How My Research Led to the Most Beloved Christmas Poem: A Visit From St. Nicholas by Terri Bradshaw O'Neill



One Moore family of New York City...

Early in my research of the Moore family in New York City, I learned of the connection between the Moores from whom I descend, and the family to which Clement Clarke Moore belongs. Col. John Moore (1686–1749) of New York City was the son of the Hon. John Moore (1656–1732) of South Carolina and Pennsylvania. Young John Moore was sent to New York City about 1712 to be "brought up in business" by Stephen DeLancey, prominent in trade and shipping, who eventually took John Moore as a business partner. DeLancey and Moore were also active in civic affairs and were responsible for purchasing and transporting the first fire engine to the City in 1732.

John Moore was a Vestryman and Warden of Trinity Church, Colonel of a Company of Militia, and a member of His Majesty's Council. He built a large house at the foot of Manhattan, on Moore Street at Front Street, which was subsequently used as the Custom House during the Revolutionary War. He and his wife, Frances Lambert, had a large family of 18 children, including three sets of twins. Twelve of the children survived to adulthood.

One of these was Stephen Moore (1734–1799) from whom I descend. The eldest son of Thomas and Elizabeth (Channing) Moore's eleven children was John Moore (1745–1828) who became known as John Moore, Esq. and was the author of memoirs and a family history which gave us much of the knowledge we have about the Moore family. Their seventh child was Thomas Lambert Moore (1758–1799) who was called to the clergy at an early age. He studied at Kings College (now Columbia) under the direction of Rev. Benjamin Moore and eventually went to England for his ordination. It is Thomas Lambert Moore who is the connection between the two Moore families.

...and another Moore family of New York City

The Rev. Benjamin Moore was a descendant of the Rev. John Moore of Newtown, Long Island. He attended Kings College where he graduated at the head of his class in 1768, then commenced his theological studies with the Rev. Samuel Auchmuty. He went to England for his ordination, returning to New York in 1774, and became assistant minister at Trinity Church early in 1775. In May of 1775, the Loyalist president of Kings College fled the city and Benjamin Moore was made president *pro tempore*, which position he filled until 1784. During his presidency, young Thomas Lambert Moore was a student of Kings College.

In the spring of 1776, American military officials took over the buildings of the College, forcing Moore to move the remaining students to 13 Wall Street until the British occupied the city. Rev. Benjamin Moore, even though a Loyalist, most likely remained in the city attending to his duties as assistant minister of Trinity Church.

When the British occupied the city, Benjamin Moore acted as deputy chaplain for the hospital, which was in the Kings College building. When the British evacuated in 1783, the Loyalist Rector of Trinity Church, Rev. Charles Inglis, having resigned, Benjamin Moore was elected in his place but was opposed by the Whig members of the parish so he withdrew. Benjamin Moore had married Charity Clarke in 1778, and in July of 1779, their only child, Clement Clarke Moore, was born.

The Connection: Moore married Moore

During the spring of 1776 when the Americans occupied the city, the majority of the Loyalists were forced to flee. Thomas Moore and his family (including John and Thomas Lambert) took refuge at the home of Thomas' brother, Stephen Moore, at West Point. Thomas Lambert Moore, his studies having been interrupted by the War, returned to the city upon the entry of the British. On the recommendation of his brother John, Thomas Lambert secured a position as clerk in the Commissary General's Department, living with his brother John in the Custom House, the home of their grandfather, Col. John Moore.

Still pursuing his theological studies in the evenings, Thomas Lambert was given letters of recommendation by Rev. Charles Inglis in 1781 and was soon set to depart for England for his ordination. However, before his departure, he had another matter to attend to. Just before his departure for England, he married Miss Judith Moore, the sister of his old mentor, Rev. Benjamin Moore, thus becoming his brother-in-law, and the uncle of the infant Clement Clarke Moore.

Upon his return from England in 1782, Rev. Thomas L. Moore took up clerical duties primarily in Islip, Long Island. By 1785, he had answered the call to the rectorship of St. George's in Hempstead, Long Island, where he remained fourteen years until his death in 1799.

The Parallel Moore Families

Rev. Benjamin Moore eventually attained the rectorship of Trinity Church and continued as the president of Kings College which was renamed Columbia College in 1784. John Moore, Esq. of the Customs House left New York City before the evacuation of the British in 1783. He spent almost 10 years in Connecticut before returning to New York and settling in Hempstead, Long Island.

His son, Thomas William Channing Moore, was born and christened in 1794 in St. George's Church, where his brother, Rev. Thomas Lambert Moore, was minister. Rev. Benjamin Moore died in 1816.

His son, Clement Clarke Moore, wrote the famous Christmas poem about 1822. "T'was the night before Christmas, when all through the house...." John Moore, Esq. began writing his memoirs in 1820 and finished the last of three versions in 1824.

By that time, the Christmas poem had barely made a ripple, having been first published anonymously in the *Troy Sentinel* on 23 Dec. 1823. Consequently, John Moore's memoirs mention the connection between the two families only in the context of his brother's marriage to Judith Moore. John Moore, Esq. died five years later in 1828.

The Research Payoff

The discovery of John Moore's memoirs occurred on my first trip to the New-York Historical Society's Library and manuscript collections in 1984. Subsequent research forays into the vast manuscript holdings of the N-YHS revealed more layers of Moore family information until 1997, when I began looking for information about John Moore's son, Thomas William Channing Moore. I knew he had been a member of N-YHS, and had donated his father's papers to the Society, so when I looked in the card catalogue for T. W. C. Moore, this delightful letter was listed:

73 East 12th St.

New York March 15th 1862

Geo. H. Moore, Esq.

Librarian of the New York Historical Society:

Dear Sir:

I have the pleasure to inform you that Doctor **Clement C. Moore** has been so kind as to comply with my request (made at your suggestion) to furnish for the Archives of our Society, an Autograph copy of his justly celebrated "Visit from St. Nicholas." I now enclose it to you.

I hardly need call your attention to the distinctness and clarity of his hand writing; very remarkable, considering his advanced age; (he completed his 82nd year in July last) and his much impaired eye sight.

These lines were composed for his two Daughters as a Christmas present, about 40 years ago. They were copied by a relative of Dr. Moore's in her album, from which a copy was made by a friend of hers, from Troy, and much to the surprise of the Author, were published (for the first time) in a Newspaper of that city.

¹ The New-York Historical Society, in granting permission to quote from the letter, cited the letter as, "BV Moore, Clement Clarke." However, my notes suggest that it came from the T.W.C. Moore papers, though I am unsure of the precise citation

In an interview that I had yesterday with Dr. Moore, he told me that a portly, rubicund Dutchman, living in the neighbourhood of his father's country seat, Chelsea, suggested to him the idea of making St. Nicholas the hero of this "Christmas piece" for his children.

T.W.C. Moore

Eighty-one years after the union of the two Moore families by the marriage of Thomas Lambert Moore and Judith Moore, and 40 years after the famous poem was written, the New-York Historical Society was presented with an autographed copy of *A Visit from St. Nicholas* by the author, at the request of his "cousin by marriage." Though there was no blood relationship, Thomas William Channing Moore and Clement Clarke Moore were connected by virtue of the fact that T.W.C. Moore's uncle married Clement C. Moore's aunt. Still a third Moore emerges in this story: George H. Moore, Esq., Librarian of the New-York Historical Society, who suggested to T.W.C. Moore that he request the copy of the poem from Clement Moore. George Moore was no relation to either T.W.C. Moore or Clement Clarke Moore.

The "portly, rubicund Dutchman" who served as a model for St. Nicholas in Clement Moore's poem piqued my interest enough to try to identify this man. An article by Guy Trebay appeared in the *New York Times* 11 Dec 2001, in which he speculated that the image of Santa Claus that we are familiar with today "most likely originated with Jan Duyckinck, a handyman employed by Clement Clarke Moore."

A bit of research in the New York censuses of 1810 and 1820 failed to reveal a Jan or J. Duyckinck in the area of Chelsea, which was in the 9th Ward. There was a Christopher Duyckinck and an Evert Duyckinck listed in the 2nd Ward. In the 1830 census, a J. R. Duyckinck was listed in the 10th Ward. It is possible, but not likely, he is the model for St. Nicholas. The New York City Directories for 1821 and 1830 list, respectively, J. R. Duyckinck, accountant, and James R. Duyckinck, scrivener and conveyancer; not a likely candidate for the handyman on his father's estate. The identity of the man who served as the model for Dr. Moore's St. Nicholas remains a mystery.

In the last decade, there was some speculation and circumstantial evidence suggesting that Clement Clarke Moore was *not* the author of *A Visit From St. Nicholas*, based on his other writings and his reportedly stern and serious demeanor. It is true that the original manuscript draft has never been found, and probably does not exist. However, I can state unequivocally that in 1862, when T.W.C. Moore made his request for the copy of the poem from Clement Moore, he firmly believed that he was making the request of the true author.

A PICTURE IS WORTH A THOUSAND.... by Shirley Stertz Hawn

As 'Voyager I' continues its interstellar mission at the outer edge of our solar system, traveling approximately 365 million miles a year, snapping pictures and recording history, it's easy to forget how important early artists were to our quest for pictorial knowledge of yesteryear.

Seeing pictures from around the world taken from spacecrafts reaching out to the solar system's frontier makes us forget just how young photography is. The word *photography* was first used in 1839 when the photographic process was made public.

Although his earliest attempt in 1841 ended in failure, John Fremont was the first explorer in America to attempt photographic documentation of his travels.

Many improvements were made by 1861 when Mathew Brady and his staff covered the American Civil War. They exposed over 7,000 negatives, leaving a pictorial history that gives us a sense of what our ancestor's world was like.

In 1904, Edward S. Curtis (1868-1952) began a massive project to document Native Americans. The undertaking took many years and resulted in a 20 volume set, *The North American Indian*. Each volume consists of a book of text with small prints made from incised plates and a portfolio of larger prints.

Since our ancestors were their contemporaries, these pictures and stories can be an important background to our family stories, and invaluable to those with American Indian ancestry.

Before the development of technology that allowed photographers to travel with their equipment, we have to look to artists for a picture of the life of our early ancestors. Many traveled extensively, sketching and writing of their travels.

The Dallas Public Library has two books by Robert Knox Sneden with fascinating watercolor reproductions from the Civil War. Sneden was born in Nova Scotia in 1832 and moved to New York City with his family when he was eighteen.

He joined the Union army in 1861 and became a mapmaker. He saw many campaigns first hand and not only made maps but also sketched battles with houses in the background, often giving names of the owners of the property.

He was captured in November 1863, and held in several prisons including Andersonville. While a prisoner, he continued to document his experiences. Fearing his sketches and notes would be taken by prison guards, he sewed them in his coat, and hid them in his shoes.

Robert Sneden survived the ordeal of prison, and devoted his life to converting his sketches to watercolor and writing his memories of the war.

Both books, Eye Of The Storm and Images From The Storm, have beautiful reproductions of villages, plantations, battlefields, churches, mills, prison camps, and hospitals. Each picture is identified by location, battle, or landowner, giving us an amazing pictorial window into the past.

There are many illustrated books that can help identify the lives of our early ancestors. Let's not forget to use this valuable resource when we write our family history.

New Balch Springs History/Genealogy Collection Opens by Marilyn Kosanke

Even if you don't have early Dallas County ancestors, you have probably heard of John Neely Bryan, Bird's Fort, Cochran Chapel, and many other well-known icons of local history. But have you heard of William H. Bennett, Watts Marks, or Haught's Store? Probably not, because the history of Southeast Dallas County has received minimal attention by local historians. That oversight has been corrected. On November 16 the Balch Springs Chamber of Commerce opened the Balch Springs Local History/Genealogy Collection in the new Balch Springs Library-Learning Center. The mission of the collection is to collect, preserve, and make available for research, information on the Balch Springs area not available in other collections. The collection features the following:

- Local History Files Vertical files contain 200 folders containing information from the 1841 to the present time. Subjects range from Agriculture to Zipp City. The focus is on the unincorporated area of Dallas County that became Balch Springs, as well as nearby communities such as Haught's Store, Scyene, Rylie, Pleasant Mound, Pleasant Grove, etc.
- Genealogy Files There are 71 folders on surnames related to the Balch Springs area.
- Obituary Notices Currently 238 obituaries from 1888 to the present are in the collection. The notices are about individuals who were born, died, lived, or worked in Balch Springs.
- Newspapers From 1965 to 1999, a progression of different publications served Balch Springs. The surviving issues are in the collection and are invaluable for local history research. These newspapers have not been microfilmed, and no other collection is known to have copies. Among the ten newspapers in the collection are the Southeast Sentinel, Balch Springs News, and The Suburban Tribune.
- ❖ Reference Books Dallas County, Texas history, and genealogy books are on open shelving for easy access by researchers.
- Exhibit The history of Balch Springs from 1841, the beginning of the Peter's Colony, to 1953, the year the city was incorporated, is presented in a glass display case. The exhibit contains photographs and small artifacts.

The Balch Springs Library-Learning Center is at 12450 Elam Road in Balch Springs. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 10:00 a.m.—9:00 p.m.; Saturday, 10:00 a.m.— 3:00 p.m.; closed Sunday. Phone: 972-913-3000.

LDS Online Additions and Changes

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (a.k.a. LDS Church or Mormon Church) is making substantial progress toward providing free online access to the world's largest collection of genealogical data. Starting in 2007, genealogical researchers can use the Internet to access, almost instantly, the first selected portions of indexed and digitized images of the vast LDS collection of genealogical data heretofore available only on about 2.4 million rolls of microfilm with limited indexing.

Even more, within some constraints, online users will be able to attach commentary (hopefully including source references) to records which appear to contain errors.

"The LDS Church is currently working with thousands of volunteers worldwide to help index the digitized records—many of them through state and local

genealogical societies. Public access to selected records that have been both digitized and indexed is anticipated 'fairly soon—definitely by next year,' according to Steve W. Anderson, online marketing manager for the LDS Family History Department."

Long Creek Cemetery Designated as a "Texas Historical Cemetery" and Receives its "Historical Marker"

You may laugh but I could swear I heard that "great cloud of witnesses" cheer today! Today (Saturday, November 18, 2006, beginning at 1:00pm.) was the day so many had dreamed of yet few from the old days will be here to see.

It was with great celebration that we came together once more to honor the memory of our cemetery's founders, A.W. Webb and William H. Caldwell, the ladies who gave of their time to care for the burial places of our ancestors and to all those families of yesterday who settled the land at Long Creek, Tripp, New Hope, Locust Grove and other communities who now make Long Creek Cemetery their final resting place.

Families and friends joined together as we celebrated the Texas Historical Commission's designation of Long Creek Cemetery, Sunnyvale, Dallas County, Texas as a Texas Historical Cemetery and the dedication of our Historical Marker at Long Creek Cemetery.

The Historical Marker reads:

"Capt. A. Webb, veteran of the Black Hawk War in Illinois, established a homestead near here as part of the Mercer Colony in the mid-19th century. He was joined later by father-in-law and War of 1812 veteran Benjamin Crownover and his family. In 1855, Crownover's daughter Leona Caldwell was the first laid to rest in this field beneath a pecan tree. Capt. Webb later deeded a tract of land to area residents as the site of a school, church and public burial ground. His donation, and that of W. H. Caldwell, formed the center of Long Creek community.

"The Long Creek Cemetery is a link to generations of area families. Burials include many military veterans, ministers, teachers and members of the Masons, Eastern Star and Woodmen of the World organizations. Stones and landscaping at the cemetery represent a broad spectrum of funeral practices from the 19th century to the present, and today, an association formed in 1910 maintains the burial ground."
