Tuesday, February 1 Speaker: Diane Bentley Topic: "Okay, I Wrote My Family Story...How will I ever get it indexed?"


Diane will take the mystery out of beginning indexing in MS WORD. Every family history writer and abstractor will love this topic.

#### Annual Reports June 2003 through December 2004

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We had a bumpy start without a VP of Education. Cindy Burgwin filled the role for a short while until she decided to return to school to work on a degree in History. She did an outstanding job of lining up our general meeting speakers from September 2003 to May 2004 and doing final touches for the Awards Banquet in December 2003. Frances Chantillis filled the role for a short period and lined up speakers for our "test" to meet all year round without a hiatus during the summer months. She arranged for the speakers through May 2005. John Wylie returned to the DGS Board as VP of Education and continued to be active in the Computer Interest Group.

In July 2003, we had a Lock-in, then the second half of the Southern Perspective Institute finishing up the two-year series. We decided to experiment with having the lecture series in places other than the library. It was a good experiment, but with the added expenses of those places and an insignificant increase in attendance, we will be returning to the Central Dallas Public Library facilities. The three 2005 Lecture series will concentrate on methodology. The 2004 Institute on Colonial Research was a huge success with 110% attendance allowed. We have thought of another really broad topic for 2005 that we hope will be similarly well received. Two more lock-ins were held during 2004, setting the pattern for what we expect will be January and July events each year.

We returned to the education arena with Beginner's Workshops at several of the branch libraries, as well as, at the Central library. Six Beginner's Internet workshops were added in the summer of 2004. They were well received and will be repeated starting in February 2005. These classes utilize an unused space in the library that has computers for each participant. The Society took researchers to Salt Lake City in October 2003 and 2004. The groups were small, but we all became family, having a really good, sharing, fun time. Everyone found something to add to their family research or at least had tales to tell.

Major Bylaws revisions were approved by the membership in March 2004. Additionally, updates were done to the membership database and other technology related arenas to make it easier for the volunteers on the Board and a few committees to do their jobs. Many of you are not aware that this society has had more members than the Texas State Society for years. We move a great deal of money in and out of our accounts as we have events, publish the newsletter and journal, as well as make donations to the genealogy collection of the Dallas Public Library. It is a small business venture that is being run by volunteers!

Over the past year and a half, we have provided funds to purchase books and microfilm and will continue to do so. The incoming board will be putting together some goals to accomplish for the year 2005 and future years.

DGS is fifty years old. We've planned some special things for 2005 in order to celebrate!

# Executive VP, Fundraising Shirley Sloat

Our fundraising events were educational, entertaining, well-attended, and profitable this year. Many thanks to all whose participation made this possible, helping DGS add more material to the collections of the genealogical section of our wonderful Dallas Public Library. This year's financial reporting of our fundraising events was made much clearer, thanks to the leadership of our former Treasurer, Jerry Fillebrown, who helped us create procedures such that we could more accurately track all the expenses and income associated with a specific activity. Also, lest we set the bar higher than it should be because of our extended Board year, our net profits from fundraising activities included two Institute events, instead of the usual one, and three Lock-ins, instead of two.

#### Lectures:

Because of many non-DGS genealogical events occurring in 2003-2004, a decision was made to

have only two lectures, both to be staged off-site at venues that could hold a large audience and spanning Dallas County. Although the two lectures were excellent, financial results were disappointing; future lectures will be held at the DPL with its seating capacity of 176.

# VP, Education and Programs

## John Wylie

Upon the resignation of Frances Chantilis, I was appointed in June 2004 by the Board to complete her term. Since this occurred at the same time that the business year was changed, her term was 18 months, 7 of which I filled.

The first new Education initiative after I took this job was introduced by the DGS President: the very successful Beginning Internet Genealogy series which she teaches in the DPL Gates Lab. This program will continue in 2005.

In November, the Board approved DGS offering discounted Family Tree DNA testing as a membership perk. Details will be announced in early 2005.

During my term, I completed digitizing the DPL meeting room requests. All requests are now prepared on the computer and tracked in an Excel database. In the fullness of time, this task may be accomplished within the DGS VPN database.

Late in 2004, we replaced our six-year-old digital projector which was fading fast, with a new state-of-the-art, more powerful one. This 2200 lumen unit will meet our needs in large auditoriums...hopefully, for the next five years.

Future plans for Educations and Programs include:

- Initiating a speaker education program, starting with a roundtable discussion in January on using PowerPoint. If that succeeds, more training will be scheduled.
- Forming a German Studies Group, probably by hosting a one-day seminar in the fall of 2005 and using those attending that as the basis for the new group.
- Initiating a DGS Imaging Project. This project would digitize private documents of DGS members so that they can be preserved, shared with friends and family and, within limits, published on the Internet.
- Replacing some of the current DGS plaques that hang in the DPL Genealogy section. They were damaged in storage and lack room to add new awardees.

VP, Membership Bill Deal

The last 18 months have brought changes to our economy and I think to our membership—in June 2003, we started with 936 members and as of December 31, 2004, we have 897 members. We know of 8 that "Are Gone, But Not Forgotten": Gene Bethel, Jeanette B. Bland, Charles Callaway, Hance Hamilton, William F. Jacoby, Jr., Helen D. O'Neal, Rex A. Pointer, and Mike Slattery.

We had 130 new or very late renewals over the last 18 months. We averaged 7 new members per month—and unbelievable growth in January and July 2004 with 16 and 17 new members, respectively.

I am now seeking submissions for the 2005 issue. I have Mel Brewer's article on his brother-in-law. This is a wonderful follow-up to the listing of World War II deaths in the last issue. I have several family Bible records and Gerri Brannan's World War I deaths, Korean War deaths, and Vietnam War deaths from Dallas Co. However, we can use more material.

I would like to continue publishing the World War I Draft Registrations, but I need some volunteers to do this.

With the change of the DGS year, we may want to consider a change in the Journal publication as well. Because the 2006 Journal editor will take office in December 2005, maybe the Journal should come out in November or December. We can discuss this with the new board.

The cost of printing 20 black and white pages on 28# stock with a saddle stitch binding has been \$0.71 per issue, per person, including courtesy delivery to our VP, Mailings, Betty Jean Steinke. We thank Ed Millis for negotiating with Texas Legal Copies, Dallas, to keep our printing costs down.

I hope that broadening our focus to include American Indian, African American, and Hispanic American articles and resources has also encouraged new researchers to join DGS and they will step up to the plate and contribute to expand these offerings in our Newsletter and Journal.

It has been a pleasure to serve with everyone on this Board and our Newsletter staff. I am pleased to pass my editorship to Happi McQuirk, who has the technical know-how, creativity, and interest in genealogy that will keep our Newsletter an education and information source.

The financial strength of the Society improved during 2004 in almost every category compared to operations for 2003.

The Total Assets for 2004 are \$109.248 compared to \$95,902 for 2003. Liquid Assets reflected in "Checking and Savings" improved from \$89,434 in 2003 to \$103,051 for 2004.

Membership Dues Income rose slightly in 2004 to \$22,470 from \$21,560 in 2003.

Net income from Fundraising is up about 50% from \$17,898 in 2003 to \$26,537 for 2004.

Donations, however, were down about \$5000 in 2004. Donations in 2004 were \$14,690 compared to \$19,552 in 2003.
