
2004 DGS SUMMER INSTITUTE

Monday, June 28 Speaker: Alvin Harper Topic: "Land Research with a Shot of Urban"

Have you ever driven by an old house or through an old neighborhood and wondered, "How long has that been there?" The answer, my friend, is not "Blowin' in the Wind." The question can be answered by searching the self-same records that we, as genealogists, use on a regular basis to establish our ancestral connections.

In this case study, the expert researcher will show how he stumbled and bumbled his way to prove a neighborhood tradition, to determine the age of a house, and to solve a question that arose in the process. Emphasis will be placed on sources in and for Dallas County.

Alvin E. Harper was born and raised in Dallas, educated by the DISD, with degrees from the Rice Institute and the University of Denver. He has 25 years experience with the frustrations of genealogy.

He is a member of the Mesquite Historical and Genealogical Society, Dallas Genealogical Society, National Genealogical Society, and Genealogical Society of Iredell County, North Carolina.

Monday, July 26 Speaker: Helen Garrison Topic: A first person narrative on Cynthia Ann Parker

We will hear the true story of Cynthia Ann Parker, who as a child was taken by the Comanche Indians and raised as one of their own. This is a moving and sensitive portrait of this Pioneer Woman's unusual life--a story that reflects her deep devotion to the Comanches who became her people. Helen, in costume, tells the thrilling story of Cynthia Ann's life in a first person narrative portrayal.

She is known as Granny G. (Helen Garrison), a woman of the mid 1800's that has many stories to share. Helen Garrison was a featured storyteller in the 1996 DFW Telloff and has received many other awards acknowledging her craft. She is a member of the Tarrant Area Guild of Storytellers, Tejas Storytelling Association, Oklahoma Territory Tellers, Texas Folklore Society, Texas Historical Society, and Wordcraft Circle of native Writers and Storytellers.

Monday, August 23 Speaker: Frances James

Topic: "Dallas County: From the Ground Up"

Frances James, known as the Cemetery Lady of Dallas, has worked at preserving the cemeteries of Dallas County since her retirement from Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in 1978. Frances has written or helped write between 50 and 75 Texas Historical Marker applications, for individuals, churches, cemeteries, and schools or other institutions.

Although the EasyShare software was originally developed for Kodak's line of Easy-Share digital cameras, most of the features work with scanners and digital cameras made by other manufactures. Research Suggestions for CCC (Civilian Conservation Corps) by Kathy Mays Smith

It was a pleasure to be with the DGS Monday evening, March 22, and share information about the CCC. Below are some suggestions which may facilitate your research of the CCC.

Most records for the military between World War I and World War II were lost, discarded, or scattered. There is no one single source of complete information on the CCC, which existed 1933 - 1942. The National Archives in College Park, Maryland has sample documents of every camp, but these may not have such items as pictures or rosters. To uncover most aspects of a CCC camp, the CCC Company number, name of the camp, and location are needed.

Below are some websites and sources that may provide information. But, again, emphasis is made that such websites may have some information about some CCC camps but not necessarily all.

This website is building an Internet museum for oral/written CCC histories, pictures, and other CCC information (including commanders of some of the camps). James Justin forwards, almost daily, inquiries about the CCC from across the United States and countries as far as Holland and Australia. If someone is looking for someone who served in the CCC or wants information about a particular CCC camp, JJ will send queries out to his list to see if anyone has any answers.

Kathy Mays Smith, Dallas resident and CCC historian, welcomes these letters and in some cases may be able to give more definitive information about a camp or contact that can be reached. They have limited volunteers to help with their extensive archives that are still being cataloged. As membership of former enrollees is dwindling, NACCCA encourages relatives of CCC enrollees or anyone interested in the CCC to join. Membership is \$20 a year and provides an excellent monthly newspaper, NACCCA Journal, with articles about the CCC - then and now. A National Reunion is held once a year. An application form is included at the end of this information. Ask NACCCA for local CCC chapters in the state which you are researching. Texas has three chapters. The local CCC chapter nearest Dallas is Chapter 123, in Fort Worth, Texas. Al Clement (Phone: 972-252-2166) is the President. They meet at 10:00 A.M., the second Saturday each month at the Northside Multipurpose Center in Fort Worth, TX.

The CCC company number is necessary before you can obtain information about a particular CCC camp from the National Archives in College Park, Maryland. The contact person is Gene Morris, 301-837-1993, E-mail: eugene.morris@nara.gov NARA has documents on every CCC camp. He can tell you what is available and the cost of those

documents. He will send you a form to order them. Of course, more can be found if an individual goes to the Archives and does the search personally. As with NACCCA, the demand for records is more than the employees can handle.

He has pictures of the extant CCC structures at White Rock Lake Park and related structures. CCC Company 2896 developed and beautified White Rock Lake from Aug. 8, 1935 - Jan. 15, 1942. This CCC company was honored with the dedication of the first official CCC Worker Statue in Texas on April 17, 2004.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department is compiling oral histories of CCC enrollees and also information on what the CCC did in different state parks. Their web page is: www.tpwd.state.tx.us.

Go to: Parks. It may take some fishing around, but they have blurbs on the state parks, pictures and snatches of CCC history (where CCC work was done).
