 THE LOCAL HISTORY AND GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY VOTES TO SUPPORT PROPOSAL FOR
 THE CREATION OF A HISTORICAL AREA NEAR THE KENNEDY MEMORIAL PLAZA

The use of an entire city block directly south of the planned Kennedy Memorial Plaza has been proposed as a site for recreating some historical buildings of Dallas as a tourist attraction, and as a means of preserving the history of early Dallas.

The site would be bounded by Main on the north, Commerce on the south, Record on the west and Market on the east, and is presently owned by the County of Dallas.

Mr. John Plath Green, President Emeritus and Founder of The Local History And Genealogical Society, is Chairman of the Dallas County Historical Survey Committee, and is spearheading the movement to preserve some of the most historical buildings, now standing on the site, and to reproduce some of the more picturesque buildings of early Dallas, which would be arranged artistically around the block with a Court Yard in the center, which would be used for an open-air restaurant or side walk cafe, with old fashioned arc or gas lights used throughout the block. All buildings would be air conditioned, and would be operated as old time business establishments by representative pioneer business establishments, carefully carrying out the theme in decor and in methods typical of the era.

The plan is supported by the Dallas Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, which has had drawings made showing how the project would look, and the Local History And Genealogical Society voted at their regular Luncheon Meeting held at the Y.M.C.A., 605 North Ervay, Thursday, March 25, 1965, at which Mr. Green was the principal speaker, to support the proposal for the creation of a Historical Area of the city block directly south of the planned Kennedy Memorial Plaza, as outlined above.

IN MEMORIUM

Mrs. George F. Carlisle, (Willie Flowers)

Honorary Member, and Founder Member, Local History And Genealogical Society

The entire membership of the Local History And Genealogical Society join in paying tribute to Mrs. George F. Carlisle, who was an Honorary Member, and Founder Member of the Society.

She was born 85 years ago in northeast Dallas County, and was a lifetime resident of Dallas until her death Wednesday, 7 July, 1965. She was buried in the Greenwood Cemetery in Dallas. She is survived by her husband, Mr. George F. Carlisle, and son, Mr. Thomas F. Carlisle and two grandsons, William and Robert Carlisle, all of Dallas.

Mrs. Carlisle graduated in 1909 from the school of nursing in the old Leake Hospital here, and was a registered nurse when the state's first law was passed governing certificates for registered nurses.

For almost 20 years, Mrs. Carlisle was a leader in the movement to recognize Texas and Dallas County pioneers buried in the Odd Fellow, Masonic and old City cemeteries on Masonic Street, and her crusade resulted in the Memorial Park beside Dallas Memorial Auditorium.

Mrs. Carlisle was the great-granddaughter of Robert Hamilton, a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence, and was keenly interested in genealogy and history, devoting herself to collecting many valuable genealogical and historical records, and became an authority on the history of Dallas County, and its early residents.

She was a member of, and dedicated worker in the James Butler Bonham Chapter of The Daughters Of The Republic Of Texas, the John Cavet Chapter United States Daughters Of 1812, the Jane Douglas Chapter of the Daughters Of The American Revolution, the Dallas Historical Society, the Local History And Genealogical Society, and the Munger Place Methodist Church, all in Dallas.

Mrs. Carlisle will be greatly missed by all who knew her, and the sympathy of the entire membership of the Local History And Genealogical Society is with her family and loved ones.

EARLY CENSUS, LAND GRANT NUMBERS, AND BRIEF HISTORY
OF THE ENGLISH FAMILY IN TEXAS

In 1819 to 1824 the English brothers and one sister came to the Teneha District of Texas which is now known as Shelby Co. and Harrison and Panola Counties. They left their mother and father plus one younger brother in Tennessee. In 1831, the mother came to this District as a widow with the younger son Archibald English. The next day after she arrived she took out papers for a land grant which she transferred to Archibald, William English, the oldest son was a Delegate to the first convention at San Felipe in 1832. John English, his brother was a delegate to the second convention at San Felipe and served as Congressman from this district under the Republic of Texas. George English, a son of the William named above was appointed to several positions by Sam Houston. In 1827 he was named sheriff of San Augustine District. He was in the Battle of the storming of San Antonio and captain of a company of Militia of San Augustine Volunteers in 1836 and fought in Monterrey in 1845 U.S. war with Mexico. In the Confederate War he again had his own company comprised of many of the English. Col. George English is buried in the English Cemetery in Houston Co. Texas and a Historical marker was placed on both his grave and Captain John English's grave. Captain John English served in the war of 1812 under Andrew Jackson and was captured and held prisoner for several weeks during this war (East Tenn.)

The English brothers who came to Texas were: (Note: Another brother Abraham listed in John English Bible - no records on him in Texas.) William, James, Stephen, Thomas, John, Joseph, Joshua, Jonas, Archibald and the sister Hannah English Payne who married Jonathan Anderson. Hannah and Jonathan Anderson were the early settlers of Panola County and gave the one hundred acres for the founding of the County seat of Carthage, Texas. Jonas English was my Great Grandfather and he married Martha Todd whose family also came to the Teneha District early, about 1827. These early settlers all had early Spanish or Mexican land grants and all signed papers stating they would uphold the laws and religion of the land, that they were honest and reliable people and would abide by the Mexican laws. As we all know this didn't work out as the pioneers had minds and ambitions of their own and wanted schools for their children and their own religion.

I have also listed the numbers on the English Land Grants as the descendants of these early English are numerous. Copies of these Grants may be had from the State Archives of Texas

FITZHUGH

When Col. Fitzhugh's stately, white columned home on Worth Street across from Col. C.C. Slaughter's burned, he "retired" to his farm in town (so-to-speak)-block bounded by present-day San Jacinto, Bryan, Bennett (then called Gano, one wonders why the change in name?) and Fitzhugh Avenue. On the south-west corner his son (Lafayette-Henry Jr. called "Faye") built the attractive cottage that still stands, altho it no longer is at the corner for business-houses crowd it, occupying what was the gracious expanse of lawn. And back-to-back -altho some distance apart, on the Bennett Street corner - was the first home of the S.H. Millikens, Mrs. Milliken being the Colonel's eldest daughter; later they lived for a few years in Oak Cliff & also in Mexico.

The colonel's home was facing Bennett; and, facing Fitzhugh, was his garden, stables, including pig-pen (the fascination of his eldest grand-daughter' earliest years) and servants quarters. All the rest was fields. Across these fields was St. Mary's School (now St. Matthews Cathedral area); the mule-car that traversed Bryan's terminus being thus delivery of the "young ladies & day-students" "out-from town". What a merry time those gay young people had during that-sometimes longer than others-

ride. Of course, the mule was one source of delay when he took a notion to graze; an- other when one or more of the girls decided to romp -pulling the "stop-bell", or the "Motor-man(?)'s hair or whiskers...there were numbers of pranks they could think-up and execute. Who wanted to get to the "stuffy old school-rooms", anyway? Very few, if any, So...

The Fitzhughs homes- like most of those whose "roots" were in Virginia (as theirs) or Kentucky - were patterned on the traditions of "gracious-living" that placed the kitchens quite separate from the house, making it imperative to have hot-water types of covered dishes in order to transport from stove, or open-grill to the table with the least loss of treasured heat - the colored "young-fry" sprinting to accomplish the required results. In the 1880s & 1890s the kitchens were joined to the houses by an open porch - which, when the north-wind was blowing offered no enticement to linger thereon..in fact even in summer it was something that seemed to be a necessity-to-be-endured -until some sensible male decided to enclose it...ah, the comfort that brought. One wonders why it wasn't done years before it was. Tradition and status are powerful, wellnigh invincible allies, sometimes.

Of course the modest homes built as modifications that were more or less reminiscent of pioneer-cabins (that, in deference to climate in the southwest, developed the "breeze-way" between the main sections of the house, and the locating this with reference to prevailing-winds)-afforded quite a contrast in architectural details as well as ease of housekeeping should insufficient retainers (by some inelegantly referred-to as "factotums") be forth-coming.

It is a well-known fact that individuals tend to make every effort to reproduce that which they admire & have been accustomed-to from childhood,-in short what they are used-to..when they change their place-of-residence. Hence it is many times a helpful clue where to look for a family's antecedents.

Col. Lafayette-Henry Fitzhugh's background in Virginia was not only of interest but in many respects most enviable, for few if any families contain as many direct-descendant-from persons of historic prominence and importance in the genesis of our American United States; born in 1829 on May 9th in Nottoway Co Va. to Philip⁵ (son of Lt. John⁴ & Lucy daughter of Samuel Redd of "Cedar Vale" Caroline County, and his wife Lucy Rogers, daughter of John & Mary (Bryd) Rogers - Mary being of the Byrds of "West-over") and wife Mary-Macon Aylett, daughter of Col. Philip⁵ & wf nee Elizth Henry dau of the great Orator Patrick Henry whose mother was Sarah, dau. of Isaac & Mary Dabney, Winston; and whose first wife Sarah Shelton was dau. of Capt. John of "Rural Plains" son of Wm & wf nee Hannah Armistead...all names to be "conjured-with" were one in the mood to go "title-hunting", altho this "hunt" would be "for true" -not make-believe.

There is a fascinating story connected with Col. L.H. Fitzhugh's grandfather-Lt. John⁴ of Caroline Co. who died in the year 1802/3 after the tax list for 1802 was completed, but his widow - Lucy - paid them in 1803.

John⁴ - Lt. of the Caroline Co. Militia in the Revolutionary War - was born in Stafford County, one of the first of Col. Wm³ (who built "Marmion") children- some say the first - by his 1st wife nee Ursula Beverly, daughter of Col. Wm³ of "Blandfield, Essex" and his wife Elizth, dau. of Richard Bland of "Jordan's Point" (Col. Wm³ Beverly being the only child of Robert² of Beverly Park K&Q, son of Major Rgb't "The Historian"; and wife Ursula, daughter of Wm Byrd I of "Westover")...Col. Wm³ Fitzhugh being the son of Major John², whose wife was Anna-Barbara McCarty, granddaughter of Col. Richard Lee and Letitia Corbin...and Major John² was son of Col. Wm¹ (son of Hon. Henry of Bedfordshire Eng.) who came to Virginia cl1670 and lived at "Eagles Nest" in Northern Neck, his wife being "Little Sarah" daughter of John & Rose Tucker.

With this background it is amazing that merely going into the "wilds" so-to-speak, of Caroline County of that early day would allow John to become for his Texas descendants "Lost John" as far as being able to learn any vital statistics concerning his life were concerned -but such was the case. No one questioned his parentage, nor

that Philip of Caroline & Nottoway was his son. In fact no one questioned anything except where could be found any documentation relating to him & his life. Also, who were Lucy Redd's parents, also "lost" to the Texas descendants. Wingfield's, & Campbell's Histories of Caroline County, together with the Personal Property Tax-lists have filled in the most important gaps, altho to date where and when he died and is buried, is still unknown. Lucy survived him a number of years, leaving a will in Caroline Co. administered by her sons: Philip & Sam'l-Redd Fitzhugh -dated 1815 Sept. 2 & recorded Feb. 12th 1816.

Col. L. H. Fitzhugh (of Dallas)'s mother's people should not be overlooked in a record of his background for Col. Philip³Aylett's parents were Gen¹ Wm⁴ wf. Mary, daughter of James Macon - Gen¹ Wm⁴ being son of Philip³ of "Fairfield", Clerk of the Court of Old King Wm. Co. who married 1st in 1739 Martha Dandridge daughter of Col. Wm³ of Elsing Green² & Unity, only child of Col. Nath¹ West, 14th in lineal descent from the Lords DeLaWare, son of Col. John & Ursula Crowshaw, daughter of Major Joseph of "Poplar Neck".

Col. Philip³ Aylett "of Fairfield" was son of Major Wm²-Clerk of Court of Old King Wm. & Burgess, also, whose father - Capt. Wm¹ Aylett son of the Cavalier Captain John, - came to Virginia from Essex England c 1660. Major Wm² married Anne Daughter of Col. Henry Ashton of Westmoreland Co. Va. & served in the Indian Wars as Commanding-Officer.

Col.L.H. Fitzhugh's was Confederate service..eminently worth of his illustrious ancestors. In a comparatively newly settled part of the land - one might say just beginning to get-on-its-feet after the cruel Civil War - the value of an influence of the character he brought can not be adequately evaluated.

LINEAGES OF CATS, AS AN EXAMPLE OF STUDY IN GENEALOGY

HISTORY & GENEALOGY OF THE PERSIAN CAT

There are many interesting facts told about our friend, the Cat. I would like to touch on a few of them. As most of you probably know, my other favorite hobby is GENEALOGY and its companion, HERALDRY. In the study of Heraldry, we learn that the cat is used in many family Coats of Arms. Authorities tell us that of all the household pets; the cat alone may not be perfectly subjected to man's will. She will fight tooth and claw against anyone who attempts to injure her or do her harm in any way. She obeys or ignores commands as she pleases. If the cat is in a disobedient mood, no threats or blows or loud cries will force her to do her owner's will. For this reason the cat was quite popular and used as a fitting device for any knight who believed in freedom and the fight for liberty.

The armies of the Roman Empire for a long time fought against the various tribes of Europe. These tribes among them the Suevoi, the Vandals, and the Alani, did not wish to be included in the Roman Empire and be ruled over by Romans, nor did they desire to send tax money to Rome, or obey orders given by Roman governors. They wanted to be free and rule themselves and do whatever they pleased. So the Suevoi, the Vandals and the Alani marched to battle under banners on which they painted the symbol of liberty, the cat.

In later times the patriots of the Dutch nation, who struggled long and valiantly for liberty, adopted the cat as their emblem, not only to show the world that they were fighting for liberty rather than conquest, but also to inspire the Dutch soldiers with the ideal that every blow they struck, was a blow for freedom.

Many families part of whose name sounds like the word "cat" bear a cat in their arms. Such families as Keats of Gloucester, Catesby of Warwickshire, and the Comptons of Catton all bore cats on their coats of arms. A family of Cheshire County, the Cateralls, had a cat as their crest. The clan Chatteran had a mountain cat, in heraldry called Muslon, as its crest, and the Earl of Sutherland, who was their leader, was given the title of Mohr or Chat, "The Great Cat." The motto of this clan was "Touch not the cat but (with) a glove." In Germany the house of Katzen bore a silver cat on its coat of arms; in Italy the family of Della Gatta also had a silver cat on a blue field, while the Limousin family of La Chetardie emblazoned two silver cats one above the other, on a blue field. Such armorial bearings, which pun upon the bearer's name, are called by heralds Arms parlantes, which means "speaking arms," because the very arms themselves seem to speak forth the name of their owners.

The British Royal Family uses other members of the cat family on their coats of arms. The ancient Greeks gave the name of pard to some wild beasts, probably the leopard or panther; but afterward it was believed that when the pard mated with a lioness the cubs were leopards, as the name shows for leopard means "lion-pard;" while if the lion mated with the female pard the litter were panthers. It is then, no wonder that in armory the same beasts are called leopards by some and lions by others. The three beasts borne of the kings of England have been called leopards by some heralds who pretend that they must be leopards because they are shown passant, or walking on all fours, while the lion is so fierce that he can only be shown rampant, or rearing on his hind legs.

England's greatest warrior king, Richard Coeur de Lyon, was so-called because he was very bold and brave, yet fierce when fighting his enemies. According to legend, King Richard earned his nickname, when he was captured by his enemies and put in an Austrian prison. One day a lion was released in his cell to devour him, but the brave king put his arm into the lion's mouth and pulled the lion by the heart so hard, that the lion was immediately killed.

The second quarter of the shield of Scotland is a golden shield within a border

which is partly made up of fleur-de-lis, which some held as the mark of friendship between Scotland and France. Before England and Scotland were united under one crown, they were often at war, and as England was often at war with France, it was natural that the French and Scots should be close friends.

One of the most interesting stories in English folk-lore is the story of "Dick Whittington And His Cat." The story may or may not be true, but the facts indicate that it is based upon a real live person, Richard Whittington, who did become Lord Mayor of London, and was later knighted by King Henry V.

His father having died, young Dick Whittington set out for London at the age of thirteen, to seek his fortune. He apprenticed himself to Sir John Fitz-Warren, a prosperous mercer. Dick became a kitchen servant and did all the menial chores. One day, Dick was given a penny for polishing a gentleman's shoes, and he bought a cat with it, because the attic where he slept, was always full of rats and mice. The cat soon cleaned up the attic and one day, Mr. Fitz-Warren asked each of his servants if he or she had anything they would like to send to be sold in foreign ports. A ship owned by Sir John was sailing with trade goods to eastern ports. The only thing young Dick had was his cat. So the merchant gave the cat to the ship's captain, Alice Fitz-Warren, Sir John's daughter, felt sorry for Dick and gave him money to buy another cat. After that, the cook for whom Dick worked, was even crosser with him than before. So Dick decided to run away and go back to the village where he was born. He walked as far as the place called Holloway, and there he sat down on a stone, which to this day is called "Whittington's Stone."

As he sat there very sad, and wondering which way he should go, he heard the bells on Bow Church, far away, ringing out a merry chim. He listened. They seemed to say to him: "Turn again, Whittington, Thrice Lord Mayor of Londontown." "Well, well!" he said to himself. "I would put up with almost anything to be Lord Mayor of London when I am a man, and to ride in a fine coach! I think I will go back and let the old cook cuff and scold me as much as she pleases."

After many weeks at sea, the ship finally reached a distant port and docked. A great crowd gathered around the ship, and soon trade was very brisk. Eventually a message arrived for the captain from the king and Queen, asking him to visit them. After the captain arrived at the palace and dinner was served, rats and mice began invading the table. The king apologized and mentioned that he would give the riches of his kingdom for a way to be rid of the mice and rats. The captain remembered Dick's cat, and immediately told the king that he could solve the problem. The captain brought the cat to the palace, where a second dinner had been laid, when the rats and mice again invaded the table. This time, however, the cat cleaned up the rats and mice, and soon there were many dead and dying rodents. The king and queen had never before seen a cat, true to their promise, the ship was loaded with chests of treasure and jewels. When the ship reached London, the captain immediately told Sir John Fitz-Warren about his wonderful luck in selling all the goods and the good fortune that the cat had brought. Dick was told of his great fortune which the cat had brought him, and shortly thereafter, there was a fine wedding, and Sir John's daughter, Alice, became the wife of Mr. Richard Whittington.

In 1397, he was chosen Mayor of London, and was again chosen in 1406. He was elected member of Parliament for the city of London in 1416, and in 1419, was again chosen mayor for the third time. He was knighted by King Henry V. By his will, he rebuilt Newgate and St. Michael's Church, connecting also a college and an almshouse with it. He also restored St. Bartholomew's Hospital, and gave a library to Grey Friars. He provided drinking fountains.

On the arch-way in front of Newgate Prison in London, was a figure, cut in stone of Sir Richard Whittington and his cat; and for three hundred years this figure was shown to all who visited London.
