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

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THE RECORDS OF AN EARLY TEXAS BAPTIST CHURCH

20 Oct. 1833 - Received the following 1837

The Church Book, belonging to the Pilgrim Predistinarean Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ

Items of genealogical interest extracted from the article as published in The Quarterly of the Texas State Historical Association, Vol. XI., No. 2., October, 1907. Short quotation from the Footnotes originally written by Mr. George P. Garrison, Editor, of The Quarterly of the Texas State Historical Association.

Brief background information from a Footnote: The church to which refers the document here printed in part is still in existence, its present location being mear Eikhart, Anderson County. It is probably the first Baptist Church of Texas. The enumeration of Baptists in Texas in 1837 by Rev. Z. N. Morrell (Flowers and Pruites, 72), indicates that if there was an earlier organized church of this faith it must have been the congregation of "Primitive Baptists" on the Colorado mear Bastrop, the pastor of which was Abner Smith. H. H. Bancroft (North Mexican States and Texas, 11 547) attributes to Morrell the statement that in 1837 began the existence of the first church in Texas organized "on strictly gospel principles," and adds that he meant the first Baptist church. But Morrell's own expression (Flowers and Fruites, 77) "with on anti-missionary element in its body," shows that he meant the first Missionary Baptist Church. The "Pilgrim" church,

Daniel Parker, who organized the "Pilgrim" church, and whose name appears so frequently in the record, was born in Culpepper County, Virginia. In 1832 Mr. Parker visited Texas. According to his construction of the Mexican law, it forbade the organization of a Protestant church in Texas, but not the immigration of such a church already organized. He therefore, organized the "Pilgrim" church in Illinois, and then the members moved to Texas, retaining their organization.

The Constitution was adopted and the church officially organized on the 26th day of July 1833, Lamlt (Lamotte) Crawford County, Ill. August 11th, 1835. The Pilgrim Church of Predistinarian Regular Baptists set at the house of Elder Daniel Parker, Crawford County, Illinois and in order proseded to business Elder D. Parker moderator.

October 20, 1833. Clayburn Parish, State of Louisiana. The Pilgrim Church etc. in her travail, conveened on the campground, and in order Proseded to buseness.

Saturday January 20th, 1834. Texas, Austin's Colliney. The Church met according to a previous arrangement at the House of Elder Daniel Parker's and in order Proseded to business Elder G. Greenwood Clerk Protem. (Various entries mention Shelby Country, Texas as a meeting place.)

During the early 1840's, this church is sometimes historically mentioned "as the only other prominent community some fifteen miles from Ft. Houston", in what is now Anderson County, Texas.

Saturday December 8th 1838. The Church met in order, appointed Bro. John Parker Clerk Protem, and poseded.

1st. Agreed: That, "Mereas, The Church agreed, at the June meeting 1838 That she would hold two church meetings in each month and one of them to be held at this place (School House Lathems, Settlement Shelby County Texas) or where the members in reach of this Place may think most convenient for them and that a clerk should be apointed to serve the church as her meetings in this settlement, as an assistant Clerk to the Principle Clerk of the Church. Whose duty it should be to make returns of the proceedings of the Church at this Place to the principle Clerk of the thore, and the duty of the church at this Place to the principle Clerk of the Church, as off as opertunity would permit at least every twelve months, and it was made the duty of the principle Clerk to report the same to the Church at her former regular Place of holding the Church meetings (Houston County Texas) and record the same in order in the Church Rook.

Saturday, November 7, 1840. The Church met and in order proseded to business. Dear Brethren. (Elder Daniel Parkrer) In accordance with the duty enjoined on me by this Church and the authority which she has invested in me I did, with the assistence of Brethren John Grigsby, Isaac Parker and Elder Allin Samuel in councel, Proceed on the 22nd day of October, 1840 to constitute a church in Fort Houston in Houston County - on the articals of Faith that this church is united on known by the name of the Regular Baptist Church at Fort Houston, and gave up fore members of this church to said constitution, Stephen Crist, Annay Crist, Anney Falkenburg and Elizebeth Frost as formeloy, by now (Delap) and I have also given letters of Dismission to Brother James Jorden and Sister Lucindy Parker with the assistence in Part of Elders Greenwood and Brittian.

THO PLONEERS OF BALLAS COUNTY JOHN JACKSON - BENJAMIN J. HUNTER Contributed by Bereniece Jackson Bonner 3317 Lovers Lane, Dallas, Texas - 75225

The early pioneer settlement of what is now Dallas county took place during the years 1841 to 1850. This period was ushered in by the first survey of the area, 1840-1841, ordered by the Republic of Texas to provide new land for Veterans of the Mexican Warr. Deputy Warren A. Ferris and others laid off blocks in then the county of Nacogdoches, but the land surveyed stretched along the banks of the Trinity river, § extended upward in two arm-like lines toward present Bachman Lake on the west § along the route of White Rock Creek on the east. By no means did it cover the entire area of present Dallas County known today.

The year 1841 is memorable for two events. It marks the year John Neely Bryan threw up a rather crude lean-to on the banks of the Trinity, and became the first settler, but more important it was the year the Republic of Texas entered into an agreement with a Land Company at Louisville Ky. in a movement to bring settlers into the, "wilderness", as it was called. The terms of this Land Promotion scheme were changed time after time until around 1844 when Sam Houston saw better advantage for Texas. First efforts at settlement were frustrated by Indian troubles, but in 1844 settlers began to come in, pitching their tents & cabins at four places - Hord's Ridge near Oak Cliff, Preston Road, Dallas and Farmer's Branch. March 30, 1846 an area of 900 square miles, including the first and later surveys, was designed as the new county of Dallas.

When the "Two Pioneers", subjects of this sketch, came to Ballas County in 1848 \S 1849 respectively, as yet there was no permanent county seat. A dispute was going on as to the advisability of placing the important county center of activity at one of the three more centrally located settlements. This was settled by vote and in 1850 the tiny village of Ballas was chosen.

JOHN JACKSON

JOHN JACKSON was by co-incident a native of Devonshire, England, the same area where the Peters family had resided for many years. William S. Peters, his brother and sons, including one Henry J. Peters were natives of Moodbury in Devon, England, but for several years had been residing in Louisville, ky., where they headed the Land Company attempting to colonize areas in Texas. It is a well known fact that in 1847 William S. Peters returned to England for a visit to his home, and there can be little doubt that JOHN JACKSON heard of "Peters Colony" from his neighbor.

JOHN JACKSON was born 1807 at Wray Barton, near Lustleigh in Devonshire county, Eng. He married 1832 Mary Ann Amery, born 1806. By 1848 John and Mary Ann Jackson were the parents of nine children. They were not too contented as tenants of John Jackson's elder brother, who was the first born son of George Jackson, and who by English custom had inherited the family estate in its entirety. Mary Ann Amery, wife of John Jackson, was the daughter of John Amery whose estate had descended to him after many generations, back to 1620 -"the visitation". The future of John Jackson seemed anything but bright for his family. He wanted landhis wins fulfilled. Sight unseen, John Jackson bought of Peters, 640 acres at 50¢ per acre, in Peters Colony of Texas and determined to go to Stewartsville, Tex., the headquarters of the company to claim his land.

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March of 1848, John Jackson, his wife and nine children took passage on the ship, (Voyps Queen", at Liverpool, England to sait to America. Two facts were at yet unknown to him. First, he nor his wife were equipped to be pioneers of this new land, and second, that expiration date for his Certificate was to be July 4,1848.

The crossing by see consumed nine weeks during which voyage one child died and was buried at sea. After a hazardous sailing the family arrived at the Port of New Orleans, La. Unloading their possessions they sought transportation into the interior of Texas. They learned that unlike England there were no stage coaches nor other familiar modes of travel. Two hundred miles stretched between them and their destination, and to carry eight children with the possessions they had brought along, the only means of travel available was covered wagon drawn by a team of oxen. When John Jackson looked upon his newly bought shaky wagon and the six long-horned animals, he was but little less nervous than his frightened wife. She refused to take to the wagon, preferring to walk along with her babe in arms. After a few miles on the dirty, dusty trails, Mary Ann Jackson, overcome by exaustion, lost her determination and climbed in the wagon to join the children.

Eight days of slow travel, camping out nights, finally brought the family to Mount Pleasant in Titus county, each and every member striken with malaria fever. John Jackson was too ill to drive, so he rented an abandoned log cabin with dirt floor to use as a home and family hospital for the two months required to recuperate sufficiently in order to continue their journey. One little daughter had died of the fever and her lone grave was left behind, to the grief of the family.

Rounding up the oxen, they started again finally reaching Bonham were Indians were camped about the village in great numbers. Here they learned that the red man can be dangerous to travelers, especially so when unaccompanied by others. The family was weary so John Jackson decided to leave them at the village and ride alone to Stewartsville, get his claimed land secure some sort of home for them before bringing them out to the colony. Buying a pony, he dug into the "possessions", and pulled out a red harness and jocky saddle. This gives us our first insight into the expectations of John Jackson. Following the hounds in Texas! How ridiculus!

By now it was mid-August and humid and hot as Texas summers come. Riding all day, he came upon one lone cabin at dusk, asking shelter for the night. Early the next morning he rode on and on until he approached another cabin. Stopping to ask the directions to Stewartsville, the lone occupant replied "this it." There was no village here but he was told that just southward he could reach "Farmers Branch." a settlement of about eighteen families. Here he met up with two men who had accompanied him on the voyage of the "Gyps Queen", namely, Lionel Simpson and Joseph Hildreth. He received lodging but also the bad news that his Patent date had exired surved sources and the set of the start of

The settlers hearing of his plight advised him to seek out William M. Cochran, an influential man in the Legislature. This kind soul took up his cause, contacted a fellow Legislator of Titus county who was familiar with his forced delay at Mt. Pleasant, and together these two men through a Special Act of the Legislature, were able to get his claim renewed. Selecting 640 acres near Trinity Mills, and about 34 miles north of present day Carrollton, Freas, John Jackson had provide 12/14 foot cabin for temporary use on a plot about two miles dmilt or their new his land. He returned immediately to Bonham to bring out his faily to their new home.

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With help of the two eldest sons, who were still in their early teens, he began the unfamiliar task of cutting timber into strips to use as a fence to enclose a stock pen, and garden plot. These rails had to be hauled the two miles each day over the prairie, to their land. Loading the wagon pulled by oxen, they would set a few rails, return home at night and resume the system the following day.

Cleared land was scarce and each settler meeded all he could get. Only through the charity and generosity of the settlers was John Jackson able to rent three acres to sow in wheat and six acres for corn. He rode to Red River to buy corn, sowed his wheat and then with ome of his neighbors started to south Texas to buy cattle. They drove back thirty head, eighteen for Jackson and twelve for the friend. These were bought at \$3.50 per head, \$7.00 for cow and caif. A permanent log home was started on his land but winter was approaching and the work was slow. Snow and sleet set in and for three weeks the family was fored to stay huddled in the small rented log cabin, a structure not leak-proof. Food was scarce and that first winter only wild game, hand ground meal and milk made up their dier.

John Jackson and his frail wife were tested to full endurance that first year. To tell the truth there were times they longed for England, where all was at least comfortable. They recalled the promises of Mr. Peters, that in this new land there was "terrnal sumshine, mild climate and perfect peace!" Only the promise of "good productive land" was to be realized. In the spring their first crop looked good, the cows increased and an abundance of milk and butter, was realized. The boys ancious to make money of their own, started riding into the village of Dallas selling butter to the natives. It is said the Jackson boys supplied the entire village with their wares for some time.

In 1860 John Jackson was able to increase his holdings to over 900 acres. The deed for additional land was signed by Gov. Sam Houston, and this document has come down in the family § presently in the possession of his grandson. With help of his sons, John Jackson soon had the largest fenced farm in north Dallas. By hard labor and persistence he earned the title of a "Prosperous farmer and cattleman."

A look on the "Official Map used in the General Land Office of Texas", will reveal John Jackson's Patent, bearing his name. A look on present day map of Dallas will reveal Jackson Road & that it intersects Josey Lane. At this spot stood the old Jackson homestead. In this log home John Jackson lived eighteen years, until his death in 1866. Breaking a long tradition in the family, he left equal shares, 160 acres to each of his four sons, three of whom were then married and living on already acquired large farms. Only the youngest, Frank, was unmarried so to him John Jackson left the part of his estate on which the home was located in order for his widow to remain in her surroundings to be cired for by this last son.

Frank Jackson married in 1867 bringing his bride, Elizabeth Hunter to live in the Jackson home, but after a few years he built a more pretentious dwelling on an adjacent tract. This new home built of sound old cypress hauled from Jefferson Texas, was joined by wooden pegs, and rested on sills of hewn logs. First a single story, later it was enlarged, a story added and tall white columns flanked the front porch. Each room had a fireplace and to the family the most interesting item in the home was the newel-post for the statiway. Carved of heavy walnut this was among the "possessions" brought over on the "Gypsy Queen" from England. It represented the high hopes of Johm and Mary Ann Jackson for a home of respectful appearance, and dignity - a home the imigrant did not live to see. We can imagine that as Mary Ann Amery Jackson looking upon this newel-post, used by her son in his comfortable new home felt a sense of fulfillment, but at the same time sentimental longing for her lost pioneer husband, and a sad wish that he too could enjoy it as a symbol of delayed affluence.

Mary Ann Jackson lived many years in her sons home, but in late life moved into Dallas to be with her daughter, Mrs. William Furneaux, where she died at age 86, in 1894.

The seven children of John and Mary Ann Jackson, lived to time of maturity in Dallas and all but one married into Dallas county families. The City Directory, today contains the name of many descendants.

JOHN JACKSON, eldest son married twice (1) to Caroline Perry a meighbor, and in their home, the parlor was used as a private school for children in the neighborhood. (2) to Nellie Guy, an English girl, daughter of one of the early settlers.

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WILLIAM JACKSON, Captain of a Company of Civil War Volunteers, married Martha, daughter of Chief Harris of the Cherokee Nation, moving to Okla.

GEORGE JACKSON, Civil War Vet. author in 1908 of "SIXTY YEARS IN TEXAS" a book from which much material in this sketch is drawn, married Lydia Jackson.

FRANK JACKSON, born May 6, 1844, Civil War Vet. married 1867 Elizabeth Hunter, daughter of Lenoir Hunter & grand daughter of BEN HUNTER, one of the "Thoy Dioneers of Ballas County", subject of this sketch.

MARY ANN JACKSON, married W. R. Dudley FANNY JACKSON, married William Furneaux. SUSAN JACKSON, married James H. Mathis.

BENJAMIN HUNTER to Dallas County 1849

BENJAMIN JAMES HUNTER was born Oct. 3, 1796 in North Carolina. In early manhood he moved to Warren Co., Tenn., where August 27, 1818 he married the widow, Elizabeth Shell Weaver, who had a daughter. Thurza born in Tenn. July 27, 1815.

1829 Ben Hunter joined other Tennesseans on a trek to the newly opened up county of Shelby Illinois. This area was still known as "North West Territory". By 1830, according to the county history, Ben Hunter was established on land situated on the old Springfield road, operating a tavern, later called, "the famous HUNTEN'S TAVERW". Being the most popular holstery in west Illinois did not stamp it as famous, but the fact Abraham Lincoln made it his resting place, where he stopped to feed his horse § give him fresh drinking water, caused Hunter's Tavern to be written up in histories. It is said Abe spent many a night with Ben Hunter when he was a young traveling Attorney.

While residing in Shelby Co., Ill., two of Ben Hunter's children married, as did his step-daughter.

SENA HUNTER m 6/22/1836 John Moore Kemper LENOIR HUNTER m.9/19/1844 Harriett Cutler THURZA WEAVER m 11/20/1833 Issac P. Johnston (later pioneer of Dallas)

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Land records of Shelbyville III. give the location of his land, but an Abstract owned by the present occupant of his land tells more. Mrs. Bertha Southern now lives on the old Tavern site and tells her story.

"BENJAMIN HUNTER homestead 80 acres first May 12, 1835, then he homestead40 acres Aug. 25, 1836. He had been living on the land long before. Ben Hunter joined by his wife, Elizabeth, his son Lenoir and his wife, Harriett, sold the land to J. J. Oliver and his wife, Sally on Dec. 4, 1847. My father bought it from Oliver and I inherited the 80 acres where the Tavern stood. Our garden covers the site. My father said it burned down & I know we have found old money while working in the garden. Mr. Lincoln came along this road on the Stage Coach from Springfield to Shelbyville & Vandalia. He alvays watered his horses and rested under the loccust trees in what is now our front yard."

In 1849 many people were leaving Illinois to go south and west. Newly opened land in Louisiana, Arkanass and Texas beckoned, and the rush to California in search for gold was sensational. Ben Hunter and wife, with the family of their son, Lenoir, left Illinois this year for Texas. Lenoir kept a diary of the trip, writing each days experience on the flyleaf of a book. This account is preserved by his grand daughter, Mrs. Reginal Burrows of Houston, Texas. It reads:

"B. J. Hunter family left Shelbyville III, March 20, 1849 Arrived at St. Louis, Mo. March 28; left St. Louis Mar. 30 on "Steamboat Mustang"; arrived St. Joseph Mo. April 9; Left St. Joseph May 1; Arrived Cedar Springs, Dallas Co. June 21, 1849"

Immediately Ben Hunter bought land on White Rock Creek. His Deed Vol. 8. p.159 "July 31, 1849 Dallas, Texas - Deed - Morris Ferris to B. J. Hunter 320 acres on White Rock Creek, beginning north west corner of Survey #17, Wyche Survey & extending into the Houx block." (both these Surveys are on the 1841 Plat done by Marren A. Ferris)

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Dallas County census of 1850, 1860 and 1870 show Ben Hunter household, which contained the family of his son Lenoir living with him.

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From -"Dallas County -- A record of its Pioneers & Progress" p.55(Dallas Lib.)

"According to records of Lenoir Hunter, Ben Hunter and wife, they brought a cooking stove and store -brought carpet (Brussel) with them in 1849, which was the first carpet of the kind ever brought into Dallas Co. Ben Hunter also built the first saw mill, which was run by water power on White Rock Creek, near his home, which was the first bridge throw of having been built in Dallas Co."

An issue of, "The Dallas Herald", related that Lenoir Hunter and his father, Ben Hunter, built the first hotel, known as the "Old Crutchfield House".

During the early years of residence in Dallas Co., Ben Hunter farmed his 320 acre tract, but along with his son he was more interested in building. This may explain why he did not care to increase his acreage. A review of his life shows that at age 19 yrs. he had built a log office building on the public square at McMinnville, Tenn. in Warren Co., and after his marriage to Elizabeth Shell he helped his father-in-law run his mill on Collins River, and assisted his wife's Uncle run his well known, "William Martin Tavern", in Warren Co. These early experiences equipped him for building and business, rather than farming.

As he aged he turned over his work more and more to his son Lenoir Hunter, 1871 deeding 200 acres of the homestead to him. Deed - Vol. P. p 12 of Dallas Co. Five years later he died at his home on White Rock Creek. His wife, Elizabeth Hunter passed away Jan. 24, 1879. Both are buried in the "NcCrea Cemetery", just off Audelia Road in Dallas, Texas.

Lenoir Hunter, only son of Ben Hunter lived out his life in Dallas County. He died two years after the decease of his father. His widow, Harriett Cutler Hunter married later George Simpson. Harriet Simpson, nee Hunter died May 4, 1880 and is buried along side the graves of Ben & Elizabeth Hunter in the McCrea Cemetery. (See Cemetery Records of Dallas County)

Lenoir & Harriett Hunter were the parents of three children:

WILLIAM LENOIR HUNTER born in 111. April 23, 1847. m Frances Elizabeth Boardman ELIZABETH HUNTER, born Dallas, Tex. August 17, 1850 m 1867 FRANK JACKSON, son of the pioneer John Jackson

BENJAMIN JAMES HUNTER, Jr. born Dallas, Tex. Oct. 5, 1853 m. Louisa Jackson.

ELIZABETH HUNTER upon her marriage to FRANK JACKSON in 1867 moved over into the Carrollton area to live at the oid Jackson homestead with her husband and help care for her husband's mother, Mary Ann Amery Jackson. Her first three children were born in the oid Jackson home, but later she was provided a more impressive house, the large white two story home mentioned in the Jackson account. She and her husband, Frank Jackson resided on Jackson Road & Josey Lane for many years, until her eldest two sons bought them a new cotlage in the city of Dallas on Tremont Street, and moved them into town. Elizabeth Hunter Jackson died May 29, 1932, and her husband Frank Jackson died Jan. 7, 1936. Both are buried at "Cemetery Hill", now called "Hurneaux Cemetery" near Hebron, Texas. They rest along side the Jackson pioneer JGNN JACKSON & his wife, MARY ANN MERY JACKSON.

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EAST TEXAS LOSES ITS MOST UNIQUE CHARACTER.... Obituary of Reubin Alonzo Morris of Pittsburg, Texas.

In East Texas death has just summoned a veteran citizen whose like no generation of Texans from this time will look upon. It may be doubted if any period in Texas history has produced a more unique character than was the Reverand R. A. Morris, known to thousands of men and women in his section of the State and through all of Texas and the broad South as "Brother Lon". These will, as one, lament his passing.

Lon Morris was a rare combination of Banker and Preacher, robust, hearty and of seemingly tireless energy up to the autumn of his life, impressive as an exemplar of simple living who shared his wealth by contributing generously to worthy causes. Lon Morris College, which he founded at Jacksonville, Texas,

will stand as the chief memorial to the donor. But many other institutions and causes were beneficiaries of his philanthropy.

Texas has changed wholly since the day that marked the beginning of this business career of this interesting Texan who has passed to his reward. Conditions of this time could never develop another such as he was. He was the product of a period in the growth of Texas, a type so unusual that he would serve well as the main character in some realistic work which a new and more sympathetic Opie Read could write.

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Rev. R. A. (Lon) Morris had many such testimonials written about him at the time of his death in 1930. The Rev. Mr. Morris was the son of a pioneer family. His father and mother, the Rev. Samuel Sudder Morris and Mary Ann E. James Morris moved to Texas from near Atlanta, Georgia in 1848 and they settled near Marshall where "Lon" Morris was born Dec. 30, 1849. By 1851, his parents had moved into Cass County, Texas and began the arduous task of clearing the forest and opening a farm in the wilderness of East Texas. This farm was eleven miles from Linden, Texas and was known as the "Trial Farm".

The wife of Lon Morris, Mrs. Sallie Lula Ellington Morris was born Oct. 6, 1854 in Cass Co., Texas. She was the daughter of John J. and Fannie Ellington of Alabama. She was married to Lon Morris in Cass County, Texas, March 30, 1871. Seven children were born to them. She died in Quinlan, Texas May 16, 1923 while on a visit there with her niece. In her Obituary she is spoken of as a wonderful woman and a fine christian. Lon Morris College in Jacksonville. Texas has a Dormitory named for her..."Lula Morris Hall". Lula being the name she was always called.

Ira Lane Morris b. Davidson Co., N.C. April 17, 1825 lived to be 102 years old. His parents moved when he was 18 months old to DeKalb Co., Ga. and then to Marietta, Ga. When Ira L. was 14 years old he worked on the first railroad to be built in Georgia. He married at age 20, Miss Nancy J. Simms and the couple moved near Atlanta, Ga. where they lived for several years and then decided to move to Texas. They came to Cass Co., Texas in a one horse homemade wagon. Cass was called Buchanan County when they arrived there. In 1860 they moved to Wood County and in 1863 to Jefferson Texas Marion Co. from here to Upshur Co. and then to Comanche Co. In 1905, he married a second wife, at

age 84. She died 9-29-1914. His first wife, Nancy J. Simms had died years before.

V. AMOS GOODSELL was born 19 August 1780, married Harriett Sabin on 26 October 1809, the daughter of Jonathan and Mercy (Powers) Sabin: granddaughter of Nicholas and Mercy (Tillinghast) Powers and the great granddaughter of Elder Pardon Tillinghast who came from England to providence. Rhode Island in 1643 and is buried in that city. Amos Goodsell and his wife, Harriett (Sabine) Sabin, were born, raised and married in New Haven, Connecticut and later moved to Illinois in the spring of 1836. 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
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
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
