WHERE DID THEY COME FROM?

Where did they come from, those early inhabitants of Dallas County, Texas? A check of the U. S. Census of Dallas County for 1850 reveals that Tennessee furnished the most families living in the County that year, with Kentucky second. A few came from as far away as Massachusetts and Connecticut, as well as from across the seas. Following are heads of families living in Dallas County 1850, grouped according to the state in which each was born.

ANNUAL BOOK AWARD

Presented each year by the Local History and Genealogical Society, Dallas, Texas. (Rules adopted for this Award are listed in THE QUARTERLY, Volume XI, No. 1, March, 1965.) The need for indices among genealogists and historians is rapidly increasing. This applies to all types of records which are now being searched repeatedly by many different people. Particularly important are the Federal Census records. Many records, however, other than census records should also be indexed, such as marriages, probate, Bible, land, tax lists, and passenger lists.

During the mid 1930's some indexing of original records was initiated to provide work for unemployed people. When the available funds were expended the work was discontinued. With the onset of the Social Security program, an applicant often had to furnish proof of his age. The difficulties experienced by many persons led to financing by the Federal Government of the indexing of the Census records of 1900 and 1920, and of part of the 1880, using the Soundex system. Nevertheless, indexing of the vast number of early records remains to be done and is still urgently needed.

Automatic data processing, as a means of analyzing and indexing records, has become commonplace in recent years by all progressive establishments, including colleges and universities. Genealogists and historians should do no less. To this end a nonprofit association has been formed and was incorporated on August 28, 1967; the name of which is the Association for Records and Census Indexing.

At present the Association is continuing the transcribing and indexing of the 1850 census of Tennessee, which was formerly sponsored by the National Genealogical Society. Tennessee is being used as the pilot state. Considerable care is being given to details so as to develop a workable pattern which can be used for similar purposes in all other states.

Work on the Tennessee census is progressing very well. To date more than 75 percent of the transcribing has been completed by volunteer workers. Two different volunteers separately transcribe the census for each county. These are now being compared to assure accuracy. Methods of programming the data for electronic computer processing to compile the indices are under investigation. Upon completing these phases of the work, the data will be ready for key punching and indexing. Each volunteer worker participating in the transcribing and associated activities, and each organization which donates processing services will be given recognition as each indexing undertaking is completed. Additional volunteers are invited to aid in this work.

THE COLLECTIONS AND FAMILY RECORDS OF LUCY BINFORD WOODS

Lucy Binford Woods was born at Sallis, Attala County, Mississippi in 1890, daughter of Robert Joab Woods, CSA veteran. She followed her two brothers to Texas in 1912, settling at Palestine. Before her retirement, Miss Woods was a Registered Nurse, spending many years at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. Most of her life was spent in medical and related humanitarian work. She is a member of the Daughters of American Revolution (National #396724) and the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Miss Wood's broad interest in life and people led her to become a collector. Her home near Palestine, Texas is something of a museum - fine old furniture, lamps, kitchenware, photos, family records, etc. She has a remarkable collection of Post Cards from around the world, starting when she was a young girl. Her sympathies for the Confederacy led her to start collecting newspaper and magazine articles on Confederate Generals. This collection covers many years, going back to when most of these Generals were still living, and should be a great aid to students of the Civil War.

Miss Wood's family records, which are outstanding, include (1) a large photo collection she compiled over the years, plus a large family album which came to her from an aunt; (2) the old Mathis-Woods family Bible, possibly 150 years old and filled with genealogical data; (3) a little brown book, with stiff covers and about 5 x 12 inches bearing the label: "Family Record of Woods."

"FAMILY RECORD OF WOODS"

This little brown book came to Miss Woods from her Aunt Emily (Mrs. Abner W. Scarborough). It also contains the Sallie McWhorton recipes for grape wine, raspberry wine and blackberry cordial. Inside the front cover is a note to the effect that the corners were chewed by Charles Mitchell Woods when he was a baby.

RECORDS FROM THE MATHIS-WOODS BIBLE

This old Bible came to Miss Lucy B. Woods from her brother, Jefferson David Woods, when he died in 1942. Jeff D. Woods got it from an Aunt but it was an heirloom of his mother, LuAnna Langham Mathis, wife to Robert Joab Woods. The records in this Bible were kept by three persons, with distinct hands. The oldest records, consisting of only two lines, is in a very fine old style freehand:

"Isaac Durham was born Sept. 24th, A.D., 1777
Barbary Brantley was born April 6th, A.D., 1784."

Later records, but still early records, are drawn in a similar style but not so fine a hand. Most of the middle and later records are in one hand, though entries have been made by several persons. Some of the records are duplicated in "Family Record of Woods", and these will not be repeated. Some records have been lost through torn pages and two pages have been mutilated by clippings. Miss Woods says that this has been done in recent years.

Though the record is not in this Bible, Barbary's father was Malachi Brantley, Revolutionary War soldier of North Carolina. He and the Rev. John Thomas of N.C., give Miss Woods her DAR lineage.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES
A PANORAMA OF DALLAS SOCIAL LIFE - VII

GAMES AND SAYINGS

One wonders if the metal slides and other playground equipment designed for active youngsters of today can compare with the home-made or self-devised methods of amusement and exercise their forefathers used and loved. Of course, city children have much more playground equipment than do those in smaller places, but then the country is really no longer the country, taken as a whole, so the following discourse on bygone days, even if not nostalgic, may be amusing.

Another thing that excites a bit of wonder is a rather widespread disuse of many games, except a few played at parties. When did you see youngsters playing hop-scotch? They used to mark off the sidewalks and compete heatedly with each other. When have you heard gay voices and happy laughter of children accompanying "Blind-man's Buff" or "Hide and Seek", or "Drop the handkerchief?"

Everyone loves gayety and rhythm, a characteristic of most of the oldtime games; and the little sing-song ditties chanted in such games as "Ring around the rosy-pocket full o' posies", . . . "Sing a song o' six-pence, pocket full o' rye. Four and twenty blackbirds baked into a pie", . . . "Teapot hot, Teapot cold, some like it hot", . . . "Jack be nimble, Jack be quick, Jack jumped over the candlestick."

Instead of everybody doing dances for grace and poise, the opposite is true in popular "return-to-the-primitive" dances. The Southern "Cake-walk", Tap-dancing, jigs, soft-shoe, square-dances, and "Folk-dancing", are confined primarily to professional entertainers, which youngsters view on TV, thus substituting personal development of many desirable skills by participation in passive observation with resulting flabby muscles, awkward gestures, and the like. It's surprising that one of the TV personalities hasn't begun to challenge his viewers to "do likewise", if he can! 'Twould be fun to see, and most delightful to hear, one evidence of a return to sanity.

Of course most of the ball-games are played during school (baseball, football, basket ball, etc.) and the tennis courts are in almost constant use. But, what of the quieter dexterity required by "jacks?" Or the skill in croquet?

When, outside of a circus or other professional entertainment fields, have you seen stilt-walking, rope-jumping, hoop-rolling, or even roller-skating, aside from school playgrounds, or roller rinks?

These questions are not to disparage the forms of physical development that are popular. On the contrary, any form is commendable. It's that some of the once popular ones had merits that perhaps are being deliberately overlooked simply because they were formerly popular. Who knows?

There was "once-upon-a-time" a fun-game called "Yes and No", popular in Winter when one had to be indoors. The players seated around the room were alternately to answer "Yes", the next one "No" to the questioner, regardless of how ridiculous such an answer would be. When the questioner was clever, the results could be highly hilarious. Similarly, the "Whisper-game" could produce much gayety by the garbled final result.

For small children an indoor favorite was "Hold fast all I give you", by actually giving to only one a small object held between the palms, then each child in turn guesses who has what. Children loved it. For the other ages, one person is sent from the room. The others choose a word, or object, which the recalled "It" has to guess. The "clues" being "hot" if close to correct answer, or "cold" if "way-off."

Likewise, tiny-folk still delight in the nodding-game of "Grandmother Cunningham's dead, how did she die?" with answer, wave right hand from wrist as first reply of "Just So!" then left one, then right foot, and left foot and last of all (the former "replies" continuing thru-out to be in motion) nod the head, also. It's not as easy as it sounds, or seems. Try it!

Everyone plays "pat-a-cake" with babies - even older folk, and "This little pig went to market. . .", Touching wee toes, or fingers. There are variants of the jingle words. Probably those most frequently used include:

"This little pig went to market

This little pig stayed at home

This little pig had roast-beef, this little pig had none

or

This little pig had a marrow-bone, this little pig had none

or

This little pig had some corn, this little pig wants some

(then the tiniest toe or finger is)

This little pig cried wee-wee-wee, I ain't got none,

or

I want some

or

I couldn't get over the doorsill to get some."

"Three blind mice - Three blind mice - See how they run . . .
They all ran after the Farmer's Wife, Who cut off their tails
with a carving-knife . . .
Did you ever see such a sight in your life - as three blind mice?"

Another sing-song included:

"I'm in love with the Man-in-the-Moon

I'm going to marry Him soon. . .

Popular always was the old Roundel, one verse being:

"Go tell Aunt Dinah - go tell Aunt Dinah - go tell Aunt Dinah

Her old Grey Goose is dead

Died last night with a tooth-ache

Died last night with a tooth-ache

Died last night with a tooth-ache

Right in the back of her head."

To teach a wee one the fingers' difference, touch in turn the thumb, then each one in sequence saying as each is touched . . .

"This one's TOM THUMB

This one's BASE BODKINS

This one's LONG LANKINS

This one's JACK JENKINS

and

This one is WILLY WINKINGS."

Another use for nimble fingers was to stick a bit of paper onto the nail of the index-finger, holding the other fingers and thumb closed. Lift the hand to the shoulder saying:

"This one flew East" and fold it under, extending quickly the long finger instead. When the hand is brought down, the bit of paper is of course concealed. Repeat and substitute the thumb saying: "This one flew West" concealing it and returning the forefinger with the bit-of-paper again visible, saying gayly: "This one flew over the cuckoo's nest." It is puzzling, if done well. Still another popular game for hands is that of the Church. . . made by lacing the fingers toward the palm, lifting the two index fingers to form a point and the two thumbs side-by-side, saying:

"This is the Church

This is the steeple (the pointed index fingers)

Open the doors (i.e. the thumbs, part them) exposing by turning up to see
thru the laced fingers.)

Here's all the people."

Another version of the bit of paper detail has an introduction as follows:

"Little Sally Walker

Sittin' in a saucer,

Rise Sally, rise

Wipe your weepin' eyes -
'cause

One flew East - one flew West, one flew over the

Cuckoo's nest

To bring to you

The one you love best."

At parties, perhaps today, in some areas, the "Pinning of the Donkey's Tail" while blindfolded and the "Farmer in the Dell" type of games survive.

The latter had a sing-song that required a number of players to be effective:

"The Farmer in the Dell, the Farmer in the Dell,

Heigh-ho the derry oh, the Farmer in the Dell.

(While this is being sung, the "Farmer" is to be standing
in the center of encircling group)

"The Farmer takes a wife, the Farmer takes a wife"

High-ho the derry oh, the Farmer takes a wife.

(He chooses one from the encircling group)

The choosing of son, daughter, cat, dog, etc., continues

(To all are chosen and facing in the reverse of the facing at first,
holding hands, end with a final "Heigh-ho" Chorus, circling.

Apparently this was a version of "Drop the Handkerchief" yet not as complicated as the "Christmas game" or the House that Jack Build", tho all are of a similar pattern, the latter two being more complicated because of the repetition of former lines. Usually no two players saying the lines are in unison. The Christmas one, not often remembered, follows:

(1st round) all say (each line being the succeeding round)

"A good fat hen

Two ducks and a good fat hen

Three plump partridges, two ducks and a good fat hen

Four squealing wild geese, 3 plump partridges, etc.

Five hundred limerick oysters, 4 squealing wild geese, etc. (Cont'd.)

Six pairs of Don Alphonso Tweezers, 500 limerick - etc.
 Seven hundred Macedonian Soldiers drawn up in rank
 and file ready for battle; 6 pair of Don Alphonso, etc.
 Eight cages of Heliogabulos Paraquets, 700 Macedonian, etc.
 Nine sympathetic, apathetic, diatetic propositions - 8 cages
 Ten helioscopic, stereoscopic Trans Atlantic views, 9 sympathetic,
 Eleven flat-bottomed Flu-boats, sailing from Madagascar to
 Penelope repeated from 1st as each above ---
 Twelve European Dancing-masters, going to Egypt to teach
 "The Mummies to dance at Pharoah's wedding."
 "With a heigh-ho-high-larry-oh- and a MERRY CHRISTMAS to ALL."

These gay, uninhibited games, ditties may or may not fall into the category of
 "folk-material." Be that as it may, they often have distinct therapeutic value
 because they can relieve tensions, especially in adults provided the "spirit-of-
 them" is entered into.

What could be gayer than:
 "A tisket, a tasket
 A red and yellow Basket..." or
 or
 "Doodle-bug - doodle-bug
 Fly away home
 Your house is on fire
 Yore Chillen all alone."
 Fly away home."

"Rock-a-bye baby- in the tree-top
 When the wind blows
 The cradle will rock
 When the limb breaks
 The cradle will fall
 Down will come Baby
 Cradle and all."

(This is probably a variant of the bit of paper on the finger) Altho some say it
 was taking a twig and stirring the hole-in-the-ground home of a doodle-bug.
 Who knows?

Mrs. Thema Barber Smith told of the fun to have with the following silly rhyme,
 one almost totally lacking in "common-sense."

"Oh - be she went?
 Oh, be she gone?
 Oh she left I all alone?
 Oh cruel Fate, to be so blind, Thou wast too unkind
 To take her fore, and Leave I hind.
 It can NOT was."

She also repeated the following Mississippi Lullaby:

"Go to sleep Little Baby
 Go to sleep Little Baby
 When you wake - you shall have
 All these pretty little horses-
 Black-and bay- an' a bob-tailed grey."

Everyone knows the classic Texas Song: "I've been working on the railroad
 All the live-long day . . .

Does anyone, except the professional ice-skaters, play the strenuous "Crack-the-
 whip" game? If so, it would have to be on play-grounds in order to have enough
 space.

Do boys fly kites, and shoot marbles? City-dwellers do not often see the old
 games being played.

What about somersaults and leap-frog? Is that, too, confined to professional
 "tumbler's"?

What games and sayings do you recall? Won't you share with us?

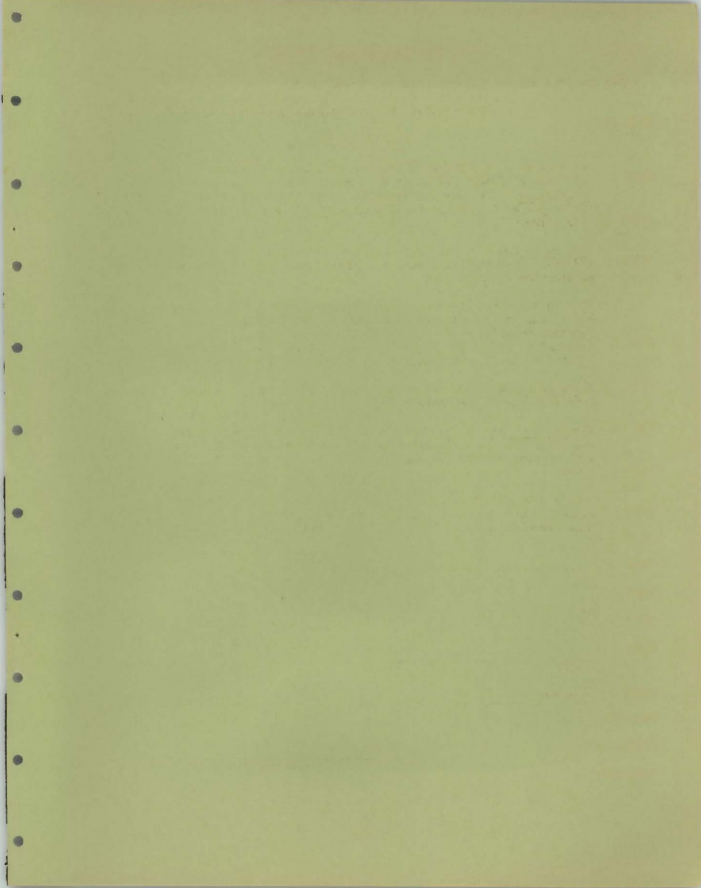
