Founded in 1955, the Dallas Genealogical Society (DGS) is the oldest, continuously functioning organization of its kind in Texas. It is a nonprofit, tax-exempt corporation and a member of the Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS).

The object of this society shall be to create, foster, and maintain interest in genealogy; to assist and support the genealogy section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library in Dallas, Texas, or its legal successor, and to collect, preserve, copy, and index information relating to Dallas County and its early history.

MEETINGS

Regular meetings and special interest group meetings are held in the plaza level auditorium and East/West Rooms of Dallas's J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, 1515 Young Street, in downtown Dallas. Secured, underground parking available beneath the library.

DALLAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY: Usually meets the fourth Monday of each month, September – May. There are exceptions due to holidays and scheduling conflicts. Social time is 6:30-7:00 p.m. for refreshments and to meet fellow genealogists. The business meeting and program begin at 7:00 p.m.

DGS COMPUTER INTEREST GROUP (CIG): Meets on the first Tuesday of each month, September – May, in the library auditorium. There are exceptions due to holidays. Open Forum question & answer time is 6:30-7:00 p.m. The educational program begins at 7:00 p.m. We cover topics that range from introductions to Genealogy products to organizational systems to "How to get it in print".

DGS AFRICAN-AMERICAN INTEREST GROUP: Meets on the third Tuesday of each month, September – May, in the Library Auditorium beginning at 6:30 PM.

All DGS and Special Interest Group meetings are free and open to the public.

DGS ANNUAL EVENTS: include a Summer Institute, Lecture Series, a Library Lock-in, a Salt Lake City Research Trip, and other workshops as needed. (Fees vary)

The newsletter editors in consecutive order were Cheryl Mann, Beth Applebaum, and Sammie Lee. I would like to personally commend Sammie Lee for taking on the newsletter for

the last three issues. She is a real lifesaver.

The year began with the Summer Institute 2001, which focused on Washington, D.C. It was a huge success. Instructors were Lloyd D. Bockstruck, FNGS and John Philip Colletta, Ph.D. We hope to continue this tradition of success in the future.

A Southern Perspective on the American Experience Institute with Lloyd D. Bockstruck, Brent Holcomb, and Robert Scott Davis is slated for the 2002 Summer Institute. The states of Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Alabama are the states being covered.

He spoke on technology "Writing topics: and related Distributing Genealogy via Electronic Newsletters," "Gadgets for Genealogists," "Creating Your Own Genealogy CD-ROM Disks," and "How to Select a Genealogy Program."

There are five lectures planned for the next board year. The board, with the help of the African American Genealogy Interest Group and the Computer Interest Group will be presenting these activities.

The Silent Auction/Surname party was fun, but did not raise many additional funds. event was held at the Dallas Police Association. which donated the building for the event. reacclimatize yourself with the collection. DGS plans to have some workshops on the use of the collection starting in the fall.



Direct Line Software's DEEDMAPPER plots actual land from the deed boundaries descriptions known as metes and bounds DeLorme's STREET ATLAS is a street level map for the entire continental United States. Combined with a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver, it can be used to locate or document locations such as cemeteries, churches, creek beds, A subscription satellite mapping service provides aerial photographs and topographical maps scaled to match the output of DEEDMAPPER. Superimposing one on the other can provide an actual view of an ancestor's property. Explanations and a demonstration of each of these products and services will be included in this presentation.
