HINTS FOR WRITING AND PLACING A GOOD GENERALOGICAL QUERY: You are likely to receive a more successful response to your query if you are more specific about a single family group and include names, dates, and places for that specific family. Don't clutter your query with too many surnames!

Guide to Resources in the Dallas Public Library Genealogy Collection

National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections

Overview The National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections, or the "NUCMC" (pronounced nuck-muck) as it is commonly known, is a series of more than two dozen volumes describing about fifty thousand manuscript collections held by some thirteen hundred repositories in the United States. Begun in 1959, NUCMC is published annually by the Library of Congress, which requests repositories, such as private, institutional, and university archives, to report their manuscript collections/acquisitions. According to Mary McCampbell Bell, C.G.R.S, an authority on NUCMC, new entries are being added at the rate of two thousand or so per year.

Content

Each volume contains descriptions of collections reported to the Library of Congress by participating repositories. It does not include holdings of federal libraries such as the National Archives, Library of Congress, or presidential libraries. Records that would be expected to be found in a collection (state militia rolls in a state archives, for example) are not included. A collection of family papers donated to an archives would be listed. Also omitted are manuscript collections held by the institution that created them. Emphasis is on materials disassociated with the institution in which they are housed or materials found in unexpected places.

NUCMC covers a wide variety of records: governments, businesses, families, churches, social clubs, societies, hospitals, cemeteries, etc. Each volume contains a descriptive entry for each manuscript collection.

A manuscript collection may be only a few sheets of paper or many boxes or bound journals.

Aids

An article by Mary McCampbell Bell on "NUCMC" in the <u>National Genealogical</u> <u>Society Quarterly</u>, Volume 77, September 1989, page 208, gives a more detailed explanation and examples of entries.

To locate a manuscript collection that might be of interest to you, search each index. Some indexes cover one year and are bound with the catalog, while others cover multiple years and are bound separately. Look under entries such as the county name, a category (such as Revolution), a surname, and Genealogy. An index entry has a year-identification number that directs you to the paragraph in the catalog describing the individual manuscript collection. If an entry looks promising, write the repository for their catalog or guide describing their collection in greater detail.

Guides to Repositories by state and locality are in the 1981 catalog and every three or four years thereafter. You should check these before a research trip.


ARE YOU IN CHARGE OF THE FAMILY REUNION?
