Fourth Annual DGS Awards Banquet Shirley Stertz Hawn

IT'S TIME! Time to send in *your* reservation for the Fourth Annual DGS Awards Banquet. As you know, the banquet will be at the Royal Oaks Country Club, on 7 November at 6:00 P.M., and is a very special evening. This is the time when we honor all of our very hard working volunteers, recognize the winners of the writing contest, and announce the winners of the DGS Service Awards.

This is the fourth year that the Dallas Genealogical Society has recognized individuals or groups who have made outstanding contributions in the field of genealogy and family history research. Each recipient's name will be added to the plaque hanging at the Dallas Public Library, and each will receive his or her personal award certificate.

There are four service award categories:

The Volunteer of the Year Award recognizes a member for outstanding volunteer service to DGS during the preceding Society year. Previous winners are Robert H. Maybrier, Shirley Remnant Sloat, and Dr. Alan Miller.

The Award of Merit recognizes a DGS member for his or her contributions to the Society over a number of years. Previous winners of this award are Helen Lu, Adrienne Bird Jamieson, and Sammie Townsend Lee.

The Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck Distinguished Service Award goes to an individual who has significantly contributed to the field of genealogy over a period of years. This award is not given every year. Past recipients are Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck and Desmond Walls Allen.

The Heritage Preservation Award is given for outstanding contributions by an individual or group in the Greater Dallas Community for helping preserve our historical heritage. Previous winners are Jerry Henderson, Black Dallas Remembered, Lois Dillard, and The Dallas County Heritage Society.

This is the second year the Award of Excellence will be given by the Dallas Public Library in recognition of exemplary volunteer service. This award recognizes the outstanding work and efforts of library volunteers who have added immeasurably to the furtherance of goals and objectives of the Genealogy Section and toward improving and enhancing service to the family researcher.

I hope each of you sent your *family* history, book, or article to Sheila White Huckaby, DGS Publications Chair, by September l, for the 1997 Writing Awards Competition. Although we are a relatively new competition, we have received work from the East Coast to the West Coast.

You don't have to be a member of the Dallas Genealogical Society to enter the competition. All entries will be judged in three major areas: genealogical content, writing composition, and presentation of material. There are many levels and ways of writing, and the manner in which the Writing Awards Competition has been structured takes this into account. The competition is divided into four divisions. These divisions with their various categories are as follows:

Division I: Unpublished Articles (10,000 words or less)

- Category 1: Documented Family History or Genealogy
- Category 2: Undocumented Family History Narrative
- Category 3: General Genealogical Interest

Division II: Published Articles (10,000 words or less)

- Category 1: Documented Family History or Genealogy
- Category 2: Undocumented Family History Narrative
- Category 3: General Genealogical Interest

As genealogists, we spend hours upon hours looking for those elusive ancestors, those that lived in the past. Take a little time from your research, look to the present, to the future, and let's smell the roses while we can.

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Overlooked and Underused Records at the National Archives Southwest Region Meg Hacker

Lesson Two of the Three R's

Margaret Schmidt Hacker, or Meg as we know her, will present the next lesson at the DGS October meeting. She has been with the Southwest Region Branch of the National Archives since 1986 and has served as Assistant Director since 1992. As the former Archives Archivist she can acquaint us with all of the records that are available to researchers. This program will highlight the little-known and underused records that genealogists should be aware of when researching at the Archives.

Federal research you may be familiar with include the military and Indian records. Other records that you may not be aware of at the National Archives are criminal and equity court records and naturalization records. Meg can show us how we can extract genealogical gems from all of these records and others that are often overlooked.

Meg Hacker has published *Cynthia* Ann Parker: The Life and Legend that was also used as an entry in the Texas Handbook. She is a prolific speaker at local and national events, and no doubt will broaden your research base with these unfamiliar records at the Archives.

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The Columbia Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society is sponsoring a new heritage program in honor of South Carolina's two hundred and tenth birthday. It is called Founding Families of the State of South Carolina. Persons who are directly descended from an ancestor living in South Carolina when the state was admitted to the United States 23 May 1788, or before, are eligible for membership. The applicant must be able to prove descent from the ancestor for each generation, including proof for the applicant. Current South Carolina residency is not a requirement.

The information furnished as proof of their lineage will be placed in the archives of the Columbia Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society. IN MEMORY OF LUTHER MALCOLM BASHAM

"MIKE" 1942-1997

Born Luther Malcolm Basham, 25 May 1942, in Grandview, Texas, to Frances and Kermit Basham, Mike's childhood was spent in Venus, TX. Graduating as the Valedictorian of his high school class in 1960, he went on to serve as a member of the Ross Volunteers at Texas A&M, from which he graduated in 1964. Mike was a Vietnam veteran, serving 1965-1966.

He was married to Nancy Elick on 6 January 1968, and to this union three children were born—Suzanne (Mrs. Larry Koonce of Plano, TX), John (married to Jennifer, living in Irving, TX), and Mark (of the home). Mike was preceded in death by his parents and is survived by his wife of 29 years, his children, two brothers, one sister, and several nieces and nephews. Funeral services were held 19 September at St. Patrick Catholic Church in Dallas; interment was in The Grandview Cemetery, Grandview, TX.

At the time of his death, Mike was serving his third year on the DGS Board of Directors, currently as the Executive Vice President. In his first two years he was the Director of Special Interest Groups and continued to serve as the leader of the Computer Interest Group. Through his development of Internet Workshops and Beginner Computer Workshops, the Computer Interest Group raised funds to become a financially self-supporting project of the DGS. Due strongly to his guidance and at his suggestion, the success of the CIG allowed them to share their funds to help offset the cost of two new SIG's, the Latin-American Interest Group and the African-American Interest Group.

It was to Mike that the DGS turned when they decided to donate multiple computers to the genealogy section of the Dallas Public Library. This new computer research area was planned, implemented, and maintained by him personally. He devoted many hours of his own time to making this difficult project a success.

Mike was the Director of the Texas GenWeb project, dedicating his time and efforts to soliciting and assisting individuals in every county in Texas on preparing a society home page for this project. His success was dramatic—successfully recruiting volunteers for all 254 Texas counties. He was also serving as a board member of the US GenWeb project, the parent entity of the Texas project. Mike's expertise, humor, and ease of instruction garnered him high respect throughout the GenWeb community. His death was a great shock that vibrated across the state from one home page to another, many choosing to place a memorial on their page as a show of respect for his help and friendship.

The genealogical community at large will miss his contributions. He is not only personally known to this society as a valued speaker, but has lectured on the national level at NGS, FGS, and GENTECH. His lectures could also be found on the Internet, where he held classes on genealogy research and html programing. Along with his brother, Dwaine, Mike also authored and published several family genealogy books. Together the Basham brothers developed a unique method of electronic publishing that allowed genealogists to publish small quantities of family histories at a reasonable cost.

Mike had a strong and abiding love for genealogy, but it did not rule his life. He was a loving and generous husband and a proud father. He shared his free time away from his family responsibilities with his church, his neighbors, and his friends. He was the Past President of the Lake Highlands Soccer Association; Past President of Bishop Lynch Booster Club; Officer in the Royal Highland Homeowners Association, as well as the Dallas Genealogical Society. He was an avid tennis player and was engaged in a match when a heart attack struck him.

The vast circle of friends that closed around Mike Basham is broken now with his passing. We thank his family for sharing him with the genealogical community, and we send them our thoughts and prayers at this difficult time. We will all remember him dearly.

Family TreeMaker has become the most popular Windows based genealogy database program. Family TreeMaker has also established an outstanding Web Site which contains valuable and useful information for genealogy researchers. You will find up-to-date information on the latest release of the Family TreeMaker software plus lots of other useful information.

Some of the things that you will find on this site include:

- Family Finder Index which provides an on-line index to information on the large number of CD-ROMs published by Broderbund. The site states that these CD-ROMs now contain information on over 123 million names representing over 20% of all people who have ever lived in the United States. And remember that many of these CD-ROMs are available for your use on the 8th floor of the Dallas Public Library.
- Internet Family Finder which provides the capability to search the entire Internet for genealogy information. This is the first Internet search engine which is completely devoted to genealogy.

While currently in its early stages, this capability could become an invaluable aid to the genealogy researcher.

- Beginning Genealogy On-line Courses provides a self-paced series of classes for the genealogist. Lessons 1-4 conducted by Karen Clifford are currently available.
- Product Availability Listings provide the latest information about releases of Family TreeMaker plus information about all of the CD-ROMs offered by Broderbund. These products can be ordered on-line if you wish.
- This site also provides the facility for Family TreeMaker users to upload their genealogy research to the Family TreeMaker Web Site and make this research available to others who might be interested in that research. Also, the capability to search the site for surnames of interest is provided.

Putting the Past Back Together

A few weeks after the Berlin Wall fell, East German citizens rushed into the Offices of the Ministry for State Security to salvage 50 years of secret police files. As communist East Germany crumbled, bureaucrats tried to destroy these records, some of which dated back to the early sixties. Thankfully, 17,000 sacks of shredded paper, index cards, and photographs were saved. After all of the materials were sorted, over 5,000 sacks of paper remained to be pieced, pasted, and taped.

The documents include spies' reports on East Germans who traveled outside of the Communist bloc, reports on the private lives of dissidents and Olympic medalists, surveillance on churches, and information on people who died trying to scale the Berlin Wall.

Putting the pages back together has been like doing a jig-saw puzzle. The work is tedious, but the results are invaluable. Fifty workers have spent more than two years working in an old office building in Nuremberg, Germany with remarkable results. They have pieced together 180,000 pages.

What a wonderful gift this will be to those looking for relatives who lived in East Germany during that time of separation and secrecy, and what a wonderful gift to German researchers looking for answers. Hopefully, one day these documents will be available for everyone to study.

BOOK REVIEW

A Southern Boy in Blue is a memoir by Marcus Woodcock, of Macon Co., Tennessee, and is edited by Kenneth Noe. It follows the course of Woodcock's three year enlistment with the 9th Kentucky Volunteer Infantry (USA) during the Civil War. It is especially valuable to you if ...

1. You have an ancestor in the 9th or another regiment of the Army of the Cumberland. The memoir, which was written with assistance from Woodcock's log, provides an extensive index noting the names of individuals and affiliated regiments from Kentucky, Indiana, and Ohio. Also, end notes, which provide clarification of Woodcock's 1865 view, reflect the high quality of Noe's editing.

2. You are interested in a Union soldier's view of Perryville, Stone's River, Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, etc. Woodcock covers his view of the 9th's part in the battles and also the "soldier's lot" in between the big Woodcock battles. Since was frequently ill, the soldier's view of Civil War medicine is quite interesting.

I especially liked the book because Woodcock has a fresh view of the war. He wrote it in 1865, while recollections were fresh and time had not modified his account or interpretation. This is unlike more common memoirs written in the 1880's. Further this is the best source I have found that tells the story of Union soldiers serving from the border states. Finally, it provides information on the goings on among family and friends in the Kentucky/Tennessee border area. It shows that the war in which Woodcock participated was an extension of what was going on in the Kentucky/Tennessee home front.

CD-ROM REVIEW

Brøderbund-Family Tree Maker has placed Peter Wilson Coldham's *The Complete Book of Emigrants* 1607–1776 and *Emigrants in Bondage* 1614–1775 (Genealogical Publishing Co., Baltimore, MD) on their CD # 350. Price: \$ 29.99.

If you have compiled your pedigree to the point in the 1600's to late 1700's, that you think you may have an emigrant ancestor in Virginia, this CD can be of tremendous benefit to you. If you have a spouse that says "no more room for books," then you can say that you are truly saving space and money in buying this disk.

This is a fast, efficient way to access all these Coldham books for much less than the printed versions' cost. The added convenience of being able to click your mouse on "Search Expert," type in the surname, and then have all the instances of that name appear on your screen is very gratifying.

The requested name is marked by a tiny magnifying glass icon (to go with the silhouette of Sherlock Holmes on the "Search Expert" button). The upper left hand corner of the page shows you what Section, Chapter, and Year you have just brought up to the screen. If you find someone you KNOW is yours, you can just copy the data directly to your family page in Family Tree Maker (assuming you have one). Or you may prefer to highlight the text and print it out, if you want a hard copy.

The speed of this search, compared to looking in the index of each of the books and then writing down the page number or flipping back and forth to the pages indicated and hoping you haven't missed any, is a real time-saver.

Mr Coldham has a tremendous amount of research in these passenger lists that have survived. The introduction to the disk alone is worth the \$29.99 price. It explains in detail the laws in existence at the time pertaining to English emigrants, as well as the history of the plan to "clear out" the prisons in England and colonize America with these same unfortunates.

The only thing you have to get used to, if you've never used one of these CD's before, is that you scroll down the pages and never see a whole page as you would when you turn the pages of a book. You get a tunnel vision effect. However, I've discovered this helps me to concentrate on the data, so this can be good. I recommend it to anyone doing emigrant Virginia research.

TAPE REVIEW

The Future of Online Genealogy, GENTECH97 Session S23, Speaker: Dick Eastman

Dick Eastman is a superb speaker and was one of the most informed of the movers and shakers at GENTECH97. He has a vision that holds quality research above all else. In this tape he presents an enormous amount of useful material in a very listenable manner, and even includes some enjoyable humor.

He first covered four cycles that computers in genealogical research have gone through: The Hardware Cycle, the Software Cycle, the Media Cycle, and the Online Cycle. As an informed prognosticator, Dick predicted that the next Cycle will be back to hardware-with such tools as palmtop computers (true portability) and wireless data inquiries to online data (replacing the CDs) and computers-thus being even more useful in preparation for and assistance with basic research. Basic research will still involve visiting libraries, archives and Family History Centers.

Every serious user of technology in genealogical research should benefit from the view expressed on this tape. I heartily recommend this tape; it is available from Repeat Performances, 2911 Crabapple Lane, Hobart IN 46342, (219)465-1234, or at <www.repeatperformance.com>, and is listed as tape number GT97-S-23.

"Georgia Counties in the Late Eighteenth Century," by Merle M. Baker, faculty member of Abraham Baldwin College in Tifton, GA, gives an excellent summary of the changes in Georgia counties from the original eight formed at statehood in 1777 until 1800. He even gives notes on the character of the counties and where early settlers came from, for example, "Lots of the people in early Greene County were from Rowan and Mecklenburg Counties of North Carolina. Many of these people settled on Shoulderbone Creek."
