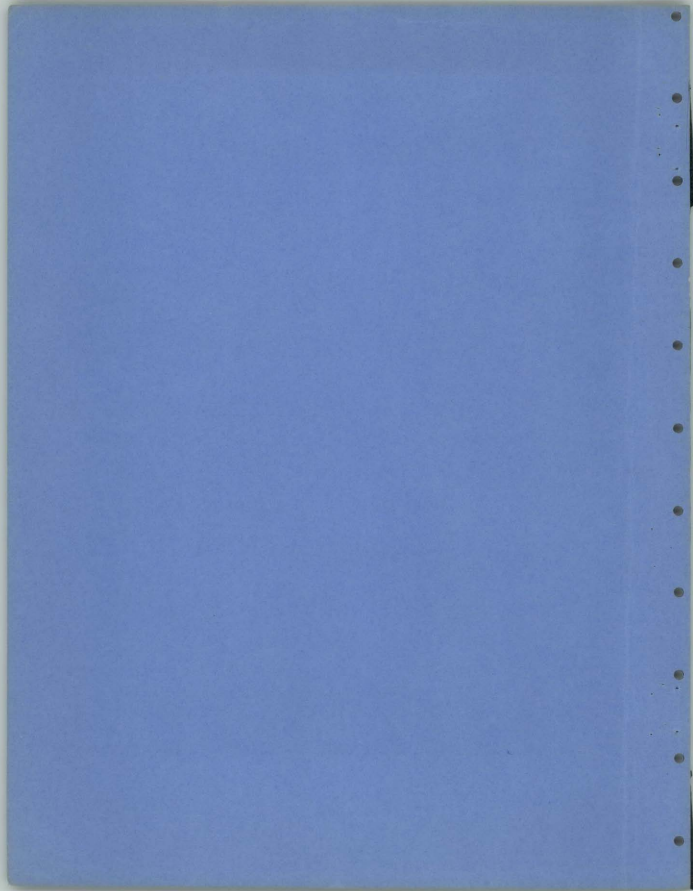

History of Lexington, Kentucky by G. W. Ranck (Henry Clay Press, Box 116, Lexington, Kentucky. Reprint of 1872 edition. \$10.95 pp.) The original is a very scarce book, though the Texas History and Genealogical Dept. has a copy. Mr. Ranck covered all possible subjects in Lexington with one exception. He has interesting paragraphs on some of the more important leaders. He covers the churches, the doctors, the banks, in chapters of varying lengths. The one subject he doesn't cover is the War, which was too recent in a border state to be written about without losing friends. If you are interested in Lexington, get it before it goes out of print again.

History of the Little Church on the Circle, Christ Church Parish, Indianapolis, 1837-1955. (Available from Christ Church, Indianapolis, Indiana.) This story of the first Episcopal Church in Indianapolis, is the story of that city and has much about the church in Indiana, as Christ Church became the Cathedral. The book is thoroughly researched and the author was able to find much interesting material to make the early days come alive. A number of fine pictures are included of the church, clergymen and some outstanding laymen. A good book for anyone, Episcopalian or otherwise, interested in the city of Indianapolis.

A Goodly Heritage, The Episcopal Church in Florida, 1821-1892 by John D. Cushman, Jr. (University of Florida Press, Gainesville, Fla. 1965.). When the Soundex Indexes of the 1880 censuses for the southern states were ordered by the Texas History and Genealogical Dept., Fla. was forgotten. This is a perfect indication of Florida's place in southern history. The Spanish and the English were the early settlers there, the American came late. There was much trouble with the Indians and soon after Florida gained its coveted statehood, it succeeded from the Union. Its history is most interesting but little known and not much written about. Besides being a thorough Episcopal history, this book gives much other information about Florida. Pictures and an excellent bibliography.

Lest We Forget. A Guide to Genealogical Research in the Nation's Capital, Compiled by June Andrew Babbel. (Published by Potomac Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, P.O. Box 89, Annandale, Virginia 22003, \$3.50). I don't know why writers give titles to their books that are of no help in knowing what a book is about. However, the sub-title is descriptive. The inner cover of this paper-bound 110 page book has a map of Washington, with arrows pointing to the main libraries. The first page has columns listing what these libraries are, where they are and when they are open. It gives detailed chapters on the National Archives, Library of Congress, Library of Congress Annex, the D.A.R. Library and the National Genealogical Society. Detailed information is given, including such tips as being able to take a tape-recorder into a certain room, or that you must register the serial number of your typewriter with the guard. It also lists the location of various groups of material, describes the different indexes. A must to read before going to Washington, D.C.

EARLY DAYS IN DALLAS

What I intend to tell today are some of the factors that have gone into making Dallas the great city it is today. Whenever I have given this little talk - and it is in no sense a scholarly work - someone always says "Why don't you go past 1910 and tell some of the interesting things that happened in the 20's, or 40's or 60's?" My reply is always "I am a lawyer's daughter and I am not to be rash enough to get involved with any eye witnesses". Some of those who hear me may remember the years before 1910, but may not want to admit it.

Dallas has always been unique. This was just as true in the early days as it is now. Probably our most outstanding feature is our dynamic, determined people - the wheeler-dealers. They made a city out of a village that had no assets that a half-dozen other communities of this area already had, except its people.

John Neely Bryan - Dallas's founder - was the first wheeler-dealer. He first came to Texas in 1839, crossing the Red River and following the lay of the land for 100 miles until he reached the three Forks of the Trinity. He noticed a small bluff above a natural river crossing. He took a piece of buckskin and with Indian paint wrote his name, attached it to a stake and drove it into the ground at the highest point on the bluff, approximately where Main Street crosses the railroad tracks at the Triple Underpass. Bryan returned to his home in Arkansas and two years later, in 1841, was back to stay.

The next settlers were the Beeman brothers who settled in 1842 on White Rock Creek, about three miles from Bryan. They raised the first crop in Dallas County. Also in 1842 Thomas Keenan settled on the Elm Fork of the Trinity near what is now Farmers Branch.

In 1843 Bryan married Margaret Beeman. He built for her the log cabin which now stands on the old Courthouse lawn. The Bryans used this log cabin for one winter. In it was held the first court in Dallas, and in it was born the first white child in Dallas. While living here, Bryan laid out the town of Dallas, made the first sale of town lots, and chose the name of the city. Bryan soon built a larger cabin, and the old cabin was moved upriver and set up, several times, until it was bought by Dr. R. C. Buckner, founder of the Orphan's Home, who presented it to the city. It was set up for the fifth time where it now stands on the square, which Bryan presented to the city, 100 yards from its original site. What other city has such a personal and intimate reminder of its early days?

Dallas was laid out in the spring of 1844. A town one-half mile square was planned and platted. It extended eight blocks from West to East, from now vanished Water St. by the old course of the Trinity to Poydras St. It reached ten blocks North to South, from McKinney to Young.

Oak Cliff began as Hord's Ridge in 1845. Judge William Hord settled on a square mile which is now the business section of Oak Cliff.

In 1845, at the time of Texas' annexation to the United States, Dallas had four families, two bachelors, one store and one saloon. Farmers' Branch was larger, having a grist mill and a blacksmith. Also in the area was a settlement called

Cedar Springs, about four miles north of Dallas where the new Tollway crosses Cedar Springs Road.

In 1846 things began to break for Dallas. Bryan was granted a ferry concession by the State of Texas. Two new stores opened; the owner of one became Dallas' first postmaster. His postoffice was a rough cotton container with pockets stitched into it, into which mail was sorted alphabetically. This hung on the wall, and people looked through the pockets themselves, so the Postmaster could continue helping his customers.

Also in 1846 the first hotel opened, the first private school began, and Dallas was named temporary County Seat after much politicking by Bryan. A 16ft. x 16 ft. cabin became the first court house, erected on the square donated by Bryan. It occupied one corner so it wouldn't interfere with Bryan's corn crop which was planted there! A larger building was erected when Dallas became the permanent County seat the following year.

A little about Dallas life in these very early years -- Here is a note from a traveler from the east about an 1844 journey to Dallas. They sailed down the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers to New Orleans and then on to Galveston. From there they went overland to Houston, confident of finding a boat to bring them up the Trinity. From Houston they went by wagon to Cincinnati, Texas; from there by flatboat to Fort Alabama, and the rest of the way on horseback.

There was one sewing machine in Dallas. All store goods came by ox wagon from Houston or Jefferson. Venison cost 3 cents a pound; a saddle of deer was 40 cents. The first cabins were log, and there was no window glass available. Clothes were of handwoven cloth or buckskin. Moccasins were the usual footwear. There was a weekly newspaper. By the early '50's, room and board at the leading inn was \$12.50 to \$15.00 per month.

The grist mill at Farmers Branch attracted farmers from as far away as 100 miles. As many as twenty-five wagons might be lined up to use the mill. The first social events were the old camp meetings, and the Masonic Lodge was established early.

Popular sports were horse races, dog fights, and cock fights in the pit of the Glen Lea saloon at Main and Murphy Streets. Boxers met regularly in back of Flanagan's Saloon, located where the Wilson Building now stands.

All types of people came to early Dallas. The men and women who came to find new homes and establish a decent way of life and a reputable business climate were only a small part of the total population. They were far outnumbered by the frontier riff-raff. A compromise was established -- each group left the other alone. But when things got completely out of hand at one or another "joint" a few of the solid citizens sent an agent to burn down the offender's place of business! Quite a frontier town, weren't we?

Dallas' first capitalist was Alexander Cockrell, who came to visit a cousin in 1845 and returned to live in 1847. He observed the stimulating effect on Dallas on becoming the County seat, and decided to invest in the city. For \$7000.00 he bought Bryan's Ferry concession and what remained unsold of his original town. (Bryan, who had begun to drink heavily, then faded from the Dallas scene.) Cockrell was the first man with a vision of what Dallas could be, and he set out to make it come true.

Cockrell first concern was that if Dallas was to become the center of the region it had to be easier to reach, especially from west of the Trinity. He obtained a franchise and built a toll bridge and causeway across the river. He built a sawmill and after cutting the bridge timbers, sold building material in 1857. He built an impressive three story brick hotel, spacious, with large rooms for public functions. Cockrell died in a duel in 1858 at age 38. Don't you wonder what he might have accomplished if he had had twenty years instead of only five?

In the fifties Dallas grew. Dallas County had more towns than any other Texas county, the weekly paper boasted. Actually, we were not much ahead of these others, except that the courthouse brought people here on public business.

In 1855 the French colony arrived. This was an experiment in a cooperative community - not communistic, I hasten to add. This idea of co-op living was quite popular in Europe, but failed everywhere it was tried, including Dallas. This French Colony, called LaReunion, settled on 2000 acres at what is now Cement City on Hampton Road, and began to farm. The land was poorly chosen for agriculture, and by 1860 many colonists had left. One hundred and sixty came to Dallas. From them we acquired much of the sophistication and culture of Dallas' early years. An orchestra leader and composer brought the first piano to Dallas. Others gave music, painting and dancing lessons. Others opened bakeries, breweries, butcher shops, millinery shops. Two distinguished American naturalists, Ball and Reverchon, trace their beginnings to the French Colony, which contributed much to Dallas.

To enter its third decade, Dallas had a spectacular fire in 1860. Only one building remained standing on the square. Abolitionists were suspected. One historian described the fire as "not so spectacular, but proportionately just as inconvenient" as the Chicago fire.

In the fall, national elections were held. Lincoln won. Throughout the South during that winter ran a high tide of feeling in favor of leaving the North to form a nation of the south. Dallas people were overwhelmingly in favor of secession. When war was declared, the young men rallied to the Southern cause. Fighting never came to Dallas, but the life and economy of the town were much affected by the war, as the North managed to cut the South off from the rest of the world.

Dallas felt the war most directly in reconstruction. The gloom and demoralization which settled over the South was felt in Dallas of course, but strangely enough, almost from the close of the war, Dallas grew steadily and regained its economic health, and was the only part of Texas to do so. Primarily, this growth was farmers who felt they couldn't make a living growing cotton without slave labor, saw the great wheat growing area around Dallas, and came here to live. In the seven years after the war, Dallas gained between two and three thousand people.

The lack of adequate transportation throttled Dallas both as a seller of cotton and wheat and as a buyer of building materials and other items. In 1867, a small steamboat navigated the Trinity carrying cargo, and a group of Dallas businessmen commissioned a steamboat of their own "The Sally Haynes". She made several hauls, was finally wrecked. This dream still lives 100 years later!!

Finally the railroad reached Dallas in 1872 - the Houston & Texas Central. Dallas wasn't big enough to induce the railroad to come all the way into the town, but obtained a promise for the tracks to pass one mile east. The small station was

quite near where Baylor Hospital now is. A gala celebration, featuring buffalo steaks, was held when the first train arrived. The terminal merchants, who moved from town to town as the tracks progressed, built a new town overnight on Elm Street between Record and Griffin. More than nine hundred buildings went up to accommodate these new people and businesses. Among these firms were Sanger Brothers, Padgett Brothers and Huey & Philp.

The Texas & Pacific arrived in 1873. At the same time railroad construction was halted because of a depression and panic which swept the whole country. For three years, the terminal was at Eagle Ford, six miles west of Dallas. Both railroads made Dallas the shipping and receiving point for everything west of the City. If the panic had come a few weeks later, Ft. Worth would have received this large volume of business.

A prime example of the wheeler-dealer aspect of the Dallas personality is the story of how Dallas got the T&P. The T&P was crossing the southern part of the U.S. (following the 32nd parallel). Somewhere along its route it would cross the H&TC and this junction was bound to create a flourishing city.

Dallas leaders could see that this point would be about fifty miles south of Dallas, but with the experience gained in dealing with the H&TC, they had learned the ins and outs of the legislative directive that charted the courses of railroads. They also knew that any direct attempt to put through a law in Austin diverting the T&P would be defeated. This was their strategy: In what is now City Park, there was a group of springs known as Browder Springs. The city fathers framed a rider to the railroad bill - which the Legislature was very anxious to pass so they could go home - which included, among other things, the stipulation that the T&P pass within one mile of Browder Springs. The bill was passed, the Legislature adjourned. The T&P found this rider later, and Browder Springs meant Dallas. They were upset, to say the least, and threatened to retaliate by building one mile South. Dallas quickly voted a \$100,000.00 bond issue and granted a broad right-of-way through Dallas - what is now Pacific Avenue. The meeting of the two railroads brought on a big expansion for Dallas.

A Western atmosphere was still very much a part of Dallas in the Seventies. Herds of cattle were driven through the streets as this was a good fording spot. Cowboys left their herds to graze and came to Dallas for diversion. There was plenty of it. Gambling halls and saloons lined Main St. from Houston to Austin Sts. and the southwest part of town was given over to dance halls. Over one hundred professional gamblers headquartered here. Often cowboys raced up and down the streets, firing their guns. Dallas was also the center of the buffalo skin trade and the largest buffalo skin market in the world.

Dallas also began to become a city. A gas plant was built and gaslights installed. A streetcar line was started. An iron bridge crossed the Trinity. A water system was installed and the first telephone installed.

Unfortunately, we didn't have a city's traffic plan - in fact, the only plan was to get traffic from the west through town and out to the H & TC station in East Dallas. There was no plan for radiating, well placed streets.

The principal Dallas Streets were then, as now, Elm, Main and Commerce. They were unpaved and extended only as far as Murphy St. Ross and Bryan Streets were country lanes. John Neely Bryan had envisioned a riverfront town like Memphis or Nashville. The prime residential area was to have been between the courthouse and the Trinity. Instead, homes were built to the north, along the road

to McKinney, which joined the Preston Road and the Cedar Spring Road. This addition was known as - you guessed it -- Caruth's Addition. William Caruth had bought the area bounded by Ross, Lamar, McKinney and Orange streets and had developed it.

The future growth of Dallas was affected by physical factors which had already formed in the 1870's. The railroads, with their lines through the city and their switch yards, blocked large areas from street crossings. Natural waterways had few good crossings. Fair Park formed a barrier. Cemeteries, both North and South, blocked large areas from street crossings. Also, there was no idea that Dallas would grow as it has. A separate town called East Dallas had been formed around the Houston & T.C. Station, and also other communities had sprung up in North and South Dallas. Their streets were laid out on a different axis from Dallas'. These caused innumerable problems where the city reached them.

With the railroads came the cotton buyers. Dallas was the center of the region producing the finest Texas cotton. Lower Elm St. became a curb cotton market. The newspaper reported that in 1874 Elm St. was a snow-white sea of cotton. By 1880, when 50,000 bales were brought in Dallas, most of this was stored on the streets. Finally a cotton exchange building was built at Commerce and Lamar to get the cotton market off the streets.

The church came to Dallas almost as soon as it was founded. Dallas has always been primarily Protestant, unlike the cities founded by the Spanish. The Methodist claim the first church, followed quickly by the Baptists, Christians, and Presbyterians. The first Catholic Mass was said in 1859, the first parish founded in 1872 and Ursuline Academy started in 1874. The Episcopalians arrived in 1860, and the well known Bishop Garrett arrived in 1874. His first official duty was to conduct a funeral for a man shot in the lobby of the hotel where this dignified English Bishop was staying. Bishop Garrett founded St. Mary's College in 1889.

Terrill School for Boys was formed in 1906 and was noted for combining frontier traditions with the strict discipline and the trimmings of the Eastern prep schools. The school proved so popular that a group of parents approached Headmaster Terrill about a similar school for girls and he suggested Miss Ela Hockaday to head it. Hockaday opened in 1913 at a site on Haskell where theYWCA's Proctor Hall now stands.

Public schools? The first State appropriations were made in 1841, but this was only a token which had to be extended by private subscriptions. Schools were not open all year. Finally, a City school tax and School Board were set up in the 80's. The development of new residential areas may be traced by the building of schools. The first ones were Cumberland Hill, still standing on North Akard; Travis, on McKinney Ave. where the Administration now is; Oak Grove, across from the Lone Star Gas Building; and the Columbian School, where Dallas Memorial Auditorium is. Crozier Tech occupies a site which has been a school site for ninety-five years.

During the 1880's, residential areas were added without any overall plan. Growth followed the old wagon roads. South Dallas, out Ervay St. was the old road to the ferry. Oak Lawn straddled the roads to Cedar Springs and McKinney. Ross was the longtime high and dry road to the ranches.

In 1886, T. L. Marsalis and his associates bought 2000 acres west of the Trinity

on a beautiful bluff overgrown with oak trees. What could they name it but Oak Cliff? Marsalis began to promote it as a residential suburb and a widely advertised auction of lots was held. Sales were better than anyone had expected, and Marsalis had someone bid privately for him to buy back some lots. One of his partners in this and in a wholesale grocery business, John S. Armstrong, was shocked at what he considered very poor business. He delivered and ultimatum to Marsalis -- "take either the groceries or the real estate, we are no longer partners." Marsalis took the lots and went broke. Mr. Armstrong later developed Highland Park.

Not many buildings dating back to the Seventies and the Eighties remain. There were impressive homes - showplaces before 1900, but not one remains the home of any family, much less its original family.

Dallas got a daily newspaper in 1885, The Dallas Morning News. This was a branch of the Galveston News founded in 1842. With the staff arriving from Galveston was Geo. B. Dealey who was largely responsible for what his newspaper became.

The Times-Herald was formed by two competitors of the News and when it passed into the hands Edwin J. Kiest in 1896, quickly established itself. However, in those first uncertain months, Kiest regularly pawned his gold watch for cash to meet his payroll.

Dallasites have always loved entertainment - fairs, theater, music! Field's Opera House, a small, poorly ventilated building, opened in 1873. There was no dressing room. Actors had to dress in their rooms in the Windsor Hotel, cross a covered bridge to the Exchange Hotel, enter a back room, climb out a window, cross a roof, enter another window of the Opera House which opened on the back of the stage. The process had to be repeated for each costume change! Fortunately for the arts in Dallas, several progressively larger and better equipped theaters followed Field's.

The State Fair began in the 80's, following three decades of County Fairs, although Fair Park didn't take on its present look until the 1930's, when it was almost entirely rebuilt for the Texas Centennial of 1936.

The Dallas Public Library opened in the 80's and was the scene of the first art exhibit. In 1900 it received a grant from Andrew Carnegie for a building, which served the city for almost sixty years.

Dallas achieved its goal of a University in 1915, when SMU opened with 706 students.

Probably the only time Dallas even partially lost faith in the future was during the panic of 1893. However, the City recovered with vigor. Oak Cliff became a part of Dallas in 1903, and five years later the Houston St. viaduct, now part of the Stemmons and Thornton Freeways, was built. This was the first roadway over the Trinity to be able to stand a real flood. About this same time Dallas first skyscraper - the fifteen story Praetorian Building - went up.

In 1910 the traffic picture was terrible. There were five railway stations, one for each railway serving Dallas. All were congested and outgrown. These railroads effectively cut off both South and North Dallas from any real growth because the grade crossings were so dangerous. The Trinity effectively cut off the West, because in flood time it became a raging torrent and a real

destroyer - this was before the levees were built. Dallas had grown out Ervay, Akard and Griffin Streets, rather like a tree growing in the crevices of a rock. Ervay and Akard met and ended at Ross. St. Paul was a series of short, unconnected streets. Harwood was crooked and narrow, with no North or South outlet. There was no Highland Park, no Munger Place, and Oak Cliff ended at Tyler Street. George Kessler was engaged to study the problem. His report was brought before the Park Board in 1911. Notable among his recommendations were that the railways be diverted from City Streets by belt lines around the city and a Union Station established. The Trinity needed levees. He gave a comprehensive plan for street widening, park and playground creation, and the elimination of grade crossings. Kessler's plan is primarily responsible for Dallas as it is today, although other planners came after him.

The Dallas philosophy is unchanged. It is aggressive, choosing its objectives after shrewd estimates of the probable direction of economic and social winds. The wheeler-dealers are still here, thank goodness.

Or perhaps we should quote from the Fort Worth Democrat these words of 1872. "The first thing Dallas children are taught to speak is 'HURRAH FOR DALLAS!'"

BENJAMIN C. LOGAN, who was born March 20, 1809, moved to Arkansas in 1818, died May 9, 1888.

Bro. Logan, when young, joined the C. P. Church but after marrying, became a member of M. E. Church South and remained an honored member of the same for 54 years, or until the end of his life.

The writer formed his acquaintance in Dec. 1885 a few months after the death of his beloved companion with whom he had lived half a century and more. From old age and bodily afflictions he has been confined almost entirely to the house for several years. He frequently spoke to the writer about the loneliness of his life since the death of his wife. He looked forward with anxiety and anticipation of great joy when God would call him to rejoin the dear wife and other loved ones. He seemed anxious to go, but was willing to wait and suffer the will of God.

It was a means of grace to see his patience and resignation to the Divine will and to talk with him about the glorious realities and prospects of the future. The dear old brother has entered upon these realities and it is easy for us to imagine the glorious greetings that were awaiting him on the other side.

Many friends were present at the funeral services which were held in the afternoon after his death, at CAROLINE Presbyterian Church; and we laid him away in the adjoining cemetery to await the general resurrection.

We think of his life here only with pleasure. His children have his good name as their inheritance, and "Oh! what a precious heritage; more to be desired than silver and gold."

My dear brethren and sisters, I gladly and confidentially commend you to the God of your father for grace and consolation. Thank God Heaven is growing brighter and more attractive. God help us to get there where we will meet wife and baby, Mother and Father and all the good and glorified.

The inscription on his tombstone reads:

SARAH H. LOGAN

SARAH H. LOGAN, wife of Benjamin C. Logan, departed this life Jan. 24, 1885. Sister Logan was a native of New Jersey. She had lived in Arkansas since 1828. In her 17th year she professed religion and joined the Church and lived a consistent Christian until called away to the Church Triumphant. In 1844-45 her home was one of my stopping places. Many times the writer enjoyed the hospitality of that Christian home. She and her husband succeeded in raising their children in great respectability.

They had been citizens of Clark County for 60 years. The wife has closed up a well rounded life and has left her aged companion to battle alone. It will not be long until a reunion will take place in that bright world where there will be no more parting.

Sister Logan was called away suddenly. She was preparing on Saturday for Sunday. Her husband hearing an unusual noise went to the cook-room door and discovered that she had fallen and was dead. She ceased at once to work and live. Bro. A. B. WINFIELD preached her funeral to a large concourse of citizens, called together out of respect to her memory.

Elizabeth Chambers was the only child of Jacob and Catherine Chambers Matthew Logan with his wife, five children and his wife's parents joined a caravan over a mile long, destined for Arkansas in 1817. They spent a year at Magnet Cove. Early in 1819 they moved down the Caddo river near the old Military Road Crossing. While there their horses were either stolen or ran away. Jacob Chambers and his oldest grandson, John C. Logan, a lad of 13 years went back to Magnet Cove in search of the horses. Failing to find them, they endeavored to return home by waters of Ouachita and Caddo rivers. They ran into a swift current where the two rivers converge and their boat capsized and there on May 10, 1819, the grandfather, Jacob Chambers, was drowned. The grandson swam ashore and carried the sad news home. The body was recovered and buried on the West side of the Ouachita River.

Matthew Logan served as sheriff at the first court in Clark Co. Ark. (This data supplied by Rev. George W. Logan, son of John Clark Logan.) Matthew Logan was appointed Coroner of Clark County. He died in 1820, leaving wife and 7 children. Elizabeth later married again on May 6, 1830 to George Overbaugh.

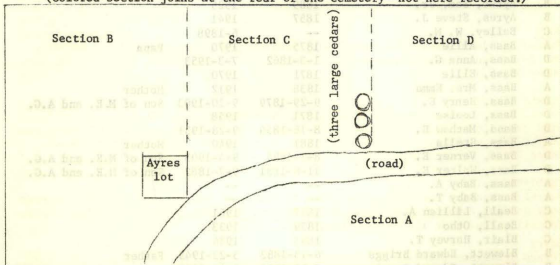
Hutchins Cemetery is located within the town of Hutchins, ten miles south of downtown Dallas, on Denton Road a few feet to the northwest of Lancaster-Hutchins Road. Graves in the central portion of the cemetery are irregularly laid out, being the older section which was in use before survey. Dallas County deed records (Book 241, pp. 390-91) contain a map of the original survey performed by Charles Archer in May 1895. The plat was adopted as official in March 1900 by Trustees of the Hutchins Cemetery--George H. Pangburn, J. I. Irwin and Joseph T. Brightwell-- in a resolution notarized by B. D. Atwell and recorded in company with the plat.

A number of graves are unmarked. The oldest marked graves begin 4-15-1878 with Dr. E. Elgan, followed on 5-11-1878 with Thomas L. Campbell and on 11-15-1880 with Orpah G. Campbell. The most recent burial prior to the conclusion of the reading of gravestones was that of Allie Bass, who died in June 1970 on the home place on which he was born at the age of 95 years.

Five persons buried in the plot were born prior to 1820: Orpah G. Campbell, 1811; B. A. Atwell, 1813; N. L. Ham, 1817; Malinda Pruitt, 1819; and Margaret Fisher, 1819.

The following diagram divides the cemetery into four sections as a means of showing comparative location of graves within the plot.

Hutchins is the hometown of the compiler, and the cemetery is the resting place of three of her grandparents-- D. L. Todd, Sarah Elizabeth Todd, and Sarah Ann Blewett.

THE STRACHAN FAMILY BIBLE

Records copied by Mrs. Eugenia Butler Toland and Mrs. Betty Harvey Butler from the Strachan Family Bible, now in the possession of Mrs. Maud Christian Dial of Big Sandy, Texas. There is no longer a Title Page, but the following appears between the Old and the New Testament:

The New Testament references by the late Rev John Brown, Minister of the Gospel at Haddington, New York. Printed by Hodges & Campbell and sold at their respective bookstores. M.DCC.XCII.

William Strachan was born on Sunday, the 30th of August, 1752 Old Stile.

Helena Bogert was born on Sunday, the 7th of Feb. 1768.

Ann Ferguson, mother of William Strachan, died Jan. the 2nd, 1786, aged 65 yrs.

Daniel Ferguson, her husband, died Oct. 13 1787, age 67 years.

Wm. Strachan and Helena Bogert was married by the Rev Mr. Myers at Preakness on Sunday the 24th day of March, 1782.

Alida, our first child was born on Monday morning 8 o'clock the 8th January, 1787 and was baptized by the Rev Dr. John Rogers the 4th of Feb. following.

On Monday, the 3rd day of November, 1788 was born our second child, a son which died the 6th, only 3 days old.

Ann our third child, was born on Friday evening 8 o'clock the 15th day of January, 1790 and was Baptized by Doctor Rogers the 21st February following.

William, our fourth child, was born on Tuesday Morning 6 o'clock the tenth day of January, 1792 and was Baptized by Dr. Rogers the 5th of February following.

David Ritzema, our fifth child, was born on Saturday between 12 and one o'clock (noon) the First day of March 1794 and was Baptized by Dr. McKnight the 30th of the same month.

Eliza Kermit, our Sixth Child, was born on Tuesday afternoon at five o'clock the twenty-third day of February, 1796, and was Baptized by the Rev Doctor McKnight on Monday the 28th of March following.

Helen, our Seventh child was born on Monday afternoon at five o'clock the twenty-third day of April, 1798 and died the 26th of June following.

Died at his house, No. 83rd Pearyl St. in the City of New York on Friday morning October 12th, 1798, a quarter after three o'clock of the prevailing fever, Capt Wm. Strachan, after a severe indisposition of six days. Aged forty six years one month and two days. His remains were decently interred in the old Presbyterian Church yard the same morning at half after five o'clock.

8. A posthumous son born 6th of May, 1799 and Baptized by Mr. Van Vanbrauken Nov. 21, 1799, Henry Kermit. Capt. Kermit and wife sponsors.

On Thursday 1/4 past seven o'clock, in the evening, June 20, 1799, died at The Hermitage, Beekman, in the house of her father, Helena Strachan, age 31 yrs 4 months and 13 days. Her remains were interred June 22, in Hopewell Church yard.

Henry Kermit Strachan died on Tuesday, March 11, 1800, at Beekman, age 10 months, 3 days - was interred on the following day in Hopewell Church yard in his Mother's grave.

Alida Strachan, died on Friday at 1/4 part of 12 o'clock 26th March 1813 and was interred in her Father's grave. Aged 26 yrs. 2 months and 18 days.

David R. Strachan - Died on Thursday the 20th October, 1848 at the Farm, of Saints Rest, Salt River Township, Shelby County, Missouri. Aged 52 yrs and 7 months.

W. B. Christian died March _____ 1862, 5 o'clock P.M.

David S. Anderson and Ann Strachan was married by the Rev James Rosmeyer at Hackensack on Monday 6th of May, 1816.

Samuel Cassidy and Eliza Kermit Strachan were married at St Michael's Church by the Rev W Jarvis on 20th Nov., 1816.

David R. Strachan and Hester Frazier were married by the Rev Mr Wm Smart at Ogdensburgh St Lawrence Co, on 13th Aug, 1817.

1. Helena Alida was born 13th Sept 1818 and was baptized by the Rev Mr. Clinton.
2. Hester Ann Elizabeth was born the 3 June 1820 and was christened by the Rev Mr. Clinton.
3. Wm. Ritzema was born 13 Dec. 1822 and was baptized by the Rev James McAuley

Died at Ogdensburgh Jan 15, 1827 at 8 o'clock P.M. Hester Strachan, aged 25 years 3 months 26 days.

David R. Strachan and Maria Matilda Young were married by the Rev Daniel Dervelle at the Brainerd Church on the 3 day of March 1834.

Letter written by Lieut. William Strachan while serving in the Second Artillery Regiment under the command of Col. John Lamb, New York, to his future father-in-law, Nicholas Bogert, Preakness, New Jersey. Letter is now in the possession of Robert K. Butler, a descendant of William Strachan.

Art'y Park February 14, 1781

Hon Sir,

Whilst writing to the younger part of the family I cannot help dedicating a line to you Sir and first then let me congratulate you on the most excellent news from the Southward, which I suppose your News Papers will tell you the particulars of, but least you may not see them so soon as this letter, I will transmit a few particulars. It was on the 17th day of January that the Brave General Morgan, with only eight hundred, defeated the Rash Col. Tarlton with one thousand, and pursued him upward of twenty miles. The following I took from a hand bill published by order of Congress, and the gentleman who had it was going on express to his excellency - The enemys loss 10 commissioned

and 100 rank and file killed, 29 commissioned and 500 privates prisoners, and 200 wounded - 2 pieces of artillery, 2 standards, 800 muskets, 1 traveling forge, 35 baggage waggons, 70 Negroes, 100 dragoon horses. Our loss only 12 killed and sixty wounded and they engaged with bayonets for a considerable time. May they always share the same fate is sincerely wished by the writer of these lines. When, my dear Sir, shall we live in our native place again. When shall War be done away with, and peace Sweet peace again bless our land. What a happiness will it be to us poor inhabitants of New York, when we all meet again. It is beyond conception. Therefore, shall not offer to point it out, but leave it to the period which I hope is not far off. For any thing new among us is not, peace & harmony seem to dwell, and tho not the best situated, yet I believe as contented as any other troops, but why trouble you any further, perhaps tired already. Well, Sir, I will quit after presenting my best respects to your worthy Partner in Life, to my little Nancy, Caty and in a word to the whole of your family. My best wishes attend and may every one of you experience happier times and live to enjoy all those pleasures which your minds can fancy. Especially enough of them to satisfy in the room of the many difficulties you have all encountered with. I shall not add, but remain tho at a distance the same as heretofore.

The Mayflower Society, which publishes an attractive Quarterly, is for those who had an ancestor on the Mayflower. If there is a book that you absolutely have to have and can not find through any of the usual ways, did you know that you can have a copy made for you by University Microfilms, Ann Arbor, Michigan? It is a long slow process for the company first gets permission (if possible) and then has to find a copy of the book you want. If you know where a copy is, this would possibly speed things up. The pages are printed on double pages; the book is neatly bound in a soft cover with a name label on the front. The price depends on the number of pages. It is not cheap, but it is cheaper than a very scarce or rare copy. Mrs. Boykin has several catalogs listing books already available without special search.

BY-LAWS - LOCAL HISTORY & GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, DALLAS, TEXAS
ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. Membership is open to any person interested in subscribing to the purpose of the Society, who submits a written application for membership to the Vice President in Charge of Membership, accompanied by payment of annual dues.
- Section 2. Membership shall be effective on a calendar year basis following acceptance of the membership application by the Vice President in Charge of Membership and/or acceptance of annual dues by the Treasurer.
- Section 3. Annual dues of one person or two persons within the same household who share one mailing of communications and publications of the Society shall be \$6.00 per annum payable before the 1st day of March. Dues received prior to September 1 shall be retroactive to January 1 with regard to publications. Dues received on or after September 1 shall be credited as the next year's dues. Should publications not be available to make the receipt of publications retroactive, then the dues shall be pro-rated on a quarterly basis at \$1.50 per quarter, and a refund made for publications not available.
- Section 4. With a contribution of \$9.00, along with the payment of \$6.00 annual dues, a member shall be recognized as a Sustaining Member for that year. With a contribution of \$19.00, along with the payment of \$6.00 annual dues, a member shall be recognized as a Patron Member for that year.
- Section 5. With a contribution of \$100.00, along with the payment of \$6.00 annual dues, a member shall become a Life Member of the Society, and shall thereafter be exempt from the payment of annual dues. During the life of the Life Member, the \$100.00 shall be placed on deposit in a Special Savings Account of the Society with the interest available in lieu of dues, for use by the Society. Upon the death of the Life Member, the \$100.00 shall accrue to the Society, to be used for such purpose as the Society shall direct. Should the Society be disbanded, the \$100.00 shall accrue to the general assets of the Society, to be disposed of as the Board of Directors direct.
- Section 6. An Honorary Membership of one year duration for some special service to the Society may be conferred by majority recommendation of the Board and majority vote of the membership in attendance at a meeting.
- Section 7. An Honorary Life Membership for outstanding service to the Society may be conferred by unanimous recommendation of the Board and majority vote of the membership in attendance at a meeting. An Honorary Life Member shall be exempt from the payment of annual dues.

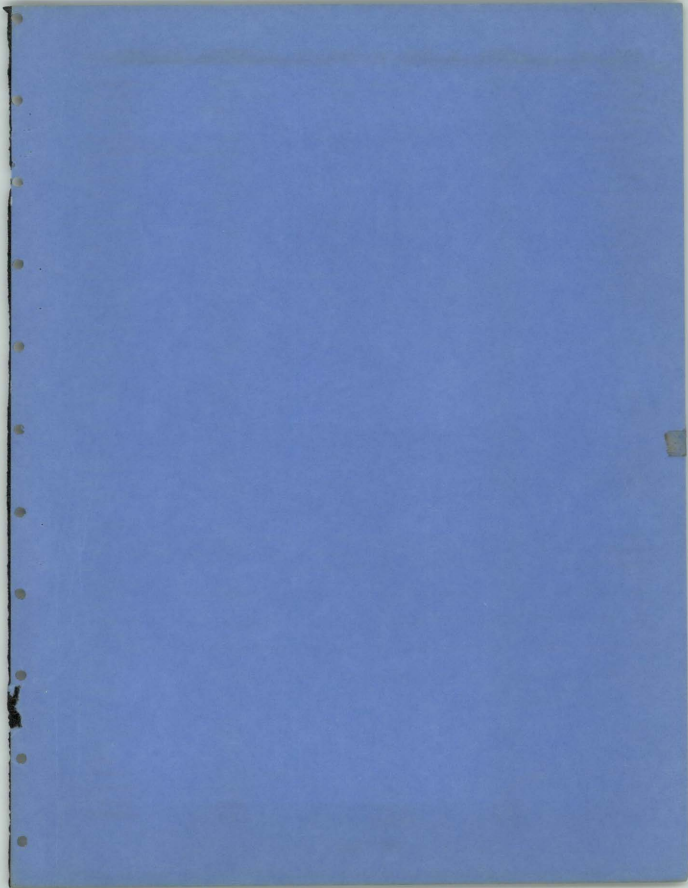
