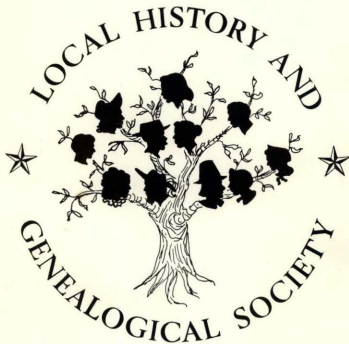

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this Revolutionary War Ancestry Issue is to pay tribute to those men and women who gave of their time, their money, their personal belongings and their lives to aid their country in a time of particular need.

We have attempted to collect information about many different ancestors of the members of the Local History & Genealogical Society and Dallas County residents. We express appreciation to all those individuals who participated in this special issue by furnishing data on their ancestors.

The June Issue is divided into Part I: The Revolutionary Period. Part II: Revolutionary War Ancestors.

The format was developed to place emphasis on the man who was involved in the Revolutionary War. Therefore, his name is carried first (in large type face for easy readability) and in alphabetical order. The service information is recorded at the right with any other information.

After the Revolutionary War Ancestor (RWA) is listed, he is followed by his child. As you proceed, line by line, you move from the earliest generation to the present generation (indicated with an asterisk).

Addresses of those submitting information are provided for research purposes.

In some cases, there were multiple individuals descended from a common ancestor, and where possible, they have been listed together. Thus, if a listing has 'Son 1' and 'Son 2' they are of the same generation and sons of the person listed immediately preceding them.

If information on generations prior to the RWA was provided, that was included. It is in those instances that the notation: 'See below===' is used. The data for the RWA is carried in the proper generation sequence.

PROFILE OF A PATRIOT

"Martha Ellington Motley was the wife of Captain Joseph Motley of Amelia and Pittsylvania Counties, Virginia, and was murdered during the American Revolution. She refused to divulge to a Tory raiding party the hiding place of supplies which Captain Motley had for the Continental Army or the whereabouts of her husband".....*



The story of this Patriot was gathered from direct quotes from a 'real-daughter' of the American Revolution, Obedience Motley. She was present when her mother was killed by a 'friend' with a Tory raiding party... and lived to tell the tale. Also from her memoirs, there is gained much information of the way of life of her family and of references to the times in Virginia during and just after the Revolution. Her accounts show a people drawn from an easy and prosperous way of life to almost poverty. Altho these patriotic families lost much of their personal wealth due to the cost of the Revolution, they gained what later proved to be a quality of courage and fortitude which brought forth some of the early industrialists and leaders of that Section of Virginia and North Carolina...**

Martha Ellington was one of ten children of David Ellington and Martha Tucker Ellington of Nottoway Parish, Amelia County, Virginia. There she met and married Joseph Motley, Jr., in 1750. Martha and Joseph lived in Amelia County until after 1770, when they moved to the upper section of Pittsylvania County. This was their residence during the American Revolution...*** To this union were born eleven children, before the untimely death of Martha. After Martha's death, Joseph Motley reared their children yet at home, with the help of Rachel, a servant, who cared for the little ones as she would her own. Later, after all the children were grown, Joseph married in 1782, Elizabeth Irby of Halifax County. The love and affection which Joseph showed for his daughters was manifest in the record of his gift to Obedience of 2000 pounds as her marriage dowry. The record states he was a man of large capacities and fortune and revered by all of his children...****

Martha Ellington Motley came from a family of patriots of Virginia. The following accounts are documented in records of the military in Washington and Richmond, Virginia...*

Three of her brothers, Jeremiah, Hezekiah and David are known to have served in the Virginia Colonial Militia and during the American Revolution served as a supply agent for the Continental Army, and as a Juror in Pittsylvania County. Two of her sons are credited with revolutionary service. David is listed as a soldier in the Continental Line of Virginia and Daniel is listed as giving supplies to the army of Virginia. Daniel also served in the War of 1812 as a rifleman in the 6th Regiment, Virginia Militia.

The story goes: Martha was alone in the "Old Place", except for servants and the little children at home. She was recuperating in bed from the recent birth of her eleventh child, Elizabeth. She was served by Rachel, a very extra-ordinary

servant who is purported to have been an African Princess. This servant was kidnapped from the rice fields of her homeland by slave traders. The record also states that she spoke a different language from the other servants and wore beautiful flowers tattooed on her breasts. As has been stated, this servant later reared the children who were left orphaned when Martha was murdered.

Around and about that fateful day were four little girls, daughters of Martha and Joseph. Obedience was eight, Prudence was six, Sally was four and Delilah was two. They were under foot when the party of men on horseback arrived at the front gate to be greeted by Rachel. The spokesman of the group asked to see Captain Motley. When told he was not at home, they demanded to talk to Mrs. Motley. Although told by Rachel that Mrs. Motley was ill in bed and could not be disturbed, on the insistence of one of the men, the servant let them into the house. Later Rachel disclosed that she recognized one of the men as a neighbor of the Motleys. The party of men hurried past Rachel and the little girls and barged up the stairs to Martha's room.

In the excitement of a child's fancy, Obedience ran to see what this was all about, and was present when the neighbor and 'friend' demanded to know where her father was and her brothers and where the provisions were kept. She heard her mother refuse to give them any information and saw them take the arm of her mother and despite Martha's struggles and cries, pierce her arm with a knife and leave her faint and unconscious.....****

Of the little girls there that day, the baby-in-arms, Elizabeth, lived to adulthood and married Floyd Tanner. Delilah married Benjamin Terry; Sally married Francis Anderson; Prudence married Joshua Stone. They all lived in Pittsylvania County.

Obedience Motley lived to be ninety-five years of age, dying in 1863 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Annie M. Hobson at Mocksville, North Carolina. She remembered the Red Coats with vivid repugnance. In her memoirs, she often said that she could not pass a motherless child without pity welling up inside her, nor could she ever overcome completely the sorrow of being so early orphaned through the treachery of a Tory 'friend'. From her story is a picture of the home life of her family and of the times when she was married and living in North Carolina. Obedience learned to spin and weave at an early age. Their clothes and sheets were made at home on the premises, although at times fine and elegant goods were brought from England to be used for state occasions. Her father still traded, before the Revolution, directly with the mother-country. Many generations of this family went to England to entertain at Court.....****
 "I remember the 'Old Place', the grand room hung around closely with pictures all of one size, the high-backed leather-seated chairs in a stiff straight row all around the three sides with corner ones fitted in. The desk with a dream book in the library, which gave great delight to Henrietta Hobson and myself. These chairs belonged to my poor, dear, father, Captain Motley, and were given to Jose who was his namesake".....****

In 1790 Obedience Motley married John Morehead of Rockingham County, North Carolina. John was born in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, and was Obedience's dancing instructor. They settled in Leaksville, North Carolina. From this union came nine children. Their eldest son, John Motley Morehead, became an outstanding industrialist and founder of the Textile Industry in Leaksville. He also was the first president of the North Carolina Railroad on which the modern industrial development of the Piedmont is based. John Motley Morehead was elected Governor of North Carolina on the Whig ticket in 1841-1845. The great-grandson of Obedience, John Motley Morehead III, became a multimillionaire industrialist, a diplomat and was the University of North Carolina's greatest private benefactor,

giving the Planetarium on the Chapel Hill Campus, and during his lifetime, seventeen million dollars to the University...***

Through the descendants of this family have the events of this story been preserved.....

REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION

of
JOHN YOUNG

On this the seventh day of November eighteen hundred and forty-two personally appeared before the County Court of Greenup County, John Young, a resident of the County of Greenup and the State of Kentucky, age seventy-eight years the twenty fourth day of August. Also being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of his pension made by the Act of Congress passed June 7th, 1852.

That he entered the service in the spring of seventeen hundred and seventy-eight as a substitute for his father, Reuben Young, in Captain James Crouche's company and Colonel George Stubblefield's regiment in the County of Spotsylvania, State of Virginia. That they marched to Cabbin Point to where the Regiment was rendezvoused and remained there three weeks from thence marched to Petersburg where the Regiment was discharged making a total of thirty-five days, and then he was enlisted in the United States Army in the Virginia's continental line as a rider of Express from North to South. That he was enlisted by Richard Young, who was quartermaster at Fredericksburg in the month of August, seventeen hundred and seventy-eight. That his wages were twelve dollars and fifty cents for a month. By the orders of Brig. Gen. George Weeden who was a general of the Continental Army and stationed at Fredericksburg. That he was enlisted for and during the war when General Weeden wanted draught of militia or supplies from the following counties. He would take him from the regular route and send him to the Colonels of these counties Spotsylvania, Sorrisa, Albemarle, Agusta, Rockingham, Shenandoah, Frederick, Hampshire, Berkeley, Orange, Stafford, King, George Westmoreland, Richmond, Landcaster and Northumberland. That he was kept constantly riding from North to South except when taken out by General Weeden to carry an express to the Colonels of the above named counties. That a great part of his service was performed in the night and he was frequently in great danger of being taken by Col. Tailland Light Horse. That he was sent to Little Gash with an express direct to Col. Timothy Tichising who was Quartermaster General and was detained there by Col. Tichising until after the seige to carry express from one part of the Army to the other. That he saw Lord Cornwallis surrender to Gen. Washington- and he was sent with the first intelligence of the surrender of Cornwallis to the North- and then he was kept in service as a rider of express when it was necessary and the balance of his time was engaged in taking care and collecting the public property until the last of April, seventeen hundred and eighty-two and then he was discharged by Gen. George Weeden which discharge he has lost by reason of his coming to Kentucky the fall after he received it. He states he served forty-five days as militia man and three years and eight months a rider of Express in the Continental Service making in all three years and nine months that he was in the Service.

He further states that there was not a man that rendered more service than he did. That he was taken out of the ranks and put as a rider of Express which was much harder and more dangerous. He was frequently in great danger of being taken by the British and had to be exposed to all sorts of weather and very near to freezing to death several times. That there was no man whose services was of more importance than his. That all the important communications were entrusted to him. That he has frequently rode from Fredericksburg to Richmond and back to Fredericksburg in twenty-four hours making one hundred fifty miles carrying express from Gen. Washington to Gen. Green and back to Gen. Washington. He further states that in the month of September 1782, he came to Kentucky with Richard Young and then returned to Virginia the same winter and married his present wife on the 12th March, 1785, whose name was Mary Moore and moved to Kentucky by the fall of 1787 and was in every expedition against the Indians. That was after he got to Kentucky and with Gen. Wilkinson Scott and Wyanes Campaigns. He hereby relinquished his every claim relating to a pension or annuity except the present and he declares that he is not in the Pension Roll of any agency in any state or territory of the United States.

Permit 7 Amendment to the Declaration

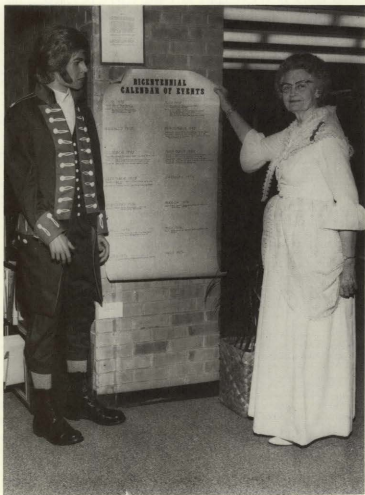
He states that it said he was born August 24th 1764 and entered the Service in his 14th year and was married the 12th March 1785 in his twenty first year and moved to Kentucky at the time stated above and has lived in residence since that time.

We, the said court do hereby declare this opinion that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary soldier and served as he states.

Mrs. Jewel Young Wimbish, member of Local History and Genealogical Society, Dallas, was the first to participate in a special Bicentennial Calendar of Events in Irving. The uniform depicts that of JOHN YOUNG, a soldier and patriot from Spotsylvania Co., VA. He served from 1778-1782, substituting for his father, REUBEN YOUNG, in Capt. James Croucher's Co. and Col. George Stubblefield's Regt. The majority of his service was as an express rider in the VA Continental Line. Involving great danger and exposure to the elements, he carried confidential messages between Gen. George Weeden and the colonels in the various counties in VA. Mr. Young frequently rode from Fredericksburgh to Richmond and back in 24 hours, making 150 miles, bearing express from Gen. Washington to Gen. Green and back to Gen. Washington. He was present when Lord Cornwallis surrendered to Gen. Washington and was sent with the first intelligence of the surrender to the North.

THE STORY OF THE BELL

The first Province Bell was thought to have been brought to Pennsylvania by William Penn, founder of the Province. Pennsylvania or Penn's Wood - was named for Admiral Sir William Penn, father of William Penn who was granted land by Charles II in 1681 for royal debts owed to Admiral Penn.

Shortly after 1700 an Assembly was formed to regulate and guide the people of the Colony. The Province Bell was used to call members of the Assembly together for sessions; to announce the opening of the Courts of Justice to the people, and other public functions. It was also used to announce proclamations of a new King or Queen of Great Britain, and to announce treaties of peace and declarations of war.

The following brief data with some significant dates are chronologically arranged.
May 1, 1729 - the Assembly voted to appropriate 30,000 pounds (\$150,000) to build a House for the Assembly of the Province of Pennsylvania to meet in.
Oct. 14, 1736 - the Assembly met in the unfinished building and appointed Benjamin Franklin to be Clerk of the House of Representatives for current year.

Nov. 4, 1741 - a bill of Edmund Woolley was presented for "expenses in raising the Tower of the State House". This was to be used as a clock tower.

Jan. 27, 1750 - the Assembly authorized the tower's superstructure "to contain staircase with suitable place for hanging a Bell". This superstructure was finished in 1752.

Oct. 1751 - the Assembly directed the State House Trustees, which included Isaac Norris to order a bell from England. The bell was for the 50th anniversary of William Penn's Charter of Privileges which insured freedom for the citizens of Pennsylvania Colony. The bell was ordered thru Robert Charles, the Colonial Agent of the Province of Pennsylvania in London. The letter was dated Nov. 1, 1751 and directed the bell to show "By Order of the Assembly of the Province of Pennsylvania for the State House in the City of Philadelphia, 1751" and underneath "Proclaim Liberty throughout all the Land unto all the inhabitants thereof - Lev. XXV v10."

The Master Founder - Thomas Lester's Whitechapel Foundry of London was chosen. It had been founded in 1570 during the reign of Elizabeth I and was operated in 1751 by Thomas Lester. The bell was 77 1/2 copper and 23 1/2 tin, weighed 2,080 lbs. and cost 60 pounds plus or \$305.00. It arrived in Philadelphia on September 1, 1752. A few days after, it was brought ashore and in the State House Yard, it cracked on the first stroke of the clapper. In 400 years it is the only bell from Whitechapel's to crack. Bells made in 1583 and 1598 for Westminster Abbey are still in use. One was made in 1702 for Christ Church, Philadelphia. The Great Bell of Bow in London was cast in 1750. Bells of St. Clements were cast in 1588 (the year of the Spanish Armada); and Bells of Big Ben were all made by Whitechapel Foundry. In 1964 they cast the Bell for the Washington Cathedral.

The reason for the crack was thought possibly due to the unusually rough sea passage from London to Philadelphia or by having been mishandled by amateur "colonial bell hangers" or that the bell may not have been hung free of its frame or that the clapper was not released properly.

They intended to send it back in March, 1753 but Capt. Budden could not take it on board whereupon two "ingenious workmen" undertook to cast it in Philadelphia. They were John Pass and John Stow. They broke up the bell, recast it without change or addition of metal. This was done in 1752. Isaac Norris did not like the tone (note flat) and so in April, 1753, it was re-broken and recast and they added 1 1/2 oz. copper ten pound of bell metal. The tone is E flat.
June 7, 1753 - the bell placed in the steeple of the State House.

Aug. 27, 1753 - bell rung to call session of Assembly.

Aug., 1754 - a second bell from Whitechapel Foundry arrived and was installed below the first one, and used as a clock bell, striking the hours. It was discarded in 1828 and given to Philadelphia's Roman Catholic Congregation of St. Augustine. The bell was destroyed when the church burned in May, 1844.

Feb. 21, 1761 - Bell rung for the ascension of King George III.

Jan. 26, 1763 - bell rung to proclaim end of French and Indian War.

Sept. 9, 1763 - bell called the Assembly to consider a plan for the First Congress of the Colonies.

Oct. 31, 1765 - the bell was muffled and rung for news of passage of Stamp Act.

Feb. 4, 1771 - bell called the Assembly to petition King George III for repeal of the tax on tea.

Some people thought the bell was rung too often and too loudly. A petition dated Sept. 17, 1772 said the too frequent ringing distressed and incommoded the residents of Philadelphia; and further said it should be rung only on public occasions such as call for Assembly, opening of Courts of Justice, and other public occasions.

June 1, 1774 - the bell was muffled and rung for news of the closing of the Port of Boston.

April 25, 1775 - after the battle of Lexington, the bell called together 8,000 people in the State House Yard to "associate for purpose of defending with arms, our lives, liberty and property against all attempts to deprive us of them."

June 16, 1775 - bell rung for opening of Second Continental Congress and the appointment of George Washington as Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Army.

May, 1776 - eight of the colonies decided to support independence. Virginia wanted a resolution to declare the United Colonies free and independent states.

June 7, 1776 - Richard Henry Lee of Virginia offered his resolution. A committee was appointed to prepare a Declaration. It was composed of Jefferson, Adams, Franklin, Sherman and Livingston.

July 2, 1776 - the resolution of Richard Henry Lee was passed by twelve (12) colonies with New York abstaining. The Declaration which was prepared by Thomas Jefferson was presented and debated July 3 and 4, and passed late in the afternoon of Thursday, July 4th with 86 changes and 487 words eliminated. There were 1337 words in the final draft.

John Dunlap, the official printer for the Second Continental Congress, made the "broadside" during the night and early morning of July 4-5, one copy being attached to the Journal of the Congress. The original has been lost, but at least 20 copies survive.

July 6, 1776 (Saturday) - The Declaration printed in full in the "Philadelphia Evening Post".

July 8, 1776 - the bell rang to summon patriots for reading of the Declaration at noon. The High Sheriff, William Dewees, delegated Col John Nixon to read the Declaration of Independence. The bell was rung at the end of the reading. The Declaration was also read at Easton, Pennsylvania.

July 9, 1776 - The Declaration of Independence was read in New York City to troops by order of General George Washington.

In 1776 the bell was known as "The Old State House Bell".

July 4, 1777 - the bell was rung for the first anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

Sept. 18, 1777 - the bell was moved in a train of 700 wagons accompanied by 200 North Carolina and Virginia Cavalry commanded by Col. William Polk of North Carolina. They went thru Germantown and Bethlehem to Allentown, PA. where the bell was hidden in the basement of the Zion Reformed Church. It arrived on Sept. 24, 1777 (62 miles in 6 days) and was returned to Philadelphia and re-hung June 27, 1778.

July 16, 1781 - the bell was lowered to the Tower of the State House.

Oct. 24, 1781 - the bell was rung for the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown.

Apr. 16, 1783 - bell rung for Treaty of Peace with Great Britain.

Sept. 17, 1787 - the bell was rung for the adoption of the Constitution by the Federal Constitution Convention.

Dec. 6, 1790 - bell was rung when first Federal Congress moved the capital from New York City to Philadelphia.

March 4, 1793 - bell rung for 2nd inaugural of President George Washington.

Dec. 18, 1799 - the bell was muffled and rung for death of George Washington. In 1816 the State House and Bell were sold to the City of Philadelphia for \$70,000. The Pennsylvania Capital had been moved to Lancaster in 1799 and in 1812 then moved to Harrisburg.

Sept. 29, 1824 - the bell was rung to welcome General Lafayette. The Journal of City Council for 1828 states: "It was cracked during the violently joyful ringing at Lafayette's visit to Philadelphia in 1824, but not completely disabled until one night in the following winter, when, while ringing an alarm of fire, it finally gave out."

July 24, 1826 - the bell was muffled and rung for the deaths of Adams and Jefferson which had occurred on July 4, the 50th anniversary of the Declaration.

1828 - the City of Philadelphia hired John Wilbank to cast a bell twice the size of the Liberty Bell for a new steeple clock and to use the old Bell. Drayage costs were more than the bell was worth (\$400) so Wilbank left it hanging in the tower of the building. The City sued - final results were that Wilbank paid the court costs and the City accepted a 'gift' of the bell.

Feb. 22, 1835 - the bell was rung for Washington's birthday; and this is the traditional date of the cracking of the bell. From 1827 to 1836, Thomas Downing was Official Doorkeeper and Bell Ringer of the Philadelphia City Council. Emanuel J. Rauch, born Nov. 6, 1825, said the bell was cracked on Feb. 22, 1835. He was 10 and the steeplekeeper, "Major Jack" Downing called him and 6 or 8 other boys to ring the Liberty Bell for Washington's birthday. The bell was struck about 10 or 12 times, when they noticed a change in tone. When the steeplekeeper noticed the change, he told them to stop pulling the rope. All of them climbed to the steeple. Mr. Rauch said the side of the bell that hung toward Walnut Street had a 12 or 14-inch crack. He gave an interview to the New York Times in later years.

1839 - it is not known when it was first called the "Liberty Bell" but in 1839 the Friends of Freedom in an anti-slavery paper called it the "Liberty Bell."

Feb. 23, 1846 (Monday) - they did not ring the bell on Sunday, so it was rung on Monday for Washington's birthday. It had been cracked before, but the edges had been filed and the notes were still loud and clear until noon, when there appeared a zig-zag fracture thru one side and it was completely out of tune.

1846 - the bell was placed in the Assembly Room - east room on first floor. The wooden yoke was removed as early as 1852.

1854 - the bell was displayed on a 13-sided pedestal without the wooden yoke.

July 7, 1863 - the bell was "tapped" for the surrender of Vicksburg.

April 3, 1865 - bell again "tapped" for the fall of Richmond.

1872 - the bell was attached to a wooden frame and shown in the hallway of Independence Hall.

1875 - the bell was moved to the Supreme Court Chamber.

April 13, 1876 - the Select Council of Philadelphia appointed a committee to see about re-conditioning the Liberty Bell so it could be rung for the Centennial on July 4. The Committee decided it was inadvisable.

1877 - the bell was suspended from the hallway ceiling by a chain of 13 links.

1878 - the bell was back in the Assembly Room and put in a glass case.

Jan. 23, 1885 to June 17, 1885 - the Liberty Bell was in New Orleans, Louisiana for the World's Industrial and Cotton Exposition.

April 24, 1893 to Nov. 6, 1893 - the bell was in Chicago, Illinois for the World's Columbian Exposition.

Oct. 3, 1895 to Feb. 1, 1896 - the bell was in Atlanta, Georgia, for the Cotton States and Atlantic Exposition.

1896 - the bell moved back to the Tower Hall.

1900 - the wooden yoke was reclaimed and attached to the bell in the Tower Hall.

Jan. 6, 1902 to June 10, 1902 - the bell was in Charleston, South Carolina for the Interstate and West Indian Exposition.

June 15, 1903 to June 29, 1903 - the bell was in Boston, Massachusetts for the Bunker Hill Celebration.

June 3, 1904 to Nov. 19, 1904 - the bell was in St. Louis, Missouri for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition.

Oct. 9, 1908 - the bell was displayed in a street parade in Philadelphia for Founder's Week Celebration.
 Feb. 11, 1915 - the bell was "tapped" to commemorate the first transcontinental telephone conversation from San Francisco to Boston.
 July 5, 1915 to Nov. 26, 1915 - the bell was in San Francisco, California, for the Panama-Pacific Exposition.
 1915 - the glass case was removed so that the public could touch the bell.
 Oct. 25, 1917 - the bell was in a street parade for the First Liberty Loan Day Celebration.
 May 15, 1919 - the bell was put on a pedestal outside the hall for parade for the return of the 78th (Iron) Keystone Division from World War I.
 June 6, 1944 - this was D-Day in Europe. A rubber mallet was used and the bell tapped 12 times for "Independence" at the beginning of a radio program and 7 times at the end of the program for "Liberty."
 July 1, 1950 - the City of Philadelphia agreed to let the National Park Service administer the property. Since then the Old State House has been restored and renovated. The Congress Hall has also been restored.
 1976 - the bell is to be moved 100 yards from Independence Hall to its new home in Independence Park.
 May, 1976 - a 6-ton Bicentennial Bell, a gift from Great Britain, will be housed in a special bell tower in Orientation Center in Independence National Historical Park and will hang close to the silent Liberty Bell. Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh will view them on a state visit in July, 1976.
 To commemorate the Bicentennial, the Whitechapel Foundry of London, made 100 full-size replicas of the original Liberty Bell in oxidized black finish. Also, 2400 models 1/5th scale, made of 80 % copper and 20 % tin, finished in either black or silver. The small models were placed on hand-carved plinths made from oak from the Windsor Forest.

A CLOSER LOOK AT SOME ANCESTORS

SAMUEL NASH. Ancestor of Mrs. Dorothy Roberts was the fourth generation of her family to be in America before the Revolution. Thomas Nash came in 1637. Sam Nash, his great-great grandson, was Town Clerk of Hadley, MA for 41 years as well as Town Treasurer and Justice of the Peace for 26 years. He was also in the MA Legislature from 1757 to 1775.

THOMAS & DANIEL POLK. Ancestors of Mmes. Virginia Bissett, Billie Moore, & Faye Saunders and Mr. James W. Folk. Various documents set out land grants of hundreds of acres of land in what is now South Carolina. Some of the deeds are dated back to 1748, 1750 and 1768. A later generation Thomas Polk and his son, Thomas Jr., fought in the Revolution as well as a cousin, Daniel Polk.

BENONI DAWSON. Ancestor of Mrs. Georgia Frost. John Dawson, great grandfather of Benoni Dawson, came to MD before 1670. On the ship coming over, John Dawson met an Irish girl, Mary Doyne, daughter of Robert Doyne. They married and settled in Charles Co., MD.

Robert Doyne was commissioned High Sheriff in 1680. The family owned much land and estates in MD, such as, "Indiantown," "Lion's Den," "Rotterdam," "Doyne's Beginnings," and "Saturday's Work."

HENRY WIDECK. Ancestor of Mrs. Dorothea Russell. He came to America in the 1700's and fought in VA, Dunmore and Rockingham Cos. during the Revolution. He was a German immigrant and was not as concerned about the War as some of the Anglo colonists.

OTWAY BURNS Ancestor of Miss Grace Lockey. Burns came to America with a friend, Gabriel Johnston, from Co. Ayr, Glasgow, Scotland, in 1734. Mr Johnston became Gov. Gen. of the Carolinas, and Otway Burns conducted a business operation with the government which is documented by a voucher for goods and services in the amount of \$400.00 being paid to him.

SAMUEL SMITH. Ancestor of Dr. Ben L. Smith, Jr. Samuel Smith entered the service as a private in the militia company commanded by Capt. Daniel Morgan in 1779 from Westmoreland Co. Living on the margin of the Bay near the mouth of the Potomac (Smith's Point), he was called into service at the age of 16 to repel the incursions of the British who often landed on the coast and pillaged the country, bearing off all the movable property they could. As the attacks of the enemy could not be anticipated and their visits on the land were of short duration, he and others were frequently called on to guard the coast.

In August, 1781 in the Co. of Westmoreland, he enlisted and joined the company of horsemen principally raised in Northumberland Co. commanded by Capt. John McAdams. The enlistees furnished their own horses and equipment. Capt. McAdams' company of horsemen belonged to Col. Webb's regiment and served on the Gloucester side of the York River ranging up and down the river above and below the town of Little York during the siege by Cornwallis of that town. Samuel Smith was in the engagement with the British commanded by Col. Tarleton when he attempted to retreat from Little York to join the main army of the British to the north. General Weeden and Colonel Innis and Nelson were in command on the Gloucester side of the York River. Samuel Smith served about nine months.

A CRIMINAL CODE

The original document from which this 'Code,' was copied is on exhibit at the Hoya Memorial Library and Museum, Nacogdoches, TX. Copied by Mrs. Grace McKnight, Ferris, TX.

Published in Nacogdoches in 1783

I, Don Antonio Gil Ybarbo, Captain of Militia, Military and Civil Lieutenant Governor And Judge of Revenue for the town and district of Nuestra Senora Del Pilar de Nacogdoches:

WHEREAS, amongst the foremost duties devolving upon those who are in charge of the preservation of good order in the communities, are the protection of the lives and properties of their members, the exactitude with which they enforce the compliance of every individual, with the prescriptions of the wise laws of the Monarchy, the detection and punishment of all offences, principally those of a public, outrageous and scandalous character, sic; which duties are defined in the 1st Title, Chapter 7, and 1st law of the "Copelacion".

CONSIDERING that vices and crimes of every description are progressing rapidly in this new settlement; that, in spite of divine and human laws, and notwithstanding the inducements tendered to the inhabitants of this town, by bad and evil disposed men, they would not entirely abandon themselves to the torrent of their passions, provided they had a sufficient knowledge of the rigorous chastisements prescribed by the criminal laws, of which they are completely ignorant, against those offences and disorderly life lead to the social contract established between men, in view of common happiness:

THEREFORE, having resolved to lay before the eyes of the ignorant as well as the evil disposed, the chastisements ascribed to the offences they are most liable to commit, in order that, being better informed, they may always have present the abyss open before the transgressor and vices in which many of the inhabitants of this town and district are indulging, and which are in direct opposition to our institutions, good order, and the security of the Kings objects,

I HAVE ORDAINED, that the articles of the laws of the Kingdom, and such regulations as I have thought proper to issue, shall be read, published and proclaimed in a loud, audible and intelligible voice, for three consecutive holy days, at the out door of the Church of this town, and at the issue of the inhabitants from High-Mass, the laws shall, hereafter, be read publicly in the streets and on the squares, in order that no one may argue his ignorance, and they may have their full effect:

1. If any person shall blaspheme the name of God our Lord, that of the Virgin Mary, His Mother and Our Lady, and the names of the Saints or Sacred Things; or if any person shall swear by the name of God, or the names of the Saints, such person shall be dealt with, with the utmost rigor, and punished according to the Laws of the Kingdom.
2. The above chastisement shall also reach any person who shall soil, or commit what outrage soever against the Images of Jesus-Christ, Our Savior, the Holy Virgin and the Saints; or soil and commit any outrages against things consecrated to divine worship.

3. Any person who shall speak evil of the King, any member of the Royal Family or against the Government, shall be punished as a traitor.
4. A traitor to the King shall suffer death, and forfeit the whole of his prosperity.
5. Any person who shall burn a house, with the purpose of causing the death of another person, even when death did not issue, shall suffer death, and forfeit half of his property for the benefit of the Royal Chamber.
6. The same punishment reaches any person who shall burn a building, or crops.
7. The felon, or person who shall deliberately kill another, shall suffer death.
8. Any person of what condition soever shall commit murder or homicide, shall suffer death.
9. Any person of what condition soever who shall kill another in a quarrel, shall suffer death.
10. Any person who shall inflict a wound, or attempt to kill another with an arrow, even when death does not issue, shall, besides suffering the corresponding corporeal punishment, forfeit one half of his property for the benefit of the Royal Chamber.
11. Any person who shall treacherously kill another, shall be quartered alive, previous to being hanged.
12. Any person who shall treacherously kill another or wound another with an arquebuss or a pistol, shall suffer the penalty awarded to the felon, and forfeit one half of the property for the benefit of the Royal Chamber and the other half for the benefit of the wounded, or the heirs of the defunct.
13. Any person who shall kill another, having received money from another person, as an inducement for the perpetration of his crime, shall suffer the pain specified for the felon.
14. Any person who shall take the life of his Father, Grand-Father, Mother, Grand-Mother, Brother, Son, Sister, or Daughter, shall be hanged after having suffered the most degrading treatment awarded to the murderer.
15. Any person who shall be found guilty of witchcraft or poisoning, shall be hanged after having been quartered alive.
16. Any person who shall challenge another to fight a duel, shall suffer death, and the person who shall accept such challenge, shall suffer the same pain; moreover, agreeable to the Canonic Rules, they shall be ex-communicated from the moment they have agreed to meet for the purpose of fighting, besides being dealt with according to the prescription of the "Pragmatic Law" of 1716.
17. Any person who shall take the life of another in the circumstances constituting "Ordainarie Homicide" shall suffer a degrading death.

18. The abominable crime against nature shall be punished with death, and perpetrators shall be consumed in the flames and forfeit the whole of their property.
19. Any person who shall ravish a maiden shall suffer death.
20. Any person who shall commit a rape in a secluded and deserted place shall suffer death, and any violence committed against a woman living honestly shall be punished likewise.
21. Any woman convicted of having held illicit intercourse or lived with a married man, shall, for the first offence, be expelled from town for one year and forfeit "One Marc" of silver; for the second offence, she shall be expelled for two years and pay "Two Marcs" of silver, for the third offence, three years and three "Marcs" of silver, and shall receive one hundred lashes as prescribed by law.
22. Any man and woman convicted of adultery, as specified by law, shall be punished with the utmost rigor of the law. Incest, or carnal intercourse with an ascendent or decendent, brother or sister-in-law, God father or God mother, or any person in the 4th degree of consanguinity, shall be punished with death.
23. Any married man who shall not live with his wife, shall suffer a degrading punishment, and forfeit one half of his property for the benefit of the Royal Chamber.
24. Any single person who shall unlawfully live together, shall be punished according to the law, the circumstances of the case, and in proportion with the scandal occasioned.
25. Any person who shall have carnal connexion with a beast shall suffer death, and afterwards his body burnt with the said beast.
26. Any man who shall assent to the prostitution of his wife, will for the first offence, be exposed in public, being feathered, rubbed with honey, wearing a fool's cap with a string of garlic, and a pair of horns, receive 100 lashes and be sent to the galleys for 10 years; for the second offence, he shall remain in the galleys for life.
27. Any pimp, or procurer, shall be exposed in public, being feathered and wearing a fool's cap and afterward sent to the galleys for 6 years; for the second offence, they shall receive 100 lashes, and remain in the galleys for life.
28. Any person who shall open or work in a house a hole, so as to allow the introduction of a man, for the purpose of committing a crime, shall be considered a burglar, and forfeit one half of his property, besides, being dealt with at the pleasure of His Majesty the King.
29. Any man, who having a former wife existing, shall marry another woman, shall be exposed publicly, and sent to the galleys for years.
30. The robber of sacred things shall hang.

CODE - Continued

31. Any person who shall steal in the fields, a number of sheep or goats amounting to twelve heads, or a number of horses, or hogs amounting to five, shall suffer death; meat cattle stealing shall be punished in the same manner, according to the assessed value of the stolen property.

32. Any other robberies shall be punished in proportion with the assessed value of the stolen property, and with the utmost severity of the law.

33. Any person who shall break loose from a gang of prisoners, or from jail, shall be reputed guilty of the crime for which he is awaiting his trial, and fined in the sum of 600 "Mavreidis". Any Alcade, keeper or person in charge of such prisoner, shall forfeit a like sum of 600 Maravedis, besides being brought to account for the prisoner.

34. Any person who shall abuse a Priest with words or facts, shall be punished according to the nature and circumstances of the fact, and with the utmost rigor of the law.

35. False witnesses shall be sent to the galleys for a term of ten years, after having been exposed publicly.

36. Any person who shall oppose resistance to justice, shall be exposed publicly and sent to the galleys for a term of eight years. However, if the resistance was of such character as to render it necessary to state an example, such crime may be punished in proportion to its consequence.

37. Every subject of the King is bound to give help and assistance to justice, whenever required. Any person who shall refuse to perform such duty, shall be punished in proportion with the consequence of his refusal.

38. Any person who shall proffer or sing indecent and improper language or songs in the streets, public squares, or any other place where scandal may be occasioned, shall receive lashes, and as prescribed by law, and besides, be expelled from town for a term of one year.

39. If any person who shall abuse another with insults prohibited by laws, such as "Cuckhold, Thief, Sodmist, Traitor, Heretic, Leper", or expressions of the same nature, or shall insult a married woman with the appellation of "Whore", such person shall be punished as prescribed by law.

40. Any son or daughter who shall publicly or privately, insult their father or mother, before or behind them, shall be exemplarily punished.

41. Any persons convicted to be vagrants, and to live in idleness, shall receive 80 lashes as prescribed by law, and be expelled from town.

42. Young men of bad habits, who, at home or in public, are a continual cause of scandal, owing to their want of regard for their parents, remaining idle, instead of working as they should, living in criminal intercourse, drinking and gambling, shall be reputed vagrants, or idle and vicious persons, and punished as prescribed by the "Royal Pragmatic" or the Ordinance of the 30th of April 1745.

43. Those, who, under the pretense of being journeymen, work one day, and remain idle another, wasting a time that should be employed in tilling the soil, or gathering crops, and neglect to have recourse to the various means of living by honest people, shall be reputed vagrants, and dealt with according to the above mentioned Ordinance.
44. If any person shall assist or conceal deserters, or supply them with means of evasion, or shall neglect to apprehend them, or omit to give information to the authority for their apprehension, shall be punished according to the Military Regulations.
45. If any person shall break his oath to fulfil a contract (This article is left incomplete in the original)
46. Servants are under the economical and civil authority of their masters, whom they must respect as they would their parents, they are bound to serve them for the whole term agreed upon, and for which they receive a salary. In case they should leave their Master previous to having accomplished their term of service, they cannot hire their term to another; nor can any master receive them in his employment, unless they produce a certificate of their former master. Any servant who shall not comply with present prescriptions, shall be confined in jail for a period of twenty days, and expelled from town for one year, and, at the option of his master, may be compelled to fulfill his time of service. Any person who receives such servant in his employment in the above circumstances, shall be fined in a sum of 6000 Maravedis, to be paid in three installments.
47. Servants shall not abuse their masters with word or otherwise; for abusing their masters with words only, they shall be punished arbitrarily, according to the nature of the case, and the condition of the persons; for abuses in facts, as raising their hand against their masters, besides incurring the above specified penalties, they shall be reputed "felons" who betrayed the fidelity due to their masters.
48. Lotteries of any description are prohibited; therefore if any person shall hold, or be concerned in holding a lottery, either in public, or in a private house, such person shall incur the penalty prescribed by the Royal Decree of the 11th March 1773.
49. Whereas several Laws of the Kingdom prohibit the games of the same description, the names of which are not herein mentioned, considering the immoderate general and inveterate passion for gaming prevailing amongst the inhabitants of this town, mostly poor people, who have no means of existence but their dayly labor, which many individuals of both sexes are neglection, to indulge in such vicious habit, gambling off the very clothes that cover their nakedness; such excesses being a continual source of quarrells, thefts, abominable cursings, and scandalous scenes of drunkenness; therefore, for the purpose of putting an end to such disgraceful excesses, in opposition with religion, good order, civilization and the welfare of the Community; I hereby, forbid expressly any person in this Town and District, without exception of condition or sex, to play at any game of what description soever. The transgression of this order shall be punished with the utmost severity of the provisions of His Majestys "Pragmatic Sanction" of the 6th of October 1771, and the owners of houses in which games are held, shall be assimilated to the gamester, and even subjected to double the penalty, as prescribed in the above mentioned law.

50. Experience having demonstrated that in most of the public and private balls which take place in this town, drunkenness and other excesses are generally prevailing; that such balls are a cause of frequent quarrells and superfluous expendece prejudicial to the propriety for the Community; in order to eradicate these evils so directly opposed to good manners and public peace, I hereby order that no person, under what pretence soever shall give a ball, or allow a ball to be given in his house, either in daytime or at night, without having previously obtained my authorization, under panalty of being confined in jail for a time of eight days, and fined in a sum of 10 dollars to be appropriated to improvements.

51. Any meetings either in daytime or at night, are prohibited in this town, unless for religious purposes, and on days and at the hours when the faithful are wont to assemble, or for extinguishing conflagrations, or repelling a common enemy; any persons who shall gather in such numbers as to be considered forming a meeting, shall be punished as rioters.

52. From and after the beating of a retreat, no person shall, for what motive or under what pretence soever, walk without a light, through the streets and on the public square; any contravention to this prescription being punished by confinement in jail for a period of eight days.

53. Considering that combustible materials are generally used for building chimnies in this town, and conssequently not-withstanding the greatest care in cleaning said chimnies, they are liable to take fire rapidly; in order to prevent the said effects of conflagration, I have directed that, every inhabitant or householder shall have the soot scraped off from his chimney once at least in fifteen days; any person who shall be so neglectful of his own interest, and public safety as to omit due compliance with the present prescription, shall be confined in jail for twenty-four hours, and fined in a sum of four dollars for public improvement.

54. Whereas, indepent sic, of the great evil resulting to public welfare, from the prejudicial and detestable practice of several inhabitants of this town and District, of selling spiritous liquors to Indians, such practice is inhuman, and ought to lay heavily on the conscience of Christians, on account of the enormous offences committed by these savages who loose their senses when under the influence of liquor, and in that wretched state, are sometimes rendered guilty of the most awful profanations, and even, commit the abominable crime against nature; therefore, and considering that, repeated orders on the subject, have, thus far been disregarded and in order to eradicate completely this unlawful trade or commerce, directly opposed to, the precepts of our Holy Religion, good manners and the security of the community, I forbid any person of what sex, quality, station or condition soever, to sell to, or bother with, Indians any intoxicating beverage, under penalty of forfeiting the property thus bought or bartered, and being fined in the sum of ten dollars, to be appropriated for public improvements.

 BY THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,
 IN GENERAL CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

WHEN in the Course of human Events, it becomes necessary for one People to dissolve the Political Bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the Earth, the separate and equal Station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent Respect to the Opinions of Mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the Separation.

We hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness—That to secure these Rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed, that whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these Rights of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its Foundation on such Principles, and organizing its Form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient Causes; and accordingly all Experiences have shown, that Mankind are more disposed to suffer, while they are not oppressed, than to right themselves by abolishing the Forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long Train of Abuses and Usurpations, pursuing a uniform Course, has excited such a Degree of Anger and Resentment among the People, that a Change of Foundation and Principles is the only Method which their Wisdom could devise, their Prudence will dictate that they should throw off such Government, and in a new Form of Government, lay its Foundation on the most solid and most comfortable Basis. The History of the present King of Great-Britain is a History of repeated Injuries and Usurpations, all of which have a direct Tendency to the same End.

The Purchase

On the night of July 4, 1776 in the print shop of John Dunlap approximately 80 copies of the final version of the Declaration of Independence were printed. Only 21 copies are known to exist today. Nineteen copies are held in government archives, museums, universities, and libraries.

The "lost" copy of the Declaration is now owned by two Dallas men, Ira G. Corn, Jr. and Joseph P. Driscoll. It is the only one of the broadsides ever offered for public sale and the only copy west of the Mississippi.

On May 7, 1969 at a public auction held by Samuel T. Freeman & Co., in Philadelphia, Messrs. Corn and Driscoll paid the highest price ever paid for a printed document--\$ 404,000--for this rare and historically significant document, well preserved and in excellent condition. The "lost" copy has been fully authenticated by Mr. Frederick Goff, Chief of the Rare Books Div. of the Library of Congress.

Mr. Corn is Chairman of the Executive Committee and Senior Executive Officer of Michigan General Corp., a Dallas-based conglomerate. Mr. Driscoll, a distinguished scholar and lawyer, is Chairman of the Board of Michigan General Corp. Both men are co-founders of MGC as well as Tyler Corp., headquartered in Dallas.

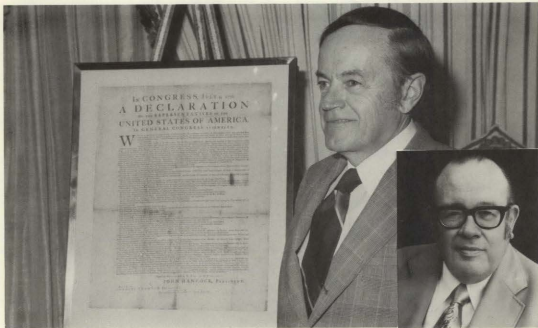
According to Mr. John M. Freeman, auctioneer at Samuel T. Freeman & Co., there were only four or five contestants for the broadside at the 1969 auction. The Bidding opened at \$100,000. Bids first went up in \$25,000 leaps, and gradually slowed to \$1,000 steps.

"It doesn't seem possible," said Mr. John F. Fleming, commenting on the price paid in 1969 for the Leary copy of the Declaration. Mr. Fleming, a leading New York rare book dealer once associated with Rosenbach's, called the Declaration, "the most expensive document in the history of the world."

In the early 1940's, the copy of the Declaration at Indiana University was sold by Rosenbach's for \$3,500 to Henry Flynt, who sold it for \$5,000 to David Randall, who in turn sold it for \$7,500 in the early 1950's to Josiah K. Lilly, who founded the Indiana Library.

The only other copy owned by an individual, of the 21 original broadsides, is owned by William H. Scheide but is on deposit at the Princeton University Library.

Dallas is particularly indebted to these two Dallas individuals who have brought "home" this important part of America's birthright. Their dedication to the manifestation of our American heritage, especially during this Bicentennial Celebration, is obvious in the frequent exhibition, open to the public, of this copy of the Declaration of Independence, some 25 major displays since 1969.

The Declaration of Independence exists in two official texts authorized for public distribution by the Continental Congress. The first of the two texts is the July 4th edition; the second version is the July 19th copy which is the better known. The "lost" copy of the Declaration of Independence is the July 4th edition. A brief history follows.

In June 1776, the Committee of Five, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert Livingston, presented to the Continental Congress their revision of Thomas Jefferson's original draft. On July 4th the final revision was approved by Congress. The Committee of Five was ordered by Congress to supervise the printing of this, the first official Declaration of Independence, the night of July 4, 1776, in the printing shop of John Dunlap, of Philadelphia, the official printer for the Continental Congress.

Minor changes were made by the Committee as the type was set. The printing was not actually completed until the early morning hours of July 5th. The Secretary of the Congress left appropriate space in his minutes of the July 4th proceedings, and one copy of the newly printed Declaration of Independence was added the next morning to the "rough" Journal of Congress and affixed in place with wax.

The second official text is the copy engrossed, or handwritten, on parchment bearing the famous 56 signatures. Congress decided on July 19, 1776 to have the Declaration reproduced on parchment somewhat as an afterthought because of the overwhelmingly popular reception given the document upon its earlier release. The signing of this copy was done over a period of several years and was completed in its present form in 1781.

The John Trumbull painting of the "mythical" signing of the Declaration took twelve years to complete and shows forty-eight members of Congress assembled waiting to sign the document. This romantic version is usually the one reproduced in history books, though there was never such a signing.

The July 19th copy, which is on display at the Library of Congress Archives alongside the July 4th copy, is missing the signatures of a number of Congressmen who were present on July 4th and it carries a number of signatures of men who were not members on July 4th but were subsequently elected to Congress. Both copies are dated July 4, 1776.

The Declaration of Independence broadside printed by John Dunlap on July 4th bears no signatures. The sole difference between it and the July 19th copy on parchment done by the scribe Timothy Matlack, is that the word "unanimous" was added to the heading. The Declaration of Independence originated the use of the words, "United States of America."

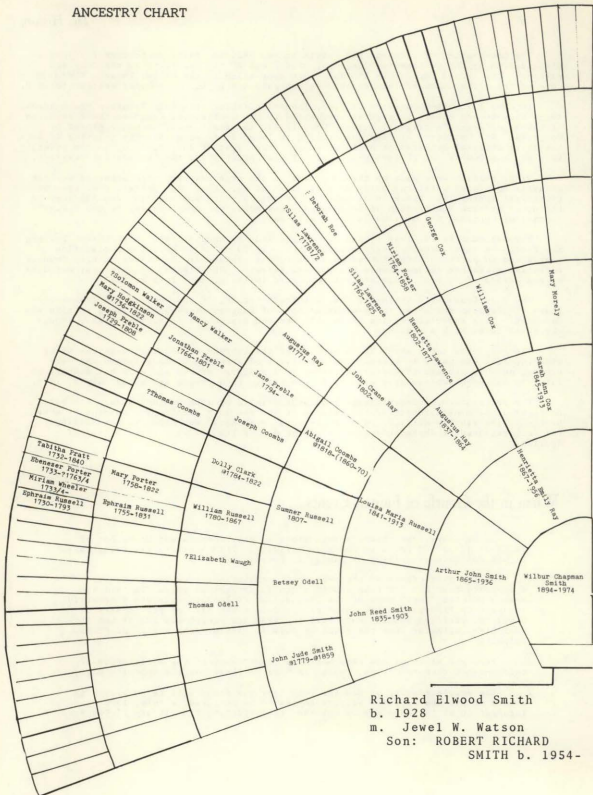
In December 1968, Leary's Book Store in Philadelphia was going out of business after 132 years in the same building. Its inventory was being catalogued for sale at auction by Samuel T. Freeman & Co.

On the sixth floor of the venerable institution, a wooden crate was discovered that had not been opened since it arrived in 1911. In this old wooden box the "lost" copy of the Declaration of Independence was discovered. Research by Frederick Goff, Chief of the Rare Books Div. of the Library of Congress, verified conclusively that the aged manuscript was one of the original first printings done the night of July 4, 1776 by John Dunlap of Philadelphia.

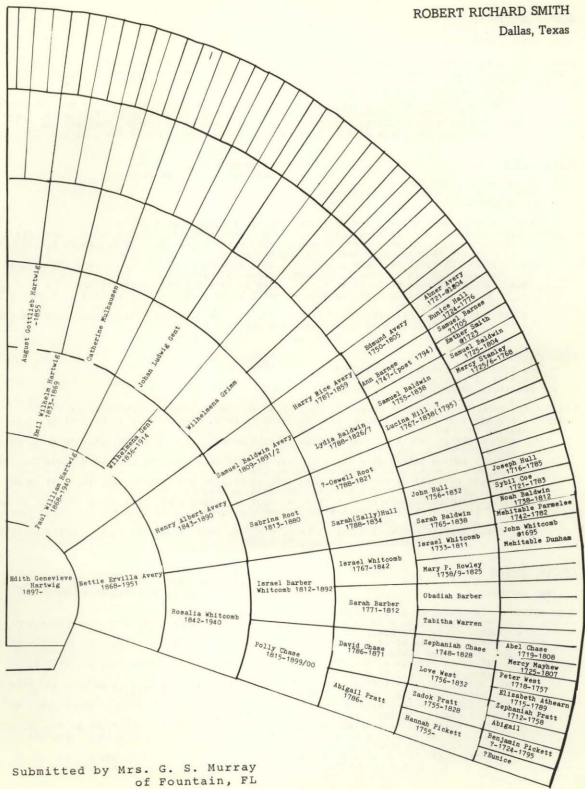
