Knowing that the Dallas Genealogical Society will share in the profits of this event and that registration fees are part of the profits, many volunteers have already offered to work at the conference for no financial benefits. (Any DGS profits from the conference have been pledged to buy materials for the Genealogy Section of the Dallas Public Library.)

For all who work prior to the conference, or choose to donate volunteer time during the conference, we have a very special DGS compensation package to show our heartfelt thanks. It has been arranged between DGS and Cindy Gray, Dallas Public Library Central Administrator, to hold a "volunteer lock-in" in the genealogy section of the Central Library late this fall. Just imagine--all

night to research, the whole department all to ourselves! Plans include a potluck midnight supper. This is truly a thank you that will appeal to all diehard researchers.

Another way we have to say "thanks" to volunteers will be a special free day-long seminar conducted by our very own Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck. The subject of the seminar is open to suggestions, but it will be topics with general appeal (such as military records, migration routes, etc.).

Compensation is also available in the following way to conference volunteers who prefer financial assistance:

- 6 hours of work on-site at the conference equals one complementary day
- ► 10 hours of work on-site at the conference equals two complementary days
- ► 14 hours of work on-site at the conference equals three complementary days
- ► 16 hours of work on-site at the conference equals the entire conference free

Conference registration must be mailed in full by the early deadline date of 15 July 1997. Volunteers who opt for this plan will be reimbursed after the conference for the hours they worked.

Time can be accrued in one day or spread over several days. For example, to earn one free day requires six hours of work on-site at the conference site. A person can work all six hours in one day, three hours for two days, or two hours for three days. To be counted, all time worked at the conference must be registered with the conference volunteer coordinator, Terri O'Neill.

#### SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DALLAS PUBLIC LIBRARY.

The Local History and Genealogical Society of Dallas wishes to congratulate the Dallas Public Library, its Director, Mrs. Lillian Bradshaw, the Municipal Library Board, Mayor of Dallas, and the City Council on the 75th anniversary of the Dallas Public Library.

The Dallas Public Library traces its beginning to a "Young Men's Literary Society" which raised funds for a library as early as 1872. Later, local donations prompted Andrew Carnegie to donate funds which opened the

During the 1996-1997 year, 10 issues of the *DGS Newsletter* were published; 1350 copies were printed each time. We decided to change to heavier paper to enhance the quality of the newsletter.

Thanks to everyone who submitted articles and information for monthly columns, and special thanks to Hallie Garner, Liz Thurmond, Bonnie Moore, Selenda Billington, and Mary Johnson.

#### Vice-President for Membership Mary Ruth McKenney

Major accomplishment of Membership this year was the publishing of the Membership Directory and Surname Exchange, with 891 members and over 6200 surnames; this was made possible by the effort of Ruth Foreman. She has also set up a database of surnames on disk which will soon be available to patrons at the volunteer desk on the 8th floor.

We welcomed 207 new members with new member packets, sent out 497 cards informing of expiration, and sent 31 letters to visitors attending DGS meetings.

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#### Publicity and Public Relations Don Raney

This office provided Publicity for the 1997 Summer Lecture Series and Beginners Workshop.

Met with Gaylon Polatti, Dallas Historical Society, to identify records in their archives that would be suitable for publication in the *Dallas Journal*. Secured a copy of the 1868 City of Dallas Census. Wrote letter requesting that Mr. Polatti provide a copy of the records of the Crawford Funeral home from 1928 through 1932.

After evaluating various alternatives for improving communications for DGS, purchased and installed a Message Center in the Genealogy Section and programmed voice mail messages to publicize:

- 1. DGS monthly meetings,
- 2. Beginners Workshop,
- 3. DGS Lecture Series, and
- 4. FGS Conference.

#### Volunteer Coordinator Pamela Haas Edman

Thanks to all of you who volunteered this year. Our accomplishments this year included:


- Maintained the volunteer desk with over 200 volunteer hours per month
- Aided with typing forms to send books to the bindery twice (over \$20,000 total)
- "Brought the books out" two nights following completion of the Capital Expansion project
- Shelved books when library page staff was short
- Aided with statistical reports
- Completed Phase I of the Dallas County microfilm project
- Typed, labelled, and organized the periodicals
- Volunteered many hours in bulk mailing of the *Dallas Journal* and several FGS mailings

A volunteer corps was formed, with names, addresses, phone number, and jobs performed or desired. A computer list was given to the library to aid them in identifying volunteers in the new system.

Volunteer week was celebrated, and a gift bookmark and thank you letter were mailed to all volunteers.

During the month of April, we logged in 354 volunteer hours, the highest number since the genealogy department has been keeping records.

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

## Using the Records of the Railroad Retirement Board

You can write for pension records of retirees of the railroads at the address below. The Social Security Death Index lists Railroad Retirees, with the first three numbers beginning with 700. Use this address:

#### History

The Railroad Retirement Board served as the same equivalent as the Social Security System. In 1935/36 President Franklin D. Roosevelt could not get enough labor union support for his Social Security plan so he made a bargain with the Railroad employees to let them operate their own system in exchange for not opposing his Social Security plan. The Railroad Retirement Board invested their funds more wisely than the government did. In the early years the retirees received much less than the Social Security retirees did, but by 1941 or so the investments of the railroad group began to pay off and railroad retirees drew larger monthly checks than Social Security retirees. OK, history class over...

## What Can you Get from the Railroad Retirement Board?

I received the following:

1) "Employees Statement of Compensated Service Rendered Prior to January 1, 1937, To Employees Under the Railroad Retirement Act of 1937." This is a form filled out by my father to establish his work experience prior to 1937. It started when he went to work in Sept 1904; he had to state the job title, dates of employment, railroad employed by, department of the railroad, and location.

- 2) Section 5, Personnel Record. This indicated every month in which he drew a paycheck
- 3) Section 7, Compensation and Occupation. This listed each biweekly paycheck, the amount, and the job title he held.
- 4) A certified copy of his death certificate.
- 5) A copy of his marriage license.
- 6) Copy of Mother's application for the lump sum death benefit, listing all his survivors, wife and children, with birth dates.
- 7) Certified copy of his birth certificate.
- 8) Copy of Mother's application for monthly benefits, listing her employment and wages.

Statement included in the cover letter from Bill Poulos, Director of Public Affairs

The Railroad Retirement Board's records deal primarily with the administration and payment of benefits under the Railroad Retirement Act. As such, they do not generally contain a great deal of personal information. And, as Mr. James R Savage died before actually retiring, and only survivor benefits were payable, these records contain even less such information than would those of someone who retired on the basis of age and service.

Daddy died at the age of 72, still working, with 50 years' seniority.

## Genealogy Section, History/Social Sciences Division, Dallas Public Library.

Before there was a Local History and Genealogy Society, there was a collection of books in the Dallas Public Library where patrons and members of patriotic societies did research on their families.

Assisting patrons in their research, there has always been a staff of helpful and dedicated people.

Mr. Lloyd Bockstruck is First the History/Social Assistant in Sciences Division. He was born in Vandalia, Illinois, and joined the Genealogy staff in 1973 following graduation with a Masters in Library Science from the University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois. Earlier he received a Bachelors degree in 1967 from Greenville, Illinois. College. September 1969 he received a Masters Degree in History from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois.

### **Genealogy Internet Workshop**

This workshop is designed for the person who would like to learn as much as possible about the Internet and how to use the Internet as a genealogy research tool.

Both beginning and experienced Internet users are encouraged to attend, with the understanding that Session IV is quite detailed in nature.

## Session I—Genealogy and the Internet

This presentation provides an introduction to Genealogy on the Internet. Topics covered include what is the Internet, Internet terminology, history of the Internet, Internet features for the genealogist, what does it cost, and genealogy resources available on the Internet.

## Session II— Genealogy Sites on the Internet

This session will include on-line access to the primary genealogy research sites on the Internet. Research techniques will be provided to explain how to most effectively use these primary research sites.

## Session III—Finding Things on the Internet

With literally thousands of genealogy oriented sites on the Internet, one of the biggest challenges of using the Internet for genealogy research is to learn how to find things. This session will discusses proven techniques to locate the information you need, plus a detailed discussion of the major Internet search engines.

#### Session IV—Home Page Creation

Establishing your Home Page on the Internet is the way to make you and your genealogy research visible to other genealogy researchers. This session will provide detailed instruction on how to accomplish this. An actual Home Page will be created using a live Internet connection and the available software tools.

Instructor for the workshop will be Mike Basham, a professional

genealogist with eighteen years of research experience and over 25 years of experience in the computer industry. He is currently serving on the DGS Board of Directors as the Vice-President for Fundraising and is the Director of the DGS Computer Interest Group. Mike has been actively using the Internet since July of 1995. He is the State Coordinator for the Texas GenWeb Project, which has recruited and trained volunteers to create a Home Page for each Texas county. Mike is also an active genealogy publisher, having published several family histories, county census county history transcripts, and reprints.

## **@HEADLINE** = Internet excitement

#### **Desmond Walls Allen**

We're still excited about the possibilities of the Internet. If you're connected, you know what we're talking about. If not, you're missing out on a great information resource.

Recently, we needed to know when Easter was in 1923. (An old letter gave a death date as "the Sunday after Easter.") Without getting up from our chair, we logged on and came up with **Ecclesiastical** Calendar http://cssa/stanford.edu/~marcos/~eccal.html. And we found information we needed. But there were links on the page to a document, "The Calendar FAQ" (Frequently Asked Questions). So we visited http://www.pip.dknet.dk/~pip10160/~ calendar.html and learned all sorts of interesting things, including when each of the western nations changed to the Gregorian calendar. We also visited The Worldwide Holiday and Festival Page at

http://www.smiley.cy.net/~bdecie.

Think of the Internet as being able to run amok in the biggest library you've ever seen and do it all as fast as your phone line will transfer the data. No parking problems, no closing time, no holidays. (Also, unfortunately, no helpful reference librarian.)

It's also easy to get side-tracked on the Internet with all the tantalizing links to other information. It's rather like open stacks in a library—a title catches your eye and you've been waylaid. We took a little side trip to http://www.med~access.com/address/vital\_toc.htm and found a complete guide to vital records offices.

Watch those URLs (the http stuff you type to go to a specific place on the Internet). Spelling definitely counts. So does upper and lower case. There are no spaces. Sometimes the servers, computers on which files reside, are contrary. If you get a "not found" error message, try again and check your spelling very carefully. If you're using an older version of the AOL software. Netscape. Microsoft Explorer, download the new version from the Internet and install it. Old browser versions sometimes can't access newer features of web sites. It takes a little time to learn how to use the search engines (like Yahoo or Alta Vista) to find what you're looking for. Most of the problems we've had involve too much information in response to a search query. With practice, you'll learn to enter keywords for what you're looking for and refine when the results them unmanageable.

The Internet is changing the way we do genealogy. It isn't a passing fad; it's a good research tool and it's getting better.

To the Dallas genealogical researchers,

As a member of the Dallas Genealogical Society, I wanted to share one of the newest publications of my local genealogical society with the Dallas Genealogical Society. In February, we hosted our annual daylong seminar with Desmond Walls Allen as the speaker. Those who attend the seminar can submit a list of ten surnames to be published in a surname book (usually the seminar pertains to a theme, period of time or a location). This year it was pretty general and no restriction of names was required.

Why am I a member of your

society? Well, I was born and grew up in Dallas. I attended Lida Hooe Elementary School, Greiner Jr. High and Sunset High School in the forties and fifties. Most of my mother's ancestors came into Denton and Collin counties before 1870.

While I have your ear, can you pass on a message to Leslie Smith Collier? After attending the Institute last summer and hearing her talk about finding difficult people to find in the census, I came home and took another trip to our local archives. By using her methods, I found my "missing" MIERS family on the 1860, 1870, and 1880 census (spelled three different ways). Her Civil War pension application had indicated they had been in Wood County for thirty years...not so. They were in Ennis, Ellis County during those years. Thank you, Thank you, thank you, Leslie.

# **Internet Beginners Corner: Free Internet Alternative Mailing Lists**

If you have a computer but are mystified with the intricate workings of the Internet, don't have access to the Internet in your budget, or can't allocate enough time for Internet searches, you might want to think about an Internet alternative that still let's you communicate with other genealogists out there in Computerland. This method is termed using Mail Lists: called by some a modernized version of the Genealogical Helper! You don't have to have Internet access to use Mail Lists, and it costs nothing if you have a computer modem and an E-mail address. If you have a modem but don't have E-mail, there is a free program mentioned in the May 1997 DGS Newsletter Bulletin Board called Juno. Chrysalis offers unlimited Email for a one-time lifetime fee of \$10 a year; see the October 1996 DGS Newsletter for details.

#### History

Mike Basham wrote an earlier article this year about the "Mother-of-all-Mailing Lists" called Roots-L which has over 14,000 subscribers. For those who are overwhelmed by the sheer volume of Roots-L there are other alternatives in regional mailing lists.

Formerly an unsung hero named Larry Stephens at Indiana University operated several hundred mailing lists that were either regional, state or surnamed based with a server called MAISER. Unfortunately, "spamming" by unscrupulous advertisers caused that system to crash, and many people were saddened and inconvenienced by the loss. Larry has been working on an alternative server (called ListServe) and has some of the regional lists back

up, but the surname lists may never be back. There are, however, some surname lists accessible through RootsWeb which will not be covered in this article.

## How to Find Available Lists for ListServe

Although you could previously find the names of the available lists for the old MAISER-based lists by E-mail, you must now go to the Internet to get the names of current possibilities. If you don't have Internet access, you can do this at the Dallas Public Library. The home page URL of the List Owner of the group of mailing lists discussed here is:

http://copper.ucs.indiana.edu/~stephen l/genealog.htm. You can also check at this URL:

http://www.eskimo.com/~chance/.

#### How to Use the ListServe System

Once you find the exact name of the mailing list for which you wish to subscribe, such as MI-WI-ROOTS-L or ILLINOIS-ROOTS-L, write down the exact listing. Spelling and case (caps or no caps) are very important here. There are no spaces. Then go to your E-mail program and follow these directions.

To subscribe to a list, send a message to:

listserv@listserv.indiana.edu. Do not put anything in the subject line. In the body of the message put only this simple message:

SUB NAME OF LIST Your name for example: SUB MI-WI-ROOTS-L Joe Blow

Be careful about your spelling, as

many errors are caused by spelling the command wrong. Once you have submitted your name to the mailing list, you will receive a confirmation, to which you must reply. This is to prevent fraud and spamming.

Once you have received confirmation, you will receive a Welcome message to the Mail List that will give you additional directions. For instance, the Welcome message will instruct you on how to send queries, to unsubscribe to a list, to get Help, to receive the messages in Digest (abbreviated) format, etc. Read those directions carefully, follow them, and you'll be up and running in no time. You'll be making contact with a whole new group of genealogists in your research area for mutual sharing! And best of all, once you find the lists that interest you, you can do it for free right from your own home computer!

## **Searching the Internet**

Searching the Internet is somewhat similar to using a telephone. If you already know someone's telephone number and/or web page address, you can just dial the telephone number or go straight to the page on the web.

If you don't know the telephone number/web page address you have to ask information.

A) The Internet equivalent of calling telephone information is called a search engine. Search engines are large electronic indexes which search web sites. It's very much like doing a subject search in a library's catalogue.

Type in the words/terms for which you are looking. The search engine then selects "hits" out of its collection of sites which "match" the search terms you have typed in, and it brings these sites up on the screen in a list for you to see.

Just as in a subject search in a library catalogue, the "hits" you get will be determined by the terms you use.

For example, if you just use the word genealogy as a search term, the search engine will bring up a gazillion sites, many of which will have no interest for you. If you use the words Scottish genealogy or Rowan County genealogy (or whatever), you will get far fewer sites, but chances are they will be more useful to you.

By the way, leave out words such as "the," "a," "an," "and," etc. when you're typing in your search terms.

There are a number of search engines out there. None of them does everything, but the one I have found

most useful is called HotBot. The address is: http://www.hotbot.com/.

B) If you already know the address (or URL) of a web page, you can go straight to it (see steps below).

- 1) Open up whatever browser you use and get an Internet page on the screen (any page, whatever page comes up when you begin is fine).
- 2) There will be a white horizontal box near the top of your screen beginning on the left hand side.

Depending on what browser and/or what edition of your browser you have, the box will say something like "Location" at the beginning of the box.

- 3) There will be an address in the white box which is the address of the page you have on the screen at the moment.
- 4) Put your cursor at the beginning of the white section (left hand side) at the beginning of the electronic address.
- 5) Click on the cursor, so that the cursor is flashing at the beginning of the white box.
- 6) Use your delete key to delete the original address in the box.
- 7) In the now empty white box, type in the address of the new page you want. The cursor must be flashing in the box in order to type.
- 8) When you are finished typing the new address, leave the cursor flashing at the end of the new address.
- 9) Hit the enter/return key.

10) Your computer will go to the new page at the address you entered.

If your computer does not go to the page, go back and look at what you typed. Computers are very literal and if the address is not exactly correct, the computer won't recognize the address. Even a comma instead of a period, for example, will make it a different address, and your computer will not be able to find it.

Some page addresses (URLs) are case sensitive, some are not. My own rule of thumb is to copy the original address exactly, e.g., if there is one capital letter in the middle, I type the one capital...if the address is all lower case, I use all lower case, etc.
