A RESEARCH TRIP TO SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

In October, Linda Rogers, Dorothy Bruce, Pat Hatcher and Sammie Lee made a trip to Salt Lake City to research at the LDS Family History Library. This is their report.

"If you have never been to the Library in Salt Lake City, maybe you will find our experiences helpful in planning your trip. Go on Tuesday and return on Sunday. This gives the maximum number of hours at the library and also usually qualifies for bargain airfares. The months of October, November, March, and April are "off season" months for hotels and airlines and offer the best opportunity for good rates, plus less crowded conditions at the library.

We stayed at the Howard Johnson's, which is right next door to the library, has free airport shuttle service and offers a 15 per cent discount for senior citizens and genealogists (ask for the genealogy discount when you book.) There are several other hotels within two blocks of the library, such as the Marriott, Travelodge and Red Lion Inn.

The library is across the street from Temple Square and near several auditoriums and the Salt Palace. These have numerous cultural and sporting events(some are free.) Shopping malls are one and two blocks away. Salt Lake City is surrounded by mountains and the scenery is lovely.

A snack room, located on the first floor of the library has vending machines with a good selection of sandwiches, salads, muffins, fruits, ice cream, juice, soft drinks, coffee and other snacks, reasonably priced. There are tables and chairs, and a stand-up bar for eating, plus a microwave for heating foods. Several restaurants are located within walking distance of the library, as well as a fast-food court in the nearby mall.

The library opens at 7:30 a.m. Monday - Saturday and closes at 10.00 p.m. Tuesday - Friday; 5:00 p.m. on Saturday; 6:00 p.m. on Monday. Closed on Sunday. The collection of 1.5 million rolls of microfilm and 180,000 books is distributed on four floors: British - basement 2; International - basement 1; LDS and Family Genealogies - main floor; U.S. and Canada - second floor. (Administration - third floor.) Each floor has tables, microfilm readers (the hand-crank kind, so get your arm muscles in shape!), fiche readers, copy centers and computers for the Family History Library Catalog and the International Genealogical Index (IGI).

Each copy center has several photocopiers (5 cents), fiche printers

(20 cents), and microfilm printers with various reduction sizes(20 cents). For convenience take about \$25 in dimes and nickels, with some type of coin holder or coin purse, although change is available from change machines and library attendants. For women, an apron with pockets, a "fanny pack" or a sweater with big pockets is useful for keeping track of change, classes, a pencil and a small notepad as you move around the library. Facilities on the second floor (United States and Canada) can be crowded, creating lines at the copiers and no vacant readers. However, you can take materials to the other, less crowded floors as long as you return them to the proper location.

Prepare before you go by visiting one of the local LDS Family History Centers in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. (If you do not live in this area, you can write Salt Lake City for a list of the Family History Centers in your area.) Review the Family History Library Catalog on microfiche (the Dallas Public Library has the 1988 edition) to plan your research, noting microfilm reel numbers and book call numbers. For some counties the records are voluminous: hundreds of rolls of deed, probate, cemetery and vital records. For other counties the records are not so complete. Because of the way the catalog entries were made, it is important to <u>check for records at the state, county</u> <u>and town levels.</u> The Library by Johni Cerny and Windy Elliott is a useful resource.

The international holdings are also voluminous. For Canada and Great Britain, the microfilm collection of parish registers is extensive. Microfilm rolls for the least frequently accessed countries are kept in the storage vault. Check with the library in advance if you suspect you are researching such a country. Then, if necessary you can notify them of your needs at least a week before your visit.

The library has research and how-to guides on U. S., Canadian and international records available at the library. Some of the guides published by the library can be purchased by mail prior to your trip to Salt Lake City.

Throughout the week, free classes are held on a variety of subjects of interest to genealogists. Classes on how to use the library's computers, the Library Catalog and IGI are held frequently during the week. Each floor has trained personnel and volunteers to assist you in operating the computers and locating needed records.

The Genealogy Section has received the following microfilm sets:

- (1) Index to New England Naturalizations 1791-1906, 117 rolls rolls 1-38 Connecticut rolls 39-46 Rhode Island rolls 47-117 Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts
- (2) Mississippi Tax Lists, 28 rolls covers the counties of Adams to Jackson. Years vary.
- (3) Massachusetts vital records, 28 rolls The library now has the most complete collection of Massachusetts vital records in Texas. The following towns have now completed the collection: Georgetown, Lancaster, Lanesborough, Lunenburg, Swansea, Wakefield, Watertown, Woburn, & Worcester
- (4) Index to Compiled Service Records of Volunteer Union Soldiers Served in Organizations Not Raised by States or Territories. 36 rolls There are various indexes to categories in this set. Two significant ones are Indian Home Guards (for present day Oklahoma) and the index for Confederate Prisoners of War Who Enlisted in the U.S. Army.

This set now provides coverage for all Union soldiers except New York and Pennsylvania.

With this year's funds made available for binding, the Genealogy Section has shipped more than 700 volumes to the bindery. These books had not previously been available. There was no money made available from the city to bind periodicals. A donation of \$6.03 is need to bind a periodical volume.

Remember that the Genealogy Section is now open 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday to Thursday. Friday and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sundays 1-5 p.m.
