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SPEAKER FOR THE TENTH ANNUAL GENEALOGICAL INSTITUTE AND WORKSHOP BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF COLONEL CARLETON EDWARD FISHER, PRESIDENT, NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, WASHINGTON, D.C.

Colonel Carleton E. Fisher, B.S., President of the National Genealogical Society, is currently on duty with the Defense Atomic Support Agency. A native of Maine, he attended the University of Connecticut, Boston University, and the University of Maryland, where he received a B.S. Degree. He is a graduate of the Army Command and General Staff College and the Army War College.

Colonel Fisher entered military service with the 103d Infantry Regiment, Maine National Guard. He served in many units including the 115th Infantry Regiment, 29th Infantry Division, where he was battalion commander and executive officer during World War II in Germany. He commanded the 38th U.S. Infantry Regiment in Germany during 1959 and 1960. From 1953 to 1956 he served on the Army General Staff in the Pentagon.

In addition to being awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action against the enemy, he has received the Bronze Star Medal, with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Purple Heart. He was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in Germany in February 1945. He fought in the Northern France, Rhineland and Central Europe Campaigns in World War II.

In addition to his association with the National Genealogical Society, he is a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Maine Historical Society, New Hampshire Historical Society, and the Columbia Historical Society, (Washington,D.C.)

He is married to the former Phyllis White, of Ohio and has one daughter, Lucille, a senior in high achool. The family resides in Falls Church, Virginia. Colonel Fisher plans to retire from the Army later this year and return to Maine and work as a genealogist.

The 128th Anniversary of the Fall of the Alamo, March 6, 1836.

After writing the following letter of desperate appeal for help, on February 24, 1836, exactly 11 days before the Fall of the Alamo, which depicts the heroic and

The Herces of the Alamo (Continued) indomitable courage that for a standard to all Texans, Colonel William Barret Travis, Commander of the Alamo, bravely, quietly, and prayerfully, prepared to defend The Alamo - to the death.

> "Commander of the Alamo Bejar, Feby, 24th 1836-

> > -

To the People of Texas & all Americans in the world-Fellow citizens & compatriots-

I am beseiged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna - I have sustained continual Bombardment & Cannonade for 24 hours & have not lost a man-The enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion, otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken-1 SHALL NEVER SURRENDER ONE RETERAT. THEN, I call on you in the name of Liberty, of patriotism & everything dear to American character, to come to our aid, with all despatch-The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily & will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible & die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own homor & that of his Country-VICTORY or DEATH.

William Barret Travis Lt. Col. Comdt.

P.S. The Lord is on our side-When the enemy appeared in sight we had not three bushels of corn-We have since found in deserted houses 80 or 90 bushels and got into the walls 20 or 30 head of Beeves.

On March 6, 1836, The Alamo fell under the attack of the 4,000 to 5,000 Mexicans, who advanced their attack on the Alamo to the music of the "Deguello" which meant they would give no quarter to the Heroes of The Alamo, who died fighting heroically.

The only survivors were Mrs. Almeron Dickerson, and her baby daughter: a few children, slaves, and Mexicans; who were able to give accounts of the seige and fall.

THE BUNTON FAMILY

Based on Material on Bunton Family given by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Patterson Bunton 925 North Link Street, Palestine, Texas Submitted by Mrs. Walter March Burress, Tyler Texas

The Bunton (Buntine-Bunting-Buntin-Buntyn-Bunton etc) family was well establish-

ed in Virginia prior to 1700, with later generations moving to the South and Westward.

This family appears to have been well-to-do from early times and of the homes built by the early settlers to Texas several nice two story residents are still standing, including the home of John Wheeler Bunton, the signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

In 1832 four members of the Bunton family came to Texas from Summer County. Tennessee. They were:

1. John Wheeler Bunton, 6 ft. 4 inches tall

2. Robert Bunton, ancestor of President Lyndon Baines Johnson

3. Lucius Bunton

4. Desha Bunton, 7 feet high

All were over 6 ft. and known as "The Four Giants"

Desha Bunton's home was located where the Insane Asylum main building is now located in Austin, Texas. It was said that he could call a man down on the capitol grounds and be heard distinctly. (Did not need a telephone).

In 1853 James Madison Bunton, a younger brother, and the mother of the above listed men, came to Texas. She was Mrs. Phoebe (Desha) Bunton. Mrs. Bunton was a relative of Governor Desha of Kentucky. Another relative, Miss Mary Desha, of Washington, D. C., helped organize the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution in 1891. (1891)

John Wheeler Bunton (named for a Revolutionary War Ancestor --- Miss Brewye went into DAR on John Wheeler's Rev. War Record --- in 1901, she also joined DRT in 1901) was a college graduate and Lawyer and after remaining in Texas five years he returned home and married in 1837, Miss Howell. A younger relative, Miss Varina Howell (1828-1907) married as his second wife, Jefferson Davis --- their home is one of the historic houses in Natchez, Mississippi. Jefferson Davis' first wife was the daughter of Gen. Zachary Taylor and they met while Jefferson Davis was under command of Gen. Taylor at Fort Jessup, La. She died within 3 months after their marriage, and Davis remained a widow for 10 yrs. Marrying Miss Howell in 1845. Both Mrs. Bunton and Mrs. Davis were related to Governor Howell of New Jersey (Governor Richard Howell).

3. Elizabeth Howell Bunton, m. Dr. W. A. Oatman 6. William Howell Bunton The last grandchild of the signer of Texas Declaration of Independence, John

Wheeler Bunton, died January 1, 1964. He was Robert Bunton of Hays County, Texas, lived out from San Marcus, Texas.

John Wheeler Bunton and wife are buried in the State Cemetery. Their remains were moved there in 1930's from the Robinson Graveyard in Hayes County, near Buda, Texas.

THE GAINES FAMILY

By Mrs. Walter March Burress, Tyler, Texas

James Gaines, signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence, was born in Virginia in 1776. He was related to the Strothers and Pendletons of Virginia.

James Gaines married Susannah Norris, daughter of Raymond Norris who moved to Texas from Boeuf Bayou near Alexandria, La. soon after 1800. The Norris family came from Maryland to Louisiana, and is a part of the noted Norris Family of Maryland. Many Marylanders came to Louisiana prior to 1800 and immediately after 1803 when the Louisiana Purchase had been consumated.

James Gaines and Gen. Edmund Pendleton Gaines were brothers.

James Gaines bought the Ferry on the Sabine River about 1812 and sold it to his cousin, a Mr. Strother in 1844.

J James Gaines built his large two story log house at the Sabine River Crossing (Gaines' Ferry) prior to 1820. This house is still standing and in good conditionhas been cut down to a one story house.

The First Census of Texas--1829-1836, compiled by Marion Day Mullins and published in Washington, D.C. in 1962, states that James Gaines had five children (see page 32) (it is not certain exact date this census was taken).

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"Sir:-

"After making due inquiry and examination of the site for cantoning the troops in quarters, which promises the advantages of health, combined with the conveniences of position, for the protection of the settlements upon the frontier. The site selected is about 25 miles south, south-west, from this place, upon a ridge of Red River, and near the road leading to the principal settlements in Texas; and not more than 18 miles from the Sabine River. Having a constant spring of running water (a thing but seldom found in this country) with a dry and airy ridge and sufficient space for public land, with excellent timber for every purpose of building, and fuel for an army of twenty thousand men. I have the honor to be with respect and esteen.

THE GAINES HOUSE AND GAINES FERRY By Mrs. Harry Joseph Morris, Vice President-Editor

Near San Augustine, Texas, on the Sabine River's edge, on El Camino Real where it crosses into Nachitoches, Louisiana, stands the "Gaines House, 1812", shaded by an old, twisted, Mulberry Tree.

James Gaines, had come from Virginia as a soldier, to this spot in 1805, and build his log cabin, now known as the "Gaines House, 1812", in 1812. The men coming into Texas to help fight the Texas Revolution, and especially in the three, hard fought, battles, including the Fall of The Alamon, around San Antonio, crossed the Ferry which he operated, and stopped at the "Gaines House, 1812." Among those who passed that way were: William Barret Travis, Davy Crockett, Sam Houston, and General Pendleton Gaines passed his brothers' house, enroute to Nacogdoches, to put down the Cherokee uprising in East Foxas. It was the point of entry into Texas, and a crossing for centuries, before James Gaines built his log house, and operated Gaines Ferry.

The house is solid, roomy, and is now one story. Although siding has been placed in some places, the original dovetailed log walls still stand.

For 152 years, the old "Gaines House, 1812", has "stood by the side of the road, and been a friend to man."

"HISTORY OF THE GAINES FAMILY", BY L. P. GAINES, Published 1918 A REVIEW By Mrs. Harry Joseph Morris, Vice President-Editor

"History of The Gaines Family", by L. P. Gaines, Adairsville, Georgia, Published by T. H. Lang, Calhoun, Georgia, 1918, a rare book, which is the property of Mr. Mark Howard Gaines, of Palestine, Texas, and which is now in the possession of his granddaughter, Mrs. Patsy Gaines Paschall, 1730 Sandy Lane, Mesquite, Texas, traces the Gaines Genealogy, "One Line from 1620 to the present time, 1918, also Gaines Heroes of the American Revolution, and Short Sketch of the Michael Clore Family", and begins with the following "Apologetic" on the frontispage.

"Apologetic"

"Pride of ancestry and a desire to perpetuate their memory prompt me to publish what I know and have heard of my parentage. Also my father, Reuben Gaines, often spoke of having the Gaines genealogy put in permanent shape and perpetuated by being recorded in some court of record, or put in book form. Our State makes no provision for such record and I can only print such as I may be able to get together. I regret not having attended to this during my father's lifetime, when I could have been aided so much more by his presence and counsel. I now have to rely on memory of what he told me. It is so common a fault that we do not fully appreciate a friend, or parent ever, 'till he is gone.

I write this genealogy partly from tradition and partly from recorded facts, partly from hearsay evidence, and partly to my own knowledge.

There may be some mistakes-it would be marvelous if there were not. If there should be any material errors, I ask the forbearance of friends and critics and that they continue the search for the truth and straighten out such mistakes. I wish to thank everyone who aided me in this cause and contributed to its success-or failure (?)"

Truly this is a common complaint of all who procrastinate in writing their family histories or genealogies, and it has been well worded.

This book contains 88 pages, and contains 9 generations of Gaines, all descended from Richard and Roger Gaines, two brothers who came from Wales, to Virginia, the Colony of Jamestown, Virginia, about 1620. They married two sisters, members of the Rawlins family of Virginia. "History of the Gaines Family" - Cont'd

Line of descent as given, is clearly and well given, and rewards the researcher, through the 9 generations, through James M. Cafnes, born March 15, 1841, near Adairsville, Georgis, and died December 19, 1916. He gave 7 acres of land to the Pisgah Baptist Church, at Brushy Creek, Anderson County, Texas, to be reserved for a Church and Cemetery. He married Paulina Gray, November 1867 in Anderson County, Texas. "Most of the descendants of James Gaines live in Navarro County, Texas, and a portion of them live in Smith County."

Of particular interest is the Chapter on "Disconnected Links", which contains "Random Remarks Concerning Various Persons Belonging to The Caines Family." On page 73, relative to "Levis Pendleton Gaines, born November 24, 1849 - "His home is in the grove where General Johnston had his headquarters - in the Civil War. The house is a large brick structure erected by Charles Hamilton, a Mexican soldier who was at one time a prisoner in the Castle of General Santa Anna. He was so charmed with the architecture of the prison that on his return, he built his home exactly on the plan of this romantic old Mexican building."

Considerable space has been devoted to the Homorable John W. Gaines, "ex-member of Congress, of Nashville, Tennessee", and to his son, John N. Gaines, Jr., who was to "have in charge the building of a suitable monument of the 23 Gaines herces of the American Revolution, to be erected at some point to be decided upon later, with the 23 names and suitable inscription to be put on the monument." The photograph of John W. Gaines is found between pages 38 and 39.

Mention is made of General Edmund Pendleton Gaines, of War of 1812 fame, and the fact that the City of New Orleans was partly built on his land. His heirs, after a lawsuit, collected a large amount of money from the City of New Orleans. Mrs. James K. Polk, wife of President Polk, who was a sister of General Edmund Pendleton Gaines, is also mentiomed.

This Book is indeed a fascinating "collector's item", and most interesting to examine. Mine has been a rare privilege and opportunity to examine it, and to review it.

DENTON COUNTY COURT RECORDS: DEED ABSTRACTS Compiled by Mrs. Alma Lain Chambers, Sanger, Texas

Although the courthouse in Denton, Texas was burned in 1775, one book was saved. This is BOOK A, many of the deeds dated 1854, and are <u>for the most part those deeds</u> issued to the former Peters Colony settlers.

Peters Colony was chartered by the Republic of Texas to W. S. Peters and 19 other men to bring 600 families into Texas within three years. Since this colony did not meet the contract agreement, and difficulties arose with settlers, the contract expired in 1848. In 1850 the Legislature provided a commissioner, Thomas William Ward of the State Land Office, who personally traveled through the area awarding land certificates. Basis of award was the sworn word of two citizens who knew the claimant was settled on the land before 1848. According to Ward's certificates, penton-County had 128 settlers in the part of the county that was designated in Peters Colony. This seastern part of the county in said colony was in the drainage area of the upper Trinity and its tributaries. It was also identified as the "Cross Timbere" and has been as oidentified since.

All deeds in this <u>Book A</u> were abstracted in the order in which they appear in the book.

Edward on the North Side of Falling Creek, Adjoining the Lands. & bounded by the lines of Patrick Henry Esgr., Thomas Robison, Elizabeth Venable, Charles Price, & Tarlton Woodson, containing by Estimation One hundred & Ten acres be the same more or less. To have & to hold the same together with all the privileges & appurtentures there unto belonging or in any wise appurtaining. And he the said Casey Askew the said Tract of Land unto the said James Welch & his heirs forever shall & will warrant & forever defend against the claim & demand of all & every other person, whatsoever. In witness whereof he the said Casey Askew hath hereunto set his hand & seal the day and year above mentioned.

Mr. Roy C. Ledbetter:

A Member of the Society, Roy C. Ledbetter, 3516 University Blvd., Dallas, Texas with others is author of a book entitled "Ledbetters From Virginia" being printed by Wilkinson Printing Company of Dallas. The book will be off the press perhaps by May.

The Ledbetters settled in Prince George County, Virginia, before 1650. The book attempts to trace all those named Ledbetter who were in and spread out from Virginia up to about 1800. The descendants of several of the early Virginia Ledbetters are traced in a connected line to the present. Chapter Six by Lt. Col. Wm. R. Ledbetter, presently stationed in Korea, traces the original Arthor. Among his descendants is the Missionary Baptist preacher Arthur who left Overton County,

Tennessee March 7, 1848 to settle in Peter's Colony in Dallas County. His first wife, Elizabeth Robins and a daughter died of smallpox August 1848 near Garland.

George Washington Ledbotter, youngest son of Rev. Arthur by his second marriage was commissioner of Dallas County for eight terms, 1916 to 1933. Buth, the youngest daughter of George was employed by the Dallas Public Library. Arthur, a grandson of Rev. Arthur, served as Sheriff of Dallas County 1906-1912. His service as Sheriff was cut short by his death due to a falling aming at the Linz Building.

"Ledbetters from Virginia" contains eleven chapters, including a chapter on Ledbetters in the Revolution and another on Ledbetters in the Wars After the Revolution. Included also is a chapter on Ledbetters in the Census.

Mrs. Sid Smith, (Thelma Barber Smith):

Hrs. Sidd Smith, (Thelma Barber), 4508 Southern, Dallas 5, Texas, LA8-2818. Hrs. Smith wag horn in the deep South where she cut her tech on family history, being born in Newton County, Mississippi. She was reared at Gulfport, and attended Judson-College, Marion, Alabama. She taught home economics in Louisiana, and was engaged in Agriculture Extension Service in Texas until she married. She served as distician in the Bonham Public Schools for 15 years, then moved to Dallas, where her "Mobby for Retirement" is reproducing Coats of Arms in Brass or Copper, which began with a visit to Houston, where she saw a replica of her own family Coat of Arms, the original of which still remains in place near the roof tree of the ancestral home of the Briscoes, in the Isle of Woght, from which they emigrated to Saint Mary's, Marvland, the site of the landing of the "Ark and Dove Expedition". March 27, 1634.

Alfred Brown, Mrs. Smith's grandfather, wrote the History of Newton County, Mississippi, and he was well versed in the Indian lore of the County.

"Long Meadows", by Minnie Hite/Hyte Moody, is the story of the Hyte family, descended from Baron Von Hite, Mrs. Smith's line.

She saw the ancestral home of the Chrisman's, at Winchester, Virginia, which was built in 1751. It is a lovely old farmhouse, and is still in the family, and is used as a summer home.

Mrs. Smith has her own family lines: Briscoe, Brown, Chrisman, Hite, as represented in the Coats of Arms in Brass and Copper, on display, as well as many others which she has done for clients. Among the most exquisite are the antiqued Brass Coats of Arms of Briscoe, Richardson, Smith, and Potter families.

Mrs. Smith says "We who have maintained interest in our background will be more determined to leave a good heritage for our children, and a permanent symbol could be in the form of one of the family Coats of Arms, in brass or copper." It is really Heraldry in Brass or Copper (\$100.00 up.)

Mrs. Exa Thomas:

Our congratulations and best wishes to Mrs. Exa Thomas, who is writing a "Pamily Treed" Column, called "The Pamily Album", which will appear regularly in "The Texas Mesquiter", a weekly newspaper, published every Thursday, at Mesquite, Texas. Before 1850 guite a number of persons who were interested in becoming settlers, became discouraged for one reason or another and did not take up land. Several pages are devoted to this listing in the Ky. "Register" for Oct. 1954 (Vol.52 #181) in the article by Seymour Connor. Apparently all of these were in 1844 and 1845. Some may have come later but it is doubtful.

Also the same article lists guite a large number who received "county court certificates as colonists ... probably colonists" - and among those in that list likely descendants will like to identify their progenitors. Those with Dallas as County, include:
