OKAY, A LITTLE BIT OF DGS HISTORY

The Society was first known as the "Local History and Genealogical Society". Its first meeting was held 26 October 1954 when 22 people met at the downtown Dallas YMCA to discuss having a society with goals to preserve [Dallas] heritage and records.

Our first publication was a single page printed on both sides dated 21 February 1955. In 1957, we began producing a Quarterly publication that continued until 1996 when we changed to an annual Journal. Newsletters were published sporadically up to 1996 when 10 publications a year were started.

November 1955 is an important month in the history of the Society as that was the month the first night meeting was held at the [Dallas Public] library, the first clinic was held, and a Charter was obtained for a non-profit corporation domiciled in Texas.

Over the years meetings have been held during the day, at night, and alternating between the two. Today, we hold the general meetings on the fourth Monday of the month and we have added monthly meetings for some special genealogy-related interest groups. We've had fall festivals, lecture series, and summer institutes to help educate and to raise funds for our favorite charity – the Eighth Floor of the J. Erik Jonnson Public Library.

Sometime over the years, the Local History and Genealogical Society became the Dallas Genealogical Society.

We are going to start our 50th-year Celebration at our December Awards Banquet this year, followed by a year of memories and special events, and end it at the 2005 banquet. The Awards Banquet is a member's only event and we hope you will join us! We do need a head count for this event so please contact us either by postal mail, phone, or e-mail: celebration@dallasgenealogy.org.

CALLAWAY, Lt. Col. Charles Patrick passed away July 28 after a heroic battle with cancer. He was born April 4, 1933, in Atlanta, Georgia, and is predeceased by his parents, Horace and Ann Bivens Callaway. His spirit lives on in his beloved wife, Mary Anna, of 5 1/2 years. He is also survived by his Aunt, Catherine Bivens of Atlanta; two daughters by marriage, Deanna Boudreau and Lynda Valtchanov, and three grandchildren; and adopted daughter, Susan Mendenhall. He was an accomplished pilot, rated in both fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters. He served our country for 36 years in the Army and is a Viet Nam veteran. The purpose of this competition is to encourage high school students (grades nine through 12) to research and write history about individuals and events in their local communities throughout Texas. For the past four years students from the Fort Worth Region have won the Annual Barbara Jordan Essay competition state scholarship prizes.

Ms. Hanson is on the Arlington Historical Society Advisory Board and Education Committee. She is also the Society's Junior Historian co-sponsor.

A Sister Society for DGS??

In early May, Ed Millis and I traveled to Memphis, Tenn. and Jackson, Mississippi for two outstanding art shows. Along the way we detoured to the small town of Mt. Vernon, Texas, where I had remembered an ancient five-and-dime store with wooden floors and tall tin ceilings – and a stock of nostalgic items like Blue Waltz perfume and Tangee Natural lipstick.

Alas, it no longer existed, but we were rewarded instead by finding a store-front on the town square belonging to the Franklin County Genealogical Society and buzzing with volunteer and visitors. Mt. Vernon is the county seat of Franklin County, formed in 1875 from Titus County.

When we had explained our interest in genealogy and our affiliation with DGS, we were warmly welcomed and given a tour of their facilities. Although the Society has existed for only seven years, they have already built an impressive library and are serving as the repository for historic records from both Franklin Co and its parent Titus Co. They are rapidly publishing these records and have a very respectable list of books for sale. President Christine Skelly says they have created every-name indexes for 1870 (Titus Co.), and 1880 and 1900 (Franklin Co.) censuses and have abstracted funeral home, obituary, cemetery, probated births, and school census records.

Their library contains some but not all of our recent DGS publications, so I plan to build a care package of DGS Journals and Newsletters, etc. to send to them.

They have inconsistent sets from 2001 back to 1993. If you have old DGS publications you no longer need, please let me know the dates, so I can build a complete set for their library.

Their librarian, Kirleen Hiett, said that she recently began indexing their DGS publications and enjoyed them so much that she joined our DGS Society! She also reported that while in Huntsville, Alabama doing research at the downtown library genealogy department, her husband attended a workshop on the topic "Finding your Revolutionary Ancestor." He began telling someone about the Dallas Public library genealogical section and Lloyd Bockstruck, and the presenter said something to the effect of "Oh yes, OF COURSE the Dallas Library has everything and is beyond compare."

JFK TOUR: IN THE STEPS OF LEE HARVEY OSWALD SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 2004

AMID THE SKYSCRAPERS OF DOWNTOWN DALLAS** NOVEMBER 20, 2004

DOWNTOWN DALLAS TOUR - Does downtown intimidate you? When you drive through, are you so busy watching the traffic lights, pedestrians, and one-way street signs that you don't have time to look up at the buildings?

Climb aboard a comfortable bus and let a Dallas historian be your guide as you learn about the heart of the city. Our first stop will be Dealey Plaza where the city began. Here we'll go inside the Old Red Courthouse, currently under renovation. After lunch, we will take a brief walk amid the skyscrapers, we'll explore Pioneer Cemetery, where many of the founders of Dallas are buried, and have an up-close view of the bronze cattle crossing the stream in Pioneer Plaza. Then we will board our bus and drive by the Farmers Market, Old City Park, the remains of "Theater Row," then we will explore the Arts District, the State-Thomas neighborhood, and Deep Ellum.

Historian and author Dr. Michael V. Hazel will be the tour guide.



A TEA PARTY BY ANY OTHER NAME

We're all familiar with the Boston Tea Party that took place on December 16, 1773. But did you know there was another "Tea Party?"

It was set in motion on August 22, 1774, when a mass meeting of citizens, presided over by Daniel Earle, rector of St. Paul's Church, in Edenton, North Carolina, gathered at the court house to publicly denounce the unjust imposition of taxes and openly condemn the Boston Port Act, declaring, "The cause of Boston is the cause of us all."

The "Tea Party" took place on October 25, 1774, when fifty-one ladys [sic] of the town met and resolved that, "We, the Ladys [sic] of Edenton, do hereby solemnly engage not to conform to the Pernicious Custom of Drinking Tea," and that, "We, the aforesaid ladys [sic], will not promote ye wear of any manufacturer from England until such time that all acts which tend to enslave our Native country shall be repealed."

This was absolutely incredible; they not only signed their names to a public document, but they openly participated in a political protest.

Women just didn't do those things in 1774.

At least on that cold evening in Boston, when the Sons of Liberty burst from the South Meeting House and marched towards the wharf and the three English ships loaded with tea, they were disguised as Mohawk Indians.

When the news of this act of defiance in North Carolina reached England, it caused quite a

commotion, and the event became known as the "Edenton Tea Party."

A London newspaper lampooned the event in a cartoon, depicting the women dumping the tea out of their caddies and enjoying alcoholic punch instead.

Edenton is in the northeast part of North Carolina, on the north shores of Albemarle Sound in Chowan County. The site of Edenton Tea Party is marked by a Colonial teapot mounted upon a Revolutionary cannon.

There is a list of the ladies who signed the document.

If you have ancestors from that area, you just might find their name among those brave ladies.



Wylie's Words of Wisdom

When you can't find your ancestor's name in an online search, try these tips:

- The most important tip is to erase the concept of "correct spelling" from your mind. Use every variant you can imagine.
- Reverse the name, especially if a given name is similar to a surname. Try OTOOL RILEY for Riley OTOOL. Drop non-alpha characters. Try OTOOL for O'TOOL or try VANDEVENTNER for VAN DE VENTNER.
- Substitute the first letter of a name to one easily confused in handwriting. Try SANGHAR for LANGHAR; ROBBS, NOBBS, or MOBBS for HOBBS; or BYMAN for EYMAN.
- Substitute vowels. Try JOHNSEN for JOHNSON; or FARRIS for FERRIS.
- Drop or add double consonants. Try FERIS for FERRIS; or GOSSETT for GOSET.
- Remove or add prefixes and suffixes. Try TOOL for O'TOOL; HOEN for HOENBERG; FLOWERS for FLOWER; or MCCLURE for CLURE.
- Place your ancestor's initial(s). If this forms a name, try that. Thus for Olivia SMITH try

- OSMITH; or for Celia OVERLY try COVERLY; or EAVERY for AVERY.
- If the search engine allows, try the 'contains' feature. Thus to find a PARK, try 'contains' PARK and it will also find PARKE; or try PIER for either PIERPONT or PIERPOINT. However this technique would not find the PERREPOINT spelling.
- Separate compound names. Try EVER and WOOD for EVERWOOD.
- Names with MAC and MC prefixes should be tried in all variations including without the prefix. In indexes there is no hard rule for the placement of Mc/Mac; before, following or within the letter M. Look for all three.
- If you are searching a common name, try using the NEAR tool (when available) with a location or another surname. Try "John CLARK" NEAR Voluntown or CLARK NEAR WYLIE.
- Normalize uncommon spellings. Try CARY for CEARY; DIXON for DICKSON; ELLIS for ELLS; or WILEY for WYLIE.
- Think contractions. Try Ebr or Ebenr for Ebenezer; Wm for William; Jn or Jno for John, Johnsn or JnSn for JOHNSON; and so forth.
- Think nicknames. Try Eliza or Betsy for Elizabeth; Sam or Anna for Samantha; Jack for John; Fate for Lafayette; or Polly for any number of names.
- Consider the ethnicity or the writer. A German may record HYDE as HEID or HEIDE. Perhaps a Frenchman said BENOIT which an Englishman recorded as BENWAH.
- Consider regional accents. Try HAMBELTON for HAMILTON; WARSHINGTON for WASHINTON; or GRABBERSMITS for CRABBENSCHMIDTS.

Share every variant spelling you find (but not all you try) with others researching that name.

Search engines differ, thus a wildcard that works in one may not work in another. Read the help file. A case sensitive search at one website may not work on another.

The Year 1904... Mind Boggling

This is very interesting reading. I didn't realize the last 100 years made such a difference!

Where we were a century ago? This ought to boggle your mind.

Here are some U.S. statistics for 1904

- The average life expectancy in the US was 47 years.
- Only 14% of the homes in the US had a bathtub.
- Only 8% of the homes had a telephone.
- A three-minute call from Denver to New York City cost \$11.00.
- There were only 8,000 cars in the US and only 144 miles of paved roads.
- The maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph.
- Alabama, Mississippi, Iowa, and Tennessee were each more heavily populated than California. With a mere 1.4 million residents, California was only the 21st most populous state in the Union.
- The tallest structure in the world was the Eiffel Tower.
- The average wage in the US was \$0.22/hour.
- The average US worker made between \$200-\$400/year.
- A competent accountant could expect to earn \$2,000/year, a dentist \$2,500/year, a veterinarian between \$1,500-\$4,000/year, and a mechanical engineer about \$5,000/year.
- More than 95% of all births in the US took place at home.
- 90% of all US physicians had no college education. Instead, they attended medical schools, many of which were condemned in the press and by the government as "substandard."
- Sugar cost \$0.04/pound. Eggs were \$0.14/dozen. Coffee cost \$0.15/pound.
- Most women only washed their hair once a month and used Borax or egg yolks for shampoo.
- Canada passed a law prohibiting poor people from entering the country for any reason.

- The five leading causes of death in the US were:
 - 1. Pneumonia & influenza
 - 2. Tuberculosis
 - 3. Diarrhea
 - 4. Heart disease
 - 5. Stroke

OCTOBER IS: SPANISH HERITAGE MONTH

The History of SHHAR

SHHAR (pronounced "share") is a non-profit all-volunteer organization with the specific goal of helping Hispanics (Spanish language heritage) research their family history. A need for cooperative data sharing was first recognized in 1986 by a small group in Orange County, California --Tony Campos, Raul Guerra, Mimi Lozano, and Ophelia Marquez. Networking and support among researchers was through weekly one-on-one support meetings at the Bolsa Family History Center in Westminster, California. Soon, annual quarterly meetings were offered, and special regional interest groups were organized.

The group formalized in 1987 and quickly grew to national networking status. Open, free lectures and workshops gained support from prominent historians and genealogists, such as Dr. Julian Nava, former Ambassador to Mexico and Professor Israel Cavazos Garza-Cronista (historian/archivist) for the State of Nuevo Leon, Mexico. Eventually, one of the quarterly meetings became an annual conference. Membership had expanded from local participants to networking across the nation.

With growth came the necessity for a member newsletter. In 1990, **Somos Primos** was first distributed to members, as a quarterly newsletter. The formalization from a study group to a society, the Society of Hispanic Historical and Ancestral Research (SHHAR) represents both a goal and expanding awareness. The historical complexity of

the connections among Spanish language heritage researchers has led members to a better understanding and appreciation of our individual heritage, and the relationships between Hispanic researchers all over the world.

SHHAR Journals and publications currently are entirely authored and produced by SHHAR members as a service.

Sharing is the reason for successful networking. To assist our members in networking, *Somos Primos* was greatly expanded -- study groups were encouraged and supported. However, subscribers to *Somos Primos* included an increasing number of out of state and out of the country readers.

In order to help those researchers an additional service was added. In 1995, with the assistance of Win Holtzman, a database was developed for networking purposes. Board member Laura Shane volunteered to manage the computerized matching service. This service facilitated communication with researchers from all over the nation. The support resulted in a generous exchange of data, pedigrees, and family group sheets, as distant relatives have found one another.

In January 2000, the Board made another major change in how to best serve. *Somos Primos* went online. Dues were dropped. Inclusion on the SHHAR Members On-line became entirely free. SHHAR and *Somos Primos* were in the 21st century, with major emphasis on networking through the World Wide Web. *Somos Primos On-line* is available to everyone and available for downloading and sharing freely.
