Four sons and one daughter born of this marriage, of whom the following survive: Mrs. Lucy L. SHOCKLEY of Oakton, Virginia; Chapman THOMPSON of Washington, D. C.; Harry THOMPSON of Clarendon, Virginia; and Franklin THOMPSON of Fort Myer Heights, Virginia. Second marriage to William E. HALL. One child of second marriage, Mrs. Mabel V. BROOKS. One brother, John F. OLIVER of Herndon, Virginia. Died January 25th, 1929, near Ballston, Virginia, burial being in Oakton Cemetery.

Mrs. Matilda MIDDLETON STARR, born February 28th, 1887, daughter of Howard MIDDLETON and Mary TEMPLEMAN MIDDLETON. Married Joseph C. STARR in April, 1915, and went to live in Bedford County, Pennsylvania. Eight children, not named. Died at her home near Floris, Fairfax County, Virginia, February 14th, 1929. Elder J. F. TIPTON, born August 28th, 1858, Schuyler County, Missouri, married April 14th, 1886, in Monroe County, Iowa, Miss Emma J. GAGE. Ten children, not named, born of this marriage, five boys and five girls; one of the girls died in 1905. Moved to Montague County, Texas, in 1896; a few years later moved to Greer County, Oklahoma. Spent the four years prior to his death in Washington County, Arkansas. Died September 15th, 1928, age 70 years and 17 days, at the home of a son in Quay County, New Mexico. Burial in Plains Cemetery.

Park C. FERGUSON, born February 22nd, 1857, married February 22nd, 1883, Malissa Ellen GAINER. Nine children, not named, born of first marriage, six sons and three daughters. Married second, September 24th, 1913, Dositia FITZWATER. Five children, not named, born of second marriage. Died January 29th, 1929, aged 71 years, 11 months and 7 days, at Montrose, West Virginia.

J. F. FULLER, born near Vellarica, Georgia, September 3rd, 1853. He moved to Hope, Arkansas, in 1857. Married June 28th, 1876, Mattie BURNS. Died February 15th, 1928, aged 74 years, 5 months and 12 days; buried in the cemetery of the New Hope Church, Hempstead County, Arkansas. Had no children of his own, but raised two or three sets of orphan children.

Chapter XLVII. An Act to Provide for the Registration of Births.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That it shall hereafter be the duty of the clerks of the District Courts of this State to make and keep in their offices a register of all persons born in their respective counties.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, That in order to enable the several clerks to perform the duty prescribed in the first section of this act, it is hereby made the duty of the several County or Police Courts of this State to furnish the clerks with well bound books, with appropriate headings, and properly ruled into columns. That said book shall be ruled as to have one column for the name of the person to be registered; one column for the names of the Father and mother; one column for date of births; one column for the color of the parents, and one column for the sex.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the father and mother to have the registry of all children born unto them, after the passage of this act, registered, as provided for in the second section of this act, within six months after such birth; and any father or mother, guardian or person, having charge of such child, neglecting the performance of the duty prescribed in this act, shall be fined in the sum of five dollars for every month said duty may be neglected.

Section 4. Be it further enacted, That the several clerks of this State shall keep a complete index of the persons so registered, and may demand and receive from the person having such registration done, the sum of ten (10) cents for each person so registered. That this act take effect from its passage.
Approved May 3, 1873

Chapter CLIV. An Act to repeal "An Act to provide for the registration of births."

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That "An Act to provide for the registration of births," approved May 3, 1873, be and the same is hereby repealed.
Approved August 21, 1876
Takes effect ninety days after adjournment

Cousin Emma KIMBELL died on the last day of the year 1897? (1896)

January 1st, 1897, Friday, I went with Ma over to see Aunt Emma
Saturday, 2nd, it rained and I stayed at home and worked on my crazy quilt

Sunday, 3rd, went to hear Brother SWEENEY preach in the morning, he and Sallie GROVES came home to dinner with me and spent the evening
Monday, 4th, killed hogs

Tuesday 5th, worked with sausage and lard

Wednesday 6th, went to society

Thursday 7th, went to town got some apron goods and made two aprons

Friday 8th, called on Mrs. KINCAID and Mrs. PALMER, also went to see Sallie JACKSON

Saturday 9th, I did some mending and made an apron

Sunday 10th, went to Church meeting at our church, then we went to hear Dr. CHRISMAN at the Methodist

Monday 11th, Ma and I went over to see Sallie JACKSON again in the morning, and Sister Emma and I went to see Sister SMITH and Mrs. Jim KIMBELL in the evening

Tuesday 12th, Stayed at home and did some cleaning up

Wednesday 13th, went to society

Thursday, Friday, Saturday, 14th, 15th and 16th, it rained and I worked on my crazy quilt

Friday night 15th, BUCKNER's Orphans Home burned and 17 children burned to death

Sunday 17th, was not well and stayed at home all day, Charlie and the children went to the Presbyterian Church twice

Wednesday 20th, our society did not meet today as Mrs. JACKSON's folks were all down with the gripe. Sister Emma gave me some blackberries to set out

Friday 22nd, Ma and I went over to see Cousin Sue and Aunt Emma

Saturday 23rd, I went over to see Della who is down with the Lagrippe

Sunday 24th, Ma, Pa and Aunt Emma took dinner with me, a norther blew up about 10 o'clock and it was very cold by night

Monday 25th, the thermometer down to 12 this morning and a little snow falling. Aunt Emma started for home this evening

Tuesday 26th, thermometer down to 10 this morning and snow has been falling and in larger flakes

Wednesday 27th, this is the coldest morning we've had but sun came out this evening

28th, 29th, 30th and 31st, cold - thermometer down below freezing every morning. I have made five squares on my crazy quilt, worked a plasher? and made three aprons this month

February 1, 1897, Monday, was sick this morning and did not commence sewing as I expected to, but basted the first square on my new silk quilt

Tuesday 2nd, the ladies gave a dinner for the benefit of the graveyard. Ma is sick and I will go down there this evening

Wednesday 3rd, society did not meet on account of sickness at Mrs. JACKSON's

8th, commenced Spring sewing this morning. 12th, Sister RUCKER and SMITH called

13th, have made four garments this week

15th, called on some new members of the Church, went also to see Sister Helen
Wednesday 17th went to sewing society this evening and we started a quilt for Jimmie McCLINTIC, also made a waist for Lewis JACKSON. Went to hear Blind BOON with Charlie and the children that night
Friday 19th, went down to see old lady RAWLS this evening, while I was gone Mr. CAYTON's old cow got into my yard and ruined some of my shrubbery
Saturday 20th, sewed hard all day made two garments and a half. Charlie went at night to hear a man lecture on spiritualism. I've made six garments this week
Sunday 21st, Charlie, Foster and Sterling went to Sunday School. Sterling came home and took care of the baby while I went to Church meeting and then to the Presbyterian Church and now Charlie has gone to hear the lecturer. Sterling has gone to the children's services, the baby is asleep and Foster is looking at the album
February 22nd, 1897, WASHINGTON's birthday, the carpenters commenced work on our house.
Aunt Cindy is sick and I celebrated by cooking
February 25th, my birthday, still celebrating by cooking
(Pages 5-6-7-8 missing)
Monday, May 10, 1897, Brother SWEENEY's father came, our cow got sick and we all had to stay at home and work with her, rained very hard late in the night
Wednesday 12th, Lawrence BURROW joined Church. Society met here that day
Thursday night 13th, Jim CAYTON and Henry CLAY professed and all three were baptised that night
Friday 14th, Brother SWEENEY closed his meeting and went home
Saturday 15th, Mrs. STEGAL and I went to see a sick lady
Sunday 16th, it rained this morning but held up in time for us to go out to hear Brother JAMES at the Presbyterian Church, but commenced raining again after preaching and rained nearly all day
Monday 17th, finished a waist for Sterling
Tuesday 18th, made Foster a blouse
Wednesday 19th, society met here
Thursday 20th, we decided to go to Nashville
Friday 21st, Made Foster another blouse and a jumper - -

Thursday 27th, made another waist. Lucy came to sew in the evening and next day
Saturday 29th, finished another waist for Sterling and Brother HARRELL came
Sunday 30th, was sick all day
Monday 31st, made two blouses for Foster, which makes ten garments this month
Wednesday, June 2nd, commenced the skirts to my organdy dress
Thursday 3rd - Friday 4th, finished them
Saturday 5th, made Foster underwaist and went to see Bell - - 4 garments
Sunday 6th, Brother JAMES commenced his meeting, we all went to Church

meeting then to the tent

Monday 7th, went to preaching again and then went to the store

Tuesday 8th, had to get dinner and did not go to preaching

Wednesday 9th, Brother JAMES took dinner with us. Went to preaching in the morning

Thursday 10th, finished Sister's dress and went to preaching in the evening as it was childrens service, I carried all the children.

Sister walked all the way to preaching and then to the store. We

went from there to Mrs. WILSON's. I met John VANLANDHAM and his

family. Made only one garment this week

Sunday 13th, went to hear Brother JAMES again

Monday 14th, made Sterling a waist

Tuesday 15th, went to preaching twice

Wednesday 16th, Brother JAMES and Lee took breakfast here, and Brother

JAMES asked me to take care of some ladies from Mexia, went to preaching again in the morning finished a blouse for Foster. Ladies came

Friday 18th evening

Sunday 20th, went to preaching with Mrs ANDERSON and Miss GROVES, Ed

BELL also took breakfast and supper here, meeting closed Sunday night

with one addition, Little Helen MORRIS six years old. Made six garments this week

Monday 21st, tired out from meeting and company, started Sister a dress

Tuesday 22nd, got dinner and didn't sew much

Wednesday 23rd, went to town in the morning and carried all the children, finished Sister's dress in the evening and made Foster a blouse

Thursday 24th, made a garment for Sister

Friday 25th, made seven garments and we had a nice shower in the evening which we were beginning to need

Saturday 26th, made one garment which makes thirteen this week

Sunday 27th, went to Church meeting in the morning and have slept a good part of evening

Monday 28th, began sewing in earnest for our trip. Made Sterling another waist

Tuesday 29th, made over a dress for Sister

Wednesday 30th, made Foster a pair of pants. Made 26 garments this month

July 1st, Thursday, made Foster a blouse

Friday 2nd, made Sister a pique dress

Saturday 3rd, started Sister another dress

Monday 5th, finished Sister's dress and went to town

Tuesday 6th, started my dressing saque

Wednesday 7th, finished it

Thursday 8th, made me a waist

Saturday 10th, did some finishing up and started Foster a pair of pants

Sunday 11th, went to Church meeting in the morning and we rode out to the farm in evening

Monday 12th and Tuesday 13th, I made my black skirt. Horse died

Monday

Wednesday 14th, packed my trunk and entertained Aunt Cornelia

Thursday 15th, we started for Nashville. Made seven garments this half month

We arrived in Nashville on the 17th, found a nice boarding place just across the street from the Capitol which is an historical old building. The grounds contain the graves of President POLK and his wife, also a statue of General JACKSON on his horse. The grounds are

beautiful, the building is on top of a very high hill and you ascend to the Capitol by a series of stone steps. We went out to the Centennial the first evening we got there. We visited the Texas building, the forestry and mineral building, the commerce building and the big see saw. We then got supper and went back to our boarding house as it looked so much like rain we were afraid to stay for the fireworks. Next day was Sunday and Charlie went to preaching morning and night, but as I was not very well I did not go anywhere except over to the Capitol grounds in the evening.

Monday 19th, We went out in the evening and visited the Government building first as it is one of the most interesting buildings there. We first visited the fisheries we all, and especially the children, enjoyed looking at the fish more than anything we saw it was fixed to represent a cave and looked very much like one. The fish were placed all along the sides in large glass tanks on a level with the eye. There were a great many different kinds among the most beautiful were the rainbow trout, sun-fish and the many kinds of goldfish. Some were almost white with just a red spot on them while some were red all over, but the queerest of all was the burr fish which looks very much like a large animated curcle burr. As we came out we saw a man very busy over a large lot of what looked like shallow pans some of these were very full of little tiny things that looked more like wiggle tails than anything else but were, I suppose, young fish. The next thing we passed on to were the birds which were very pretty but as they were not alive, were not so interesting as the fish. The children were very much attracted by several large cases of monkeys. The next in order was the Naval Department. There were some beautiful models of ships, also all kinds of big guns, and a complete suit for divers, also a marine hospital outfit, bed and medicine case. There was a big bell in the building that struck every few minutes. There was also a big display of school work, needlework and a little of everything done by the Indians that are being educated, and lots of other things. We went from there to shoot the chutes, at least Charlie and the boys did, while the baby and I wandered on till we came to the building where they had the Battle of Gettysburg. Here we waited for the rest and when they came we went in and found one of the most interesting sights to be seen, we could have stayed there for hours but the children got tired and we had to leave sooner than we wanted to, being nearly night we took a car and went home. I forgot to mention the postal service in the Government Building with its thousands of different stamps and letter carriers from all over the world, even one with his sledge and team of dogs. We also went into the Women's Building for a few minutes that evening but it was so late that we did not have time to stay long but went back next day. We also went to the art gallery the first evening, it is built on the style of the Parthenon and was filled with beautiful pictures.

Tuesday, July 20th, We spent the day out on the grounds, we first went through the negro building where we saw quite a variety of nice work done by negroes and heard some good music. We next went through machinery hall where we saw them weaving cloth ribbon and pocket handkerchiefs, we also saw them making soap, we went from there to the agricultural building where we saw a great many interesting things. What the baby enjoyed most was the model barnyard with the little ducks swimming on the pond and the little chickens, a squirrel running on the roof and even some big rats and a kitten playing about. The incubators also pleased the children with the little live chickens in them. We went from there to the transportation building where we saw

all kinds of vehicles from a bicycle to the loveliest train of palace cars that anyone could imagine, It was perfect had every convenience from a bathroom to a barber chair and the dining car was magnificent with its beautiful linen and silverware, quite a contrast it was with the model of the first American train that was ever built which was also on exhibit. After resting and getting the children something to eat, we wandered down Vanity Fair, saw a house made from the trunk of a big tree, then being attracted by a most unearthly screeching, we went to find out what it was all about, we found that it was made by a band stationed over the entry to the Turkish village they were playing with desperate energy but without time or tune in fact their music was so ear splitting that we left pretty quick. We then hunted up a lunch stand and had some dinner. We then visited the children's building where we found a great deal to amuse the children. We then went down to the building where the children are kept while their mothers take in the Fair. There were several large swings about the grounds which the children got into and rested while they ate peanuts, then their papa went and got us some ice cream and ice water and after refreshing our selves and resting, we went back to the Womens Building and went through that, then came the History Building which I think was the most interesting of all. We saw so many old relics, among them was the hat that was made for Andrew JACKSON for his inauguration, the pistol with which he faught his famous duel, and a great deal of silverware that belonged to the JACKSON family, also the wedding dress of his adopted son's wife's wedding dress. A great many old confederate uniforms, canteens, caps and swords. We also saw a bust of the heroic Sam DAVIS who preferred death to betrayal of his country, also a shoe worn by him at the time that was cut to pieces by his enemies in hopes of finding papers. There was also a group of queer old fashioned furniture in one corner of the room, a harpsichord, a cabinet and a chair which formed part of the furniture of a house at Yorktown where WASHINGTON and CORNWALLIS met to arrange terms for the surrender. The chairs are said to be the ones in which these two Generals sat on that occasion. There was also a quill pen said to be made from the feather of an eagle's wing it was dropped while the bird was flying over a farm in Virginia, a lady picked it up and sent it to President POLK, asking him to make a pen of it and use it in signing his first message to Congress and this request was complied with. We also saw an old gun said to belong to Daniel BOONE. There was a large collection of old medals and coins in a large cabinet. In one corner of the room was a most beautiful collection of all kinds of precious stones in different stages, some in the rough, some polished and some set in necklesses and pins. We next took a ride on the baby steamboat and then went home to supper.

Wednesday 21st, in the morning we did not go out but went again in the evening. We visited the History Building again also the Moorish Palace and the Memphis building. We stayed until after night and saw the fireworks which were magnificent and then went home.

Thursday 22nd we packed our trunks and went down to CARTER's Creek to visit Mr. NICHOLS family, his wife being Pa's niece and his only living sister lives with them. We found Cousin Mary sick in bed but Aunt Chris was well and seemed to be glad to see us. Charlie stayed until Saturday with us and then left for Kentucky to see his only living uncle. The children and I stayed until Monday when we intended to take the early train to C_____ to visit Ma's brother, but a heavy rain came up and caused us to miss the train we then came back and stopped at the house where Pa lived, it was a very oddly constructed

affair there was also the old gin house still standing. We arrived at C _____ about night, Uncle Dick met us also Ella TOMLINSON and Cousin Lafayette WILKS' wife.

JOHNSON LETTERS

Submitted by Betty RICHARDS, Henderson, Texas. The original of these letters is in the possession of W. C. O'NEAL of Corsicana, Texas.

Accompanying the following letter is a cover letter dated 30 May 1958 from Griffin JOHNSON to Mrs. Nannie O'NEAL, Corsicana, Texas, which reads in part: "A few months ago my brother Draper took it upon himself to jot down some of the incidents and happenings which occurred during our journey from Miss. to Tex back in the year 1881."

"Dear brother Griffin:

As I was thinking last night of our exodus from Miss. to Texas in November 1881, 76 years ago, thought of jotting down a few items which might be of interest. Will attempt to relate only such of the happenings as are now most vivid in my mind. To begin with, Father has gathered his crop of cotton, taken it to the market at Vicksburg, 32 miles away, sold it at a nominal price, come back all enthused over going to Texas which region none of us knew about except for hear-say. We all got busy right away. Sold most of our belongings, which were not given away, and loaded what was left on a Conestoga wagon, such as the 49ers used to reach the Golden Shore in California. Uncle Jeff PORTER joined us at this time with his yoke of oxen which were used in the lead. Our two oxen were named Lep and Bright. I believe Uncle Jeff must have walked the greater part of the way, as it was his job to drive the two yoke of oxen by use of a long ox whip, without the aid of a line or rope of any kind. He did not have to hit the oxen at all, but drove them by talking to them, with an occasional crack of the whip over their heads. Faithful animals they were indeed! Uncle Jeff was relieved once in a while by Father. Our wagon, being a two-yoker, led the caravan throughout the entire journey. Our family consisted of five: our two parents, Uncle Jeff, you and me. George OWEN's wagon was next in line, and his family totaled eight: he and his wife, Susan, and six children, Dick, Bettie, Anna, Nannie, Julia, and Ross. The CROCKETTE family, the third and last in line, consisted of the following: the two parents and four children: Will, Lila, Mary, and Irma, the baby. This made up a total of 19 souls venturing out into, what was to us at least, an unknown country. We older kids walked most of the time as the ox teams were too slow for us. There was not much traffic on these terrible roads, especially through La. We left our homes in Miss. sometime in November 1881. Was over five weeks on the way. Of course, we stopped over to rest a day or two now and then, about ten days in all. By mid-afternoon of the first day out, the rain came down in torrents. We had to go by the home of your name-sake, Thomas GRIFFIN, to bid him and his family good-bye. Such a commotion -- two 'buddies' and bosom friends separating never to see each other again. They wanted us to stay over night, but we decided against it and proceeded to plod along through the pouring rain. We slept that night in the covered wagon with the rain pouring down all night. We kept quite dry as the wagon sheet was water-proof. We passed through Ft. Gibson the second day. On the third day, Saturday, we arrived at Rodney, Miss. on the levee of the 'Father of the Waters.' We arrived too late to ferry across, as the steam ferry boat had tied up for the night. We camped on the levee by the side of the road. The men took

turn about that night as caravan watchmen. We boarded the big side wheel ferry on Sunday morning. The big water took my eye. The river was over a mile wide at that point. The first town we came to in La. was Water Proof. The business section was of wood construction and built on stilts high enough for a buggy with top up to park under the stores. Here I had my first introduction to baker's bread. They also bought some cluster raisins. I thought it was sure high living. While going along the levee on the La. side, a steamboat proceeding down the stream hove in sight. It turned out to be the 'Robert E. Lee.' We kids yelled and waved until the boat veered to the other side of the river and was lost to view. The old folks jokingly told us we had scared the boat away. We jogged along into Catahoula Parish where we observed that pecans were very plentiful along the roadside, actually formed in heaps beneath the trees. This was the cause of my getting a broken arm, jumping out of the moving wagon in an effort to join the other kids in picking up the pecans. Uncle Jeff yelled at me not to jump, but he was a bit too late. He was the first to reach me. In the midst of the commotion a lone Negro man on a mule came along on the seldom-traveled road. We asked him to direct us to the nearest doctor. He told us of one located at Harrisonburg about 4 miles ahead on the Ochita River. The mule rider very kindly volunteered to go back and signal the ferryman for us, the town being on the opposite side of the river from us. The ferryman told us where to find the best doctor. The costor lost no time in setting my arm, binding it with pine splints and bandages. After that my activities were somewhat curtailed, but only for a few days. Next we passed through Indian country -- Catahoula Indians, the first I had ever seen. I could hardly believe they were Indians as they did not wear feathered head-gear as I had seen in pictures. Father bought dried venison steaks on sticks. Had to soak them in cold water before cooking. The woods were full of deer and there were fish galore. So you see we fared pretty well. The weather being rainy, on one occasion we obtained shelter in an old Southern home owned by people by the name of KENDRIX - two spinster sisters and one bachelor brother were the occupants. It certainly was a relief to get in out of the rain. Had a nice large room, good bed, and kitchen privileges. We remained there several days. Do not know where the other part of the carvan stopped. We ran into another rainy spell further on in Cagney Land. Father stopped at a house to see about renting a vacant house across the road. The woman charged him a dollar in silver. She dropped in on the floor several times to see if it had the right ring to it. They were a very suspicious class of people. Their was a mixture of Spanish and French. We then came to Martenville, La. served by the T. P. R. R. It was very interesting to see the engines making up a train. We next passed through Mansfield, La. I remember there were quite a number of churches in this town, all with tall steeples. We passed on to Logansport, the last place in La. Ferried across the river to Texas soil and entered the 'Promised Land.' The first place at which we camped in Texas was a picturesque, piney woods, village, with a big creek flowing by it. California was the name of the village in Shelby County. We noticed people on their front porches, operating hand looms and spinning wheels. The next town was Henderson, Texas, where we saw an old vashioned water mill in operation. We stopped and watched it quite a while. It was still forty miles to our destination, Tyler, Texas. It was two days travel, as we seldom went over 20 miles a day. We arrived in Tyler in due time, where the OWEN family separated from us and went on their way to Navarro County, where Susan OWEN's brother, Bog HERRIN resided.

Our part of the trip was at an end. Little did we know what was in store for us. To think what changes have taken place in 76 years! Our journey which required five weeks in ox wagons is now made in less than two hours by air planes. Of the thirteen people in the first two wagons, only four are living today: Mrs. Nannie O'NEAL, and her brother, Ross OWEN, both of Corsicana, you and me. We lost sight of the CROCKETTE family so cannot say if any of them still exist.

(NOTE: Draper and Griffin JOHNSON's mother was named PORTER; it was her brother Jeff PORTER who led the ox team on this journey. Jeff PORTER and his sister were first cousins to George OWEN, whose wagon was second in line.) (George OWEN's mother was Elizabeth PORTER OWEN, wife of Gadi OWEN.)"

EDITOR'S NOTE: Regarding places mentioned in the above letter, I believe Ft. Gibson referred to Port Gibson, and California in Shelby County, Texas, was probably Caledonia, which is actually right across the line in Rusk County.

HOW TO PRESERVE OLD NEWSPAPER CLIPPINGS

Are those old newspaper clippings that you've been holding on to for so many years turning yellow and threatening to crumble? Experts at the National Archives, who have the same problem, suggest the following method of preserving old newspaper: Mix two teaspoons of magnesium carbonate and a quart of club soda in a large plastic dish. Sandwich the clippings between two pieces of screen or "pellon" (a material sold in most fabric stores), and soak for 30 minutes. Mop up the excess water with blotting paper and allow to dry overnight on more blotting paper. After using this preservation technique, store the clippings in a well-sealed plastic bag. They should keep forever.

COLLIN COUNTY, TEXAS, 1860 CENSUS.

Authors: Jeanette B. BLAND and Rita B. ROOSE. 8½" x 11", soft bound, 129 pages. Order from Jeanette BLAND, 1436 North Cheyenne, Richardson, Texas 75080. \$12.00, Texas residents add 60¢ tax.

From the azure-blue cover to the last page of the Index, Collin County, Texas, 1860 Census is a splendid example of a census publication. It contains an Introduction, the 1860 Census, the Slave Schedule, and the Mortality Schedule - also included are Notes, References, and an Index. The Introduction gives explanations that are concise and direct, and an unexpected bonus is the geographical coordination of the 1860 dwelling numbers with the present towns in Collin County. The authors were very thorough in their preparation, for the Notes and References are correlated and contain important information. A work that is this complete really deserves a Table of Contents. All in all, it is a neat, easy-to-read book for Texas researchers.

GUIDE TO GENEALOGICAL SOURCES AT THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE ARCHIVES.

Author: Robert M. DRUCTOR. 6" x 9", soft bound, 129 pages. Order from The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, Box 1026, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17120. \$5.00, Pennsylvania residents add 30¢ tax.

For years the term, Pennsylvania Archives, has been synonymous with the earliest records of Pennsylvania. This is not the case, and Robert M. DRUCTOR, Associate Archivist, alerts the Pennsylvania researcher to the early records, and also the many later records in the Archives.

Although there are a Table of Contents and an Index, this is a book for the researcher to peruse because tucked into each of the ten major categories are specialized and relevant lists of records. Some of the ten categories are passenger lists, military records, family papers, records of naturalization. The unexpected categories are: Septennial Census Returns (1779-1863), occupational records, and prison records; and the miscellaneous category is a pleasant surprise with bankruptcy files (1785-1790), institutional records (1882-1909), and many others.

For the researchers who plan to write to the Archives, the numbering system in the Appendix is a must, and the author cautions that "searches . . . must be limited to those cases where the record is indexed or where the researcher provides the essential facts necessary for searching the series (exact date, registration number, etc.)."

DRUCTOR, the Archivist, has listed the volume or "amount" of each category in cubic feet. To visualize 2 cubic feet of passenger lists is quite easy, but 4,048 cubic feet of military and war records! However, it does pique the interest of the researcher.

Guide to Genealogical Sources at the Pennsylvania State Archives is a useful book and could easily be subtitled, "Something for Every Pennsylvania Researcher".

PLEASANTS AND ALLIED FAMILIES.

Authors: Norma CARTER MILLER and George Lane MILLER, Ph. D. 5½" x 9", hard bound, 423 pages, indexed. Order from Norma CARTER MILLER, 2 Evergreen Circle, DeKalb, Illinois 60115. \$21.50.

PLEASANTS and Allied Families is a serious family history which contains twelve years of careful research. The authors do not deal in the history of the period, in fanciful speculation, or cute tales of ancestors; but present detailed, informative entries about the descendants of two unrelated men: (1) George PLEASANT of York County, Virginia, and (2) John PLEASANTS (1644/5 - 1698), with 254 pages pertaining to the descendants of Joseph, third child of John.

The MILLERS have used the numbering system first employed by R. B. HENRY in his Genealogies of the Families of the Presidents. However the system appears to be difficult, with numbers containing as many of 11 digits, if the researcher spends a minute reading "Explanation of the Numerical Indexing System", he is assured of quick and easy retrieval of information. This system is also used in the charts - this means that #3 is followed by #31, not by #6 and #7.

Included in some of the entries is the notation: See Appendix. The Appendix is a splendid addition of information and discrepancies, and it usually contains the source for that one entry; however, the researcher may come away desiring the sources for all of the other entries.

Overall, the book is a serious family history of two lines of PLEASANTS. It will leave researchers of the PLEASANT family overjoyed and overwhelmed by the amount of information collected in one volume.

CEMETERY RECORDS OF JACKSON COUNTY OKLAHOMA.

Author: Claudine DOLLAR. 8½" x 11", soft bound, 162 pages, indexed. Order from Claudine DOLLAR, Box 487, Blair, Oklahoma 73526. \$8.50, Oklahoma residents add 30¢ tax).

Jackson County is of importance to Oklahoma and Texas researchers because this county ". . . was originally part of Old Greer County, Texas . . . and was settled under the Texas Homestead Law long before Indian Territory was opened to white settlers." (Introduction)

Cemetery Records of Jackson County Oklahoma contains over 7400 inscriptions from 28 cemeteries in Jackson County. Only two cemeteries in the county are not included: Altus Cemetery, which had been copied; and Rest Lawn Cemetery, a new cemetery. The dates of the deaths are from the late 1880's forward, and the legal description of each cemetery is included. As an additional aid, the author has added a map of the county.

There is an 11 page Index; however, on the last page are two small cemeteries, which were found later, so the names from these inscriptions are not included in the Index. It is a trim, neat volume, easy to read, with a marshmallow-white cover - not easily misplaced on a cluttered desk.

Adolph is a good business man but only a dumkopf would trust him with a buster pfennig. i want dam sure that schlemic oscar dont nothing get, tell adolph he can have a hundred dollars if he prove to jedge oscar dont get nothing. that dam sure fix oscar.
