

THE HISTORY

CHAPTER I

1. The early history of the town is shrouded in mystery. It is believed that the first settlers came here in the year 1630.

2. The first school was opened in 1700. It was a small building of log and was attended by about twenty children.

3. The first church was built in 1720. It was a simple wooden structure and was dedicated to the Holy Trinity.

4. The first mill was built in 1750. It was a water mill and was used for grinding grain.

5. The first bridge was built in 1780. It was a wooden bridge and was used for crossing the river.

6. The first schoolhouse was built in 1800. It was a two-story building and was used for teaching children.

7. The first newspaper was published in 1820. It was called the "Town Gazette" and was published weekly.

8. The first factory was built in 1850. It was a textile mill and was used for producing cloth.

9. The first railroad was built in 1880. It was a narrow-gauge railroad and was used for transporting goods.

HISTORY OF THE OLD TELEPHONE ROAD COMMUNITY,
COLLIN COUNTY, TEXAS

A century ago the dirt road now known as the Telephone Road in Collin County, Texas, was part of the stage coach route between Ft. Worth and Sherman. Along it many of Collin County's earliest settlers took up land. Old survey maps show the boundaries of their properties. When they died they were usually buried on their own land or in a nearby family cemetery. Some of these cemeteries have grown and are still in use. Others are small and almost lost in relatively inaccessible wooded areas.


Telephone Road begins on the north edge of McKinney. For several miles going north it parallels and runs between old and new Hwy. 75. But it soon crosses the new Hwy 75 and thereafter parallels and runs west of it. This crossing point is noted by a highway sign. Along Hwy 75 in this general area can also be seen the signs for Throckmorton Road and Foster Crossing, both named for early settlers. About ten miles north of McKinney, Telephone Road (and Hwy 75) crosses the Anna-Weston Road, FM 455. From this crossing it continues north past the old Hurricane Creek Hunting Farm and on to the new Hurricane Creek Country Club, north of which once existed the old settlement of Mantua from 1854-1872. From this point the road continues north across the county line toward Sherman in Grayson County. It becomes very difficult to follow because of new road cuts, bridges no longer in existence and so forth.

The history which follows was copied from an undated and unsigned clipping from the "McKinney Daily Courier-Gazette."

"The earliest settlers of our community were several families of settlers from Illinois, who came by wagon train and arrived in 1842. Among them were a WYSONG, ancestor of the McKinney DOCTORS WYSONG, TOM RATTAN, great grandfather of DOW RATTAN, a resident on Telephone Road, and a DR. THROCKMORTON, who at that time was not only a medical doctor but also a surveyor. At that time, Texas was an independent Republic and Collin County was part of Fannin County. DR. THROCKMORTON is famous as the first surveyor of vast acres of north Texas land. He settled on land now owned by the SHERLEY family of Anna and located just north of what is now the DYSART place. The well which he dug is still there as well as bits of china and glass to mark where the house stood. Just to the east is the OLD THROCKMORTON CEMETERY where DR. THROCKMORTON is buried. In it, in the 1930's, the Daughters of the Republic of Texas erected a monument over his grave. Most of the graves are unnamed or illegible, however there are several WYSONG markers. Also three Italians were buried here. They were supposedly killed by Indians.

The second earliest settlement was located 5 miles north of McKinney (and was) known as the Trinity school district. You can really almost say they both began about the same time. The first settler in the area was LEROY CLEMENTS, who located on Clements creek in 1842, where he headrighted 640 acres of land. He and his brother WESLEY, with their families moved from 8 miles north of Old English in Fannin County to the settlement of Throckmorton and shortly moved to their claims, LEROYS on the creek and WESLEYS near Roland. WESLEY was killed the same year and his family came to live with LEROY. This creek now goes by the name of CLEMENTS and PLEMMONS.

In 1843 and 1844 PHILLIP SMITH, WILLIAM C. LEWIS and AUNT POLLY BOONE headrighted land in the locality. SMITH'S and LEWIS'S land being north of CLEMENT'S and MRS. BOONE'S west of SMITH'S. The Old Trinity school house being built on MRS. BOONE'S land. In 1845 SIMPSON PULLIAM, ABNER SMALLEY and JOHN HART homesteaded over next to the East Fork Creek. That same year BUFFORD CLEMENTS headrighted 1,280 acres around the mouth of Clements Creek and south. AUNT POLLY BOONE has many descendants living near and in our community. The CLEMENTS were related to the THROCKMORTONS.

No history of our neighborhood is complete without some mention of COLLIN MCKINNEY, signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence in 1836. Although he was not of the Throckmorton settlement, he did live at old Mantua, a settlement about 4 miles north of us. Another noted settler was JOHN FITZHUGH and family. The old FITZHUGH place was really a fort, having a stockade enclosing two or three log cabins. The old spring is still there but all trace of the homestead is gone. JONATHAN ALLEN, another settler, and his family came to Collin in 1851 to select a home. He bought the old BATEMAN place which is now occupied by the LAWRENCE MILLER family. One of his sons, MALICHA, married one of Texas' greatest patriots, RICHARD B. ROYAL'S daughter. MALICHA ALLEN was appointed by the Legislature to survey out the new boundaries of Collin when the county was carved from Fannin county. JONATHAN ALLEN'S youngest daughter married P. N. BATEMAN and was the mother of QUATE (SISSY) BATEMAN, the famous baseball player. Another member of this famous family was MISS MINERVA MIMMS. Her home place now being the present JIM DALE place.

Other familiar names were COFFMAN, SLAUGHTER, BOYER, BRYAN, and KINKAID. JOHN KINKAID was courtin' a RATTAN daughter all the way from Illinois, so after a Texas wedding, they settled on what is now the DYSART place. They became the proud possessors of the first pig in this part of the Republic. They kept it tied to a tree and led it to the creek for water. Also of local interest is the fact that it is the belief that the mother of JOE MOORE was the first White baby girl to be born in Collin County. She was LEROY CLEMENTS daughter.

Few of the descendants of these old settlers now live in the Telephone Road Community, but to mention a few are as follows: FRANK BOONE, who married UNCLE JESSIE ORANDUFF'S daughter KAY; UNCLE JESSIE being the son of WILLIAM ORANDUFF, one of the first settlers. The JOHNNY PLEASANT family now live in the old ORANDUFF home. The old JIM CAVE home or the SMITH home originally, is occupied by his great nephew, ROY CAVE. The old JAMES ROW house has been torn down and been replaced by a beautiful modern brick home occupied by Mr. and Mrs. BILL GILES.

MEEK DYSART and his son JOHNSTON brought their families from Missouri in 1857 and settled on the old road. The house that JOHNSTON DYSART built still stands on a spot said to be the highest in the county. At the slave market in Sherman he bought 2 two or three-year-old negro girls. One died, but descendants of the other still live in the community. Several slaves left during the war, but one UNCLE BILL came back and stayed until his death. Other families who came later on were the LOFTICE, BOONE and CAVE and of course many more.

The neighborhood had a good supply of Indians when the first settlers came. Some horses were stolen and driven northward by the Indians. The owners followed and recovered the horses but one of the men was killed. HAMP RATTAN was killed by Indians while hunting. His companions had to leave his body to save themselves and when they returned they had to kill his dog to get to his body. Most of the

Indians moved westward and some intermarried, trouble soon ceased.

For many years this was very prosperous grain country. Later cotton became king....

DR. THROCKMORTON'S son JAMES, later governor of Texas, was married at the home of his relatives, the RATTANS, where Mr. DOW RATTAN now has his home. MR. RATTAN was a small boy at the time and the celebration is solidly on his memory. It lasted three days and was called an 'infair.' All the friends and relatives came from far and near and brought so much food that cakes had to be stacked on top of cakes - much to the awe of young DOW. A rumor began to circulate that some of the young men among the guests were going to shiverree the bride and groom. The young bridegroom threatened that he would have each participant's horses tail shaved in retaliation. The shiverree must have taken place because for weeks afterward young men were seen all around the country riding shaven tailed horses.

The first church in the community was a Baptist Church about one mile and a half north of HIGHLAND CEMETERY and first schools were the Trinity School and the old log cabin COFFMAN school, taught by a MR. BLACK who taught the Blue Speller by the singing and outdoor marching method. Just north was the Mantua settlement, stores, church and another school. Today nothing is left to mark the spot.

Whether or not the calm of the neighborhood was ruffled by Texas joining the United States I have never heard, but the war between the states made itself felt. At the cross-road where the MARVIN NOLES now live, there were periodic military encampments where the maneuvers and target practice was held. CAPT. HALL, the County Historian tells me that he used to pick shot out of the tree trunks there with his pocket knife. MR. DOW RATTAN'S father kept forty oxen busy hauling supplies to and from Jefferson for the pursuit of the war. CAPT. JOHNSTON DYSART, as paymaster rode his horse all over the country to get the money to pay the soldiers. Fortunately the fighting was far away. After the war, the poverty of the old South, the unsettled and homeless conditions of the defeated, brought a new kind of man, the outlaw with his revenge, horse stealing and hanging....

QUANTRELL'S men...had come here from Missouri and were camping by the same spring now owned by MARVIN NOLES...they knocked on the JOHNSTON DYSART door, called a young visitor outside (and hung him.).

There are grandmothers among us who remember being frightened...by bands of Gypsies coming to the door. MRS. FRANK BOONE recalls...seeing a big black bear in their orchard. She was sitting on her back porch churning when the bear came up....

Some of our old settlers called our road 'KING'S TRAIL'. Whether this has some historical significance or was a fanciful one, we don't know. But we do know that it was once the stage coach road between Fort Worth and Sherman and was the main road until after Highway 75 was built to the East of us. Many of our neighbors remember running down to this road and watching circus caravans as they traveled on this road enroute to Dallas.

After the Civil War, the U.S. Government built telegraph lines between all their forest (note: this probably should read 'forts') and one was built on our road, for which anyway, here we are - 'The Old Telephone Road Community.'

 V. Old Throckmorton Cemetery

The Old Throckmorton Cemetery in Collin County, Texas is about 400 yards east of the access road along new Hwy 75 between Throckmorton Road and Foster Crossing. Because it lies in the middle of a small woods (less than an acre) of red oak trees and overgrown thorny vines and other native brush, which woods itself lies in the middle of a very large field of Johnson grass, this cemetery is not readily accessible. It can be reached by leaving Hwy 75 at Throckmorton Road, continuing north on the access road about 450 yards to a pasture lane beside a hedgerow, following the lane east about another 250 yards where it fades away to nothing, continuing east another 150 yards to the edge of the woods aforementioned.

In this cemetery are buried several of the earliest settlers of the area: Dr. William Throckmorton, for whom Throckmorton County is named (Dr. Throckmorton was father of Texas Governor Throckmorton); and Thomas Rattan. The graves of the Fosters and Mrs. Wysong are enclosed with the remains of a metal fence (Chas. H. Wysong married Sarah M. Foster). Dr. Throckmorton's monument, erected in 1936 by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, is alone, as is the stone of J. Vardaman, Mr. Rattan and his wife are buried side by side. There were nine graves without stones. They were marked by bois d'arc posts at head and foot.

JUSTUS-RUNYON FAMILY & BIBLE RECORDS

These records were taken from pages in a Bible in the possession of Mrs. Scott France, of 904 Jones Street, Clearwater, Fla. She, Mrs. France is my Mother's sister. Her father was Martin Van Buren Justus, son of Jacob Justus and Elizabeth Conover (Counover). She was born in Carroll County, Ohio, March 14, 1876.

The Justus family came to Ohio from Huntington (Hunterdon) County New Jersey before July, 1838, because Jacob Justus was married to Elizabeth Counover that year, in Carroll County, Ohio. She, Elizabeth, had come to Carroll County, Ohio, as an infant, from High Bridge, New Jersey, where she was born, March 2, 1823. Her parents were Ralph and Margaret (Jennings) Conover.

According to a letter in my possession, and written Dec. 12, 1931 by Mrs. Benton Tidrick a daughter of Jacob Justus, Christiana (Runyon) Justus was one of seventeen children. The daughters were Ann, married to ----, Mary, m. to Jessie Wiant, Sarah, m. to Ned Cayn, Susan, m. to Sam Zant and mother of 15, Christiana, married to Isaac Justus. Betsy never married. Sons, Ben, John, Reuben, and the other eight are not accounted for.

Mrs. Tidrick tells, in the letter, of remembering that her great-grandmother Runyon (Mother of Christiana) read from a German Bible, much to the amusement of the small children. The Runyons also came to Ohio from New Jersey.

The children of Jacob and Elizabeth were: Virgil, who died in infancy, Isaac, Jane, Lee, Virge, Harvilla, Mary (Tidrick), and a Mrs. David Roby.

AN INTERESTING ACCOUNT OF ADMIRAL WILLIAM CARTHEW AS GIVEN BY HIS
FATHER, GEORGE CARTHEW, AN ATTORNEY, IN 1848
AND PUBLISHED IN 1880 BY C. A. CARTHEW, HIS SON,
WHO WAS AN IMMINENT ARCHAEOLOGIST AND HISTORIAN.
Presented by C. M. Carthew-Yorstoun

The Reverend Thomas Carthew of Woodbridge Abbey in Suffolk, England, was the only surviving son of Thomas Carthew of Benacre Hall, he having inherited Benacre Hall from Lord North, the Prime Minister to King George III and who instigated repeal of laws which caused the American Revolution, too late. Thomas Carthew was born at Benacre Hall Aug. 4, 1732 and was buried at Woodbridge in the family vault under the Abbey Church Altar, Jan. 1791. He was Lord of the Manor of Woodbridge.

One of his 23 children from two wives, was Admiral William Carthew of whom we treat, reads like a Hollywood movie, as did the second son, Major General Morden Carthew who married Jemima Borland Ewart of Dumfrieshire, Scotland.

William Carthew, the eldest son, was born in St. Clement Danes, November 4, 1768. After leaving the Grammar School at Ipswich, conducted by the Reverend John King, he obtained a nomination to the Royal Naval Academy at Portsmouth, and in due course entered the Navy; having attained the rank of Lieutenant, his ship, (the name of which I do not recollect) was captured by the Americans, then struggling for independency, and he was a prisoner, on parole, but for a short time only, having been exchanged. On his return to England, he and his brother, Thomas, who had obtained a Commission in the Marines, were both appointed to H.M.S. Hannibal, 74 guns. Captain -----, one of the Squadron under the command of Sir Edward Hughes, proceeding to the East Indies. The Hannibal, when alone on detached service, fell in with a Squadron of the French Fleet, consisting of five sail of the line, commanded by Admiral Suffrin, and after a gallant resistance, was compelled to strike to such superior force. Admiral Suffrin, the Commander-in-Chief of the French Fleet in those seas, had the baseness to deliver over the whole ship's crew, officers and men, to the tender mercies of the notorious Hyder Ali; the commissioned officers were all marched up the country in irons to Bangalore jail, and the poor middies and seamen were compelled to enter into the tyrant's service, and many of the former compelled to become Mahomedans. The two brothers, their relationship being unknown to the tyrant, were by God's providence chained together by the legs, and so continued suffering many hardships, indignities and privations till the treaty of 1784, when by the blessing of the Almighty they had the happiness of again entering the mansion of their father, by whom and his family they had been mourned as dead. no intelligence of them from the time of their being delivered over to Hyder Ali having been received. On their return, which I well recollect, the fatted calf was killed, and from the estimation in which their father was held, the whole town and neighborhood united in demonstrations of rejoicing, bells, fireworks, bonfires, ale drinking, etc. etc. Having had the good fortune to obtain the patronage of Admiral Sir John Jervis, Lieutenant Carthew was on the armament, called the Spanish Armament, in 178?, appointed first Lieutenant of H.M.S. Prince, 98 guns, and in 178? obtained the rank of Commander, and was appointed to the command of the Prince Edward, which ship, with a consort, commanded by ---O'Brien, his senior officer, was employed to convey H.R.H. Prince Edward, with troops to Canada, in which service Commander Carthew had the ill fortune to come into personal collision with his Royal Highness, who, contrary to the rules of the service, demanded to hold Court Martial on soldiers guilty of offending, the which Commander Carthew refused to accede, but to which his senior officer had yielded,

but having received a written order from his senior officer, Commander Carthew was compelled to submit, though under protest, for which conduct, on his return to England, he received the approval of the Admiralty, as did that of Commander O'Brien their censure.

Commander Carthew and his brother Tom soon afterwards visited Paris, in which capital they remained some time; and I have heard them mention that on one occasional visit to the Opera or some other theatre, they espied Suffren in the royal box, and that it was with much ado they restrained themselves from insulting him for his infamous conduct towards them, the expressions of which would doubtless have obtained for them royal apartments in the Bastille. Upon the breaking out of the French Revolution, the brothers, then in Paris, had the happiness to lend their assistance to the escape with them of some ladies of high rank and distinction, whose names I do not remember.

At the commencement of the war with the French Republic, Commander Carthew was appointed to the command of the Redoubt, of 20 guns, called from the weight of metal a Floating Battery, stationed on the coast of Holland, under the command of Admiral Macbride, I believe, from which, having been appointed to the rank of Post Captain, in 1704, he was appointed to the command of the Brilliant frigate, of 20 guns, stationed in the North Sea, under Admiral Duncan; and in 1706, Captain Carthew was appointed to the command of the Regulus, of 44 guns, on two decks, and in October in that year sailed from Plymouth for the West Indies, and in his passage out, under Admiralty order, he had the good fortune to fall in with and capture "El San Pio", a Spanish Corvette, of 18 guns, and two Spanish merchant ships with specie on board, under her convoy, by which he obtained a handsome share of prize money. On reaching his destination, the Regulus was allotted by the Commander-in-Chief on the station, Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, who afterwards resided at Benhall Lodge, to be the consort of the Magicienne frigate, Captain Ricketts, nephew and heir of Earl St. Vincent, who was unfortunately drowned when afterwards in the command of "Le Tonant", 84 guns, Captain Carthew distinguished himself much in the various attacks made on the strong batteries on the islands in possession of the enemy, but was finally, from ill health, obliged to be invalided home. At the time alluded to, the late Captain John Fordyce Maples, C.B., who married the widow of my brother John, was first Lieutenant of the Magicienne, and the present Sir Wm. Parker, Commander-in-Chief in the Mediterranean, was a middy. Whilst in command of the Regulus, the Success frigate, 32 guns, Captain Pigott, was under his orders as senior officer; this ill-fated officer exchanged from her into the Hermione frigate, and with all his officers were murdered by his own boat's crew, and the ship given up to the enemy. Whilst the Success was under the orders of Captain Carthew, he had the painful task of remonstrating with Captain Pigott for his barbarous and tyrannical conduct towards his ship's company, to which had he attended, his own life and that of his officers, as well as the loss of the Hermione, and the evil of his example would have been spared. Captain Carthew, after his return to England, was never again afloat, but resided as an inmate with his brother Tom, (of whom hereafter) for some few years. Sometime after the death of Francis Brooke, Esq., who after my father's death, purchased the Abbey, and made it his residence, Captain Carthew re-purchased the old family seat, and resided there to the time of his death. In 180 , Captain Carthew married Pleasance Myers, one of the daughters of Graham Thomas Myers, Esq., only brother of General Sir W. Myers, Bart., and K.C.B., and niece of Mr. Thomas, the brother of the present George Thomas, Esq., My brother attained the rank of Rear Admiral, and in 1837 died intestate and without issue, aetat 70, and was buried in the family vault in the Sekford Chapel, in Woodbridge church. He for many years fulfilled the duties of a Magistrate and

Deputy-Lieutenant, as his father had done. The greater part of the barracks at Woodbridge were erected on part of the Admiral's estate, the rent of which and of some frontage land on the opposite side of the road, brought him an income of upwards of £800 a year. On his death, the abbey and the farm, called the Barrack Farm, also part of his late father's estate, which he purchased, devolved upon his nephew Morden Carthew, the eldest son of his next brother the Rev. Morden Carthew, then a Lieutenant, and now Lieut-Colonel, commanding the 21 Regiment Madras Native Infantry, at Singapore. The Admiral's widow survived him only a few years, and was buried at Kesgrave Church, where her mother and her maternal relations were interred.


