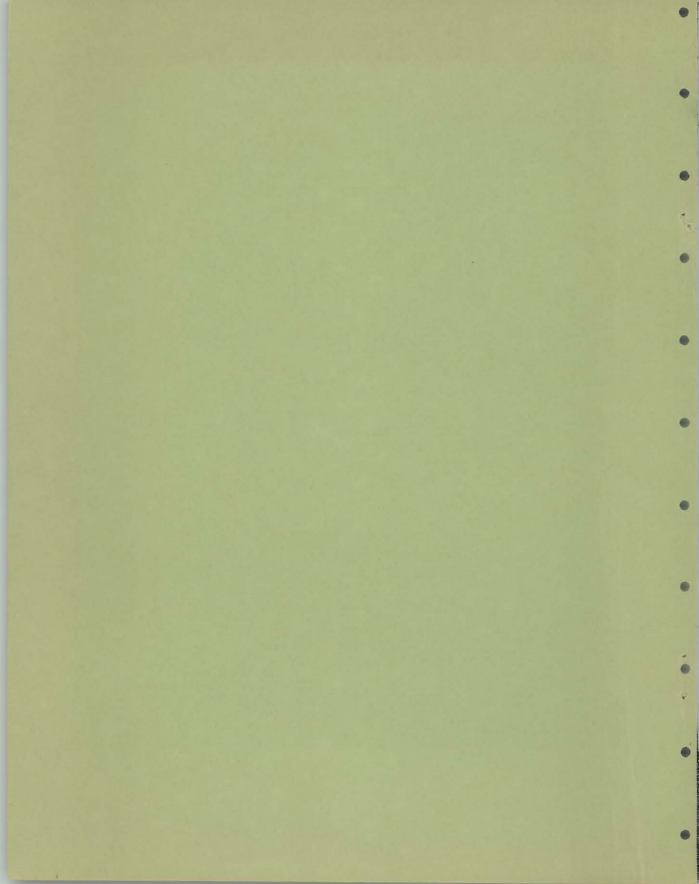

LEE CEMETERY
Seagoville, Dallas County, Texas

1810 N. Hwy. 175, Seagoville, Texas

Located at the junction of Highway 175 and the "Old Seagoville Road" in abstract #850.

The earliest record I find of the cemetery is in a deed dated November 13, 1870 in Volume O, page 478, Dallas County Deed Records in which 1 1/8 acres was "reserved as a graveyard" at this time when 130 acres was sold for \$500.00 to George D. Burris and wife Susan from Enoch Horton.

One 12-2-1871, Volume O, page 638, George D. Burris and wife sold 132 acres, more or less (and reserved 1 1/8 acres) for \$610.00 to James W. Lee.

From James W. Lee (deceased) by heirship agreement of 10-12-1898 57 acres more or less of the 132 acres above was deeded to John S. Ard in volume 225, page 230. The cemetery is named for the James W. Lee family. Some land has been added to the cemetery site and at present, April 17, 1967 it contains about three acres (about 1100 known gravesites as of this date). It was established about 1871.

YOUNG COUNTY'S FIRST COURTHOUSE BUILT IN 1857
BY PLEASANT WITT (FRONTIERSMAN) AT COST OF \$319.00

The first county seat of government in Young County, Texas was at Belknap and the first courthouse was located almost in the center of the county. The 1856 frontier town of Belknap was layed out east of the military post and south of the present site of the Belknap cemetery. It was there on February 16, 1857 that Chief Justice Peter Harmonson was authorized to let contract to build the first courthouse for the county. Lot number 1, block number 9, was set aside for the courthouse building (often referred to in the records as the County Clerk's Office.) The main street running in front of the courthouse was for reasons unknown named Colorado Avenue.

Court met in other buildings for 13 months prior to the completion of a new courthouse. Harmonson first presided over a court session in James Duff's store on August 18, 1856. It was the same James Duff who had petitioned the Texas legislature with others in the Spring of 1856 to organize the county; the same James Duff who had been sent to the West in 1852 as a soldier stationed at Fort Belknap; the same who left Young County to become a Colonel in command of Duff's Texas 14th Cavalry (later merged with Texas 33rd Cavalry Regiment).

The next meeting of the court was on September 29, 1856 and the officers chose to use a government building at the fort for their meeting. The November and December meeting took place in the town at Roark's Store House.

The court ordered an election for commissioners of the precincts and it was held at the home of Thomas Lamshead (west of Fort Belknap) with T. E. Jackson the presiding Judge of the elections. In January, 1857, the court met again at Roark's Store House. The weather was so cold and bad that this meeting moved to the home of Thomas Kelly. The next meeting in February culminated in the authorization to proceed "to build a concrete building in the town of Belknap" for the court's use. Harmonson let the contract to Pleasant Witt for "a building 36 feet long, 18 feet wide, and 9 feet from the floor to the joist," including doors, windows, flooring, roofing, and chimney.

It took ten months to complete the building. On November 17, 1857 "the court received the concrete building" and it became the first county courthouse for Young County. Pleasant Witt agreed "to paint the gable ends and finish the window in the east end of the building." For this extra work Witt was allowed \$35.00 above the \$284.00 he was paid to build the building. Witt was "paid in full" on February 6, 1858.

Those authorizing Harmonson to contract the building of a courthouse were: Patrick Murphy, sheriff; William Burkett, county clerk; L. L. "Lock" Williams and Chesley S. Dobbs, commissioners.

WITT, THE BUILDER

Witt was a transplanted Illinoian and had been in Texas and Dallas County since 1842. His twin brother, Preston, and four other brothers, came to Texas and were among the first settlers in Dallas County. It was Pleasant Witt who was

known in the Southwest for pursuing his favorite pastime, fighting Indians. He was best known for his participation in the Grand Prairie Fight of 1846, altho it was his twin brother who killed two warriors in hand-to-hand fighting in that battle.

In the summer of 1846 the few settlers in the upper part of Dallas County met at the house of Preston Witt, on White Rock creek, and organized a Minute Man Company for mutual protection against the redskins. The organization was designed by its members to be always ready, with horse, ammunition and provisions to hasten in pursuit of marauding Indians.

Pleasant Witt cavorted over the Young, Jack, Wise, Parker, and Tarrant County frontier and between Indian fights and expeditions, he found time to serve on Young County juries and oversee the building of roads out of Belknap. Witt left Young County before the outbreak of the Civil War in 1861. The courthouse which he built at Belknap was used until the mid 1860's when county government fell in disorganization. Upon the re-organization of Young County in 1874, the seat of the county government moved to Graham where it remains today.

III. Rollins Cemetery

The Rollins Cemetery in Collin County, Texas, is west of Anna about two miles. It is on an all weather dirt road, the first road turning south off FM 455 after leaving Anna on 455 toward Weston. This dirt road is really a two mile loop which comes back on to 455. On the loop there are two cemeteries, Rollins being the second. It should be noted that the new expressway, the new Hwy. 75, is under construction in this area and will, in fact, pass right by the cemetery; therefore, changes or detours on the dirt road are probable.

Comments from Mrs. Morris on the research and publication of the "Bevill-Burton Family History."

I started getting in touch with the Bevills in Texas first and they very generously answered my requests for information and one relative gave me the Bevill General Store Ledger dated 1856 from Winston Co., Miss. My own Great Grandfather had brought this and other old records with him to Texas in 1867. I then started research at our wonderful Dallas Public Library where there seemed to be an unending source of material on the Bevill and Burton families. Most of my work was done in our own Dallas Library. The State of Virginia (Archives) supplied much information and material as well as some material from Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, South Carolina, and other states.

In October of 1966 the final manuscript went to Aus-Tex Duplicators, Inc., in Austin, Texas for publication. I felt quite well rewarded when I learned that Mrs. Sarah McLean would handle all of the details of typing and correcting errors in the book for printing. She is the daughter of Garland Adair who was Curator of Archives in Austin, Texas for many years. He also wrote books on Texas, including school text books and was very interested and worked with the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. A great deal of credit goes to Mrs. McLean for her work on the preparation of the book for printing.

The "Bevill-Burton Family History" is now in many Libraries: Virginia State Archives, Newberry, Dallas, and many others.

DALLAS SOCIAL LIFE VI "School Days"

In assembling data on by-gone eras, there is often a fine line of choice presented as to whether to pursue one phase strictly chronologically or to concentrate on a subject of one locality. "Picking up threads" can cause the unfamiliar reader confusion, especially where there is an evident need for brevity, condensation of material, or any other requisite due to printing-space. Considering this, rather than use teacher's topic-headings, a degree of logical development will prevail in this grouping of factual information.

Little has been learned of the days prior to what might be termed the cultural awakening of Dallas after the Civil War. It is probable that the mothers or maiden-aunts in each neighborhood instructed the youngsters. After the 1880s for a long period, "maiden-ladies" were the school-marms, although there were a few who had been married and widowed.

In Miss Edna Froesse's Primary School in East Dallas, both German and English were taught in the 1880s and 1890s. Former pupils most fondly recall the exciting ride from home by mule car each morning and, when it rained and was very muddy, the delightful experience of spending the night with Miss Edna.

In a different part of town, on former Masten Street, near Ross Ave., Judge Fred Tucker's sisters, Misses Hattie and Lucy, with their mother, instructed the young-folks. In addition to the "Three Rs", Miss Hattie taught music and what is today termed public-speaking. Much emphasis was put on memory-work of which the simplest was that containing rhythm and rhyme.

In still another section of town on Live Oak Street, not far from Haskell Ave., and quite near where Ursaline Academy was located for many years prior to moving to the present location on Walnut Hill Lane, Mrs. Claudine Moores had a "kindergarten" type school.

Ursaline convent-school was opened in 1874, and was located where the Federal Post Office is located today. It was later moved to Live Oak, Bryan & Haskell, in a large block of ground where it had, in addition to play-ground areas, both a garden and an orchard. Rev. Mother St. Joseph Holly was the 1st Mother-Superior, and Mon. Joseph Martiniere, the Chaplain for some thirty-six years. At first, only the nuns were instructors, but later instructors of dramatics and physical-education were added. Home-economics were never featured. Boarders were not able to be accommodated in the first four-room frame structure, but were taken into the large brick buildings on Live Oak. There were no pre-school pupils until 1918.

In the fashionable "Cedars" on Browder Street and Marilla, Miss Bettie and Miss Lucy Collier had a co-educational school from about 1882 until they grew too old to operate it; in fact, until one sister died. An early City Directory welcomed these sisters as "two elegant Victorian ladies" from Kentucky who had opened a "select private school" (1882). The curriculum covered the 1st grade through the

1st year of High School. The Misses Collier used the phonetic-system of sounding each syllable in reading, the Spencerian system of penmanship, and the basics of "cyphering". Great stress was placed on the importance of proverbs being both known and practiced, certain aids in retaining grammatical information by "diagramming", and geographical data, which perhaps is ridiculed by today's methods, but which was apparently much more effective than a great many of the so-called short-cuts. Spelling was studied directly from the Dictionary; the pupils given words to look up, spell, and define. In addition to English, Cecile Giraud of the Colony at LaReunion taught French.

Two small schools, one of which was in the Cedars, were almost contemporary with that of the Misses Collier, Mrs. Meyer's, on Corsicana St., and Judge White's sister Miss Julia's not far from the earlier Misses Tuckers' on Old Masten St. or on Harwood (it not being definite in the minds of the "oldsters" questioned exactly where the school was located). Miss Julia's school was said to have been originated as early as the '70s.

On Cedar Springs at McKinney Ave., Mrs. Val Winston's school was popular in its area. The sisters, Miss Osborn and Mrs. Johnson, opened and conducted their school on San Jacinto Street following the opening of Miss Julia's school. In this school, discipline with a ruler, "on the knuckles," was not only permissible but it seems was the accepted mild punishment for "sassing", lack of attention, and other minor infractions of the rules.

On the exact location or close by what is now Crozier Technical School (formerly Bryan High), Professor James Reid Cole's "Classical Military Academy" was established prior to 1889. It was perhaps the most outstanding example of strict discipline in its time. Although Professor Cole was an excellent teacher and his school rated highly, he was not remembered for his gentleness. This school was followed by Bryan High where Dr. Jno. O. Reynolds was able to command respect, obedience, and order with the large bundle of willow switches he deposited on the mantle the first day of school. No other word was necessary.

The Misses Cowart, sisters of Judge Robert Cowart, had school affiliations also. Miss Leila was Principal of the Akard St. Elementary School while Miss Lora had her own private school "Cowart Hall" located first in Oak Cliff, later on Browder St. in Dallas.

The Misses Holly had a school located diagonally across Ross Avenue from the present Woman's Forum. This preceded slightly the school of Miss Ela Hockaday, est. 1913, yet was by no means as old as St. Mary's (Episcopal) College (1888-1929) established by Bishop Alexander Garrett, and familiarly called "The Bishop's College" because of his tremendous interest in it. At St. Mary's - located on the hill at the head of Ross Avenue - were several fine instructors, most of whom were identified later with other schools in Dallas.

In Oak Cliff, the higher-education, privately-owned school was Patton Seminary, established about the same period that Miss Lora Cowart had her school in Oak Cliff before moving to the Cedars, on Browder Street.

After the 1900s and before World War II, there was a group of small schools that became quite popular, some being merged into large present-day ones. Mrs. H. B. Taylor and Miss Jessie Russell had a co-educational elementary and kindergarden school located in Mrs. Taylor's home across from the Terrill School established in the buildings back of Mr. Menter D. Terrill's home on Live Oak

and Annex Streets. A similar school was owned by Mrs. M. H. Smith and Mrs. Proctor. The Terrill School was sold to Mr. Bogart and Mr. Sam'l ("Pop") Davis, eventually, it seems, becoming today's St. Mark's. From the beginning until now, it was and is exclusively for boys, its counter-part being Hockaday School for girls.

Early in the 20th Century Mrs. O. D. Woodrow, trained in the famous School for Actors in Boston, Mass., opened classes in Dallas and taught the technique of character-portrayals, apparently a "lost art" these days, for it appears most of the acting is achieved by "doing what comes naturally."

Another teacher-of-the unusual was Miss Edna Washington. Her technique of lip-reading et al for the deaf and deaf-mutes developed the need for the Lighthouse for the Blind as well as the various schools for the deaf, the mentally retarded and many other such important developments.

Some of the other fine instructors of the early days of the high schools include Mrs. M. B. Henderson, who earlier owned her own school before teaching in the Dallas schools and for whom M. B. Henderson Elementary School was named; Prof. Joseph Bryan for whom Bryan High was named; Prof. J. O. Mahoney, noted as a math teacher; Prof. Kendrick, noted for Latin; Mrs. Piercy; Joseph Morgan, one of the early principals whose widow had a private school; Misses Phoebe and Julia Hensley; Misses Sophie Papanhagan, beloved by all; Prof. Malcalmeson, a French and Latin specialist; and Miss Margaret Mosely. Some of these were able to give long periods of service and are held in highest admiration.

Many different teaching techniques were found to be effective in the earlier schools besides those cited earlier in this article. History in those days was rather extensively taught by student-production of pageants or plays, Shakespeare being the favorite. These were most colorful, and thoroughly enjoyed by all ages, because great attention was given to authenticate all details, especially costumes. Scenery was generally a "minor consideration." The productions were almost exclusively "sponsored" by the older students, their parents, teachers and friends. Many plays were given on the slope of Oak Lawn Park before Turtle Creek Boulevard was "cut thru" with dressing rooms located at the foot of the hill on the Hall Street side. Some productions were given in Oak Cliff Park and other out-of-door theatres, also.

From the earliest days the offer of prizes of various and sundry kinds and descriptions has been a very effective measure of encouragement of learning thru competition. For example, the offer of good books for excellence in languages and history, especially, has always been appreciated and striven for ...the offer of equipment or travel for sciences...the offer of any sort of coveted thing brings response, many times much greater than anticipated. All such offers, it seems, were being practiced from the earliest records and memories, uncovered in assembling these notes.

Another important teaching-technique found effective from the earliest days, is the method of instilling appreciation by the use of replicas (pictures, models, etc.) or other means of "visual education." This of course is extended immeasurably in today's program, probably the most vital for rapid impartation of information ...coupled with auditory assistance it becomes of tremendous value.

Some time ago I worked on the RICHARD WRIGHT mentioned in the will above and found that these WRIGHTS came from Louise Co. Va. via Caswell Co., N.C.

Note the TOLLISON connection above, and some land owned by TRUSSELLS was adj. TOLLISON land...or TRUSSELLS lived near TOLLISONS in the census lists. MAREY COLEMAN was the wife of ISALAH COLEMAN who moved from the Chester/Fairfield area to Georgia early in 1800's.

The McQuistons who witnessed this will lived in the same area and are buried at old Hopewell ARP Church where TRUSSELLS are also buried.

MATTHEW TRUSSELL

Who seems to have died in Chester County, though there is no will or estate file for this man in the Chester County Probate Office.

The old will book, Book A, in which this guardianship bond was recorded, has no record of a MATTHEW TRUSSELL listed in the index. I scanned the pages prior to the bond and found no record of his estate. It is evident that he died before 1800.

MATTHEW TRUSSELL wed FRANCES FRANKLIN, daughter of THOMAS FRANKLIN and PRISCILLA his wife (who was probably a ROGERS). The deeds, as well as the wills show that after the death of MATTHEW TRUSSELL, FRANCES (FRANKLIN) (TRUSSELL) married MOSES GRISSOM, or GRESHAM, who died testate 1800, naming PATTY TRUSSELL as his step-daughter. No...excuse it please, it was MAJOR GRISSOM whom she married and probably MATTHEW died early in 1790's. After GRISSOM'S death she (FRANCES) married 3rd, a KNIGHT or NIGHT, and see deeds for this.

In the Name of God, Amen, the Fourteenth day of October, Anno Domini 1765. I Henry Montgomery, of Craven County, in the Province of South Carolina being Weak in Body, but of good and perfect memory, Thanks be given to God, therefore willing to mind the mortality of my Body, and expecting the time of my dissolution to be Near at hand, I do make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament and first of all I give and Recommend my Soul to the hands of God, who gave it, and for my Body I recommend it to the Earth, to be buried in a Christian Like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall Receive the same again by the Mighty power of God, and as Touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this Life, I give Bequeath and dispose of the same in the following Manner and form, Impremis I give and bequeath to my dear and Loving Wife Sarah Montgomery the One fourth part of my personal Estate Horse Saddle and Bridle, and it is my Will and desire that she shall live upon the Land I now possess, while she Remains my Widow and no Longer. Item I give and bequeath to my son William Son Henry and daughter Sarah Montgomery the other three parts of my Personal Estate equally divided amongst them and if One of them should die under Age or before Marriage I allow its share to be equally divided betwext my two Surviving Children and if two of them should die under Age I allow, One of their shares to be equally divided betwext my Wife and all my Surviving Children. Item I give and bequeath to my Two Sons William and Henry Montgomery all my Real Estate to be equally divided between them. Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Janet Dunn, one Negroe Wench Named Kate and her Child to her and her issue for ever, Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Armstrong, One Negroe Wench Named Jeanny to her and her issue forever, Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Jeanet Dunn one more Negroe Wench Named Flora, not to be delivered till three years after my decease to her and her issue forever.

Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Armstrong, One Negroe Wench Named Reinah not to be delivered till 3 years after my decease to her and her issue forever. Item I give and bequeath to my nephew Hugh Montgomery One good Woods Mare and Colt and likewise One Cow and Calf, Further it is my Will and desire that there be no division made in my Estate before my Youngest Child arrives at age or comes to Maturity and likewise it is my desire that my Children shall be cloathed and Schooled of the whole Estate, after the payment of all Legacies, debts, and funeral charges. I likewise make Constitute and Appoint Sarah Montgomery, William Montgomery Henry Montgomery and James Armstrong as my Sole Executors of this my Last Will and Testament and I do hereby Revoke Renounce and disannul all former Wills and Testaments by me before this time made, Ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament, I witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal the day and Year above Written.
