND THE DESCRIPTIVE-TERMS DATE FROM THE "DAYS OF CHIVALRY" WHEN IT WAS BOTH SOCIALLY AND ECONOMICALLY IMPORTANT. BE-CAUSE OF THE PRACTICE OF "PRIMOGENITURE", WHICH ENTAILED DESCENT OF PROPERTY AND RIGHTS FROM FATHER TO ELDEST SON, -A PRACTICE WHICH ENDURED FROM APPROXIMATELY TWO THOUSAND B.C. UNTIL AROUND SIXTEEN HUNDRED A.D. -PROPERTY, ESPECIALLY LAND, DESCENDED BY HERIDITARY-TITLE. THIS WAS A UNIQUE TYPE OF TITLE IN THAT RIGID REQUIREMENTS HAD TO BE MET, ESPECIALLY REGARDING LINEAL TENURE. RECOGNIZED LEGAL TENURE MEANT KNOWLEDGE AND PROOF OF A MINIMUM OF NINE IN SUCCESSION BACK OF THE CLAIMANT, HENCE THE IMPORTANCE OF THE OFFICE OF BARD. WHO SUNG THE PROGRESSIVE ACHIEVEMENTS AND DETAILS REGARDING THE LAND-HOLDER'S ANTECEEDANTS. KNOWING THIS WAS THE LAW FOR SO MANY GENERATIONS, EXPLAINS THE VALUE ATTACHED TO THE VISITATIONS MADE BY THE RECORD-TAKERS SENT OUT BY QUEEN ELIZABETH I THRU OUT HER REALM. COMMISSIONED TO WRITE DOWN FROM THE LIPS OF THE BARDS OF EACH LAND-HOLDERS CORTEGE THE DETAILS BY WHICH HIS TITLE WAS HELD.

LINEAGE IS, THEREFORE, THE FOUNDATION UPON WHICH THAT WHICH HAS BEEN HELD MOST IMPORTANT BY MEN OF EVERY AGE OF THE PAST CENTERED THEIR ATTENTION. THEY DID NOT RIDICULE IT. WHY SHOULD WE?
