DGS Recognizes 2014 Award Recipients

Members and guests of the Dallas Genealogical Society met on Saturday, December 13, 2014, for their Annual DGS Awards Luncheon. Each year DGS recognizes individuals and organizations for their hard work and dedication to the genealogical community that contributes not only to a successful 2014 for the Society but also to the genealogy community as a whole. Award categories and 2014 recipients are:

AWARD OF MERIT – LYNELL BENNETT MOSS AND FRED MOSS

This DGS Award of merit is presented annually to a DGS member who has consistently contributed time, talent, expertise, and abilities to the Society over a period of years.

Honorees: Lynell Bennett Moss and Fred Moss have been frequent contributors to the genealogical community in a variety of ways. Lynell is the prime organizer and Director of

The Great Family Search Conference that is presented free of charge annually to our local genealogical community. She is a member of the Texas State Genealogical Society and the National Genealogical Society. Lynell and Fred have made many contributions to the Dallas Genealogical Society, such as an annual presentation to a DGS General Meeting which updates members on the FamilySearch web site and search software. In addition, Lynell has extracted information from the 1850, 1860, and 1870 Dallas County Mortality Schedules for the Mortality Schedule database on the DGS web site. Fred serves as the Legal

Advisor to the Federation of Genealogical Societies, an active participant on the Records Preservation and Access Committee, and an advocate of the Genealogists' Declaration of Rights.

HERITAGE PRESERVATION AWARD – DALLAS MEXICAN AMERICAN HISTORICAL LEAGUE (DMAHL)

The DGS Preservation Award recognizes an individual, group, or organization that has contributed to the collection, preservation, and conservation of varying types of genealogical and historical materials.

LLOYD BOCKSTRUCK DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD – ROBERT SCOTT DAVIS

The Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck Distinguished Service Award honors an individual for outstanding contributions to the genealogical community on a national level.

Honoree: Robert ("Bob") Scott Davis is a professor, a

prolific author, a speaker, and an advocate of continuing education, local history, and archive initiatives. He is Senior Professor of History at Wallace State College, Hanceville, Alabama. Bob has more than 1,000 publications to his name about history, genealogy, records, and research. His articles have appeared in many national and DeWitt Bockstruck Distinguished state-level genealogical and historical journals. He and coauthor Ted Brooke received

the 2013 NGS Award for Excellence in the category of Genealogical Methods and Sources for their publication, Georgia Research: A Handbook for Genealogists, Historians, Archivists, Lawyers, Librarians, and Other Researchers.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARD -CAROLYN DAVIS

The DGS Volunteer of the Year award acknowledges a member who has generously volunteered time, expertise, talents, and abilities to the Society during the previous year.

Honoree: Carolyn Davis currently serves as the Publicity/

Public Relations Director for DGS. She has previously served as Secretary. During 2014, Carolyn made presentations to the Technology SIG and MacGen Reunion SIG. She has worked on the committee to develop a beginning genealogy seminar and has presented programs at the Dallas Public Library. Carolyn was responsible for the messaging and content of the DGS exhibit at the FGS meeting in San Antonio, which she staffed during the event. Carolyn is an example of what makes an organization like DGS work effectively; she is a dedicated volunteer.

PRESIDENT'S SPECIAL AWARD - GAYLA BUSH

The President's Special Award honors an individual or group whose contributions to the Society fall outside the criteria for other DGS Awards.

Honoree: In 2010, the City of Dallas announced a series of budget cuts that affected the Dallas Public Library. Staffing

for the genealogy section was cut and hours for the library were reduced – both of which greatly impacted access to the collection.

Following these changes, there were several individuals who managed both the 7th and 8th floor history and genealogical collections. In February 2013, DPL announced Gayla Bush as the new manager for these collections.

Gayla has handled the reduced hours and staffing, renovations, and other changes with professionalism, patience and grace. Working with Gayla has been a true partnership of sharing information about how we can work together to serve the genealogical community.

She secured an alternative location when an unexpected library closure occurred on the morning of the DGS Spring 2014 Lecture; we began only 15 minutes late. She was instrumental in facilitating Extended Hours for registrants of the DGS Summer Symposium who wanted to research "after hours," and she has worked with the City to gain approval for DGS to install a book scanner in the library in 2015.

This is the type of cooperative effort and willingness to think "outside the box" that makes Gayla Bush the recipient of the DGS 2014 President's Award.

TSGS 2014 AWARDS: CATEGORY VI OFFICIAL PERIODICALS OF PARTNER SOCIETIES

Each year the Texas State Genealogical Society presents awards to Partner Societies in a variety of publishing categories. Judging criteria includes binding, design, organization, content, interest, editing and index.

Honoree: Pegasus: Journal of the Dallas Genealogical Society is the winner of the 2014 first place award in Category VI, Official Periodicals of Partner Societies.

Open to Partner Societies only, the requirements are that the Journals must be published at least once each year, but could be more than once. DGS submitted copies of all issues published in 2014 (Research and Records issues). These copies will be archived as part of TSGS's archival collection at the Stephen F. Austin Library.



The chair of the awards committee said that Pegasus was clearly at the top from the time they received it. One of the TSGS directors indicated that if there had been a "Grand Prize" for this category, *Pegasus* would have received that because of the quality and content. *Pegasus* sets a new standard for society publications; any group considering starting or improving their publication should be sure to look at it.

WINNERS: 2014 DGS WRITING CONTEST

The Dallas Genealogical Society announces the first place winners of the 2014 Writing Contest, the husband and wife team of Deborah Harvey and Gary Wood, for their article *As the Angus Roam*.

She has attended genealogical conferences and events including Samford University's Institute for Genealogical and Historical Research, Fairfax County Genealogical Society, and National Genealogical Society conferences. Ms. Harvey is completing her portfolio for submission and review by the

Gary Wood is a native of the Lowesville area on the Amherst and Nelson County lines in Virginia. An engineer

by training and an administrator in real life, he has been involved with genealogical research as a hobby since 1984. DGS 2015 Spring Lecture to be Held Saturday, March 21, 2015 Topic: Genetic Genealogy Analysis and Tools; a step beyond the beginner level

The Dallas Genealogical Society invites you to join us for a one-day lecture featuring Debbie Parker Wayne, a noted professional genealogist who is experienced in using DNA analysis for genealogical research.



The DGS 2015 Spring Lecture will be held at the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, 1515 Young Street, Dallas, Texas. Registration opens at 9:30 a.m. and the lecture begins at 10:00 a.m.

Debbie will begin with a brief review of genetic genealogy basics and advice about choosing a DNA testing company. The remaining sessions will provide in-depth

information about tools and applications for mitochondrial DNA, Y-DNA, and autosomal DNA studies. Each session will include a real-life case study which uses the latest tools and techniques to analyze these DNA types.

TOPICS

Debbie's topics will include the following:

Genetic Genealogy Today: Review and Updates— A brief review of genetic genealogy basics such as the inheritance of each type of DNA used for genealogy. This includes an introduction to some of the tools to be illustrated in later sessions.

Genetic Genealogy Company Comparisons—Information on how to choose a DNA testing company, the pros and cons of each company's offerings, and the tests available today.

Tools and Applications for mtDNA—Illustration of a reallife case study using the latest tools and techniques to analyze mitochondrial DNA (passed along the matrilineal line).

Tools and Applications for Y-DNA—Illustration of a reallife case study using the latest tools and techniques to analyze Y-DNA (passed along the patrilineal line).

Tools and Applications for atDNA—Illustration of a reallife case study using the latest tools and techniques to analyze autosomal DNA (inherited through all ancestral lines).

ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Debbie Parker Wayne, CGsm, CGLsm, is a full-time, professional genealogist experienced using DNA analysis, as well as more traditional techniques, for genealogical research. Her DNA research focuses on client projects and on research into her own family projects that include YDNA, mtDNA, XDNA, and autosomal DNA studies. Her traditional research focuses on Texas, the Southwest, and the Southern U.S. She has performed research for genealogical television series such as the Canadian series *Ancestors in the Attic*, the PBS series *Finding Your Roots* with Henry Louis Gates, Jr., and The Learning Channel's *Who Do You Think You Are?*

Debbie is a Trustee for the BCG Education Fund, the Texas State Genealogical Society's DNA Project Chair, a former board member of the Association of Professional Genealogists (APG), and former president of the Lone Star Chapter of APG. Debbie has presented at the National Genealogical Society and Federation of Genealogical Societies conferences, International Genetic Genealogy Conference, Family Tree DNA Project Administrator's Conference, Southern California Jamboree DNA Day, several genealogy institutes, and many genealogical societies in Texas and other states.

Her publications include a column on using DNA analysis for genealogical research in *NGS Magazine*, a column on genetic genealogy in the *Association of Professional Genealogy Quarterly*, and award-winning articles in writing competitions held by the Dallas Genealogical Society and the International Society of Family History Writers and Editors.

2015 DGS Writing Contest Opens January 1; closes April 30

Question: How do you eat an elephant? Answer: One bite at a time.

The same might be true of how you write a family history – one story at a time, until you have a collection that can be passed down for generations. Even if you have only one story you want to write, that is a worthy accomplishment.

In 2013, former DGS President Janet Khashab gave a lecture (*Genealogical Writing: Fact and/or/not Fiction?*) that offered excellent suggestions on how to write a story that is both accurate and entertaining. She included 11 books related to writing family stories. These books have been purchased by DGS for the Dallas Public Library's collection in the 8th floor.

Winners of the DGS 2014 Writing Contest will receive a monetary reward. The contest is open to both members and non-members of DGS, either amateurs or professionals. Only original material *not previously published elsewhere in any format* is eligible. Entries will be accepted January 1 through April 30, 2015. Winners will be announced in July 2015.

While DGS has a goal of preserving Dallas history, subject matter for the competition may range beyond the local geographic area. Articles may include:

- advanced methodologies and case studies (not limited by geography)
- family histories and genealogies, particularly those linked to North Texas, including those who came from or left to settle elsewhere
- transcriptions, abstracts or indexes of record groups (including family records) not yet filmed or digitized that relate to Dallas or North Texas
- ethnic, house, or military histories related to Dallas and surrounding counties.

Entries will be judged on accuracy, clarity of writing, and overall impact and interest. First prize is \$500; second prize is \$300 and third prize is \$100. Complete Rules and Guidelines are available at:


