

Cole, John, (Sr.): 1. 1775-Served with Capt. Daniel Morgan's Company of independent Rifle Men. He was left ill in the hospital at Cambridge when his Company left for Quebec with Gen. Arnold, leaving him under the command of General George Washington who had Gen. Gates issue him a coat, shirt, pair of stockings and shoes. <u>Cole</u>, John, (Sr.), 2. 1776-Served with J volunteer companies of Rifle Men at Staten Island to prevent the inhabitants from trading with the British fleet. They captured 17 prisoners, a musket, a "strand of colours", a 12 oar barge, cable and anchor. He was discharged 2nd July, 1776, but was immediately requested by General Washington to take up arms and serve as a volunteer a few days until the Army should be strengthened. He did so, and was discharged again 6th July. 1776 with the thanks of General George Washington. (Code #B-51, B-57, B-63) Note: The above facts were made known when Cole. John. (Sr.) made application for his pension.

5) Footnote: (2) WOMEN PATRIOTS OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

Motley, Martha Ellington: Ca. 1780-She was murdered during the Revolution while refusing to divulge the hiding place of supplies which her husband, Capt. Joseph Motley, Jr., had secured for the Continental Army, or the whereabouts of her husband to a Tory Raiding Party. In addition to giving her life, her husband and their sons Daniel and David Motley also served in the Revolutionary War. (Code #339)

#### RULES FOR SUBMITTING ENTIRES FOR ANNUAL BOOK AWARD

Below is a reprint of the Rules for the Annual Book Award as printed in the March, 1965 issue of The Quarterly.

The Local History & Genealogical Society announces the following rules for the Annual Book Award:

- Qualifications for entry shall be membership in the Local History & Genealogical Society, in good standing.
- The book contest shall be an annual affair with entries submitted by the first of April, and winners announced at the Local History & Genealogical Society's Annual Genealogical Institute and Workshop which is held in May.
- Recognition of winners or prizes shall be in the form of an Award, to be approved by the Executive Board, and presented at the Annual Genealogical Institute and Workshop Banquet or Luncheon.
- 4. There shall be the following categories:
  - Books with a minimum of 50 pages on the subject of a family history or genealogy.
  - b. Books with a minimum of 50 pages on some subject of local historical or genealogical interest. This would include such subjects as r how to go about genealogical research; a history of a city, county, or community: or a group genealogical study.
  - c. Manuscripts, containing a minimum of five pages, single spaced, on the subject of a family history or genealogy.
  - Manuscripts, containing a minimum of five pages, single spaced, on some subject of local historical or genealogical interest (see b. above.).
- 5. There shall be one winner in each category. If in the opinion of the Judges, no entries are deserving of a prize in a particular category, then no prize shall be given that year. If in the opinion of the Judges, entries other than the winner deserve special praise, then the Judges shall give these entries "Honorable Mention."
- 6. Each book submitted shall become the property of the Dallas Public Library with the author retaining all publication rights. All manuscripts submitted shall be available for publication in the Local History & Genealogical Society's Quarterly, with the author retaining publication rights in the same or revised form.
- 7. Judges shall be three in number, annually appointed by the President, and ratified by the Executive Board; the chairman being the head of the Local, Texas History & Genealogy Department of the Dallas Public Library, and the other two Judges being selected from outside the Society's membership, but being persons qualified to judge books and manuscripts.

## Texas Oldest Twins

Reprint from January, 1927 Fort Worth Star-Telegram

Two rough hewed cabins set back in a wilderness of brush that fringed a muddy creek stick in the memory of Mrs. Amanda Veale, 2932 Meadwobrook Drive, who with a twin brother, was born 85 years ago in Rusk County. This was their first home.

W. R. Ables, together with his sister, Mrs. Veale, watched the state evolve from its wilderness period. Ables lives in Dublin, but both take delight in visiting each other to talk over the pioneer

days

They believe themselves to be the oldest pair of living twins in the State. And from the present state of health they expect to add many more years on what each jokingly terms, "borrowed time." In their span of 85 years they have seen hardships, wars, pleasures, and the world readjust itself a half dozen times. But each gets the same enjowment out of just living and commaring.

Mrs. Veale declares the one big regret is that she did not (p)reserve on paper the impression of that pioneer age when Texas was being exploited by the early settlers. "Just think about putting in writing the conversations we had about the airplane or the railway

when both were being looked upon as mad men's fancies."

Harrison Ables, father of the twins came to Texas in 1836. He joined forces that fought for Texas' independence, fighting under Sam Houston and being a member of that detachment that captured Santa Anna. With a free State, Ables envisioned the future empire and established the Texas home in Hill County, on Jack Branch, four miles from the present town of Hillsboro.

Ables died in 1860, just previous to the outbreak of the Civil War. But he had heard the rumblings of war clouds and warned his

War. But he had heard the rumblings of war children of what was to come before he died.

Miles from any settlement, Mrs. Veale admitted that the howl of the wolf mingled with the savage war cry. . . "But as a general rule the Indians were pretty friendly. They stole horses and cattle. But the Indians came from Oklahoma and struck mostly on the run."

Farm diversification was a necessity in those days and not a matter of dollars and cents, Mrs. Veale declared. "If we didn't raise a variety of food, we went without it," she said. "Brother and I helped to grind our own meal in a hand-made mill that set in the front yard many a time. We just had to raise most of our groceries," she smiled.

Flour, coffee, and sugar, known as the three great luxuries of life, were obtainable by a long wagon trip to a small settlement near where Houston now stands. The goods were transported by wagon trains from New Orleans and distributed to Texans. "Those were real meat-

less and sugarless days," she declared.

Mrs. Veale looks with disgust or disillusion upon the modern age. "Young folks are living and having a good time and why shouldn't they? But they should remember the early pioneers who shouldered the work of opening the way to settlement of Texas. Most of them have passed on; Brother and I are living on borrowed time."

Except for being slightly blind, Mrs. Veale appears in perfect health. She lives with her daughter, Mrs. H. C. Casey, who keeps her in touch with present day events by reading the daily papers. Three months' education, with split logs for seats and dirt floors for a carpet, was not noticeable in a conversation which was both intelligent and graphic.

"And to see the people some of them looking like scared rabbits, when the first puffing train came steaming in," she smiled. "Oh, yes, it's different. But it's still old Texas to us and we love

every foot of its ground."

A LETTER WRITTEN TO ALFRED SMITH. FAYETTEVILLE. LINCOLN CO.. TN. Submitted by Mrs. Wm. E. Cooper (nee Suzanne Blassington), Dallas

Burleson County, Texas Feb. 25th 1853

Dear Friend.

I write a few lines to you, in compliance with my promise, but am sorry that my letter cannot be interesting.--In the first place I must give you an account of my own bad luck, and then I will give you a partial, but faithful account of Texas, so far as I have seen it.

While traveling through Arkansas, my son Alexander took the cholera of which he died on the 17th of November being sick with it about two days and nights. Troubles seldom come singly. On the day that we buried him my wife took the fever. We travelled a few days and she got worse, and I stopped and got her in a house, where she died on the 6th day of December, of fever and inflammation in the head. Thus have I had the hard lot from July to December to follow my wife and my two oldest sons to their graves, one murdered by a villain in Lincoln Co., and he turned loose to kill as many more as he please, with a plenty of friends to swear him clear .-- I travelled through the northwest corner of Louisiana, and the first county I visited in Texas was Panola, which with all the eastern part of Texas I found generally of a light sandy soil, easily cultivated, and produces well, when they have a seasonable year, but drought, they informed me, cuts the crops short. This eastern part of Texas is a generally well timbered with pine and other timber, tolerably well watered, range not so good for cattle as farther west where the prairies set in, tolerable good for hogs. Subject to chill and fever. Society just tolerable.

From the Trinity river to the Brazos river, the country is mostly prairie. Good timber is very scarce, water is also scarce, the land on the rivers and streams generally good, the prairie and post oak land generally poor, all subject to chill and fever. Settlements thin. The land on the Brazos bottom is. I think, the most fertile land I have ever seen, with the exception of the Red river bottom. Those two streams furnish the best cotton lands by far, and as good corn land as I have ever seen in any country. The Brazos bottom is considered by most persons with whom I have talked on the subject, the best land for cotton in the state. The land is as good as one ought to desire, but there is no good water except cistern water, and very few in this county have yet built cisterns. Of course the bottom is sickly, subject to chill and fever, and other sickness. You can form an idea of the size of cotton stalks, when I inform you that it is planted here in rows seven and half feet apart and the stalks left in the drill a foot and a half to two feet apart, and the limbs lock across rows that width and it grows so tall that bolls are frequently as high as a man can reach when sitting on a horse. This I know to be a fact, having rode among some of the cotton fields and reached up as high as I could to reach the top bolls. But last year was an uncommonly good crop year here, both for corn and cotton, it may not turn out so well again for several years. They ask various prices here for land. For upland the price varies from one to five dollars per acre. For bottom land in this county they ask from five

to fifteen dollars per acre according to location and improvement.—I have not bought land yet. I and my son John have rented 140 acres of Brazos bottom land to make a crop together on it this year. We wish to look about some before we buy.—This section is not convenient to any market. Houston is the point to which the people here mostly take their cotton to sell, and that is about a hundred miles. Occasionally a boat runs up the Brazos, and some of the planters send their cotton down the river.

You requested me to give you my opinion about Texas. It is like other countries, it has some of the best land I have ever seen, but a very large proportion of very poor land. Some may tell you as they frequently told me, while I was in Tennessee, that the prairies here are as good land as Elk river bottom. There is not a syllable of truth in this assertion. All the prairie land that I have seen in Texas, with few exceptions is poor.

It is covered with broom sedge, you may know by that circumstance it is poor. It affords good pasturage for immense herds of cattly during the greater part of the year. They can winter on it, but I assure you they get poor before winter runs out. I see as poor cattle here now as I ever saw in Tennessee, and a great many die of poverty. You did not tell me that you had any idea of moving to Texas. If you have, I would say, fixed as you are, you can enjoy the waning of life better there than here. If I were back on Kelley's Creek, I would not stay there, but if I had your situation I think I would remain there. The south west part of Lincoln has a great many vastly mean men, who hate honorable men, because they will not associate with them. It affords me pleasure to say the people here are very friendly, and seem desirous for emigrants to settle up the country. They know human nature better than any people I ever saw .-- Write to me and direct to Caldwell, Burleson County, Texas. Ask Betty and Wallace if they got a letter from me enclosing two dollars for the Observer, and inform me what they say when you write. Your Friend

The following names appear in an old ledger which belonged to Mr. Joshua Mitchell of Risley (now Estelle Manor), Atlantic Co., New Jersey. The ledger is now in the possession of his daughter, Dr. Beatrice M. Jordan, Pittsburgh, PA.

The ledger apparently records the fees and dues of a society, amounting to 35¢ to join and 10¢ monthly, but the group is unknown. The dates noted are from January 14, 1901 to June, 1913. Some dates

#### Points of Interest in Brazoria County

Submitted by: Mrs. Minier DeSpain

 Site of the first Capitol of the Republic of Texas-1856-1837. The first congress convened in Oct. 1835 and Sam Houston was inaugurated first President of the Republic of Texas. In April 1837, the Capitol was moved to Houston.

Turn N. at Gulf Station on Hy. 35 in West Columbia, following road 1 &1/2 miles to.....

Varner Plantation... The Hoggs of Varner Plantation was originally the Patton Place and was out of the Varner Grant. When it became the property of James Stephen Hogg, the Governor of Texas, he made his home here and held abiding faith in the mineral development of West Columbia.

Continuing from Varner Place, turn left on shell road and go 1.05 miles to monument on hill left of road...

3. Home site of George B. McKinstry-1802-1837...member of Austin's Colony in 1829, soldier in the Battle of Velasco, delegate to the General Convention, 1832, Chief Justice of Brazoria County in 1836. In this home, built in 1830, Stephen F. Austin died on Dec. 27. 1836.

Travel South on Hy. 36 to point .07 miles from Hy. 35, turn left on second shell road, go to monument .15 from road.

4. Site of the Home of Josian Huges Bell 1791-1836. One of the old 300 who came to Texas with Stephen F. Austin in 1821, first alcalde of Austin Colony. On this tract of 6.642 acres granted him in 1824, was later built the town of West Columbia, first Capitol of the Republic.

Return to Hy. 36- go south 7.25 miles to a point 3/4 miles north of Brazoria and take black top road to left at .20 miles.

5. Masonic Oak 1835-1952, under this oak, in March 1835, 5 masons met to organize the first masonic lodge in the State of Toxas. Unfortunately, the following year its records were destroyed when Santa Anna's troops entered this area. In 1900 the Masonic Lodge tried to buy the tract of land on which the oak stood, to be converted into a park, but the deed was never signed. In 1955 the Lodge attempted again to buy the land, but failed. And then in 1952 the land was repurchased by R.E. Mebride of Angleton and the park will commemorate the organization and first meeting of the Masonic Lodge of Texas.

Continue on black top road .25 miles to monument:

6. Home site of John Austin- Member of Longs expedition in 1819, pioneer settler in Austin's Colony... Alcalde of Brazoria, 1832, commander at the

Battle of Velasco, signer of the Turtle Bayou Resolution. Died in 1833.

Follow black top road to Hy. 36, turn left and at .65 miles to a point opposite school house in Brazoria.....

7. Statue of Henry Smith, born in 1788 in Kentucky and came to Texas in 1827. He settled in what is now Brazoria County, he regarded this as his home until his death. He was severely wounded in the Battle of Velasco in June 26, 1832; was alcalde of the Jurisdiction of Brazoria in 1835, was the deligate to the second convention of Texas in 1835, political chief to the Consultation and was by that body elected Governor of the Provisional Gov. of Texas Nov. 12, 1835. He was the first Secretary of the Republic of Texas 1836-1838 and a member of the first congress of the Republic 1840-1841. He died in a mining camp in Los Angeles County, Califf, March 4, 1851, while searching for gold.

Continue South of Hy 36... .6 miles to F.M. #524, turn right on #524 black top, to 2.65 miles, cross San Bernard River, monument is to the left.

8. Home site of James Walker Fannin. Site of plantation home established in 1834 by James Walker Fannin (1805-1836) who with his troops was massacred at Goliad on March 27, 1836.

Return to Hy. 36, turn right, go south 8.9 miles, turn right on black top road, go. 2 miles, Gulf Prairiecturch and cemetery. First Burial place of Stephen F. Austin. Return by Hy. 36, turn right and go 50 feet to monument on right side of Hy.

9. Home of Mrs. Emily M. Perry 1795-1851. Only sister of Stephen F. Austin. Stephen Austin regarded this place as his home...after burning San Felipe on March 29, 1836. This plantation was called Peach Point. It was hallowed soil, where for almost three quarters of a century reposed the remains of the Father of Texas, in the Peach Point Cemetery. The little cemetery was within a stones throw of the little room of the plantation home where Austin loved to work, to think and to sleep.

Continue S. on Hy. 36, go 6.4 miles to intersection of Hy. 36, § 288. Turn left on 288, go N. .65 miles to the black top road leading to Valesco. Turn right and go .8 miles, there you will find a monument in front of the City Hall.

10. Colonel Robert M. Coleman, erected by the State of Texas in memory of the Colonel, signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence. Aide -de-Camp to General Sam Houston at San Jacinto in Kentucky in 1790. Drowned at the mouth of the Brazos in July of 1837.

Return Hy. 288, go .25 miles to concrete road (Martins Store) turn right, go South on concrete 5.9 miles, turn right on shell road, go .25 miles to Coast Guard Station and Monument.

11. Guard Station, the Lively, first vessel with colonist to Austin's Colony landed here on Dec. 23, 1821. Battle of Velasco was fought here June 25, 1832. Several Treaties of Peace between the Republic and Santa

Anna were signed here, May 14, 1836.

Located West side of Hv. 288 near Bonney.

12. Homesite of General Albert Sidney Johnson, Texas patriot confederate hero. From Gulf Station in Angelton travel West on Hy. 35 for 1.3 miles. Turn right on shell road, go .4 miles on shell. Follow dirt road 2.4 miles to monument .1 miles left on bank of Oyster Creek.

13. Freeman W. Douglass was among those detailed to guard Baggage at the camp opposite Harrisburg on April 21, 1836. Born Ga., Dec. 21, 1822, died in 1875.

Leave Hy. 288, Lake Jackson Road, go 1.75 miles to black top road at corner of cemetery. Monument on right.

14. Eagle Island Plantation, site of the home of Sara Groce Wharton-1810-1877. William Harris Wharton 1806-1839. Member of the convention of 1832. President of the convention of 1833. Minister to the U.S. 1836-37. A gathering place for distinguished people. Erected by State in 1935.

Continue on road, cross the Brazos River to 8.04 miles, turn right on shell road, go .75 miles to wire gap to left (Church on Right) go 1.35 miles to monument.
