#### **DGS Summer Institute Speakers**

#### Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck Arkansas & Mississippi

Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck, M.S. (European History), M.S. (Library Science), FNGS, is currently supervisor of the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Public Library, in Dallas, TX. As of Feb 2003, he has been involved with the Dallas Public Library for some 31 years! He shares his genealogical expertise with readers of the Dallas Morning News in his weekly column, *Family Tree*.

He was a teaching assistant in the Department of History of Southern Illinois University from 1967 to 1969. From 1969 to 1971, he served in the Missionary Journeyman Program of the Southern Baptist Convention with assignment to the Baptist Mission of East Africa where he was a teacher and librarian in the Mombasa (Kenya) Baptist High School. He was a graduate assistant in the School of Library Science at the University of Illinois 1970-71. He has been on the faculty of the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research at Samford University in Birmingham, AL since 1974 and was the first recipient of the Institute's Outstanding Alumnus Award. He formerly served as an instructor of genealogy at Southern Methodist University.

He received the Award of Merit from the National Genealogical Society in 1982 and was named a Fellow of the Society in 1993. In 1999, he was named the first recipient of the Filby Prize for Genealogical Librarianship. His biography is featured in *Who's Who in America*.

Lloyd is a widely read author and a sought after lecturer and we, in the Dallas area, enjoy sharing his expertise on a regular basis.

He is the author of:

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#### Robert de Berardinis Louisiana

Robert de Berardinis is a 13<sup>th</sup>-generation native Louisianan, a descendent of one of the pioneers of Iberville's first trip establishing Fort Maurepas as well as a descendant of one of the French pioneers of the establishment of Port Royal, Acadia in 1605.

As he seeks his certification in genealogy, de Berardinis specializes in French language genealogy and history.

Robert will speak about French Colonial Louisiana this April at the Louisiana Purchase Bi-centennial Genealogical Conference in Baton Rouge.

de Berardinis has edited one book in print:

- French Superior Council Records of Louisiana: 1717–1763;

An Index to Abstracts in the Louisiana Historical Quarterly, Marion McCarley, comp., Robert de Berardinis, ed.

He has three other books being published:

 French Officials, Officers, and Soldiers, 1710– 1770

Translations of selected civil and military records of the French Province of Louisiana

- An Analytical Calendar and Index to the Civil and Military Records of the French Province of Louisiana
- Listes civiles et militaires de l'île française de St-Christophe dans les Antilles, 1665–1702 —

Civil and Military Records of the French Island of St. Christophe in the Caribbean, 1665–1702.

(French-English dual-language book)

de Berardinis has authored more than 70 articles in various state and national genealogical publications, including several in the National Genealogical Society Quarterly, one in France, and 9 book introductions. Additionally, Robert has an article revising French colonial history accepted for publication by a state historical journal. Robert is also currently serving a second term as a director of Clayton Library Friends, Houston, TX.

#### Charles A. Sherrill Tennessee

Charles A. Sherrill (M.A., M.L.S.) is Director of the Brentwood Library near Nashville. For seven years prior to this, he was Director of Public Services for the Tennessee State Library & Archives. His education includes masters' degrees in History and Library Science from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.

Sherrill has been active in genealogical research and publishing since he was a teenager. He began his career at Western Reserve Historical Society in Cleveland, Ohio, where he was Head Reference Librarian. As director of the Cleveland (Tenn.) Public Library for nine years, Sherrill edited a series of genealogical publications about Bradley County.

Additional works include two family genealogies, and editing:

- Tennessee's Confederate Widows and their Families.
- Tennessee Convicts, Tennesseans in Court:
   2,500 Early Settlers Found in Supreme Court
   Reports -- A collection of penitentiary records

Among his works are books on several Tennessee counties, particularly Grundy County where most of his ancestors lived.

#### Dr. George K. Schweitzer Kentucky & Missouri

Dr. Schweitzer is Alumni Distinguished Professor at the University of Tennessee and holds BA, MS, and Ph.D. degrees in Chemistry, an M.A. in the History of Religion, a Ph.D. in History of Science, and an Sc.D. (Doctor of Science) in Philosophy of Science. He is Phi Beta Kappa and is listed in *Who's Who in America*. He has authored 220 publications including 19 genealogical guidebooks.

Professor Schweitzer uses historical reenactment to teach genealogy and has traced many of his ancestral lines back to the early 1500s. He is a fascinating and enthralling speaker. He has lectured to over 200 genealogical and historical societies in the United States, Canada, England, and Germany.

Some of his research publications include:

- Handbook of Genealogical Sources
  - A 252-paged book describing all major and minor sources of genealogical information with precise and detailed instructions for obtaining data on your ancestors from them.
- Kentucky Genealogical Research

A 167-paged book containing 1191 sources for tracing your KY ancestor along with detailed instructions.

- Missouri Genealogical Research

A 235-paged book containing 1342 sources for tracing MO ancestor & detailed instructions.

- Tennessee Genealogical Research

A 132-paged book containing 1073 sources for tracing your TN ancestor along with detailed instructions.

Other areas of his genealogical research include: Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Virginia and Germany. Also resource books to help find ancestors: Civil War Genealogy, Revolutionary War Genealogy and War of 1812 Genealogy.

## WEBSITE WATCHES OVER TEXAS LEGISLATURE!!!

As the Texas Liaison for the Joint (National Genealogical Society/Federation of Genealogical Societies) NGS-FGS Records Preservation and Access Committee Mic Barnette of Houston has created both a website and email mailing list to aid Texas genealogists in lobbying and keeping an eye on the Texas Legislature and other public records offices. The Texas Legislature currently has several bills pending which seek to close records to the public. Information about these bills is on the website.

The website is a place where information about specific legislative bills may be posted and how to contact legislators.

The mailing list is designed as a forum for genealogists to communicate quickly concerning records and issues dear to the hearts of genealogists. It will enable Texas genealogists to coordinate activities in quick mode should it be necessary to do so.

The website is located at http://micbarnette.bravepages.com. On the website there is a page where one may go to subscribe to the mailing list. One may also subscribe by following the attached directions:

- send an email to TXLEGNOTES-L-request@ rootsweb.com
- in the message area of the email type the word "subscribe."

There is also a digest mode at TXLEGNOTES-D-request@rootsweb.com where multiple messages are sent at one time rather than individually. For speedier mail, at least during the legislative season when it might count, it is recommend subscribing to the L mode rather than the D mode. After the legislative season there may not be anything to say on this list. It will already have been said and voted upon.

The basic legislative issues to be concerned with at this point regard eight (8) bills pending in the House and the Senate proposing to close DD 214/Military Discharges to researchers.

- Two new bills, one in the House and one in the Senate wanting to extend the time birth records are closed in Texas from 50 years to 75 years,
- One bill wanting to close marriage applications to the public,
- TEXSHARE/TIFF funding for schools and libraries and electronic database access,
- HIPPA is expected to go into effect April 14 and will probably close records that have medical records or related information in them. This bill affects insurance and medical companies and offices. I remember hearing some people talking about this but they were not into genealogy. Now, I have had someone in a county clerk's office ask me about the same thing and said it may affect public records in their position. So, we may have to address this problem, too.

The crux of the problem of closing public records is all about Identity Theft and the fear of it. People feel that if a record is available to the public someone must be stealing their identity.

So, Identity Theft and how to protect our public records from thieves and persuade public officials not to pass laws closing them is going to be our goal.

DGS members are urged to visit the website and sign up for the mailing list. By being on the mailing list genealogists may contact one another quickly when legislative issues threaten. We are starting late in the legislative season and are therefore already behind.
