Lloyd Bockstruck

"Passing Through Tennessee."

Saturday, **October 20, 2001**

Discovering Genealogical Sources

The second seminar in our 2001/2002 Lecture Series features DGS's favorite son – Lloyd Bockstruck! Lloyd's professional qualifications and speaking genealogy is far too lengthy to list here – but suffice it to say we are incredibly fortunate to have his knowledge and expertise as speaker, librarian, historian and genealogist at our service.

This year, Lloyd's seminar will feature Tennessee. The Tennessee collection in the Dallas Public Library is one of the largest in the United States and this lecture will focus on Tennessee land and probate records, military records, census and tax records and vital records.

Interest in Trans-Appalachia began in Tennessee following the French and Indian War and Pontiac's Conspiracy. The first settlers arrived in the late 1760's believing they were within the colony of Virginia. They were joined by North Carolinians who led the unsuccessful rebellion against the Crown known as the Regulators. With the outbreak of the Revolution, Loyalists from the eastern seaboard and the piedmont came to eastern Tennessee. North Carolina awarded her Continental Line soldiers with bounty land in eastern and middle Tennessee.

Following independence, Tennessee was the third state to join the union in 1796. By 1830, it was the eighth largest state in the Union. It earned its sobriquet as the Volunteer State by having more volunteers for the Mexican War than the government could accept.

Sam Houston, one-time governor of Tennessee, migrated to Texas. He is the only American to serve as governor of two different states and the only American to head a foreign government. Thousands of others followed that same pattern.

Approximately 102 members participated in the lectures and research time. The guest speakers were Dr. John Colletta and Mr. Lloyd Bockstruck. The co-chairwomen were Sheila Stough and Barbara Baylis.

Dr. Colletta presented several informative lectures on the Library of Congress, the National Archives, the various types of records found in the National Archives, and the various finding aid available for the National Archives. On Sunday morning, Dr. Colletta presented a humorous look at "Tracking Ancestral Remains." John had the opportunity to promote his book, "Only a Few Bones." This is a must read for any genealogist.

Mr. Bockstruck presented an overview of researching in Washington D. C. and the Library of Virginia. The students had the opportunity to learn the lesser-known repositories located in and around Washington D. C. and

Pioneer Rest Here Now

"PIONEER REST CEMETERY"

The cemetery where the pioneers of Fort Worth, Texas lie at rest. This long awaited compilation of information about the burials in the historical Pioneers Rest Cemetery is on its way to the printers. From the records of the Pioneers Rest Cemetery Association, with added obituaries from Fort Worth papers and biographical information gleaned from newspapers and family members, this book with a complete full name index will be very valuable to the researchers of early Fort Worth and Tarrant County.

The FWGS committee walked the cemetery and copied every stone and made notes of those sites without stones. The listing of the cemetery is by lot and block so that those persons searching for a gravesite will have a guide to go by.

Many years after the first burials in 1850 the Cemetery Association was formally organized and a lot and block map was drafted and filed in the Tarrant County Court House. A copy of that 1870 map is included.

In the special picture section one will find photographs of selected monuments. Descendants of some of the early families were contacted and have been very helpful in allowing their cherished pictures to be copied. Photographs of some early citizens are included as a result of the cooperation of the staff of the Fort Worth Central Library, Genealogy Department.

This book can now be ordered from the FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY at PO Box 9767, Fort Worth, Texas 76147-2767. The price is \$25.00 plus \$3.00 mailing charge if it is to be mailed. NO sales tax and no shipping charge if picked up.

DETAILS ABOUT THE BOOK: It is a hard cover (Smythe sewn), 8-1/2x11, 60 lb acid free paper, historical background, full listing of cemetery, obituaries, biographical sketches, approx. 200 pages, 53 pictures, maps, CSA burials, and much more.

Reward for Information Regarding John Richard Crain

During the early morning hours of May 24, 1923, Special Officer John Richard Crain was on foot patrol in the 3400 block of Junius Street. Officer Crain noticed that the light over the Browne Pharmacy was not illuminated. As Officer Crain peered into the pharmacy, an unknown suspect shot through the front glass window and struck the officer above the right eye. Officer Crain immediately fell to the ground with the fatal shot. The suspect ran out the front door and jumped over the deceased officer. Two milkmen and a Baylor nurse witnessed the suspect fleeing from the scene on foot.

According to the pharmacy owner, the suspect removed \$1.50 from the cash register and a box of cigars. The only evidence collected from the offense location was the pried lock and photos of the latent fingerprints. The Dallas Police Department suspected that this murderer killed another officer on April 13, 1923 at Grant's Pharmacy during the commission of a burglary offense.

John Richard Crain was born on 15 September 1867 in Texas. John married Lula M. Crain and the couple resided at 1518 Hughes Circle. The children of John and Lula are Noel, Taylor, Lillie Mae, Lorene, and Mrs. J. W. Humphries of Gordonville, TX. According to the

newspaper account, John had the following brothers: J. A. Crain and H. H. Crain both of Cumby, TX and J. B. Crain of Slamont, TX. His sister was W. H. Jackson of Dallas, TX. Officer Crain was buried in Sunnypoint Cemetery located south of Cumby.

The Dallas Police Department is seeking assistance in finding descendants of John Richard Crain. Family members are needed to assist with the application process for the Police Memorial Walls in Dallas, Austin, and Washington D. C. The Dallas Police Department would like to give this fallen officer the proper police funeral with family members present. Of Cousins Lost and Found

My interest in family history was, in part, stimulated by a family story I learned when I was approximately 10 years old. The story told of two pioneer Standard brothers, Sherod and Gideon, who were raised in Kentucky in the early 1800's and worked side by side helping their father clear and pioneer a productive farm in what is now Todd County. Their father died in 1830. Sherod stayed in Kentucky, while his brother, Gideon, sold his part of his father's estate and moved by covered wagon with his young family in 1832, to the newly opened land in what is now McDonough County, Illinois.

Using the skills he had learned from his father, Gideon developed a fine productive farm in Illinois. His family grew as did his land holdings. But the press of daily life and the difficulty of communications back to their home in Kentucky eventually led to the loss of ties with the family in Kentucky. As the generations passed, the memory of where they came from grew dim. One of the few clues they had was an 1832 entry in the family bible where Gideon records the birth of the son he named Sherod, "born in Illinois in a covered wagon on our way from Kentucky."

And it was likewise back in Kentucky, where the new generations had only vague recollections of the story about the brother who took his family to Illinois. Both families grew and prospered, but the memory, one of the other, grew even more dim with the passage of time and the distractions of historical events: the Civil War, the Spanish American War, World War I and the "Great Depression."

Then one day in 1940, Daniel C. Standard, of the Illinois branch, saw the name of Dr. Ford Standard, of the Kentucky branch, in a medical journal. Daniel wondered if there could be a family connection, and eventually contacted Ford. After several rounds of correspondence, they were able to reconstruct the story of the day in 1832 (110 years and four or five generations before) when the brothers, Sherod and Gideon, said goodbye to each other.

From that communication, about 100 Kentucky Standards got to know about 100 of their long lost Illinois Standard cousins.
