Where to Look When You've Looked <u>Everywhere</u> Barbara Vines Little April 5 DGS lecturer

When she was 21, Barbara Vines Little asked about her grandfather's ancestors. She was told that nobody knew and nobody could find out. This response was like waving a red flag and inviting Barbara to charge. It started her on a lifetime of genealogy research that frequently keeps her up till 3 a.m.

On April 5, Barbara will deliver a set of lectures that share many of her secrets with those of us who think that we've "looked everywhere." She laughs when people tell her that because she says, "There's always another place to look."

Manuscript Records and Rare Books

One of her favorite treasures that many people don't know about is the cache of reels and reels of manuscript records and rare books in university libraries and other repositories.

"I can sit in the University of Virginia Library and look at records and local histories from Texas and New England," she said. Barbara discovered that these resources exist while she was looking at Lyman Draper's manuscripts, a key to research on the Revolutionary War period in Virginia. She started looking at the reels of microfilm around the Draper manuscripts at the university library. She saw records from New England, local Virginia newspapers, early county histories, family genealogies, and even films on witchcraft.

Universities collect these records for their faculty and students involved in research, and frequently they're not even listed in the card catalogs. This is why other library users don't know about them.

Now some institutions post descriptions on their websites or offer the records on pay-for-view basis. Some pay-for-view records can be seen free of charge at university libraries. For example, you can find old issues of *Harper's Weekly*, from which you might get a description of a Civil War battle in which your ancestor fought.

- learn the ease of using default templates and how to create your own in both programs.

He is a certified Microsoft Office User Specialist and currently teaches a range of computer software classes for CompUSA here in the Dallas area. Chancery Court Records

These court records may go by different names, but they are the equity or fairness courts at the county level. Neighborhood quarrels abound in these records—someone tore down someone else's fence and won't fix it. However, the cases that help genealogists the most, says Barbara, are the intestate estate settlements (death without wills).

Often, she says, genealogists can get three or four generations named in these records. If there is no will, all the children must be named in the court proceedings. It is not unusual to find 50 years' worth of descendants and heirs. She found one of her ancestors who died in the 1740s and whose will was settled in 1902. This record gave her a wealth of information in a state with no early vital records. This one was unusually rich, she says.

When and How to Hire a Professional

As a professional researcher, Barbara knows what to expect when you hire someone else to do research for you. She also knows what you can do to profit the most from this person's time.

Hiring a professional, especially in another locale, can help when you've bumped into your brick wall and you've looked at all the records available to you. Barbara will present tips on what to look for in a professional genealogist and most importantly, what information to provide to the researcher.

Taxes—Yes, You Really Should Look at Them

Tax records can help you prove identities, parentage, and ups and downs in family wealth, and they can aid in finding migration patterns. They are especially good for burned counties because they are kept at the state level.

Barbara was looking for the children of a man who died in Orange County, Virginia, in 1818, leaving no will. He owned 96 acres of land so Barbara followed the tax records on this plot, listed as his estate, for 40 years. Then the estate disappeared. She looked through the next tax records for 96-acre plots (there were only 500 names, she says), checked the grantee-grantor deeds, and found the plot sold by commissioner's suit. The deed listed the names of children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

The Lecturer Knows

Barbara Vines Little has been a professional researcher since 1982. A member of the board of directors of the National Genealogical Society, she is also editor of both the Virginia Genealogical Society's magazine and newsletter. Her own publications include *Orange Co., Virginia, Tithables, 1734-1782; Frederick Co., Virginia, Militia, 1756-1761;* and *Orange Co., Virginia, Order Book 1, 1734-9: Part 1.*

Barbara will furnish handouts and bibliographies to those who pre-register for the lecture.

Oh, yes, she did find out about her grandfather's family. It turned out that he wouldn't talk about his parents because he'd thought he was illegitimate. Barbara found out that he wasn't, and she found a career that she loves!

Wylie Words of Wisdom

When it comes to anti-virus and good computer maintenance, there are four points that people need to remember:

- Always have the anti-virus program running in the background and update at least weekly. A good virus protection software: AVG is freeware available at www.grisoft.com.
- If you have a broadband connection, usually DSL or Cable, you *also* need a firewall. Many modems and routers have this hardwired inside. If not, you can get ZoneAlarm software free at www.zonelabs.com.
- Backup all of your data files regularly and keep the copy offsite. Good software is available to remove the tedium.

 Update your operating system and office suite software regularly via the web. Recent versions can be configured to do this in the background.

And remember that which is (relatively) safe from viruses today may not be in the future, so don't believe the advice that you can't get a virus via plain text E-mail, on a Macintosh computer or using Eudora. It's simply a matter of time before some evil person finds a way to compromise these too.

2003-4 DGS ELECTION REVIEW

In the January/February 2003 DGS Newsletter, we outlined the different positions on the DGS Board and shared a little about the role that each volunteer plays in making our Society run smoothly.

This month let's learn a little about the election process as set forth in our bylaws.

From the By-laws

Section 2. Nominating Committee

A nominating committee composed of five (5) members shall be elected in January or February: two (2) from the board of directors elected at the board of directors meeting and three (3) from members-at-large elected at the following regular meeting. Only two (2) members of the nominating committee may be members of the current board of directors. At the regular meeting of the Society, the president shall request a committee member to call the first meeting and the committee shall elect its own chairman. The nominating committee shall nominate a member in good standing for each elected position on the board of directors and report its nominations at the regular meeting in April.

<u>Section 3</u>. Qualifications for Serving on the Board of Directors

Each officer and director must be a member in good standing of the Society. An officer or director may hold only one (1) position at a time; may only serve in the same position for two (2) consecutive terms; and may only serve on the board of directors for three (3) consecutive terms. A member nominated for the position of president or executive vice president for workshops may have served three (3) previous consecutive terms, allowing for a fourth (4) and final consecutive term to be served in either position. The library liaison may serve an unlimited number of terms. A member of the Society may not serve as president without having served as an elected officer or director for a least one (1) year. One who has served more than one half of a term on the board of directors shall be credited with having served that term.

Section 4. Election of Officers and Directors

The officers and directors, except the parliamentarian and the library liaison, shall be elected at the regular meeting in April by a majority vote of those present and voting. The presiding officer shall accept additional nominations from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained. The officers and directors shall be installed at the annual meeting in May, shall assume their official duties following the close of the meeting, and shall serve for a term of one (1) year or until their successors are elected.

In the January/February 2003 DGS Newsletter we printed, "Our Lady of the Pickle Jar and accounting guru, Barbara Dossett, found a surplus of funds to dedicate to the purchase of more 1930 Census Indexes." In fact, DGS used the funds to complete the soundexes of New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas for the years 1900 through 1930.

DPL now has a complete population schedule from 1790 to 1930 for all extant states and a complete soundex for Texas and the surrounding states.

Our future goal is to complete other southern states in soundexes.

We are sure these new acquisitions will help your research efforts!
