From Whence They Came: Migration Patterns to the Midwest

# IN MEMORIUM Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck

Lucile Anderson Boykin died on Christmas Day in Topeka, Kansas. She was buried in her childhood hometown of Osborne, Kansas.

Lucile joined the Dallas Public Library in the autumn of 1956 as a cataloger. From 1958 to 1961 she was Department Head of Serials after which she took a two-year stint supervising military libraries in Korea. She returned to the Dallas Public Library in 1963 as Department Head of Texas History, Local History, and Genealogy. With the library's reorganization in 1973, she became section head of the Genealogy Library in the History and Social Sciences Division. From 1980 to 1985 she was the Specialist in the Texas/Dallas History and Archives Division. She served as manager of that department from 1985 until her retirement in 1987.

In 1963, she attended the Institute of Genealogical Research at American University offered in conjunction with the National Archives in Washington, D.C. On one occasion I had the privilege to be introduced to the Archivist of the United States, Dr. John Warner. When I was identified as being with the Dallas Public Library, he asked, "How's Lucile?" While I had always been impressed with her vast knowledge and her efforts to take the Dallas Public Library not only to the community but also to the nation, I then realized just how widespread her acclaim reached.

She was an active participant in numerous professional organizations throughout her career and remained active in library endeavors after her official retirement date of 1987. She was a life member of the American Library Association and an honorary life member of the Dallas Genealogical Society. She served on the latter's board for a number of years. She also held membership in the Dallas County Library Association, Society of American Archivists, American State and Local History Association, Texas State Historical Association, and the Texas State Genealogical Society.

Is the list a general store, evidence of ancestry or a little bit of both.

# It Takes More than Census Records to Verify a Family Story

How do you prove a family story? Several cousins suggested that my great grandmother's brother had changed his name and moved to Florida. I discovered James E. Visage as a child on his father's 1850 and 1860 census records and with his wife, Evaline in 1870. Their 1869 marriage is documented in Randolph County Georgia. James does not appear anywhere else in Georgia after 1870.

Evaline and her three children are living with her father in Calhoun County Georgia in 1880 where she is described as married. In subsequent census records she is listed as widowed. She continues to live near or with her children through the 1920 census in either Miller or Randolph counties until her death in 1924.

Meanwhile, a J.E. Visage is recorded on the 1885 Polk County Florida census with a wife, Alice, and two children. Their 1883 marriage is recorded in Hillsborough County Florida. No other census record of this J.E. Visage is found. In 1900 Alice is listed with her son, Wallace W., in Hillsborough County Florida. In 1910 Wallace is found with a brother Joseph E., and his aunt, Dililah Visage, age 60, in Hillsborough County Florida. Now James E. Visage had twin sisters, Artemissa Tallulah and Narcissa Delilah. James' father, Pleasant B. Visage previously found in Georgia, is situated with a daughter-in-law and grandchildren, in another enumeration district in Hillsborough County in 1910.

From this, you might assume that J. E. Visage of the 1885 census is James E. Visage. But, deed records in Hillsborough County, city directory for Tampa, obituary notices for Wallace and Joseph E., church records and a written interview ca. 1962 with a former neighbor all name this Hillsborough County man as *Joseph* E. Visage. So the researching cousins assumed that James changed his name.

I was not happy that no document tied the two names together. As I continued in my pursuit of the whole Visage family, the Bureau of Land Management web site came to the rescue. While browsing through the search feature of the site, I entered the name Visage. I found a connection in Florida giving the record of a homestead entry for Joseph E. Visage in Volusia County in 1877. While Volusia is not far from Hillsborough and Polk Counties, it is not contiguous with them.

I ordered the deed index and then the deed records from the LDS library through the Dallas Public Library. The microfilmed index shows a number of entries for Joseph E. Visage, J. Ely Visage and E. M. Visage.

The deeds told the tale. In 1877 <u>Joseph</u> Ely Visage bought 160 acres in Volusia County Florida from the U.S. Government under the Homestead Act and subsequently sold them as a single man. Evaline M. Visage of Calhoun County Georgia later relinquished her dower right to the land bought by <u>James</u> E. Visage or J. Ely Visage in four warranty deeds. In one record made in 1882, she stated that she relinquished all her rights "as the wife of James E. Visage alias Joseph E. Visage in all that certain part or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Volusia State of Florida described as follows…"

The cousins were right. James had changed his first name to Joseph. Now I have to work on the rest of the story. Was he married to both women at the same time?

# SCOTTISH FAMILY HISTORY SYMPOSIUM TO PRESENT "THE SCOTCH-IRISH"

The 2000 Scottish Family History Symposium sponsored by the Texas Scottish Festival and Highland Games will be held Friday, June 2, 2000, at the LaQuinta Conference Center in Arlington, Texas.

The theme of this year Symposium is "The Scotch-Irish" presented by Dr. Jack Weaver of Winthrop University, Rock Hill, South Carolina. Research of the Scotch-Irish is particularly challenging and difficult and the subject is not frequently addressed. The family researcher frequently discovers an ancestor who is believed to be Scotch-Irish, but the researcher does not know what to do next. The Symposium will meet these problems directly with discussions of historical background. unique cultural characteristics. migration patterns, and genealogical research of the Scotch-Irish.

Dr. Weaver will introduce the Scotch-Irish as a culture as well as a group of people. Then he will give the account of people from England, Scotland, and Wales who ended up in Northern Ireland followed by the story of the Scotch-Irish in the American colonies. Part of the Symposium will be devoted to the resources and techniques for genealogical research of the Scotch-Irish in Ireland and America. There will be a panel discussion and ample time for questions.


