Judy Russell, *The Legal Genealogist*, is Featured Speaker at DGS Fall Lecture September 27, 2014

This year's Dallas Genealogical Society (DGS) Fall Lecture, on September 27, 2014, focuses on *Genealogy and the Law: From the Past to the Future*.

During this one-day seminar at the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library in Dallas, featured speaker Judy Russell will cover the following topics:

- From Blackstone to the Statutes at Large—How Knowing the Law Makes Us Better Genealogists
- "Don't Forget the Ladies" A Genealogist's Guide to Women and the Law
- Through the Golden Door: Immigration After the Civil War
- The Ethical Genealogist

Judy is a genealogist with a law degree. One of her goals is to help researchers understand the often arcane and even impenetrable legal concepts and terminology that are important to those studying family history. Her blog, *The Legal Genealogist*, is an excellent source to find answers to the questions we have about many of the legal situations genealogists encounter.

Judy has a varied background with a bachelor's degree in journalism from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. and a law degree from Rutgers School of Law-Newark. She holds Certified GenealogistSM and Certified Genealogical LecturerSM credentials from the Board for Certification of Genealogists® where she currently serves as a member of the Board of Trustees. She is member of the National Genealogical Society, the Association of Professional Genealogists, and, among others, the state genealogical societies of New Jersey, North Carolina, Virginia, Texas, and Illinois

She has worked as a newspaper reporter, trade association writer, legal investigator, defense attorney, federal prosecutor, law editor and, for more than 20 years, she has been an adjunct member of the faculty at Rutgers Law School.

She is on faculty of the Institute of Genealogy & Historical Research (IGHR) at Samford University, the Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy (SLIG), the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh (GRIP), and Boston University's Center for Professional Education.

She has written several articles for both the *National Genealogical Society Quarterly*, and the *National Genealogical Society Magazine*.


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President's Column
