MEETINGS

Regular meetings and special interest group meetings are held in the plaza level auditorium and East/West Rooms of Dallas's J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, 1515 Young Street, in downtown Dallas. Secured, underground parking available beneath the library.

DALLAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY: Usually meets the fourth Monday of each month, September – May. There are exceptions due to holidays and scheduling conflicts. Social time is 6:30-7:00 p.m. for refreshments and to meet fellow genealogists. The business meeting and program begin at 7:00 p.m.

DGS COMPUTER INTEREST GROUP (CIG): Meets on the first Tuesday of each month, September – May, in the library auditorium. There are exceptions due to holidays. Open Forum question & answer time is 6:30-7:00 p.m. The educational program begins at 7:00 p.m. We cover topics that range from introductions to Genealogy products to organizational systems to "How to get it in print".

DGS AFRICAN-AMERICAN INTEREST GROUP: Meets on the third Tuesday of each month, September – May, in the Library Auditorium beginning at 6:30 PM.

All DGS and Special Interest Group meetings are free and open to the public.

DGS ANNUAL EVENTS: include a Summer Institute, Lecture Series, a Library Lock-in, a Salt Lake City Research Trip, and other workshops as needed. (Fees vary)

Our Mission: Explore the use and expand our knowledge of computer technology as we search, collect, manage, and publish information related to genealogy.

The following are highlights of upcoming programs:

September 3

Our speaker, William B. Dow, Jr., will speak on "Computer Mapping and Platting for Genealogists".

Several mapping and platting programs and services are available to assist the genealogist with research and documentation. Gold Bug's ANIMAP shows the evolution of states and counties since colonial times with dates of creation and the parent jurisdictions from which they were derived.

Direct Line Software offers **DEEDMAPPER**, which plots actual land boundaries from the deed descriptions known as metes and bounds.

DeLorme's STREET ATLAS is a street level map for the entire continental United States. Combined with a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver, it can be used to locate or document locations such as cemeteries, churches, creek beds, etc. A subscription satellite mapping service provides aerial photographs and topographical maps scaled to match the output of DEEDMAPPER. Superimposing one on the other can provide an actual view of an ancestor's property.

Explanations and a demonstration of each of these products and services will be included in this presentation.

William B. Dow, Jr. is principal and CEO of Micro-Comp Consulting, a computer software design and development firm in Carrollton, TX. He has been in this industry for over 30 years and uses his technology skills with his law enforcement experience to combine computers with investigative techniques and record keeping. He says this makes his quest for kinfolk more efficient and FUN, not to mention addictive.

Bill is a professional genealogist who has researched areas of Illinois, New York, England and Scotland for 25 years. He has received the highest award level from Toastmaster International, the Distinguished Toastmaster award. He has given numerous lectures at local, regional and national genealogical conferences and workshops.

October 1

Speaker, Barbara Dossett, will focus on "Time-Lining Those Difficult Ancestors".

A time-line for an ancestor can be a useful tool for the genealogy researcher. Our ancestors did not live to create one record after another. Your ancestors created many kinds of "records" at the same time on different levels. They could be paying their taxes and developing census information at the same time. If researchers dissect these records, we often find similar information contained within them. One type of record can become another type if we expand the definition of a 'record.'

Barbara Dossett will teach us how to analyze and combine our records to create the quilt of an ancestor's life.

Barbara owns and operates her own bookkeeping business, The Taxpayer Service. Barbara has been in this business for almost twenty-five years, and has been doing genealogy research for seventeen years. She has given many presentations to local genealogy societies in the region. She is a member of DAR, the First Family of Texas and currently serves as Treasurer of DGS.

November 5

Glenn Kinkade will spur us forward with "Search and Ye Shall Find."

When you use search engines to find information about your ancestors, do you receive too many results? No results? Results that are not relevant? Come hear where and how to use Search Engines to your best advantage!

December 3

Our organization's President, Tresa Tatyrek, will present, "Navigating the DGS Website." Everyone can benefit from the information on the site and its Internet links – it is a "work-in-progress!"

Our next DGS Newsletter deadline is October 1 for submissions.


What does this mean? All news, program promotions and announcements for <u>December - February</u> should be included in the October edition.



Best for Browsing: and the winner is...

THE DALLAS PUBLIC LIBRARY

"The Dallas Public Library's genealogy section has the largest number of volumes in open stacks (you can browse the bookshelves). Other good places to browse are the Birmingham Public Library, the Clayton Library and the Mid-Continent Public Library".

Other winners in the "Honorable Collections" are:

Largest Collections: "The Allen County Public Library has the most genealogy holdings among public libraries; The New York Public Library comes in second".

Best Regional Collections: "The Boston Public Library, the Kansas City (Mo.) Public Library, the St. Louis (Mo.) Public Library, and the Seattle Public Library all have large collections focusing on their own areas of the country".

Best Small-Town Library: "The Indian River County Main Library in Vero Beach, Florida has an impressive genealogy collection of more than 15,000 books, 10,000 plus microfilms, more than 35,000 microfiches and all US federal census records from 1790 to 1880".

We, as genealogists, who use the 8th floor of the Dallas Public Library, appreciate the opportunity we have to do our research in the lovely remodeled facility, value the staff who assist us, and know that, without Lloyd's knowledge and expertise, Dallas

wouldn't have this outstanding collection available for our use.

This will allow you to select the state, the county, and, if you wish, the city, of interest and if you will receive a helpful list of enumeration districts.

I believe it will also steer you to city directories when those are available. This saves a lot of time doing manual navigation within a county's many reels of film to find a specific township or city name.

DID YOU KNOW ...?

BUNKER HILL REVISITED, by Bill Deal (DGS)

In the July DGS Newsletter we related, very briefly, the fact that the Battle of Bunker Hill actually occurred on nearby Breed's Hill; and gave the date as 16 April 1775. Thanks go to an alert reader, Gerry Dobson (<munker@centurytel.net>) who emailed, "I hate to do this, but the "Did You Know" on p. 53 of the July DGS Newsletter is incorrect." And he goes on to give us the correct date of 17 June 1775—a full two months later. Two months! Well . . . !!! I guess we've been told!

The source of my literary boo-boo (OK, debacle) was "100 Great Events That Changed The World, from Babylonia to the Space Age," edited by John Canning, Odhams Books, Middlesex, England, 1966, pp. 361-362.

Further research shows that this "tale of great blunders heroically redeemed" (<www.masshist.org/bh/essay.html>)

did indeed occur in the early morning hours of 17
June 1775 on Breed's Hill. And that the American
farmers ran out of gunpowder during the third
British assault and made the only escape possible
by way of Bunker Hill. Technically, the battle was
won by the British who did succeed in retaking
possession of both hills on the peninsula
overlooking Boston Harbor—but at a terrible price
to them.

The untrained, undisciplined, poorly supplied and sometimes inebriated American colonists won a psychological victory with much fewer losses of soldiers—in full view of "thousands who crowded the housetops, church steeples, and shore batteries of Boston to watch the spectacle" where "viewers only half a mile away could make out the stages of the battle clearly." (ibid. <www.masshist.org/>)

The moral to this unnerving experience is two-fold (and every such experience should have at least one good lesson to learn): 1. Where possible, always use more than one reference, and 2. Be **very** wary of stories about the American Revolution from British sources!




