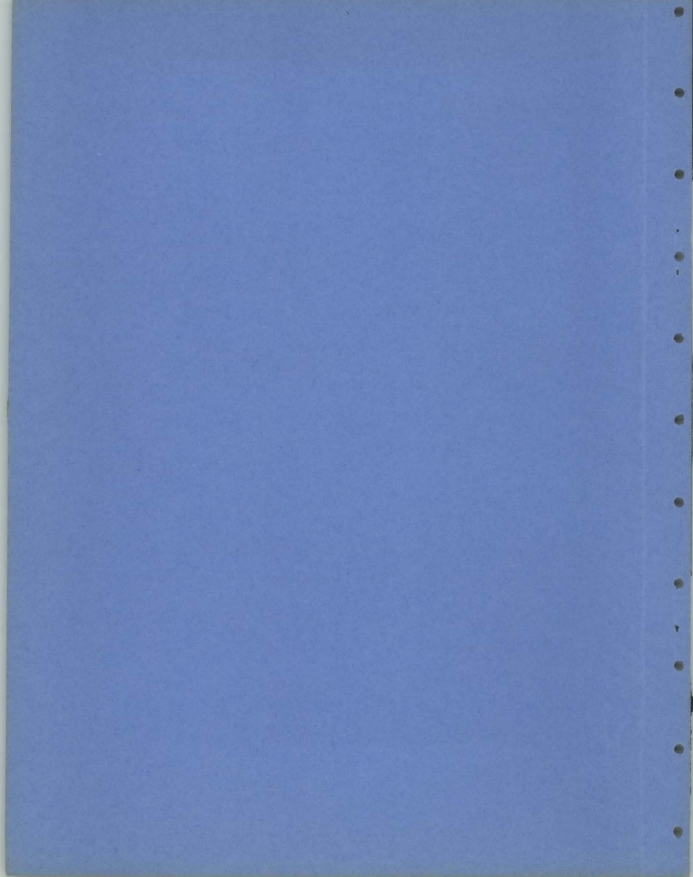

For example, Asea Henry, age 5, in Family 737 was born at sea; George Gratin, age 4, in Family 750 was born in Texas; Raphael Santerre, age 6, was born in France.

FROM THE MINUTE BOOK OF THE VIRGINIA COURT
HELD AT FT. DUNMORE FOR THE DISTRICT OF WEST AUGUSTA 1774-1776

December 6, 1774 Justices of Peace and Justices of the County Court were appointed as follows:

Silas Hart, James Lockhart, John Dickinson, John Christian, Daniel Smith, Archibald Alexander, John Poage, Felix Gilbert, Abraham Smith, Samuel McDowell, George Moffett, Sampson Matthews, Alexander McClenochan, William Bowyer, Matthew Harrison, George Matthews, Michael Bowyer, Alexander Robertson, John Gratton, John Hays, Thomas Hugart, James Craig, Elijah McClenochan, John Frogg, Jonah Davidson, William Tees, John Skidmore, George Croghan, John Campbell, John Connally, Edward Ward, Thomas Smallman, Dorsey Penticost, John Gibson, William Crawford, John Stephenson, John McCullough, John Cannon, George Vallindigram, Silas Hedge, David Shepherd, and William Goe, Gentlemen.

John Campbell, George Redman and Thomas Redman and Benjamin Renoe or any three of them, to view a road from Ft. Dunmore to Frederick Dinfields.

Upon petition of James Johnston, Edward Cook, Joseph Hill, Sr., Levy Stevens, Gilbert Simpson, Richard McMahon, John Decker, Paul Froman and James Innes to view a road from the road from Thomas Gists to Ft. Dunmore to Paul Fromans on Shirtees Creek by James Devore's ferry.

Feb. 22, 1775

Upon petition of Alex Douglas, William Crawford, Providence Mounce, Ezekial Hickman, Joseph Beeler, John Vanmetre, Morgan Morgan, Vincen Colvin, Henry Taylor, and Van Swaerengen are to view a road from Providence Mounce's mill by Ausberger's Ferry and thence to Catfish Camp.

Robert Henderson, Benjamin Kuykendall, John Robinson, and James Sullivan are to view a road from Ft. Dunmore to Becket's Fort.

Silas Dexter, Gabriel Cox, Richard McMahon, Benjamin Sweet, Robert Henderson are to view a road from Ft. Dunmore to Henry Heath's farm.

William Craig estate ordered administrated by Francis Brown and Patrick Elroy was sworn as deputy sheriff.

William Christy certified as Lt. of Pittsburg militia; Simon Girty as Lt.; Jacob Bousman as Ensign, John Connally, Major; David Steel, Ensign and George Ashton, Captain.

Paul Froman, Thomas Cook, Josiah Crawford, Jacob Long and Richard Crooke to view a road from Ft. Dunmore to Paul Froman.

Jacob Dorein was leaving for down the Ohio River and wanted a passport.

Ordered that the sheriff make use of the room in the fort now used as a guard room as a Goal for this part of the country, and also that John Campbell and Dorsey Penticost, Gentlemen, survey the prison bounds for the same, including the alley of the fort and 2 rods wide to the town.

The sheriff ordered to employ a workman to build a ducking stool at the confluence of the Ohio with the Monogahela.

Feb. 23, 1775

Henry Heath granted permission to operate a ferry on the Monogahela at his home plantation and he provided a boat for the ferry. William Lynn to operate a ferry on the Monogahela River from his house over the river to the land of Fras. Holls and that he provide boats. Michael Cresop also to operate a ferry on the Monogahela River at Redstone Fort to the land of Indian Peter and that he provide a boat. James Devore a ferry on the Monogahela River from his house over the rive to the mouth of Pidgeon Creek.

Constables appointed were: Christopher Turby, John Carpenter, Joshua Wright, Joseph Hill, Sr., John Hawthorn, Emson Brumfield, John Hardin, Jr., John Pettyjohn, John Warick, James Booth, Reeson Virgin, Ezekial Rose, Wm. Hawkins, James Taylor, Nathaniel Blackmore, James Murdough, James Young, Abraham Slover, John Bell, John Dousman, Andrew Robinson, Nicholas Higarthy, Barney Wistner, John Castleman, Elias Myers, Wm. Teagard, Jr., Joseph Erwin, John Nicholas, James Baird, Samuel Hinly, Moses Smith, Terry Moore, Michael Martin, Richard Wells and Garshom Hull.

Edward Armstrong and James Ryan, arrested for fighting in the courtyard, put in jail until they raise 1 pound 10 s security each.

Bills of sale from James Cumberford and Simon Butler to George Ashton approved by Valentine D'Alton, a witness.

Licenses for ordinaries granted to John Ormsby and Samuel Ewalt; Frederick Freee; Samuel Sample, and Jacob Bousman on the south side of the Monogahela River.

Will of Shedrich Muchmoor proved and widow Mary Muchmoor and Jonathan, 19 years, chose Thomas Smallman as his guardian.

Need date and place of death of Daniel Howell and wife, Annie POOL HOWELL. Daniel born ca. 1810 in Gallia County, Ohio. Lived in Macon and Piatt County, Illinois and Jasper County, Missouri, moved to Texas ca. 1880. Also need date and place of death of Mary Ann HOWELL WAGNER, wife of Christopher WAGNER. She was born ca. 1838 in Macon County, Illinois, moved to Texas. Will exchange Lowell L. Howell, Box 281, Buckner, Mo. 64016.

WILL OF THOMAS YOUNGER OF HALIFAX COUNTY, VIRGINIA

May 2, 1789

Submitted by Mrs. William T. Starr, 10215 North Lake Drive
Dallas, Texas 75218

In the name of God Amen. I, Thomas Younger of Halifax County in Virginia, Joiner, being in perfect health in body and perfect mind and memory, Thanks be given unto God, calling into mind the Mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed unto all men once to die, to make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say:

Principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hand of Almighty God who gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the descretion of my executors, nothing doubting at the resurrection I shall receive the same again by the might power of God, and, as touching such unholy estate wherewith it has pleased God to help me with in this life, I give, decree and dispose of the same in the following manner and form;

First, I give and bequeath unto Susanna, my beloved daughter, the half of the land on which I now dwell, together with plantation buildings, orchards and all improvements for her use and benefit during her natural life. Also a negro girl named Nell, two feather beds and furniture. The choice of two cows and calves, also three young steers, each a year older than the other and such necessary household furniture as is necessary to housekeeping.

Secondly, I give and bequeath unto my beloved son, Samuel the other half of the land on which I now dwell, to be divided from Light's Line northward by a direct line to my back line southward, which division I intended, God willing, to make in my lifetime, to have and to hold to his proper use and benefit during his natural life; and then to his male heirs lawfully begotten of his body. And in case he survives his sister, Susanna, then the other property of the land to be worked in him; and in case he die without issue, then his half to descend to his brother, James Younger and his heirs and my daughter Susanna's half after her decease and in case my son Samuel, leave no issue as foresaid, to descend to my son, Joseph Younger, and his heirs, male, lawfully begotten of his body. In turn, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Susanna, and my son, Samuel each a mare or horse fit for plantation business at their choice, and to my son Samuel, my bridle and saddle and choice of my two guns, and the land I bought of Dodson and his wife, to be at his own disposal during the life of the said Dodson's wife. Also a cow and a calf as also a feather bed and furniture.

Then to my beloved son, James Younger, I give and bequeath the sum of twenty pounds, current money of Virginia, to be raised out of my effects by my executor. But in case he fall heir according to the preceeding clause in my will, then this legacy to be void and to be divided among the survivors. Then I give and bequeath to my beloved son, Joseph Younger, if he ever make a demand thereof, the sum of twenty pounds, current money of Virginia, and on the same condition as mentioned above. Then I give and bequeath unto my son, Thomas Younger, if he ever make a demand thereof, the sum of five pounds, current money of Virginia. Then I give and bequeath unto my daughter, Mary Fretwell, if she ever demand it, the sum of five pounds as foresaid.

Then I give and bequeath unto my son, Jesse Younger (John) the sum of twenty

pounds current money of Virginia. Then I give and bequeath unto my son, William Younger, my work bench and bench tools, commonly called joiners tools, my lathes and turners tools and whipsaw.

Then I give and bequeath unto my daughters, viz, Elizabeth Legrand, Nanny Smallman, Katey Brown, Dolly Younger, Lucy Younger, Rebecca Younger, and Rachel Younger, the sum of twenty pounds, current money of Virginia; and in case any of the four that are now single and live with should decess without issue, then their part to be divided equally among the survivors; namely of these four, and so on to the last of them.

And I also by those present constitute and appoint my son, Samuel, and daughter, Susanna, Joint Executor and Executrix of this my last will and testament, and my will and desire is that there be no appraisal of any of my effects and that there be an absolute...on the demand of any of the legatees before name and in case of - and my executor and executrix see fit to sell my negro lad later; and my will and desire is that they, namely the executor and executrix give no security or incumberance to any person and that there be no such thing as going to law one with another; but, if any dispute or misunderstanding arise, to conclude it personally among themselves; or, at least to get some honest and disinterested man to arbitrate the difference for them.

And, if any of them will not be content with this, but would needs go to law, my will is that such person be deprived of the benefit of the legacy that was left them. My will and desire also is that my four daughters, last mentioned, that are now living with me, should live all together with my daughter, Susanne, and my son Samuel, until they are married; and I exhort them all to live in peace and love and to keep good order among themselves.

Further my will and meaning is that such things as I have willed to my daughter, Susanna, except the land on her decess, shall descend to the next eldest of the four single daughters now living with me, provided she be single. Otherwise, to the eldest that may be single. Also that my account on their benefit shall stand good against any of the legacies left to any of my children, only what I have bought of some or any of their estates, I leave to them and their children after them, and I do hereby notify and confirm this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness thereof I have hereby set my hand and seal this second day of May, one thousand, seven hundred and eighty-nine.

Signed, sealed, published, pronounced and declared by the said Thomas Younger as his last will and testament in the presence of us who he wishes present, and in the presence of each other, have hereunto ascribed our names.

At a court held for Halifax County the twenty-fourth day of October, 1791; The within written last will and testament of Thomas Younger was established into Court and proved by the oaths of two witnesses that subscribed it to be the act and will of the said Thomas Younger and was admitted to be recorded. And, on the motion of Samuel Younger and Susanna Younger, the Executor and Executrix, named in the said will, who made oath according to law certificate for obtaining a probate of the said estate was granted them in due form, thus giving bond and security whereupon they together with John Younger and Edward Bomar, their securities, ordered into and acknowledged bond for that purpose, according to law.

We definitely know from different sources in the Parish Church Book that there were Williams in the following counties in the early and middle 1700's: Henrico, Cockburn (made one in 1733), late of West, Norfolk, Powhatan, Middlesex, New Kent, York, Lancaster, Southampton and Amherst.

Our problem was to find which of the Williams listed was our ancestor. We went to James County, North Carolina, the county in the early 1700's. The name of James County) North Carolina and Henry County, North Carolina. Williams was living there as early as 1701. And it is believed that he was there as early as 1725 since James Williams of James County, North Carolina, which is that the father Thomas, son of William, was born in James County in 1725. This is established in Cockburn's "Historical Sketches of the State of Tennessee," which is in the library of Congress, Washington, D.C.

In the court records of Henrico County, Virginia the names of Thomas Williams and William Williams appear in the years 1737-1738 inclusive. It appears that they were brothers.

THE WILLIAMSON FAMILY HISTORY

The Williamson family was one of the earliest in Virginia, and although their descendants did not crowd the "Hall of Fame" they certainly stayed afar from the "Dungeons of Dishonor." The vast majority of them led useful lives and propagated the United States with hardworking, respectable, civic-minded citizens.

In the book "Old Free State" by Bell, Volume II, page 375, it states that John Williamson came to Jamestown, Virginia in the middle 1600s. He was a direct descendent of Sir Joseph Williamson, Knight, who purchased a large estate of the Duke of Richmond in Kent, England, called Cobham Hall. This John Williamson married Catherine O'Brien Stewart. He was Secretary of State in England and the son of an English Clergyman. His son, John Williamson came to Virginia and settled opposite Jamestown and called his place Cobham

We definitely know from different Vestry Records in the Parish Church that there were Williamsons in the following counties in the early and middle 1700s:

Henrico, Goochland (Made out of Henrico in 1728), Isle of Wight, Norfolk, Powhattan, Middlesex, New Kent, King George, Hanover, Southampton and Amelia

Our problem was to find which of all the Williamsons listed was our ancestor who went to Rowan County, North Carolina. Our search in the Salisbury (County seat of Rowan County) Courthouse and Library records confirmed that William Williamson was living there as early as 1782. And it is believed that he was there as early as 1775 since Jesse Williamson of Newbern, Tennessee gave the information that his father Thomas, son of William, was born in Rowan County in 1775. This is established in Goodspeeds Publishing Company's "Men of Note of Tennessee" which is in the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C.

In the court records of Henrico County, Virginia the names of Thomas Williamson and William Williamson appear in the years 1727-1734 inclusively. It appears that they were brothers.

In the State Library in Raleigh, North Carolina I found in the book "Old Free State" that Thomas Williamson married Judith Fleming in 1730 in Virginia.

Since Fleming was definitely the middle name of two of our ancestors and the only real clue I had, I felt sure that my trail went back to Virginia.* Possibly Thomas named his son after his brother, William, as was done frequently in those days.

In the book "The Douglas Register - Goochland Wills 1750-1797," I felt I had found our William. There is a marriage record which lists the marriage of William Williamson and Ann Mayo 10/25/1763 and also John Williamson to Lucy Hog, 5/26/1765. I think this John must be the brother of William. In the Christening Records of the Douglas Register, it lists William and Ann as having a daughter, Martha, born 3/2/1767 and John and Lucy as having a boy, Elisha, born in 1767 and as having twins, Susannah and Benjamin born 2/16/1771. The fact that twins frequently are found in the Williamson family and that the names of John and Elisha appear in court records of Rowan County, North Carolina leaves the impression that this is our William and that both John and William Williamson and their families came to North Carolina at the same time. With this evidence in hand, I list our family tree as follows:

John Williamson: a descendent of the John Williamson of Cobham, Kent, England who settled opposite Jamestown in the middle 1600s married Rebecca Chamberlayne and lived at his plantation on Brook Road, Henrico County, on the North Side of James River and about five miles South of Richmond, Virginia. They had several children. Some of the names listed on the Vestry Records are Thomas, John, Cuthbert, Prudence, James, Richard, Samuel, Joseph (an idiot who died 1737). They were all members of Curls Church, Henrico Parish and John, Sr. (Known as Honest John) and Samuel were vestrymen. Later John Jr. was elected vestryman and Church Warden. At this church William Stith was Rector and kept the records. This William Stith was later President of William and Mary College and wrote the famous account of the "History and First Settlement of Jamestown, Virginia." Also listed were other first families of Virginia--The Randolphs, Chamberlaynes and Jeffersons.

Thomas, our ancestor, who married Judith Fleming, in a vestry meeting, October 18, 1735, offered to give land from his plantation on Brook Road for a new church as the membership was outgrowing the old church.

In a Vestry meeting in 1737 "Collector to receive five pounds of tobacco from every tithable person in parish toward new church at Williamsons." In December 1751 "John Williamson elected Church Warden and took oath. Wardens agree to repair and paint Church at Curls and do whatever necessary to Church at Richmond." Also agree to "raile church yard and to pail in a garden at the Gleabe."

In Richmond today is the mansion of Miss Amanda Williamson, "Brook Hill." Miss Williamson is a direct descendent of this Thomas Williamson.

Judith Fleming is a descendent of Sir Thomas Fleming, second son of Earl of Wigdon, Cavalier stock, who came to this country in 1616* and settled in New Kent County, Virginia. One of his descendents, Anna Fleming, is a direct ancestor of Dolly Madison. Again, this is according to "Old Free State."

* Our time did not allow us to go to Virginia, however, this information was verified from Henrico County Court Records found in the excellent Genealogical-Historical sections of the Dallas Library.

* Please note that this Fleming Ancestor was in America before the Mayflower landed.

Judith's father and mother were Thomas Fleming and Judith Tarleton (daughter of Stephen M. Tarleton). Their issue was as follows:

WILLIAM WILLIAMSON:

We definitely know that William Williamson was in Rowan County North Carolina in 1782 as his name appears in court records in that and later years. In the year 1784 he is on a list "return of Taxable Property in Captain Todd's Company" as being taxed for one hundred acres of land, one negro boy 14 years old, one negro girl, eight years old, three horses, one yearling colt and four cows." This property was toward South Yadkin River and near Second Creek in Rowan County, North Carolina. He is also shown to have purchased 250 acres on Third Creek, May 8, 1795 and 248 acres on Second Creek 1796. In 1786 he buys 250 acres on south side of Third Creek including house.

There were very few people in North Carolina before 1720-- maybe twenty or thirty families; however, migration started and the pioneers were a group of men and women, poor in goods, but rich in hope, who came by horse and oxen drawn vehicles and afoot from Pennsylvania, Virginia and Maryland. Scotch-Irish from Pennsylvania and Virginia were the first to occupy Rowan County in 1750. They settled in the Southern and Western parts of Rowan County. Later German immigrants followed the Scotch-Irish down the Wagon Road and settled in the Eastern section of Rowan County.

Our Williamson family was part of the "Third Creek Settlement," and like most North Carolina communities, the Third Creek Settlement was built around a church of the same name: "Third Creek Church." The church was a guiding light, but more than that represented the pulse and activities of the community. It is said that families would walk several miles over dusty trails from their homes to the church every Sunday. The women would walk barefoot to conserve their shoes and only after arriving at the church would they put them on, together with a clean apron and scarf that they had carried in their pockets. After church all would eat a lunch they brought and would then visit until evening services and then they would have their long trek home sans shoes and singing hymns.

Third Creek Church lying half way between Salisbury, the principal town in inland North Carolina and the Fourth Creek Settlement and Fort Dobbs (Now Statesville--30 miles to the west) was a center of learning as well as religion. The first schools were operated either privately or by the Church. It would be a hundred years before the establishment of public or free schools in North Carolina. There were instances of the Church operating elementary community schools without tuition charges. The Third Creek Church House probably served a double purpose. In it the children and young people of the community could receive the rudiments of a good secular education and on the Sabbath, Third Creek people could come together in the public worship of God.

The area was rich in land, good water, fine streams and other things which create a healthy environment for agriculture for home and plantations to make gracious living possible on the new frontier.

Dr. Jethro Rumble in his "History of Rowan County" published 1878-1888 wrote of his acquaintance with an elderly man who recalled the times "When the highlands between Fourth Creek and Third Creek were open prairie, covered with grass and wild peavines, and the wild deer would mingle with their herds of cattle as they grazed."

Dr. E. F. Rockwell, a professor in Davidson College, and at one time Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Statesville, described the country as follows:

When this country first came into their possession, it is represented as being most desirable land, very much like the famed prairies of the west, and altogether different in quality and appearance from which it now is. It was open and most clear of timber, so that the sight could reach a great distance. The undergrowth was kept down by the Indians burning it over so often. The bottoms were thick cane-brakes, and the hills and plains were covered with a natural growth of wild peavines, which furnished abundant pasture for stock of all kinds, which needed little attention even in winter. Buffaloes, wolves, bears, deer, panthers, etc., roamed through all the land, furnishing provisions for the early settlers as well as the savages. There are traditions connected with many spots where the ancestors of the present inhabitants saw immense herds of buffaloes.

It should not be assumed, however, that all the land was exactly as you would see it on the western plains today. Here and there were wooded areas, sometimes even great forests and giant trees.

Our family, like others who received the earliest land grants and made their home in the Third Creek Settlement were Scotch Irish. The term might carry the idea to some that these were descendants of marriages between Scot and Irish peoples. But such is not the case.

Our Scotch-Irish forebears had been transported by English Sovereigns from the Lowlands of Scotland to Ulster or North Ireland. The transplanting came about in this way. In the reigns of Queen Elizabeth I and James I, Ireland suffered greatly from rebellions, pestilence, and famine. These conditions decreased the population in the Province of Ulster to a large extent. This enabled King James to easily confiscate half a million acres in Ulster which at that time embraced nine counties. About the year 1610, James began to establish his ULSTER PLANTATION, moving large numbers of people from Scotland into counties of North

Ireland. The Scottish newcomers being thrifty, energetic, and skillful, soon made Ulster famous by its prosperity. The new inhabitants became extensive raisers of cattle and sheep, and they developed woolen and linen manufacturing on a large scale. This cut into English trade to such an extent that the British Government began to enact laws that made it difficult for the Scotch in North Ireland to market their products. Not only was life made hard for them economically, but they were also persecuted for their religious faith. "Under the first Test Act of 1704, Ulster Presbyterians were excluded from holding civil and military offices, from practicing law, or from teaching school, and were denied many other civil and religious rights." It was not surprising, therefore, that as opportunities opened for establishing homes in America, many came to this country. This movement has been called the Scotch-Irish Migration. "Between the years 1705 and 1775 five hundred thousand Scotch-Irish migrated to America." Many of these at first settled in Pennsylvania, later moving down through the Valley of Virginia, and at last settling in the fertile Piedmont section of the Carolinas. By 1750 this movement into western North Carolina was increasing at a rapid pace, many settling between the Yadkin and Catawba Rivers. "In a single winter more than a thousand Scotch-Irish wagons passed through the little village of Salisbury."*

There does not seem to be a marriage record of William Williamson in North Carolina. A lot of the early marriage records were lost or destroyed so he could have been married in North Carolina a second time.

In 1783 one of the wills of his neighbor was proved by William and Mary Williamson, so it appears that his wife at this time was named Mary. This could have been his second wife as so many women died in childbirth during this time. Moreover, his wife could have been named Mary Ann, using Mary as her legal name and called Ann.

William Williamson appears on the 1790 census in Rowan County as having 3 males in the household over 16 years of age, 3 males under 16, 5 females and two slaves. On the 1800 census there are two William Williamsons listed. On one there are only 2 males over 16, 2 females between 10 and 16, one female over 26 and under 45 and one female over 45, no slaves. The other William Williamson (who was probably his son) had 3 males under 10, one male between 10 and 16, one male between 16 and 26 and one male 45 or over, 4 slaves. The female portion is not readable.

I find several instances of a William Williamson being in the Revolutionary War. The name is listed on different muster rolls and pension lists of North Carolina. Of course, there were several William Williamsons in the Revolutionary War and I haven't proved positively that our William Williamson fought for the freedom of our country, but since he was in the right time and place and the right age, I feel sure that he is one of the Williamsons listed. I intend to check this out further. If this proves to be true everyone of us would be eligible for the Daughters of the American Revolution.

We find that William with (1) Ann Mayo (2) Mary _____ (or possibly Mary Ann Mayo) had 10 children. The issue from these (this?) marriages is listed below; however this may not be the correct order:

Martha Williamson

William Williamson, Jr.

Of the above we know the following:

Martha Williamson - Her name doesn't appear in North Carolina records, evidently died young.

William Williamson, Jr. - On February 5, 1810 William Williamson, Sr. lets William Williamson, Jr. (a blacksmith) both of Rowan County, N.C. have 250 acres on South Side of Third Creek were latter now lives for \$228.00. On March 14, 1821, Sheriff (on execution against William Williamson, Jr. for \$163.60) recovered and sold 250 acres on S/S of Third Creek. On July 27, 1821, William Williamson, Jr. sells 224 acres for \$700. (where he was living) Also, on same date Elisha Williamson and William Williamson sell two negroes, Brister and Bel for \$1000.

Note: Evidently William Williamson, Jr. sold out and moved away at this time.

Thomas Williamson - Married Mary Rachael Graham - Since this is our line of descent, you will find more on this later.

Elizabeth Williamson - Married David Rutherford January 22, 1802 and had the following children: James Rutherford, Thomas Rutherford, Mary Ann Rutherford, David Rutherford and William B. Rutherford. David Rutherford, Sr. died and Elizabeth married Joseph Gheen on March 7, 1822. William Williamson was made guardian of the Rutherford children when David Rutherford, Sr. died.

Sarah Williamson (called Sally) - Married David Moore on March 24, 1812. There is a David Moore listed in Pearson's Company in the War of 1812.

Ike Williamson - Nothing is known about him.

Pricey Williamson - never married. There is a note in the records at Salisbury, N.C. that Miss Pricey Williamson, whom everyone called Aunt Pricey, spent her life among relatives and finally died at Salisbury at the home of Mr. Sam Harrison and may be buried in Salisbury Cemetery.

Elisha Williamson - Must have died in 1821 as John Williamson gave bond of \$1000.00 as administrator of his estate.

Minta Williamson - Married James A. Steele, January 7, 1833 and settled in Carroll County, Tennessee.

John Fleming Williamson - Married Mary (Polly) Cowan, more on this later.

THOMAS WILLIAMSON AND MARY RACHAEL GRAHAM

We know that Thomas Williamson was born in 1775 in Rowan County, North

Carolina. On October 9, 1802 William Williamson let Thomas Williamson (both of Rowan County) have 248 acres on north side of Second Creek for 248 pounds. November 8, 1806 Thomas Williamson and wife Rachael let Thomas Cowan have 117 acres on north side of Withrows Creek on Rocking Knob for 170 pounds. Thomas Williamson married Mary Rachael Graham on May 24, 1804. They went to the historic Third Creek Presbyterian Church. (He is listed in book by John Kerr Fleming as having contributed to the new brick church on September 12, 1833). He was a farmer and had seven children. He died August 5, 1849 at 74 years of age. I have not located his grave.

Mary Rachael Graham: The first notation I found on Rachael Graham was in the Salisbury Court Records. It shows that November 10, 1787, James Marlin was appointed Guardian of Allen and Rachael Graham, orphans of Joseph Graham, deceased.

Joseph Graham was listed as early as 1768 with a wife named Agnes. I am not sure, however, if this is our Joseph Graham.

It is confusing, but there seemed to be two Joseph Grahams who died within a year of each other. One with minors Allen and Rachael (our ancestor) and the other with minors Agnes and Else.

In court records February 5, 1788, Joseph Graham left an estate of 800 pounds (approx. \$4,000.). Elizabeth Graham is appointed Guardian of Agnes and Else Graham, minor orphans of Joseph Graham.

Evidently Eleanor Graham was the mother or older sister of Rachael who died in 1793. In 1794 a suit ensued between James Marlin and the administrators of Joseph Graham's estate over the handling of the estate. The court set the value of the negroes for hire and allowed the sheriff to sell the estate and later in 1795 three negroes were sold for 296 pounds.

We know that Rachael "an English Lady" married Thomas Williamson May 24, 1804. Since the above seems to be the only record on her, it appears that she, her father and mother (or older sister) and brother Allen must have come from England to Rowan County around 1782-83 (probably to be with some relative—possibly the other Joseph, who could have been this Joseph's uncle.) After her father died in 1787 and mother or sister in 1793, she and her brother lived with relatives until she married. There is no other mention of Allen Graham in the records.

The children of Thomas Williamson and Mary Rachael Graham are as follows:

William Williamson: Born November 3, 1805-- died April 24, 1864 at age 59. He married Nancy Cozart December 10, 1828 and had three children: Calvin Williamson, Giles Williamson and Lydia Williamson. Nothing is known about where they lived.

Ellen G. Williamson: Born July 23, 1807 and died at 36 years of age April 28, 1843. She married Kinchen Elliott in Rowan County March 31, 1828 and had two children; Bud and Jesse Elliott. Nothing more is known of this family.

Mary Ann Williamson: Born March 16, 1810 and died in November 1849 at 38 years of age. She married John T. Steele, January 31, 1845. Nothing more is known of this family.

Joseph Williamson: Born August 27, 1812 and died November 14, 1826 at 14 years of age. Probably named for his mother's father.

John Williamson: Born March 7, 1815 and died December 10, 1842 at 27 years of age. He married Elmira D. Smith on November 25, 1841.

Thomas A. Williamson: Born November 20, 1817 and married Mary C. Hall January 12, 1842. They had 6 children; John Williamson, Jennie Williamson, Frank Williamson, Ed Williamson, Mary Williamson, and Tom Williamson. He is known to have been living 1 1/2 miles from Newbern, Tennessee in 1886.

*Jesse Franklin Williamson: Born February 23, 1823 and married his first cousin, Sarah Fleming Williamson. More about this later.

JOHN FLEMING WILLIAMSON AND MARY (POLLY) COWAN

We can follow John F. Williamson through his entire life. He was born May 24, 1790 in Rowan County, North Carolina and died May 2, 1872 in Newbern, Tennessee. He was a carpenter and cabinet maker by trade and made many of the lovely pieces of furniture now being used in the fine old homes in Salisbury, North Carolina at this time. He married Mary (Polly) Cowan (no date available-probably 1818) and they had ten children. He and his family attended Third Creek Church and he is listed in 1838 as one of the first trustees of Davidson College, Presbyterian ministerial school in North Carolina. Polly died before 1850 as he was listed on the 1850 Rowan County census as living in Salisbury with Neztine Pierce Williamson, a widow he married after Polly's death. At this time six of his children and two of the Widow Pierce's boys and a little girl, age 9, Elizabeth A. Little (possibly a grand-daughter of the Widow Pierce) were living with them. His real estate value was listed as \$500.00 at this time.

Incidentally, on the 1850 census there were 4,844 white males in Rowan County, 5058 white females and 1842 dwellings, 1868 families and 122 colored persons.

John Williamson and his family sold several tracts of land in Salisbury in 1845. In 1851 he sold two more tracts on Water Street (which is now Innes Street and a cross thoroughfare) and soon thereafter moved to Newbern, Tennessee. There are two versions of this: One being that he came first alone and went back for his family and the other being that he came bringing the family. At any rate, we know that several members of his family later resided in Dyer County, Tennessee and on the 1860 census he was living with his daughter Sarah and his nephew, Jesse Franklin Williamson. He was 70 years old at this time. He died May 8, 1872. His tombstone is in Center Church, 6 miles from Newbern

Mary (Polly) Cowan: The Cowans were some of the first people to arrive in Rowan County, North Carolina. They came from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. William, John and George Cowan are listed on court records as early as 1755. William Cowan, in 1760, received from the Earl of Granville 453 acres of land. He continued to buy land and on the Taxable list in 1797 he was a big landowner with numerous slaves. His will, is abstracted below:
