DGS IS STARTING EARLY THIS YEAR!

We have asked the library for two Lock-In's, but we had to agree to shorter hours so as not to wear out the staff. The first is scheduled for 26 August and the second one for 24 March, so mark your calendars.

This activity is open to DGS members only, and the *Newsletter* is the only way to register. You must be pre-registered so your name can be left at the parking garage guard station. You can park underground free, eat free refreshments all night long (we promise to have enough this time), and have uninterrupted research time for 7 hours straight. What more could a genealogist want?

Bring your notes, research folders, and even your computer (it will be safe) and research (or organize) the night away. Copy cards will be for sale and change available for the machines.

Registration is between 5:30 – 6:00 PM only. Please park either before the library closes at 5:00 PM and wait in the genealogy section for registration, or wait until 5:30 PM after the library closes to park. The staff will be leaving between 5-5:30 PM, and the guards will be busy clearing the building. You must stay until 10:00 PM. The guards will escort you to the parking garage every hour on the hour from 10 PM - 1 AM to leave. We hope everyone can last until 1:00 AM, but you are free to make your own schedule. Dress comfortably (house shoes allowed) and join us for this fun members only event.

Registration is limited to 75 people and costs \$20.00. DGS will pay the cost of one night guard, and our police officer board member will donate her time to share guard duties.

Register early since the space is very limited and goes quickly. Use the registration form on p. 103 in this newsletter. There are no registration forms at the library or on the web site.



President Carole Chew Ruska

This summary will cover both terms of office of 1998-1999 and 1999-2000, as I realize I did not write an annual report last year.

Budget: The record keeping program was changed, and it is now easier to show what each office and event spent and earned. An amendment to the Standing Rules now provides for a two year average of the operating expenses for calculation of the 105% to be retained for the next Society year before determining the annual gift to the library. Special funds are invested in interest earning CD's to preserve the capital but allow the interest to be used for the annual gift and scholarship.

Bylaws and Standing Rules: Numerous small changes were approved to reflect how the Society operates on a society year and not a calendar year. The financial review is now done after the books close in May, and the annual gift is not given until September. The office of Director of Special Interest Groups was eliminated with those groups now reporting directly to the President.

Programs: The December business meeting is now called the Awards Ceremony that incorporates the Volunteer Awards, the Service Awards, the Writing Awards (now biennial), and the Library Awards.

Membership: Membership reached an all-time high, but now seems to be declining somewhat.

Publications & Sales: Lloyd's "Family Tree", Early Cemeteries Volume 4, and Marriage Book 6 were published and microfiched. Work is continuing on other projects. The database for an extended mailing of the sales catalog is still pending.

Database Coordinator: This new, appointive position has coordinated registrations of all events, helped coordinate mailings and publicity, and serves to verify membership and all registrations.

Server and Computer Workstations: After two years of investigation, money set aside for a better system of handling our genealogy CD's and FamilySearch programs has been spent. DGS purchased a server and six workstations for the genealogy section along with some new CD's. These programs will be installed on the server and accessed by the six computers without any handling of the CD's. This system will allow more userfriendly access of the CD's, prevent damage and loss, and serve as a prototype for other workstations in the renovation of the 8th floor. Grants: a new committee was established to prepare grant applications and solicit funds, materials, and equipment for the genealogy section. The first grant application to the Summerlee Foundation was successful, and a gift of \$25,000 will be used to purchase microfilm of city directories 1861-1881. The Adopt a State fundraiser was also very successful. Over \$2500 was donated to buy materials for Ohio, Illinois, and Indiana.

Institute: A new event began in July 1999, by reformatting the weeklong institute into 2½ days and evenings of intense study of one genealogical topic. The Land Institute, with hands-on platting experience, was held last summer, and this year is the Military Institute with Lloyd Bockstruck and George Schweitzer. The first one was a sell out, and it appears this one will be also.

Events: The Fall Conference, renamed the, Fall Festival of Genealogy, was held in 1998 and 1999 after a two year absence. This event, along with the Lecture Series, the Beginner and Computer Workshops, and the Family History Library Seminar provide a wide array of educational and informative genealogical studies. A Genealogy Workshop for Youth was enthusiastically attended by boy and girl scouts.

As you can see, the DGS Board works very hard to plan and implement numerous projects and events to support the genealogy section of the Dallas Public Library. Your membership, donations, and attendance at these activities are essential to the success of the Dallas Genealogical Society. Thank your for your support.

Executive Vice President Paula Parke

Thank you, thank you, and thank you! DGS had a very successful lecture series. DGS appreciates all the members and others who made the series a big success with their support. A big thank you goes to all the board members that volunteered their time to make all three lectures successful and run smoothly.

Our 1999-2000 theme was *Tracking Your Ancestors* in the New Millennium. Each lecture had something to offer everyone. Pat Hatcher began the series on 20 November teaching us all about "Writing Our Ancestors Family History," followed on 12 February with "Finding Ancestors In The Midwest; Illinois, Indiana & Ohio" presented by Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck. The final lecture on 8 April was "Technology, Software & Mapping Tools" with Jim Slade and John Wylie.

The first two lectures were held at the Lovers Lane United Methodist Church and the final lecture was held in the wonderful state of the art Performance Hall at Cedar

Valley College. A special thanks goes to DGS members and Cedar Valley College librarians, Dava Stephens and Kim Ross for making the April 8 lecture a huge success.

With off-site locations, a larger number of attendees and vendors participated at all three lectures. For the final lecture, DGS even had box lunches available for a small fee so attendees had more time with the speakers and vendors.

The total paid attendance for the lecture series was 558. The approximate profit from the lecture series is \$10,000, with the funds added to the gift to the Dallas Public Library's Genealogy section.

As DGS prepares for the 2000-2001 lecture series, I want to encourage all to attend and continue to support a great society! Remember that education is an important part of helping each of us with our genealogy research. Mark your calendars now for the first lecture to be held on 30 September at the Lovers Lane Methodist Church featuring Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck. William Dollarhide will be here on March 10. Watch your mail box this summer for the registration brochures that will announce topics. A final thanks to all that volunteer and attend to make the lectures a tremendous success!

DGS made a profit of \$32,491.62 on our eight Fundraisers. Sales earned \$4,974.96 and Adopt-A-State brought in \$2,572.50.

During 1999-2000, DGS has given \$3,420.32 to the Dallas Public Library Genealogy Section consisting of \$500.00 in memorial gifts, \$347.82 in interest earned from the Endowment Fund, and \$2,572.50 donated for IL, OH, IN. records from the Adopt-A-State campaign.

DGS purchased for the Genealogy Section the Dallas Co. Marriage Records Index on Microfilm (\$432.00) and purchased several new CDs (\$1141.51) for the server. These new CDs will be listed elsewhere in this newsletter. The network server and six computer workstations (\$18,922.00) were purchased with Funds held from the 97-98 Society year and IGS reserved funds. The new server and computers should be up and running soon.

DGS donated \$1137.00 to The Stern NARA Gift Fund and \$200.00 to RootsWeb.

The annual gift to the Dallas Public Library Genealogy Section will be announced at the DGS September meeting.

<u>Secretary</u> Suzan Younger

I have served as the DGS Secretary for the past two years. Like all of the Board positions, it takes a lot of time, some times hard, and a lot of times fun, work, commitment and organization. I want to thank my fellow Board members with whom I have served during the past two years. You have made this a very rewarding experience. And I want to thank the DGS membership for this opportunity. While I have not had much time to work on my own family history, I have gained a wonderful new perspective on the field of genealogy. The discipline of genealogy is supported and advanced almost entirely by volunteers and individuals committed to the preservation of social and personal history. DGS members make up a very important part of that "volunteer army" and I would like to say job well done to each of you.

I will continue to support the Board in some on-going projects and look forward to meeting even more of the DGS members at future meetings and events. See you at the Military Institute in July.

Directors of Sales Everett & Betty Erikson

The Sales Department took in approximately \$8,000 during the 1999-2000 year. This came from sales at the volunteer desk, special events, and mail orders.

Director of Mailing & Correspondence David Ladymon

The final Newsletter for the 1999/2000-year is in the mail. As the Director for Mailing & Correspondence I have learned much about the internal functions of the society. My thanks to all of the Officers and other Directors for their help. A special thanks to our President, Carole Ruska, who had the answer when I needed one.

The mailing expenses of the *DGS Newsletter* & The *Dallas Journal*, and other mailing items take a good portion of the dues money we all pay. Our Society is extremely active and the U.S. Mail is still the preferred method of keeping our members informed.

This year my committee mailed a total of 12,858 Newsletters and 1,248 Journals (at a pound each). We also sent out 13,498 mailers for the various Workshops, Lecture Series, Institutes and other activities. A grand total of 27,604 items were mailed this year.

To accomplish this in the timely manner necessary, I received a lots of help from my bride Dava Ladymon who helped with every mailing and more. Barbara Dossett, our Database Coordinator, not only supplied the labels for those eligible to receive each mailer, but she taught me how to do the mailings. The Postal Service has rules regarding what is necessary in order to receive our Non-Profit Bulk Mail savings and Barbara shared this

knowledge and her labor in helping to address and wrap the Journal and Newsletter.

My thanks to Cheryl Mann, fellow Board member and editor of the *DGS Newsletter*. She came over and helped in addressing several times during the year. Cheryl and Dava also were hostesses for the April Board meeting.

The Correspondence side of this Board position is a daily activity. Our Society receives a lot of correspondence from other genealogists searching for information on their relatives. My thanks to Suzan Younger our Recording Secretary for answering most of that received by the old "snail mail".

During the year our President Carole got our new Web Site (www.dallasgenealogy.org) up and running. Take time and check it out. This has brought our Society to the attention of others through out the country and elsewhere. Our web site generated almost 200 incoming e-mails. My wife Dava has taken care of most of this email correspondence from those seeking information. She supplied them the information they needed or directed them to sources in the Dallas area to help them with their research. The Society keeps a list of Professional Genealogists that we supply when needed. Some of the e-mail was for information better answered by the president and other board members and was sent on to them.

Thank you for the opportunity of being able to serve as the Director of Correspondence/Mailings. I encourage everyone to volunteer and become part of the "innergroup" doing the work to make our Society a success.

Director of Publications Adrienne Jamieson

This year the Dallas County Marriages to 1900 were copied and published on microfiche. Work continues on the cumulative index for the marriage series.

Twenty eight small cemeteries were canvassed and prepared for publication. The next cemetery book should be ready for publication next year.

Director of Publicity Monette Littleton Grant

I mailed brochures to Libraries, other Genealogical Societies, Family History Libraries, and various newsletters and quarterlies of national Societies for seven or eight fundraising activities of our Society during the board year 1999-2000.

Volunteer Coordinator Susan Powdrill

DGS volunteers provided over 3,000 hours service at the 8th floor desk during 1999. So far in 2000, they have served over 1,200 hours. Congratulations! This is a record you can be very proud of. A New Year (Millennium Theme) greeting and 2000 pocket calendars were mailed to 71 volunteers.

I want to thank all of you for being so faithful the past two years. It has truly been a joy to work with all of you. I

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know Juanita Hogue, the new volunteer coordinator, will enjoy working with you as much as I have. I know I am leaving this job in very capable hands.

If you aren't currently working on the desk, you might want to give it a try. There are some permanent slots available and substitutes are always needed. Give Juanita a call or leave your name with the person at the desk.

Database Coordinator Barbara Dossett

There were 1385 registrations taken for various events. There were 26,504 labels prepared for various mailings. There were 2863 changes made to the database over the year. There were approximately 250 miscellaneous mailings, including no-shows from various events.

1999-2000 Materials Purchased for the Genealogy Section MICROFILM

Grants and Gifts Committee

Bill Benson

The Board of Directors approved the formation of a Grants and Gifts Committee in April, 1999 to extend the fundraising efforts of the Dallas Genealogical Society for the benefit of the Dallas Public Library by seeking grants, gifts, bequests and other financial support.

The committee obtained a "wish list" of genealogical materials from Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck, developed a notebook of standard materials that funding groups need, implemented a member fundraising project, researched funding organizations, and wrote and submitted one grant application.

The Adopt-A-State project, detailed elsewhere, raised over \$2,500 from members' contributions at meetings and seminars to purchase materials from Ohio, Illinois, and Indiana.

The Summerlee Foundation received and funded the first grant application of this committee. The funds granted will be used to purchase Segment II of the city directories of the United States on microfilm. This collection spans the years 1861 to 1881 and includes 447 reels of microfilm. The members of the Society voted at the May meeting to supplement the \$25,000 received in order to purchase all of Segment II.

The committee will continue its efforts with the new Society year by looking for additional foundations and organizations whose interests are aligned with the objectives of the Dallas Genealogical Society. In particular, the committee is looking for sources of funds for the Freedmen's Bureau collection, Native American records, passenger ship lists and furniture or equipment for the Eighth Floor renovation project.

Summerlee Foundation Grant

The Dallas Genealogical Society has received a grant award of \$25, 000 from The Summerlee Foundation. The foundation, created in 1988 by Dallas philanthropist Annie Lee Roberts, has two interests: animal rights and Texas history.

Because of her family's history in Texas and the interest of her late husband, Summerfield G. Roberts, she designated Texas history as one of the missions of the foundation. This interest in Texas history is expressed in a number of goals. On its website (www.summerlee.org), the foundation states that one of these goals is to "intensify its effort to enhance the programmatic needs of state agencies responsible for promotion, preservation, and interpretation of the history of Texas." Since its inception, the foundation has invested over \$4 million dollars in Texas history projects.

Among the 37 recipients of grants in 1998-99 were the Dallas Historical Society for the conversion of collection accession records into digital format and Irving Public Library for the collection management of City of Irving archives.

The grant award to DGS is for the purchase of Segment II of the city directories of the United States. Segment II includes the years 1861 to 1881,a time of great immigration. As cities in the east filled up and land depleted, pre-Civil War Texas looked like an excellent choice for settlement. Railroad made transportation from cities and towns in the East, South, and Midwest easier. After the Civil War, conditions in the Old South and elsewhere encouraged emigration toward the west. The population of Texas grew from 604,215 in 1860 to 1,591,749 in 1880.

City directories spanning this time period will provide much missing information about our ancestors in cities and towns before they arrived in Texas. Many of the city directories list the race of the individual thus providing a clue for Texas African American researchers to their ancestors.

Dallas County Records Inventory Project Shirley Sloat

The project is continuing: current participants are Dava Ladymon, Alan Miller, Kathy Williston, and Shirley Sloat, with some proofreading assistance from John Williston. The group expended a total of 300 volunteer hours between October 1999 and March 2000.

We have inventoried everything except the records in the County Record Storage Facility, many of which are being re-filmed and placed on new heavy-duty shelving. Once the county staff has processed these records, we will be provided the inventory data, which will be added to that gathered by the team from other locations.

During the course of the past six months, we coordinated movement of various records from one location to another in order to gather similar records in a single location. A few records were moved from the Dallas Public Library back to the County; many more were moved from the County to the Dallas Public Library which has better storage conditions for valuable older records.

The older items (our criteria established a cut-off period at 1920) are stored in the County Record Storage facility and have been tagged with archival quality identifiers. They will soon be moved into a more secure storage area in the same facility as soon as new shelving is installed and available.

The new County Records Manager is Margaret Anderson and we look forward to working with her as we add items from the County's bar-coded inventory list to our database.

We are currently "massaging" the computerized database to group like items and assign proper state record retention schedule codes. This has proved to be a much more daunting task than originally anticipated. When the data has been organized to the best of our ability, we will go back to county personnel and ask them to review it. It is possible that county supervisors could use our lists, that include *everything* we found, to clean out obsolete data in various storage locations. Space is at a premium, and anything which can and should be discarded would provide space for useful items.

For our final publication, we are gathering data describing the functions of the various county departments, which we will ask county managers to verify. This should add some more "meat" to our publication than that included in the earlier inventories for other counties done by the State. An article has been submitted for the June Newsletter describing the excellent record preservation projects undertaken by the County Clerk's office.

The sub-project dealing with Delayed Births is continuing in the able hands of Dava Ladymon, with assistance in proofreading from Kathy and John Williston. Three original volumes have been completed and submitted for publication in the DGS Journal.

The sub-project dealing with Justices of the Peace was completed in December 1999 with the data given in digital form to the District Clerk who will incorporate it into the "Elected County Officials" booklet his department maintains and publishes every other year. It was also submitted for publication in the DGS Journal.

We'll keep on "keeping-on" until the data is ready to be moved from ACCESS into WORD for proofing prior to publication. It's likely that the project, originally thought to be completed in the year 2000, will stretch to 2001 before publication.

SURVEY RESULTS

Carole Chew Ruska

This summary is compiled from the returned surveys. I write the comments from my experience of serving on the board and working events for five years. I felt several areas needed to be explained for our membership so they would not feel that their concerns fell on deaf ears or that the board was not responsive. These comments are strictly my own.

Membership: 4.5% of the membership returned surveys; 95% are DGS members averaging over 6 years of membership

<u>Meetings</u>: fewer attend meetings than events; we have many out-of-town/state members

Problem 1: Location - 10% objected

downtown location of meetings

driving at night

Comment.

Dallas Public Library graciously donates the space for our business meetings/programs. The auditorium and parking facilities are very favorable. In the past, alternate morning and evening meetings were held, but attendance was so poor during the day that we had to change. It would be very hard to find a facility as nice or as cheap. The library location also allows for research before the meeting if possible for you.

Problem 2: Programs - 13% responded

no interest in topic too many local speakers and repositories others said not enough Dallas/Texas not their area of research

Comment:

DGS meetings are meant to explore our many excellent local research repositories and materials. We use local speakers because of the cost involved in national speakers. Many of our local speakers are nationally or widely known and yet will present a program for us at nominal cost. Most of these programs are a mixture of local repositories having records that cover resources and methods of research applicable anywhere. Several program suggestions will be passed on to the next board.

Problem 3: Scheduling conflicts – 33%

Fall Conference: 15% listed this as a favorite event *Problem 1*: Location

many dislike Convention Center and the cost of parking and food

Comment:

The facilities are really well suited for our classroom setup and for the large vendor area. We have outgrown previous facilities, and have tried to find other suitable places. The one or two places similar to the Convention Center are not in Dallas and are booked well in advance. Other places in Dallas are more expensive and have mandatory catered food clauses, which would cost even more. DART is a convenient substitute for driving to this location. Problem 2: Program

same speakers/topics/

Comment:

The name has evolved from Genealogy Symposium to Regional Conference to Fall Festival of Genealogy, but the format has stayed essentially the same. We try to showcase Texas area speakers in several tracts methodology, specific locations, records, ethnic groups, computer genealogy, etc. To offer 28-35 lectures costs must be kept reasonable; therefore, national speakers are usually not solicited. The call for papers is open to all so it is not known know what will be submitted, but most speakers have a variety of topics, and there have been few repeated. Most of the lectures are in the intermediate to advanced research range. The Beginners tract was separated for a few years, but will be combined with the Conference again in 2000.

Lloyd Bockstruck was #1 favorite Elizabeth Shown Mills (also listed as the worst), Cindy Howells (also listed as the worst) George Schweitzer (over two years ago, but still remembered)

Problem 2: Dates (would like to see events repeated so could have a choice of dates/locations) Comment:

These are the events in which we try to bring in nationally known speakers; costs are greater. Most are experts in specific locations, records, or methodology. We are aware of the location problems. Neither Dallas nor surrounding areas has a public auditorium of medium size (500) with free parking, comfortable seating, plenty of restrooms, and vendor and hospitality areas. Churches and colleges have the auditoriums, but are very reluctant to book far in advance to outside events and can bump us if that area is needed for their own purposes. Also parking is not very convenient at colleges; longer walks are required. Small auditoriums lack the seating and tables needed without renting more, and the vendor space is severely limited.

To date we have not found the perfect place although this problem has been discussed by many past boards. Any suggestions are welcome. One or two places were suggested in the survey that will be considered.
