### INTRODUCTION

These abstracts are from obituaries, death notices, marriages and biographical sketches published in the **Southwestern Presbyterian**, New Orleans, Louisiana, for the dates given herein.

The Southwestern Presbyterian began publication February 25, 1869 and continued through December 30, 1908, after which time it merged with The Central Presbyterian and The Southern Presbyterian to form The Presbyterian of the South.

Published weekly, these papers were four pages each. The marriages and obituaries were usually on page three, but not always. Biographical sketches, memorials and tributes were likely to be found on almost any page.

Although only a few, if any, obituaries and marriages were published in each issue, they were from a large area. Most were from Louisiana, Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Arkansas and Texas, with a few from Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri, South Carolina and elsewhere. While the majority of individuals, in the abstracts, were Presbyterian, some were of other denominations.

17 August 1871, Vol. III, No. 26

DEATH OF THE REV. THOMAS VERNER MOORE, D.D., PASTOR OF THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NASHVILLE. This not unexpected event took place Aug. 5, at 1:30 a.m. He was born in Newville, Penn., Feb. 1, 1818 and educated at Hanover College, Ind., whither he went in 1834, and at Dickinson College, Penn., where he graduated in 1838. In 1839 he entered Princeton Theological Seminary, and in 1842 settled in Carlisle, Penn.; in 1845 he removed to Greencastle, KY; and in 1847 to Richmond, Va., where he was pastor of the First Presbyterian Church till December 1868, when he accepted a call to the First Presbyterian Church in Nashville, in which connection he closed his life. While attending the Presbytery in Clarksville in the spring of 1869, he was attacked with an pulmonary affliction from which he never recovered. At five o'clock in the afternoon the pastors and others held a meeting in the basement of his church, Dr. Young (Methodist) being called to the chair, and Dr. Baird (Cumberland Presbyterian Chapel) was appointed Secretary. Resolutions were offerred by the Editor of the Christian Advocate and adopted. Family mentioned. Dr. Moore had forbidden any funeral sermon to be preached over his remains. The obsequies, consisting of hymns, prayers and reading a selection of Scriptures used by himself on funeral occasions, were performed by Rev. Mr. Anderson (his assistant) the Rev. Drs. Hoyt, McNeely and Rice, and the Editors of the Christian Advocate. The sacred remains were then conveyed to Mount Olivet Cemetery where he wished to be buried.

She left husband, children, father and sister to mourn her death. K.

Died on the 23rd June, Mr. James McNair, at his residence in Covington Co., Miss., in the 60th year of his age. He was born in N.C., came to Mississippi with his parents when quite a youth. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Died on Monday, Aug. 28, 1871, at 10 o'clock p.m., John Newton Helm, late of Adams Co., Miss., in the 74th year of

his age.

Died at Brown's Well, Copiah Co., Miss., August 23, 1871, William Bobb in the 69th year of his age, a native of Philadelphia, but for many years a resident of this city. As a son, a husband and father as well as a friend and master he discharged his duties with fidelity, generosity and love. He was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Mildred C. Shepperson, aged 67 years, consort of Rev. C. M. Shepperson, died in Marion Co., Texas, Aug. 22, 1871. She was born in Prince Edward Co., Va., was the youngest daughter of Col Saml. W. Venable of Revolutionary fame. Seven sisters went before her to their heavenly home. Her attachment was very strong to the doctrines of the Presbyterian Church, which she joined at the early age of 17 years. DEATH OF REV. A. R. Gka. .... Letter from Bro. Bartlett, conveys the intelligence of the unexpected and sudden demise of one who has for many years identified with the Synod of Miss., as one of the most active and conscientious members. Oakland College, November 11th, 1871. Dr.: Rev. Mr. Graves, died last Monday morning (5th) of Yellow Fever. On Tuesday, of the preceeding week, (Oct. 31) he buried his youngest son, Scott, who died of the same disease. Every member of his family here have been sickened, but recovered excepting himself and his son. Yellow Fever has been raging in the College grounds in a very violent form, for a month, my two children have had it lightly. It has appeared in a mild form in Prof. Adam's family but in Mr. Shaffer's family (who ocuupy the Common's house) and Mr. Graves family (who are in the President's house,) it has assumed a very malignant type. Each of the families lost two members, (a son and daughter out of Mr. Shaffer's) The sickness has been wholly confined to the grounds, it being singularly healthy in Rodney. REV. Z. BUTLER'S CALL TO THE MINISTRY. [Abstract only of this long biographical sketch.] Rev. Zebulon Butler, D. D., was born in Wilksbarre in Wyoming Valley, Penn., Sept. 27, 1803. His father was an officer in the Revolutionary army under Washington. The name of his mother's family was Lord. He was educated in the College of New Jersey and graduated in 1822. He abandoned the study of medicine in the Fall of 1823, entered the Theological Seminary at Princeton, N. J. Dr. Alexander one day placed a letter in his hands. It was written to Dr. Alexander by some citizen of Vicksburg, Mississippi. The letter requested that some young man from the seminary be sent there to preach the gospel. Rev. Butler agreed to go. He reached that place in the Fall of 1826, being twenty three years of age. There wasn't a house of worship of any description in the place, not any Presbyterian church organization and only a few individuals who had any interest in religion. A feeble band had recently been organized into a Methodist church, who were supplied by Rev. John Lame, a devoted Methodist Minister.

Died at his residence in Union Co., Ark., on Oct. 31st, 1871, Alexander McKinnon. He was born in 1806 in Cumberland Co., N. C. He was one of the original Ruling Elders of the Mt. Pisgah Church, Tallapoosa Co., Ala., having been there ordained about the year 1840 by the Rev. Robert McAlpine. In 1857 he moved to Oakland, and at the organization of Three Creeks Church he was elected again to the office of Ruling Elder.

DEATH OF REV. ROBERT J. BRECKINRIDGE. He died at his home in Danville yesterday. The deceased was one of the most distinguished members of the illustrious Breckinridge family, whose name has adorned the history of Kentucky, since the days of the Administration of Thomas Jefferson, and tracing thence its line back through Virginia for a century. Robert J. Breckinridge was born at Cabell's Dale, Kentucky, on the 8th of March, 1800. He studied sucessively in Princeton, Yale and Union colleges. graduating at the latter in 1819. He then fitted himself for the bar and practised law in this state for eight years from 1823. His family had been Presbyterians since the time of the Reformation, and upon profession of his faith in 1829, he joined that church. He was ordained pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Baltimore in 1832. In 1845 he was elected President of Jefferson College, Penn. where he remained for two years; after which he removed to Kentucky, assumed the pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church in Lexington. In 1853 he resigned these charges, having been elected by the General Assembly, Professor of Exegetic, Didactic and Polemic Theology in the newky established Seminary at Danville, an office which he held until withi a year of his death .-- Louisville Courier Journal, Dec. 28.

# 25 January 1872, Vol. III, No. 49

Margaret Mercer McNair. A solemn and impressive scene was witnessed at eventide on Tuesday last. It was the funeral of one who had reached the advanced age of seventy four years. Her children, grand children and great grand children were there. She was a native of Pennsylvania, born at Pittsbug, May 27th, 1797. In early youth she came to New Orleans as a quest of her aunt, the late Mrs. Wm. Brand. Her social relations were with the ancient families of the city. In 1817 she married the late Robert H. McNair long a prominent elder in the Presbyterian church. Her eldest son Robert H., Jr., long superintendent of the public schools fell at the battle of Shiloh. Her other son Henry after arduous service during the war survived but a few months the return of peace. Two daughters after marriage, died leaving several children. These daughters and numerous grand children and great grand children survive. Mrs. McNair attended the first Protestant service

held in this city, at the State House, conducted by a Methodist clergyman whose name is not recalled. She encouraged all later efforts joining heartily in the services of the denominations, Methodist Episcopal as well as her own. She aided the first Episcopal efforts of the Rev. Mr. Hull, the founder of Episcopacy in the city. To Rev. Dr. Cornelius she rendered the aid and sympathy which his earnest zeal inspired, and which led to the brief but brilliant career of Sylvester Larned. Her home as long as it existed was the scene of Christian hospitality. All the ministers from abroad who visited the city participated therein making her home their own. Many happy hours has the writer passed there in the society of such men as the Breckinridges, (all of them), Chase and Chamberlain. She was one of the 24 founders of the First Presbyterian Church of which Mr. Larned was Pastor. She left New Orleans with the refugees of May 1863 and remained at the residence of her son-in-law, Chas. McGehee, Esq., near Woodville, Miss., until a few weeks ago.

#### CAUSES OF DEATH

While most of the diseases and causes of death given in the mortality schedules are easily identified, there are some that seem strange or quaint to us. "King's evil" is another name for "Scrofula", a tuberculosis of the lymphatic glands, a disease of children and young adults. The name originated in the time of Edward the Confessor, with the belief that it could be cured by the touch of the king of England.

"Quinsy" is an acute inflammation of the tonsils. "Hives" is an allergic reaction characterized by raised wheals on the skin. In itself it wouldn't be fatal, apparently children who were said to have died from hives actually died from croup.

#### CAUSES OF DEATH (cont.)

"Consumption" is a wasting away of the body, formerly applied to pulmonary tuberculosis, now known to be an infectious disease. "Dropsy" is a shortened form of hydropsy meaning the presence of abnormal amounts of fluid in the body, it is really a symptom rather than actual cause of death.

These definitions came from an article, "Diseases and Death in the Nineteenth Century: A Genealogical Perspective" by James Byars Carter, which appeared in the NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY QUARTERLY, Volume 76, Number 4, pages 289 through 301. This article has a glossary of nineteenth century medical terms which is very helpful in deciphering the listed cause of death on mortality schedules or other extant death records.

# EXCERPTS FROM THE LEDGER OF JAMES FRANKLIN HEAD

#### by Jan McFarland

#### INTRODUCTION

James Franklin Head was a Baptist minister who served many churches in southern Illinois and northern Texas. He kept a ledger, starting in 1872, in which he listed the marriages, baptisms and funerals that he performed; churches and protracted meetings that he organized or served; ministers and deacons that he helped ordain. In this same ledger, he also kept a personal journal from January 27, 1878 to November 1900, which deals with day to day life in north Texas. Finally, in the same volume he has set down his family record (starting with his grandfather) giving dates and places and further information on many family members.

Jan McFarland, who serves on the Board of the Dallas Genealogical Society as Publications Director is a second great granddaughter of James Franklin Head. Jan owns the original ledger and plans to publish the ledger in its entirety; in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY, we will publish the lists of marriages, baptisms, and funerals plus some excerpts from other parts of the journal. In the last issue of THE DALLAS QUARTERLY, volume XXXVI, number 1, the lists from southern Illinois were published and in this issue are the lists from north Texas.

In the previous issue, exerpts were edited for spelling and form but the passages given below are transcribed as written in order to give the reader the true feel of the ledger.

in the sumer the bole werm struck the cotton and nerley rooened hit I only made 5 Bales on 23 acers Bilt 2 stabels and helped hold sevrel protracte meetings I will giv the names of the preachers at the meatings at eldr rod pastor Bolden Bro. James J. Dunkin and Ivens at poolvill I was pastor. Pope Gregry Dunkin Bolden and Cibbey and Brandon at Grandview I was pastor Eldr Tipton Swinford Pope Gregry Blackmon Hareson. Hardbarger Mancel Jackson, Dale Ed Nuton was pastor Head, Boldon James & Swinford & Dunkin Cibby & Brandon at friendship Swinford pastor Head & Turnbow & Brandon I preached five weaks in my stocking feat with the arciples my feat and legs sweld to my nees doctor kelly curd me.

We had a hard winter in the yer of 1881 in february the thevs stold a span of mules from mr Cerby and a mair from mr Brown on drie creek and was folered in too the nation tha fond that there was too meney of them for the crood and tha returnded home for help when 18 of us started on friday feb the 18.1881 with our guns and pistels and sevrel dayes rashens on hors back and our blankets pasing through Boonsville then to Brig port there we fed our horses and eat our check and then we went to Chico there we bored a qune from a Lawyer and traveled north to glas co there we camped the day was cold and clodey a norther Blue in our face all day we suferd vary much with cold but gut to sleep in hauses mr aleson and mr holt took us in after supper and let us lay before the phier and furnished 2 beds and wood not chard eney thing for troubel next morning we gut up erley and eat our breckfast and fed our horses and started for the nation crost Sanda Creek beley deep in watter then went to montteg toon ther lerned that hit wood bey a vilation of the guverment with out purmishen of the guvner so we rid on to redriver station 17 miles there we met our company hoo cume by Jackbura and in concultation we a gread not to go on as we did not want to vilate the law our horses were fed at the livry stabel But mr J. Hudman the oner of the stabel wood not have eny pay for corn and use of the stabel so we stayed all dayer tell nerley Sundown when 9 of the men turned home won of our mens horses gut sickand 8 remained with with him So we cume 10 miles Sunda nite and stood gard 2 at a time tell day no corn for horses so we eat a bite andcume on to montage there we gut our horses fedd and cume onto Chicl there we stade all nite with 3 famles So tusda morning we lit out for home and let Brigport to our left 4 miles cume by Boonsville and gut home By 2 oclock that day after this omother hos was stold won mr Sanders was cot and sent to State prisen so hors stealing begane to seas we then went to work to make a



BOOK REVIEWS by J. Bruce Moseley

Any Book donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society relating to family history or genealogy which is currently in print and available for sale will be reviewed in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY. The book will be placed in the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library of the Dallas Public Library System. A GLIMPSE OF THE PAST - THE HARNESS FAMILY HISTORY. Harold Duncan Harness. 1983. Hardback, 6" x 9", iv plus 209 pages. Name indexed. \$27.50 postpaid. Order from the author, 1607 Dogwood Lane, Bel Air, MD 21014.

Mr. Harness has written a chapter on each of the immmediately preceding five generations of his paternal ancestry. He begins with his third great grandfather, Michael Harness, who lived in what is now the eastern panhandle of West Virginia during the middle 1700's, and follows subsequent westward migration of the succeeding generations to Illinois and Missouri. Then come five chapters which are his autobiography. The last chapter provides vital information on 540 descendants of Michael Harness, with references noted to over two hundred source documents. The numbering system for these descendants is easy to follow and all names are indexed.

My initial reaction to A GLIMPSE OF THE PAST was one of reservation when I saw that five of the eleven chapters were about the author himself. However, those five chapters provide a marvelous opportunity to get to know and like Harold Harness. Here is a military and civil service—man who has turned out what many of us are trying to produce—a family history which our family and descendants will take pride in and enjoy. His writing is entertaining and the material well organized. The printing and pictures are of medium quality, but the binding is attractive and first rate. If I were a descendant of Michael Harness, I'd definitely want a copy of this book for my own.

RED RIVER COUNTY, TEXAS DEED ABSTRACTS (VOLUME 20) 1846 - 1855. Joyce Martin Murray. 1990. Hardback, 6" x 9", 192 pages. Name, place and slave indexes. \$30.00 plus \$2.50 P&H. Texas residents add 8% Sales Tax. Order from the author, 2921 Daniel, Dallas, TX 75205.

This is the second volume of abstracts of Red River County deed books which Mrs. Murray has done. It begins with instruments recorded immediately after Texas became part of the United States and includes all those filed through the year 1855. During the Republic, Red River County had covered most of northeast Texas so Volume 2 contains material from Cass, Delta, Grayson, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris and Titus counties prior to their creation. In addition to deeds, there are records of powers of attorney, wills, deeds of gift. bonds, mortgages, and bills of sale. All these documents are made up of names, dates and places of genealogical interest. Beside the full name index and place index, there is an index of slave names which may or may not be of much help; it contains only the person's given name. Reference must be made to the abstract if connection with the owner's surname is desired.

Again we are indebted to Mrs. Murray for providing ready access to a wealth of material heretofore buried deep within the dusty vaults of a remote county seat. Her abstracts are thorough and easy to understand, and this is a handsome little volume. Today Red River County is so small and out of the way that I was amazed to find it encompassed such an important portion of Texas during the period covered by Volume 2, reaching very near the Dallas Area. This could be a beneficial resource for those with early northeast Texas ancestors.

Genealogical Publishing Co. has once more provided us with a generous sampling of their latest offerings. The following four books are of excellent quality and can be ordered from the company, 1001 North Calvert Street, Baltimore, MD 21202. P&H is \$2.50 for the first book ordered and \$1.00 for each additional book.

INTERNATIONAL VITAL RECORDS HANDBOOK. Thomas Jay Kemp. 1990. Softback, 8½" x 11", 355 pages. \$24.95.

Contains application forms and ordering information for birth, marriage and death certificates from all fifty states and sixty seven countries and territories. Availability of vital records, their location and cost are listed for each of these political divisions. You are encouraged to photocopy the form you need, follow the instructions and send the fee and completed form to the appropriate record office. Do you need a birth, marriage or death certificate? If so, Kemp's HANDBOOK can be a big help.

GERMAN-AMERICAN NAMES. George F. Jones. 1990. Hardback, 6" x 9", 268 pages. \$25.00.

According to George Schweitzer, half of all Americans have some amount of German ancestry. If true, then every second person in the U.S. can use this book to find the meaning of an antecedent's name. Over 12,700 names, giving spelling variants and meanings, appear in an A - Z dictionary. A lengthy Introduction discusses the origin and significance of both given names and surnames, name sources, variations, and some of the special characteristics of German-American names. Each dictionary entry is referenced to a numbered paragraph in the Introduction. I wonder if Dr. Schweitzer knows his name means his ancestors actually came from Switzerland?

PASSPORTS OF SOUTHEASTERN PIONEERS 1770 - 1823. Dorothy Williams Potter. 1982, reprinted 1990. Hardback, 6" x 9", xi plus 449 pages. Indexed. \$32.50.

It's hard for us to think of needing a passport to travel within a portion of the United States, but that was once the case. Most of the passports which appear here authorized passage from Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, Georgia, North and South Carolina through Indian or foreign held territory east of the Mississippi in the period 1770 - 1823. Dorothy Potter has researched state libraries and archives to provide us with this compact listing of an unusual genealogical source record. One can quickly check the index to see if any ancestors appear; if yes, the when and where, and perhaps even the why of their travel is revealed.

THE RESEARCHER'S GUIDE TO AMERICAN GENEALOGY (2ND EDITION). Val D. Greenwood. 1990. Hardback, 6" x 9", xiv plus 623 pages. Indexed. \$24.95.

\* \* \* \*

Now you can find everything you ever wanted to know about genealogy but didn't know where to look. A brief sampling of topics covered would include: how to do research, evaluating evidence, using libraries and reference materials, organizing finding, and conducting successful correspondence. Some of the sources discussed are newspapers, vital records, census returns, and wills, plus land, court, church, military and cemetery records. One chapter deals with using computers in genealogy. There is a liberal assortment of helpful charts and illustrations. For me the best endorsement for THE RESEARCHER'S GUIDE is that it is used by the National Genealogical Society as the basic text for their home study course. I'm a little intimidated by this book, however; it most surely will show up all the things I have been doing wrong!
