Manuscripts should be typed on standard-sized paper with the author's name on each page, and each page should be numbered. Please include a cover letter giving permission of the author to publish the material in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY. When sending photocopies of original old manuscripts, such as handwritten Bible records, please include a typed transcript.

Some types of records suitable for publication include Bible records, Dallas and surrounding county court records (i.e. marriages, deed abstracts, naturalizations, will abstracts etc.), Texas cemetery inscriptions, "How-To" articles (the use of special collections, holdings of a particular repository, etc.), abstracts from Texas newspapers and brief family genealogies with Texas connections. The Editor makes the final decision on material to be published. Following publication, all original material is placed in the Dallas Public Library. Every effort is made to present authentic material, but the Dallas Genealogical Society cannot be responsible for the accuracy or the publishing rights of the material furnished by contributors.

The DALLAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY is a nonprofit, federally taxexempt organization. Individuals, libraries, or societies may apply for membership. Annual dues are \$12.00 for the calendar year if paid by January 31, after January 31st they are \$14.00. All members receive the quarterly journal and the monthly newsletter with membership.

QUERIES: Queries do not require a Texas connection and are free to the members of the Dallas Genealogical Society. Nonmembers should include \$3.00 for each query. To eliminate correspondence and delay, we reserve the right to abbreviate and condense. Queries will be printed in the DGS NEWSLETTER.

BOOK REVIEWS: Upon receipt of a gratis copy donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society, books that are currently in print and available for sale will be noticed in The Dallas Quarterly. After review, the publication will be placed in the Dallas Public Library. All books to be reviewed should be sent to the Dallas Genealogical Society along with complete ordering instructions.

SPECIAL PEOPLE

Our family genealogist has been dead for about ten years; his name was Marlin. He wasn't born with a genealogical mission. In fact, he was an emotionally pained young man who has a lot of wives and a lot of children trying to not only make a home, but also to belong in it. The divorce between his mother and father had been so bitter that little Marlin was denied his father's name and that entire side of the family was for him, entirely eliminated. He grew up with only his mother's name and with an uneasy feeling that there was a big part of him that was missing. When he became courageous enough and upon the death of his mother, he set out to find the other part of his family. His quest to legitimize himself sent him in search of his family tree, and this miraculous journey completely changed his life (and mine too, I must say). He returned to Tennessee, where our ancestry began; he remarried the last time (she was his cousin); he changed his name to that of his father; he had his last child (a son with the correct name); and then he died.

In the few years that we had this man, he accomplished extraordinary things. A journey that began as a personal vendetta, a personal history ended with mounds of careful, scientific information for our family. He emerged as the family genealogist with noble, farsighted goals. You might say that the role, the position powerfully pulled him to his finest hours, his finest self. We see that every few years in the Presidency of our country. Harry S. Truman is one of the best examples. He was a small man with local political dreams. He did not have a college degree nor a wealthy family. He probably often wondered how in the world he got to The White House. However, when he was there and when the office was upon him, he grew in goals and stature, and now history applauds him.

Good genealogists are Special People who over the course of time, arise to their positions. They begin for a variety of reasons. Sometimes it's mere curiosity or knowledge of their legal right to inherit property or their right to belong to patriotic societies or a desire to show descent from nobility or royalty. In China and Japan, genealogy is important to religion because the people revere their ancestors. Regardless of the original motivation, over time, those who remain historically involved, begin to perform for much different reasons than they originally possessed.

Since I am a psychologist and a bit of a genealogist, I believe genealogists have some compulsive-obsessive blood, a sense of their

place in history, the courage to ask what happened and why, and the energy to research the data. Overtime, they develop a tremendous sense of purpose and the desire to consistently and methodically do the job right. Not everyone who looks around in family pedigrees are genealogists just like everyone who flies is not a pilot or everyone who counsels is not a family therapist. Weekend pilots do not adequately check their planes and people die. Counselors without family training devastate a family. And genealogists without a sense of destiny mix up facts and figures with little conscience.

My job as a psychologist and as a family therapist makes me an attentive observer of people. When they enter therapy confused and questioning, they are usually self-absorbed and their lives are like a gigantic puzzle that has been dumped upon the floor. Their first journey is to slowly begin to put some order to their lives, to put the puzzle together section by section. As they enter the family of origin journey, I ask ques tions and they try to find answers. Overtime, they begin to differentiate a self; they begin to know who they are and what role they play in their family story. As this process continues, this emotional involvement with the self moves to a greater interest in others; their mothers, their fathers, their grandpar ents, and eventually into the entire historical journey of which they are only a tiny part. The fault-finding, the personal guilt begins to lessen as they recognize family themes, family "hot topics", and all of the unfinished business that moves down our family lineage. Like good detectives, a good client moves to discover what happened and why; and, over the course of time, the narcissistic involvement of the self becomes a global view. They have become more objective individuals who are not afraid to feel but have an expanded mind to think and know. They are quite capable of answering the age-old philosophical question, "Who Am I?".

Good genealogists are a lot like a good client. They all seem to begin with a very narrow vision and end with a sense of history under their belts. And, like good clients, they leave for their children and for their ancestors, a little more of the truth. With every generation of information, the story of a family changes, and the real tale emerges. As a therapist, I see this daily. A suicidal young person has usually had a suicidal parent, a suicidal grandparent, and the theme moves on down the generations. The information is of grave importance because once this knowledge is available, we have learned that we do not just have a weepy female who has lost her boyfriend. We have a family issue that stands to be corrected. We, therefore, are not there to say, "Who's at fault?". We are there to stop the destruction that has, heretofore, gone generationally uninspected.

Genealogists are uniquely Special People for most families just seem to have one (sadly, some families have none). Out of a large group of related members, there will emerge that single SPECIAL PERSON that begins to record the data. They are not just people who have nothing else to do. Our family genealogist, Marlin, worked very hard all day to feed his family, then stayed up half the night writing, writing, writing. I think his model was the impetuous to get me into my Griffin lineage. I made all the excuses about how very busy I was, but his image was before me. I could see a man driven to make his life purposeful and connect his family with their personal story. With his death I took up the family gauntlet. I did this because (like all genealogists come to know) that my responsibility to myself made me poignantly aware of my responsibility to others.

The emerging genealogists from families are usually my kind of people. To date (and I admit my sampling has not been universal), I have liked them all. The ones I have met are remarkably objective individuals (their work has taught them to use their heads); they are extraordinarily generous (they will spend thousands of their own dollars to trace a tiny fact); they are incredibly interesting (they always have something to contribute about research or history or now computers); and they are goal oriented people (you can never find one who finds life boring or one who has nothing to do).

Yes, genealogists are Special People and most of all they make each one of us feel so important. Months after my cousin, Marlin, had died of lung cancer, his many boxes of genea logical research arrived at my door. His loving wife had tenderly boxed the papers, the files, the memorabilia and sent them to me; it had been his wish. Over the years I have slowly grown more cognizant of this act. The trust he had in me was apparent; I had inherited his life's work. And, even more slowly, as I continue to read the files, I see my value. Every note I wrote, every card I sent, every scrap of paper that bore my name has been carefully stored for posterity. I don't think anyone values me like that. My mate and daughters love me, but they have probably dumped more of my prolific writing than I would even care to know. To Marlin I was a very very SPECIAL PERSON and the words from my pen were saved and treasured. That man made me feel existentially signific cant, and that's a great feeling in a world that could replace me instantaneously.

Are these VERY SPECIAL PEOPLE born or made? I really don't know. Since I lean more toward environment than biology, I want to say "they are made". However, I had a little client the other day who was aware that I knew a great deal about her family. When she said, "Dr. Cross, did you know my daddy? Did you know my grandmother? I want to know about them", I knew there was the makings of a family genealogist at the ripe old age of nine. Perhaps these SPECIAL PEOPLE are born, and maybe we should look a little more carefully at the little people. They might be recording our story.

RESEARCHING THE HISTORY OF A STRUCTURE

* by Margaret Nell "Peggy" Riddle

The following is a guide for tracing the history of a structure in Dallas, Texas. The purpose of this guide is to help the researcher find information about property and buildings and where the information can be found.

Dallas County Public Records

A. Property Information

1. Current Owner (Taxpayer of the property).

If you do not know who owns the property, check the County assessors Records, located on the first floor of the Dallas county Records Building. You will need the Block and Lot number of the property. These can be found across the hall in the Map and Plat Room. You will need the address of the property and a clerk will help you locate the correct Plat book.

2. Additional Information from the Plat Book.

When obtaining the Block, Lot and Tract numbers from the Plat Book, there usually will appear the current and/or past deed references. For example:

1220 Jones Street (address) 7931 (block number) 12 (lot or tract number)

Jane Smith to 2-23-54 (file date of deed) John Doe 210-420 (deed book: volume and page number)

3. Deed Records.

To trace the chain of title of the property you will need the legal description; the Block and lot number, i.e., North or South, East or West half. If you do not have a current deed reference, then refer to the 1978 Grantee index of Deed Records (Deed indexes are located on the second floor of the Records Building). If the building is a house, then use the private individual indexes. If the structure is a commercial or public building, then consult the firms and corporations indexes. If the property was transferred in 1978, then this index will give the names of the Grantee (buyer) and the Grantor (seller), the kind of instrument (Warranty Deed, Deed of Trust, Release, etc.), the description of the property, date filed, and the Volume and Page number of the deed. (See attached

sheet for definitions of legal terms used for researching properties). The property should be traced as far back as possible to determine when the structure was built. An increase in value of the property usually indicates an improvement was made and this will probably be a building. Of course, if the construction date of the structure is known, then this will simplify the tracing the chain of title. Refer to the Grantee index of the year the structure was built. Accurate research requires a complete listing of owners of the property.

4. Verbal Description.

From the deed records you will find the verbal boundary description and the approximate acreage of the property.

Private Records

A. Property Abstract

An abstract is a collection of all documents pertaining to real estate in chronological listing. The abstract is held by the property owner or the mortgage holder. Included in the abstract are all references to deeds, mortgages, wills, probate records, court litigation, and tax sales. Sometimes the abstract will include a description of buildings on the property. If the abstract is not available, then the researcher can find information about the property by tracing the chain of title from deed records and other legal records.

B. Family Documents

Some families have personal papers that might be helpful when researching the builder of the structure. Other personal items to check would be family Bibles, portraits, letters, diaries and journals.

A. City Directories

City directories are a listing of who lives or works at a certain address. Be careful when using the directories because some street addresses have been renumbered and sometimes residents were omitted. The

- 1911 City Directory gives both three and four digit listings for street addresses. The street addresses are not listed with residents until 1911; before this date, people are listed alphabetically with addresses following names.

This is an excellent source to use when tracing the history of a building or family.

LEGAL TERMS FOR RESEARCHING PROPERTIES

ABSTRACT. A collection of all documents pertaining to real estate in chronological listing - held by 1. Property Owner or 2. Mortgage Holder.

GENERAL WARRANTY DEED. An instrument which transfers title.

DEED OF TRUST. An instrument which secures a loan on property. It transfers title to a trustee but ignores the trustee in listing chain or title.

TRUSTEE'S DEED. Deed given the purchaser by a trustee upon foreclosure of the Deed of Trust.

MECHANICS AND MATERIALMANS LIEN. A contract lien (an encumbrance on the title) which secures payment to a workman or one who supplies material for construction or improvements.

SHERIFF'S DEED. A deed given by the Sheriff to the purchaser following foreclosure for taxes or seizure and sale upon execution of a judgment against the owner.

VENDOR'S LIEN. A security interest in the property retained by the seller to secure payment of purchase price.

QUIT-CLAIM DEED. One of two or more owners conveys his interest to the other joint owners.

LEASE. A rental agreement.

CONTRACT FOR DEED. A written contract by which the owner agrees to transfer title upon payment in full of the purchase price.

TRESPASS TO TRY TITLE. A lawsuit whereby legal title to property is judicially determined.

MRS. JOHN NEELY BRYAN

Mrs. Bryan Talks at Dallas County Pioneer Reunion. Times Herald, August 3, 1905.

The most interesting character at the Old Settlers Reunion at Oak lawn Park is Mrs. Bryan, widow of John Neely Bryan, the founder of Dallas. Nine years ago Mrs. Bryan removed with her son, John Neely Bryan, Jr., from Dallas County to Clay County, and resides on Red River near Thornbury, in Clay County. Her old friends knowing she would be at the reunion came in greater numbers than usual just to meet her again and be for two days more with the dear friend, who, with them in "the used to be" was young when Dallas County was young, before Dallas County was, indeed, for when the first settler came it was a part of Nacogdoches County. Talking to a "Times Herald" reporter, Mrs. Bryan said:

"I came with my people, the Beemans, from Illinois to Texas in 1840, when I was a slip of a girl of fifteen. We lived at a block house fort that stood where Birdville, in Tarrant County, now stands and where a few families had gathered and built this block house for protection from the Indians who were plentiful those days, almost as the buffalo that roamed at will in great heard over the prairies around where Dallas now stands, and even grazing grass right where the streets of Dallas are now laid off.

"In 1843, when I was eighteen, I married John Neely Bryan. There was a man who rode the mail, horseback, from Bonham down into the cross timbers settlements and further on, who was also a justice of the peace, and he married us. His precinct as justice of the peace ran from Red River on down this way, taking in all this section, and I don't know how much farther west. I cannot remember his name, but he was a very handy man in the community, as he could settle legal disputes most anywhere, under a tree or in a house, when there happened to be any around, or he could marry a couple with ease, grace and great willingness, and he distributed the mail through the settlements, and letters were scarce those days, but always welcome visitor, bringing news from the kinfolks and friends back in the states.

"Yes times were what folks would now call hard, but we didn't mind them. We always had plenty of meat and bread, and most of the time coffee and those who wanted it had milk, too. Mr. Bryan was a great hand to have plenty of meat in the house, and it was powerful easy to get it. As I said, the buffaloes went in great droves all around us, never out of sight, and deer and turkey were as plentiful as the beeves are out West now. The rivers and creeks had plenty of fish in them, too, and in winter we had the Northern wild fowl and prairie chickens would almost come into the house. Mr. Bryan always said he would rather eat my bread -- my cornbread -- than any other sort of bread ever made.

"Mr. Bryan founded Dallas by building the first house ever built in the town, a log house close to the river, where the Commerce Street bridge is now. There was a ferry there in those days when the river was up and a ford in low water. This was just a natural ford, the road up and down the banks first being beaten out, I suppose, by Indians and buffalo crossing back and forth.

"Yes, Mr. Bryan was the first settler in what is now Dallas County, and the Overtons were the second family to come. I remember the first time I ever saw Alex Cockrell's father. He came to our house with some Indians, was dressed like the Indians, and could talk the Indian language. I asked Mr. Bryan who he was and he told me his name. He stopped in the settlement, that was back in the forties, and took up land on Mountain Creek, a headright. I suppose Mr. Horton lived on Mountain Creek and Mr. Cockrell married Sarah Horton. He made quite a fortune and was for some time before his death engaged in milling business.

"Yes, I know all the first settlers, and when a new family came into the community it was like a nine day wonder; everybody was so glad to get another neighbor and that much more help in case of hostilities from the Indians, which we were always in dread of. In those days everybody knew everybody here was welcome in everybody else's house. We all neighbored and we all loved one another. People didn't stare at strangers like they were wild animals, but gave them a cordial greeting and welcome, and divided whatever they had with them, helping them along until they could get settled and fixed up. In those early days our house was a general stopping placed for people going to and fro through this section. Some of the men who were big in those days in the affairs of the country and some who have become big since, have often been to our house and staved with us. People didn't charge travelers for staving all night with them in those old times, but were always glad to have them. People didn't lock up their doors and bar their windows to keep thieves out, for there were no thieves or burglars in the country. We slept with our windows up and doors open in the warm weather and never thought of losing anything, and we didn't lose anything unless prowling Indians slipped in and stole a few horses or killed a beef or two on the prairie. Those were good old times, the happiest and best days of all my life. The first great sorrow of my married life was when my first baby died, the first child born in Dallas county, and my son, John Neely, Jr., was the next, the first one born in the county to live. The people were all honest, all kind and good hearted, sympathizing with those in distress, helping freely and gladly those in need. If anybody was sick all the community went to help nurse, and when a death occurred everybody, physically able, when to the funeral, weeping with the grief-stricken relatives and offering every comfort and sympathy that tender and loving hearts could give. People got closer together in the pioneer days, out on the borders, than they do when civilization fills up the country. It may bring its finer churches and school houses and dwellings, its multiplied conveniences and varied needful utilities and its greater wealth of this world's goods, but there

seems to come with it fearful dearth of God's love in the hearts of men and sad lack of human kindliness and gentleness.

This bois d'arc rocking chair you see there on the platform, my son and I brought down with us, that the people in the great Dallas of today might see the kind of rocking chairs we had in the early days. I do not suppose any of your fine furniture stores or manufacturers would let that old chair have standing room in their establishments but it is as dear as life to me. My husband cut the bois d'arc tree and made that chair with his own dear hands in 1844, sixty-one years ago, and bottomed it with buffalo hide, tanned by himself, and taken from the body of a buffalo he had himself slain. He had no turning lathe to turn the legs and rounds. but he made a bowstring (all workmen know what a bowstring is) and turned them with that. It was a fine chair when it was first made, because there were none finer in all this country, but it looks very uncouth and rustic and common beside the artistic productions of machinery and skilled workmen of these times; but do you reckon any of these artistic and elegant rockers of high price would stand the wear and tear and rough usage of sixty-one years as this plain bois d'arc chair, made by unskilled hands, has stood.

CABANYS LETTER - DALLAS, TEXAS - 1890

Jan 12, 1890 Dallas Tex

Dear Father

Sunday morning stormy. I got up & got a New's while I sent Dennis to the P. O. and just as I was commencing to write you he came in with a letter from you which was a surprise as just a few days ago I received Mothers. Yet I wish they would come every day. I could enjoy them. Am glad to hear the people of Cleveland are prosperous. Yet you write of Jake Borders & others being sold out. There are all ways the thriftless egotist that come to naught after pretensions and such I think Borders, was. Am very much surprised that Miss Eula Brown has not married before as she was what the world calls a beauty & dashing. I am glad has done so well. If you write send my congratulations.

I was at work last Monday when the Postman brought Mothers letter. I got a man to drive my team while I read it and it was the grandest treat I ever had as I had not heard from you for a month. In it she hoped that it would find me at work, which it did. And just the hardest sort, hauling dirt in wheel scrapes a constant move from 6 to 12 & from 1 to 6 not a rush but a steady move. I prefer it to hauling gravel or rock on account of my teams. It is not hard work for them. There are miles of streets being graded, graveled & paved, with bois d'arc side walks being concreted. Water gas & sewer pipes lain. There was about 75 teams in sight last week & about 500 men. The most of the laborers are foureners

[foreigners] & they make good ditchers & shovelers but so far as citizens are a [blank]. But here they keep up an army of whiskey men & gamblers, where they spend their weeks work Saturday night & Sunday. Day labor is worth 1.50 cents a day. And there is I guess between 5 & 10 thousand in town & I guess there are 1000 teams at work on the streets and still the contracts are being let. Teams get 3.00 dollars a day. Last week I put in six full days with both my teams which is 36.00 dollars. If the weather is fairly open I will make some money. When spring opens I think Will & myself will take a contract of delivering 1000 cords of bois d'arc to the R R and leave the city for a few months. We go to the Floyd Street Methodist church preaching to hear a young friend preach, Sam Hay who filled the east side Methodist church of Paris last year. He is the most eloquent speaker I ever listened too and a very smart man. The Cumberland Presbyterians have been carrying on a protracted meeting right here at us. The celebrated evangelist, Dr. Hendrix was to preach but after a few sermons, was downed with Gripp which completely ousted the meeting. It is claimed that there are many cases of Gripp which may run me out of Dallas. I hear from friends in Lamar - who are well. I want to see Mr. Jennings children as bad as if they were my own. I reckon they are the sweetest best children in the world. I have to write to Thoms Martin about some settlements in Lamar. I left a heap of things and accounts which I will have to attend to closely or loose.

BOOK REVIEWS

Upon receipt of a gratis copy donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society, books that are currently in print and available for sale will be noticed in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY. SMOKY MOUNTAIN COUNTRY. North Callahan. 1952; reprinted 1988 with author's update by The Smoky Mountain Historical Society. Hardbound, 6" x 8", 257 pages. Indexed. \$19.95 + \$1.25 P&H. Order from the Smoky Mountain Historical Society, P.O. Box 5078, Sevierville, Tenn. 37864.

This book is a humorous anecdotal history of East Tennessee and the surrounding area. It begins in the late 1700's with the Watauga Settlements and State of Franklin, and comes forward in time to the TVA and Estes Kefauver. It had been out of print for several years when the Smoky Mountain Historical Society did the reprint in response to numerous requests. The author is an East Tennessee native, and it's clear his heart is still there, even though his writing career has moved him to many places, such as Texas and now new York.

You don't have to know anything about the region to enjoy this book, but for those of us who left the Southern Appalachians to come to Texas, it's a real nostalgia trip. If you had ancestors in East Tennessee, give it a try. You may not find many details about your own family, but you'll surely come away with a warmer appreciation for the way they lived.

TAX PAYERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS. Compiled by Beth and Emily Dorman. 1988. Hardbound, 8" x 14", 275 pages plus 65 pages with every-name Index. \$40.00 + \$2.80 tax for Texas orders + \$2.00 P&H.

In the absence of any kind of census prior to or during the days of the Republic, tax records become the most important listing of early Texans. In this book, Beth and Emily Dorman have copied microfilmed Republic of Texas tax records for thirty counties and the District of Panola (records for seven counties could not be found). Each county list is for one year, with the years varying from 1837 to 1842.

The book shows for each tax payer the following: name, acres of land owned, its value, number of slaves owned, their value, and the number of poll taxes paid. With large print, good organization, and a complete index, I found this a very easy book to use. If you are trying to find an early Texan ancestor, this may be just the place for you to look.

ROGERS - SKELTON AND ALLIED FAMILIES. Helen Rogers Skelton and Clarance C. Skelton. 1987. Hardbound, 6" x 9", 903 pages. Indexed. \$75 + \$4.50 tax for Texas orders + \$4 P&H. Order from the authors, P.O. Box 340, Burkeville, Tex. 75932.

This is a big book! It is full of information the authors have collected on the SKELTON and ROGERS families, especially the latter. Sections are also devoted to the following related families: BERRY, COBB, CURRY, JONES, KENNEMER, KILGORE, KILLINGSWORTH, LAWRENCE, MANNING, MAPLES, MASSENGALE, and PRINGLE. In addition to about 675 pages of family narrative, there are 91 pages of pedigree charts and family group sheets, 134 pages of census reports, and 26 unnumbered pages of assorted material inserted ahead of the Appendix. The Index is reported to contain about 31,000 names.

I certainly was impressed with the sheer volume of material contained in this book. For instance, when all related Skeltons had been dealt with, there is a section devoted to "Other Skeltons". The Kilgore section includes a list of all Kilgore marriages in early Georgia, whether the parties were relatives or not. Since the book covers so many ancestral lines, the absence of a uniform numbering system made it difficult for me to keep them all straight, but that may not trouble at all someone looking for one family or a single name.

THE GRIFFIN FAMILY - VOL. 2 - MARTHA JANE GRIFFIN. Lela Ball Klaveness. 1987. Soft-back, 8.5" x 11", 304 pages. Indexed. \$25 + \$2.40 P&H. Order from the author, 12634 Taylorcrest, Houston, Tex. 77024.

Both of these books were attractively compiled and edited for the authors by two of our DGS members, Madilyn Crane and Margret Pearce. VOL. 1 begins with a moving dedication to the deceased cousin who involved the author in Griffin family research. It explains the touching circumstances under which that involvement took place. A very brief summary of Griffin family history follows. The rest of the book contains family group sheets on the descendants of William Marion GRIFFIN (1844-1930) and his two wives, Mary Jane CASE (1849-1899) and Mary Ann CARRELL (1869-1951).

VOL. 2 is a similar presentation of the descendants of Martha Jane GRIF-FIN (1831-1895) and her husband, Inman A. STRIPLIN (1826-1892)

William Marion GRIFFIN of VOL. 1 and Martha Jane GRIFFIN of VOL. 2 are brother and sister. They were born in Newport and Dandridge Counties, Tennessee, respectively. Mary Jane never moved but William came to Texas in the 1890's and in 1910 went on to Oklahoma where he resided until his death. Additional information can be obtained from the Griffin Family Organization of Texas, Inc. Contact through either of the above authors.

These book contain a minimum of narrative commentary. The family group sheets for each descendant are clear and easy to follow. For each person, the date and place of birth, marriage, and death are listed. The type is large and very legible, and every name is indexed. There are a few choice old photos. If you are looking for any GRIFFIN, these books could be just what you need.
