Our monthly meetings will be held on the fourth Monday of each month except for December, April and May. Watch this newsletter for specific programs, dates, and times.


At Our September Meeting . . .



President's Message

The DGS Board has been working on the budget for the 1998-99 board year, which will be presented at the regular meeting in September for approval by the membership. As always, we seek to cut expenses and maximize income wherever possible.

Your membership dues entitle you to ten issues of the DGS Newsletter and a copy of the annual Journal. The newsletter, as you can read, contains meeting and event announcements, interesting articles, and many other kinds of information useful to the members. The Journal contains genealogical records of Dallas County or surrounding areas. The cost of printing and mailing these publications is a large part of the society's budget.

Besides mailing to the membership our society exchanges publications with over 100 genealogical societies, historical associations, and libraries. These exchanges enhance the periodical collection of the genealogy section of the Dallas Public Library, and, we hope, our publications enhance the collections of the exchange societies and libraries. While this exchange enhances collections, it also costs the society money for which we have no income to offset this expense. We use profit money that would be given to the genealogy section.

We assume that the DGS Newsletter is of value to all the members. However, many members have said that even though the Journal is a very good publication, they have no use for its contents as they have never had any ancestors in this area. We wonder what you do with the Journal when you get no genealogical data pertinent to your research? We fear that many get thrown away after awhile when they begin to accumulate.

The board would like to propose a new use for those journals if you do not need them for your research. Every new member would still get the first Journal published after joining. At membership renewal time, you would have the choice of receiving the next Journal or letting us use your copy to exchange with another society. We have many more members than exchanges; therefore, for the same or less cost we could exchange with many more societies and lessen your clutter at home at the same time. What a deal!

If you are using the Journal for research, or if you are sending it on to a friend who does have Dallas

ancestors, or to a library that we do not exchange with, please continue to do so. Mark your renewal card "Receive Journal."

However, if the Journal has been taking up valuable shelf space because you hate to discard any genealogical material, mark your renewal card "exchange Journal." The society will then mail your copy of the Journal to another library or society in exchange for their publication.

This method of distributing the Journal will benefit all who use it, and will lessen the costs of the society while contributing to the genealogy section. Thank you for your consideration of this proposal.

'DUNNAGANS of All Spellings' Reunion

When is a reunion not a reunion? Answer -when the family history researchers are meeting each other for the first time!

That is what happened to some 35 researchers interested in 'Dunnagans of All Spellings' (DOAS) in Hot Springs, Arkansas, 20 - 21 June 1998. For over a year some of the researchers have been learning to exchange information by e-mail. Most read the *Dunnagans of All Spellings* newsletter, published by Dick Dunagan of Beloit Wisconsin. One weekend a month about 20 or so members join in their version of an informal genealogy chat by e-mail.

The 1998 DOAS meeting originated when Martha Gujda of California, author of Dunnagans in Dixie, told about plans to visit relatives in Oklahoma. She soon found that she was invited to meet the Arkansas Dunagins in Hot Springs. Someone joked, "Why don't we tell the others that some of us are getting together and see if people from nearby states, such as Wisconsin, might come also." They were pleased to have people from seven states including areas as far away as the Atlantic Coast (GA), the Gulf of Mexico (LA, MS, TX) the Pacific Coast (CA) and Lake Michigan (WI).

Although it was great to meet "walk-ins" that none of the group knew existed, the most important element for many was a chance to meet in person the people with whom they had already been corresponding. It was a fun and productive two days.

Beginner's Corner "My Grandparents Eloped!" by Jill M. Clark

This month we begin a short series on interviewing relatives and recording oral family history. Here is an example of what can be



iearned by asking a few of the right questions and a minimal amount of research -- in this case the 1920 federal census, World War I enlistment and discharge papers, and the personal knowledge of two older relatives. (Next month we'll get into the preparation and process.)

I was attempting to tie up some loose ends with my family history in western Michigan. I even had my dad doing some footwork as he is local to the area; while I'm over a thousand miles away. Among other things I asked him to locate his dad's birth certificate, after discovering that one of the local FHCs in North Texas had birth records in their "resident collection" for only one county in Michigan: Muskegon. (Birth records are not easy to access at the county clerk's offices in Michigan right now unless you can prove direct relationship.)

While I was visiting with my dad last summer, I complained that I couldn't find his parents' marriage registered anywhere. (I had tried several different counties.) He smiled a rather secretive smile and told me: "That's because they weren't married in Michigan." Immediately he had my attention, and with a chuckle he explained, "They eloped!" I had never heard this story so I settled back and let him tell me what he knew.

During World War I Adelbert Syers got as far as Ft. Hood, TX before being discharged from service with a questionable TB diagnosis. Texas must have seemed a world away for this young man from rural Blue Lake township, Michigan. Back home he had fallen in love with the petite, but tenacious, Manilla Dewey Monroe. Although she stood only 4'10", and was known for her bareback riding and horse jumping, she had become a young lady since he got home from boot camp. She was a high school graduate and lived close to town, along with her father (the local "horse doctor") and her mother, who'd had two sons by a previous marriage. They attended the Congregational Church in Whitehall.

One of the initial things that made him attractive in her eyes was that he had an automobile and he was older by eight years! Adelbert's father was one of 14 children who had moved to the area shortly after the Civil War and had been involved in

the logging industry as well as farming. He was of the "strong and silent" variety of man who had a very charitable nature, and a green thumb!

Whether it was the local economic situation, or a family hardship, or just a whim, the couple decided to elope to Chicago in November of 1918. They drove in his Model T all the way down to Cook county where her favorite half-brother, Warren Elston and his happy-go-lucky wife, Tootsie, lived. (More than likely, they appeared before a justice-of-the-peace, but I've not followed up on that detail yet!)

Today it's a little over three hours to the Chicago area from Muskegon county, but back then it took much longer. The road conditions ranged from bad to worse; dusty and rutted, to muddy and treacherous. The soil is sandy where it runs close to the big lake -- perfect for growing fruit, but not for driving Model T's! In the late fall of 1918 it must have been cold and slick for on their way back home from Chicago, the young couple's vehicle slid off the road and rolled over into a ditch. My dad didn't know if they walked to a local farm and had the farmer pull them out with his horse or if my grandfather was able to push the vehicle upright and back onto the road, but they sustained no Since they were newly married, I can almost picture them laughing and brushing off the snow and dirt with hardly a care. They were able to continue their long drive home without incident.

Adelbert and Manilla's names are found in the 1920 federal census for Michigan in Blue Lake township. Here they are listed as owning their home (with some acreage) and having a baby daughter—my aunt Marian. They later had three more children; the youngest of them, my father. I was rather surprised to see that they owned their home already. My dad affirmed this and even knew the name of the man from whom his dad had purchased it. To me that says my grandfather was industrious and had good connections in the area. He later went on to work for the Muskegon county road commission, driving a truck or a snow plow in the winter and perhaps on the look-out for young couples stuck in ditches!

Registrations of a "Furry Kind"

People who breed and show cats, dogs, and horses keep careful records of their animals. These pedigrees are proof of certain qualities and characteristics generally attributed to a unique breed or stock. Keeping good records is part of a breeder's livelihood. Without them there would be chaos in the world of racing, hunting, dog and chat shows, and other fields. A well-maintained record on an animal is the sign of not only good parentage, but of a quality kennel.

It is said that the pedigree charts genealogists use today were developed, in part, from animal pedigree forms. If this is the case then we have benefited indirectly by the breeding and raising of animals. Another little-known way animal records might be of use to us is in the area of registration. Did your ancestors live on a farm? (Most likely, yes.) This is often spelled out in census sheets. Did they have a pet cat or perhaps, a dog? Unless the animal was photographed or journalized, we may never know. How might the existence of a dog in the family help you to locate great-great grandfather or confirm that he was definitely in a specific location? Well, if they resided in a community like Rehoboth, Massachusetts in the late 1850's there may just be a record of old Rover, and his owner.

The following are just a few excerpts from the "Town of Rehoboth, Registration of Dogs agreeable to the Statute of 1858." (Presumably this is a local ordinance, possibly springing from a need for animal control -- or at least identification.) This act was passed again in 1859 and 1860, so it must have been valuable to someone. Perhaps this documentation will be valuable . . . or at least entertaining, to you as well!



"Knowing what valuable tools obituaries can be for genealogists, I have been clipping obituaries from the Los Angeles Times and the Orange County Register. As I clip them I sort them by counties and send them to the genealogical society that has a connection with the person in the obituary. I am enclosing the ones I have collected for your county and hope they will be of use to your members. I am more than happy to continue sending them to you, if you would like to receive more."

If anyone would like to contact Mrs. Borkenhagen about future obituaries, please see the newsletter editor for her address. (This might be a good local interest project for someone!) Here is a sample:
