Lloyd Bockstruck speaking about TEXAS on 25 October 2003!

The first of our two DGS Lectures for the 2003-2004 year will feature our own Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck speaking about Texas.

From 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. on Saturday, 25 OCTOBER, Lloyd will enlighten us with the basics and not so basics we need to know to research our Texas ancestors.

The history of Texas is largely a history of its land. Certainly her land records constitute the largest single source for Texas genealogy. A state land state, Texas has been fortunate to have preserved these public records against fire, fraud, unstable government, and lack of suitable storage facilities.

Families from all parts of the globe adopted Texas as their New World home so that, by the middle of the nineteenth century, Texas was the most cosmopolitan state in the Union.

It is imperative that researchers acquire knowledge of the records and the history of the state. Lloyd will enlighten us with "finding" aids (both in print and on-line) in order to extend their pedigrees into the past, beyond Texas.

This daylong seminar seeks to provide that foundation and to sharpen the skills of those who have undertaken such investigations.

MEETINGS

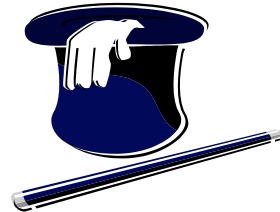

new science called "genetic genealogy" is still in the future, DNA testing by one-name groups is already revealing valuable and challenging results. Y-chromosome DNA testing is now available for \$99 for one-name groups and future reductions will make DNA testing available as a mainstream activity for one-name research groups.

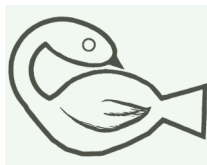

News on the Texas Legislature

The Texas Legislature ended their Regular Session in June with very poor marks as far as genealogists and open records are concerned. Behind the

issues was an elevated concern centering on privacy and identity fraud. On the firing line was access to or closure of marriage applications, birth records, funding for TexShare and DD 214-Military Discharges.

One would think that one of the legislators would have thought to check to see that Texas already has bills in effect to protect citizens from identity theft. Instead, they chose to enact new legislation when they could have strengthened existing laws.

On the positive side Senator Jane Nelson of District 12 in Grapevine gets high marks for writing her bill SB 174 with genealogists and privacy in mind. Her bill simply says that if a marriage application has a social security number on it, the number is to be deducted (blackened out) by the county clerk when someone orders a copy.

On the negative side, effective September 1, 2003, birth records will be closed to the public for 75 years rather than the current 50 years. Death records and Birth and Death Indexes are unaffected by the law. Birth and Death Indexes with no "identifying" information (mother's maiden name) remain open and Death records remain at their current closure of 25 years.

TexShare funds to the State Library were cut. (TexShare is a program sponsored by the Texas State Library in which various databases are shared by member libraries, not sure if all, around the State of Texas.) Due to the budget cuts, several database items were cut effective July 1, 2003, most notably the Texas Sanborn Insurance maps. Heritage Quest remains accessible.

Lastly, HB 545 the bill concerning DD 214-Military discharges passed and has been signed by the Governor. This bill is an example of legislators being pressed to enact a bill with little forethought of its consequences. The bill is not good for anyone including the Veterans who requested the legislature to write it. DD 214s already filed including those dating between 1968 and 2001 that contain social security numbers remain open while DD 214's filed after September 1, 2003 which have no social security numbers will be closed for 75 years. Veterans asked for and got in this bill was the ability to have the DD 214 returned to them.

The disappointing aspect of this is bill is that veterans' groups, genealogists, historians and the community lose out. Veterans are our heroes however, organizations, historians or anyone else who would like to honor them will be unable to do so if the soldier's DD 214 was filed after September 1, 2003. You can no longer research information to erect a monument or compile a list of veterans from a community for a history book, or just to find out about an individual soldier.

Veterans, themselves, often get nostalgic at periodic intervals, say, about twenty-five and again fifty years after a war. Assuming a veteran is 25-years old when he files his DD 214 he will be 100 when it is available to the public. What if he retires at age 40 or 50, he will be 115- to 125-years old when the records become public.

KINSHIP: IT'S ALL RELATIVE!

We pursue it as a hobby and search for it in the most out-of-the-way places . . . yet few of us actually know very much about kinship. For instance:

- Do you know the degree of blood relationship, or consanguinity, between yourself and your first cousins?
- Between third cousins and second cousins once removed?
- Do you know anything at all about the "removes?"
- Do you understand the difference between a great-aunt and a grand-aunt? Or between a cousin-German and a cater cousin? And what about double first cousins?

If you're a little vague about any of this, then this book is for you. In clear, practical terms it explains everything there is to know about kinship; about agnate and cognate kinship, collateral and fictive kinship, the kinship connection of orphans, foundlings, foster children, and adopted children. Everything!

The expanded second edition (2000) features new chapters on the subjects of marriage, names, and wills (kinship and the rights of inheritance); an

expanded treatment of other subjects, such as degrees of consanguinity and how to calculate blood relationships; and a new glossary, bibliography, and an index. In short, Jackie Arnold's acclaimed *Kinship: It's All Relative* is now more authoritative than ever.

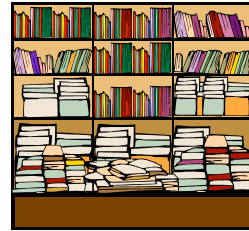

Census History and Census Locator Forms

DGS has revised its census history and census locator forms to include 1930. We've also added a 1930 census extraction form to our available forms. These forms are packaged 12 to a package that costs \$1. Shipping for up to 10 packages is \$3.75.



Lloyd's Wish List

We do, at long last, have all of the 1930 census enumeration descriptions and maps to accompany them. There is also a "finding" aid on line which, if one knows the address [such as in large cities], gives the corresponding enumeration district(s). Ancestry has the 1930 census index on their web site, but the [Dallas] library does not have access to it. HeritageQuest promises to have it in the near future so the importance of soundexes dwindles day by day.

We do have the 1930 soundex for Kentucky, West Virginia, Louisiana, and Tennessee. We lack Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Mississippi, and Alabama. These states do not figure prominently in the ancestry of many people whose ancestors have migrated westward so I am reluctant to push the acquisitions of the 1930 soundexes for them. As I walk around the microfilm readers looking at what people are viewing, I am struck by the smaller numbers who come to view census microfilm. All of it is available on-line through TexShare to any holder of a library card.

The key is to provide sources which cannot be accessed elsewhere. These examples would be ahead of the 1930 soundexes.

- State census reports are one such alternative [resource].
- County and state-wide records are another.
- Colonial land records. We have the land patents of Virginia [but not the Northern Neck land grants] and of South Carolina. We also have the plats for the latter (South Carolina). We have ordered the land patents of colonial North Carolina for the counties A-R. (The other counties remain to be microfilmed.) We also have Tennessee and have ordered a great part of Kentucky and Maryland.
- Pennsylvania and New Jersey would be next. These will supplement the access to federal records at the BLM web site.

- I am still ordering microfilm of Texas county marriage records. Next I would like to add probate records.
