Sunday, 20 October, was a milestone in DGS history, marking the completion of the Capital Expansion Project. Conceived by a long-range planning committee in 1992, presented to the Society as a project in 1993, and completed in 1996, the expansion of

the Genealogy Section has been a volunteer effort of epic proportions.

More than 200 guests signed in at the volunteer desk of the eighth floor Genealogy Section Sunday afternoon to celebrate in grand style. Chapter 21 of the Colonial Dames of America served cake and punch, while DGS Volunteer Docents, stationed around the room, provided information on the various changes made during the expansion. Old friends shared

stories and new friends joined in. Laughter and the flash of cameras filled the usually quiet room. The Dedication Ceremony was the proud moment when the DGS officially handed the project over to the City of Dallas. Karen Miller, CEP Chairman, opened the ceremony by recounting the history of the formation of the DGS and the beginning of its relationship with the Dallas Public Library. The Reverend Gordon Miltenberger, a DGS member, gave the Invocation. Acknowledging the early years of the



Capital Expansion Project and thanking those who were the beginning force behind this wonderful idea was President Leslie Collier. Patricia Westerlage, Regent of the General Levi Casey Chapter, NSDAR, shared insight and stories of Edith Allen Palmer, for whom the microform area has been named. This chapter has donated very generously to the project in memory of Mrs. Palmer and pledged to continue their support on a yearly basis. Heather Williams introduced Ms. Mary K. Shum, Assistant City

> Manager of the City of Dallas. Ms. Shum, a genealogist at heart, spoke on behalf of the City of Dallas and graciously accepted this gift. Ramiro Salazar, Director of Libraries, acknowledged and expressed his appreciation to the Society for their volunteer commitment to the Genealogy Section. The Ceremony came to an exciting close as Lloyd Bockstruck, Supervisor of the Genealogy Section and a highly respected DGS member, cut the yellow

ribbon, which was held symbolically by DGS President Leslie Collier and DPL Director Ramiro Salazar.

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DGS Service Awards

This is the third year that the Dallas Genealogical Society has presented Service Awards to recognize individuals and groups who have made outstanding contributions in the fields of genealogy and family history research. These awards were presented at the annual awards banquet held 18 October at the Bookhaven Country Club.

The Volunteer of the Year award recognizes a member for outstanding volunteer service to DGS during the preceding Society year. Alan Miller honored for his superb was performance on the Dallas County District Court Records Microfilming project. Compared to the normal expectation of 3 hours per week each volunteer is expected to serve, he often worked several days per week, in 6 or 8 hour shifts. According to the Project Manager, Shirley Sloat, Alan served a total of 470 hours, which translates into a credit for the 8th floor Genealogy Section of 261 reels of microfilm! He also provided invaluable aid to other project volunteers, quietly and expertly giving advice and support which permitted less-experienced volunteers to work more effectively and with more pleasure on the project. Alan made a significant contribution to this project and to our Society.

The Award Of Merit recognizes a DGS member for outstanding contributions to the Society over a period of years. This year the award was presented to Sammie Townsend Lee, who strongly believes in and practices one of the goals of this Society: "to raise the standards of genealogical research through educational programs, workshops, and the publication of data." In addition to being President of DGS, Sammie has held several other offices and

chairmanships. She has been the "idea person" behind some of the new and innovative activities the Society has offered. Sometimes she was met with opposition but did not seem to hear the word "NO".

Just a few of the activities she has lead, or in which she has been actively involved:

- The Fall Workshop format offering a variety of classes and speakers.
- Expanding the DGS Newsletter, improving content, and involving others.
- Invented" the Summer Lecture Series.
- Encouraged DGS to sponsor the Salt Lake City Trip.
- Saw the need for the Professional Interest Group.
- Proposed the Service Awards Program.
- Developed class material for all levels of genealogical classes.
- Supporter, administrator, and teacher of the new DGS Institute of Genealogical Studies.
- Continues her own genealogical education by attending, and encouraging others to attend, classes, workshops, institutes, and national conferences.
- Speaks at local, regional, state, and national level workshops.
- Has given up 2 years of personal research time to represent DGS as the Local Chairman of the upcoming FGS national conference, to be held in Dallas next September 3-6, 1997.

DGS is proud to honor Sammie Townsend Lee for her many contributions to our Society.

The Heritage Preservation Award recognizes outstanding contributions by an individual or group in the greater Dallas community in preserving our historical or archival heritage. This year's award was presented to The Dallas County Heritage Society for its efforts to establish and preserve the nationally out-of-doors accredited museum known as Old City Park. Thirty years ago a group of local women were successful in their efforts to save the antebellum home. The Millermore mansion, from destruction. Thus the Heritage Society and Old City Park was born. This was the start of the preservation of the architectural heritage of Dallas County. The many seasonal events held at Old City Park during the year help to bring the past alive for children and adults. A favorite event of many at Christmastime is "Candlelight in Old City Park," which has been held for twenty-five years. Gary Smith, President and Executive Director of Old City Park was in attendance to accept the award; Sharon Wooldridge, Chairman of the Board of the Dallas County Heritage Society, was unable to attend.

In addition to receiving a personal certificate, each recipient's name appears on a plaque which hangs in the new, enlarged, Genealogy Section of the Dallas Public Library.

Publications of the Harleian Society Parish Register Series

The September issue of the *DGS Newsletter* carried an article by Terri Bradshaw O'Neill, recounting her search for information ultimately found in the "Publications of the Harleian Society." We received a letter from Vicki H. Schmidt, which stated in part:

"Several years ago I had the same difficulty in locating records of a particular English church, even though the transcribed records were published by the Harleian Society and the records were in the collection of the Dallas Library. After weeks of frustration trying to locate the records I wanted, I decided to go through every book in the Harleian Society collection and compile a comprehensive list of what records are found in each volume. It took me such a long time to compile this information that I decided that I needed to share my efforts with my fellow users of the Dallas Genealogical Library."

Vicki enclosed a copy of her work, "Publications of the Harleian Society: The Parish Register Series." We are reprinting a portion of that document here.

In 1877, the Harleian Society of London began publishing a series of volumes, the purpose of which was to transcribe the birth, death, and marriage registers kept by the many parishes in England. This series is known as "The Register Series," to distinguish it from other series of records published by the Harleian Society. (The Register Series is available at the J. Erik Jonsson Public Library in Dallas, Texas, under the call number 929.341 H284P v.1-89, in the Genealogy section of the library.)

The Register Series consists of 89

volumes; each volume has a surname index, but few have a table of contents, even though many of the volumes contain registers of two or more parishes. This situation necessitates looking through all volumes in search of a specific parish which may or may not be represented.

By compiling a table of contents and brief description of the status of each parish represented in the Register Series, it is hoped that researchers will be able to make better use of this important collection.

Entries in some volumes are intermittent. Many of the earliest records no longer exist, and there are many gaps in the records, especially during the plague years and immediately following the Great Fire of 1666 which destroyed many homes, churches, and public buildings in London.

For the most part, the parish were kept by the records churchwarden in vellum books that were stored in iron or stone vaults. After July 1, 1837, all births, marriages, and deaths in England and Wales were to be reported to the central government in London. These reports are kept at the General Register Office, St. Catherine's House. Ouarterly indexes to the births. deaths, and marriages are arranged alphabetically and are available to researchers, but the originals are not available.

Dates in the oldest parish registers began the new year in March instead of January. Many of the earliest registers were begun before Great Britain adopted the Gregorian calendar. Over a period of 1500 years, the old style, Julian calendar had gotten out of phase with the equinoxes.

To correct this problem, Pope Gregory XIII ordered that ten days be dropped from the month of October in the year 1582, thereby bringing the equinoxes back to the proper dates on the calendar. The Roman Catholic countries of Europe promptly adopted the Gregorian calendar, but the Germanic countries kept the Julian calendar until 1700. Great Britain and its colonies adopted the new style calendar in 1752. Russia and Turkey did not adopt the Gregorian calendar until 1918 and 1927 respectively.

Information contained in the birth registers usually included month, day, and year of the christening, the child's names, and names of the father and mother. Sometimes the date of birth and the father's title or occupation were listed as well.

The burial registers generally included the name of the deceased, burial date, and name of spouse or parents. Sometimes the deceased's occupation or title is given. A few of the registers give the deceased person's age and place of burial. For example:

1807 July 25 The Rev'd Thomas Freeman, one of the Minor Canons of this Church, aged 82 years, in the Cloysters. (Vol. 2, p. 155)

1715 May 13 Mary daughter of Edward and Mary Maber, under the Organ. (Vol. 4, p. 122)

The wedding registers listed the names of the bride and groom, date of the event, marital status, occupation, and sometimes their residences. Examples:

1996 DGS Writing Awards Competition Recipients Named at 1996 Annual Banquet



1996 DGS The Writing Awards were recipients announced 18 October at the Society's annual banquet held at the Brookhaven Country Club. The 1996 drew competition

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twenty-nine entries in three divisions by twenty-four writers. Each entrant received a certificate of participation.

competition is annual The sponsored by DGS for the purpose of encouraging genealogists to put their family histories into the printed form, be that a book, a manuscript, or an article. Also, the competition promotes the collection and publication of genealogical and historical materials, thereby making the information accessible to the public. The competition was judged by a panel of three: a judge for genealogical content, a judge for writing composition, and a judge for presentation of material.

The winner in each category was determined by the highest score over 90 points and received a certificate and a \$25 cash award. First place recipients also had scores that totaled over 90 points, but less than the highest score, and received a certificate. Some categories had no winners, while others had no entries.

When she tried this on Grandmother, she was surprised by the reply: "Oh, he lost it in a sawmill accident. They buried that arm packed in sawdust." Astonished, Desmond inquired why Grandmother had never mentioned this vital information. She got the expected reply, "Because you never asked."

So there is a moral here for all of us. Keep poking around for details that your family has yet to divulge. They're there.

Over the years I had so often badgered my poor Uncle Jim to tell me "everything" that he got nervous when I called. [Oops, I think I pushed that one too hard.] When I inherited a box from his basement last summer, I made a real discovery. Packed away in the bottom of this box was a long-lost autograph book. According to the inscription, this belonged to my greatgrandfather, William Eli Smith. My Uncle Jim did not realize that this autograph book could have any genealogical import

Well, well . . . it does. The book was a Christmas gift presented to my great-grandfather, which is noted on the flyleaf. And with whom do you spend Christmas, in 1889 as well as now? Family, of course. So, who were the first to sign this new book? Yippee, there was a holiday verse on the third page signed, "Your cousin, Will Murray. Baxter Springs, Kansas."

Merry Christmas to me, one hundred and seven years later. I've been struggling with Margaret, a missing sister to my great-great grandfather. According to family legend, she "married a Murray and moved off." Now I've got her.

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DAUGHERTY MCKINNEY

'Tis the Season by Barbara Dossett

As Christmas approaches we naturally begin to wonder what to get as gifts for various family members. The first thing that comes to mind is how much to spend on someone. The second is to wait until Christmas Eve to get out there to find that special item. However, we have within our grasps the most precious gifts to give people: their family stories.

I first gave my father a gift of his parents' marriage license. This did not cost a fortune, nor did it force me to forage out into that den of iniquity, the shopping mall. The rewards were more tremendous than any sweater, tie, or gift certificate. This made me begin to review my genealogy collection in a new light. Although some family members would become glassy-eyed and rigid as I recited some obscure family trivia I had found, they actually paid attention when I gave them this same trivia in some sort of package.


Be creative with your information. Since you come in contact with so many relatives and ask for information, take some of that stuff and make a small family story out of it. Then ask those same folks to send in some recipes. Compile it together into a small twenty or twenty-five page booklet. Run down to Kinko's, have them scan in an interesting photo for the cover, and then let them put it together in a spiral notebook. This little activity didn't cost me more than five dollars per book; yet my family has a story of their ancestors, some nifty recipes, and a picture of the patriarch of the family.

Ask relatives to lend you pictures of different family members and have

several copies made. Then buy small picture frames that hook together into a family tree of sorts and, voila, another gift idea. Now when they look at the family they can "see" some of their ancestry.

Another time I took the marriage licenses of one particular line as far back as I had researched, had copies made, and put them together into a small book for Father's Day. Now when my father looks at these licenses he can go backwards to 1784.

As you know, our research is only understandable to another nutty genealogist and is Greek to our families. Look at your research as gift ideas for a change. The only limit is how much effort you put into the project. Remember, this gift keeps on giving for generations.



Edith Allen Palmer Honored






