SOUTH-WESTERN PRESBYTERIAN NEWSPAPER ABSTRACTS

NOTE: Volume I of these abstracts was published in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY September 1989; Volume II was published in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY December 1989.

INTRODUCTION

These abstracts are from obituaries, death notices, marriages and biographical sketches published in the <u>Southwestern Presbyterian</u>, New Orleans, Louisiana, for the dates given herein.

The <u>Southwestern Presbyterian</u> began publication February 25, 1869 and continued through December 30, 1908, after which time it merged with <u>The Central Presbyterian</u> and <u>The Southern Presbyterian</u> to form <u>The Presbyterian</u> of the <u>South</u>.

Published weekly, these papers were four pages each. The marriages and obituaries were usually on page three, but not always. Biographical sketches, memorials and tributes were likely to be found on almost any page.

Although only a few, if any, obituaries and marriages were published in each issue, they were from a large area. Most were from Louisiana, Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Arkansas and Texas, with a few from Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri, South Carolina and elsewhere. While the majority of individuals, in the abstracts, were Presbyterian, some were of other denominations.

The microfilm used for these abstracts was filmed for the American Theological Library Association, Board of Microtex Project, 1971. Microfilm copies were obtained through the Historical Foundation of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, Montreat, North Carolina. Died on the 25th of February, at his residence, "Oak Orchard Plantation," Catahoula Parish, La., Mr. Harvey Chamberlin, in the 58th year of his age. He was a native of the State of New York. At the age of 21, he followed an older brother, Samuel Chamberlin, Esq., recently deceased to Adams Co., Miss., and settled as a planter at the Pine Ridge, subsequently he removed to Louisiana. In 1842, during a temporary sojourn to Michigan, he made a public profession of religion. On his return South, he connected himself, in company with his wife, with the church at Pine Ridge. In 1856, being at that time a resident of Louisiana, he aided in organizing a Presbyterian Church at Trinity, in that state and was ordained its first Ruling Elder, which office he continued to hold till his death. He was buried March 1st, in the cemetery of the Pine Ridge Church, by side of his brother, the late Rev. Nelson P. Chamberlin.

Died, December 25, 1871, at Hong Kong, China, aged 31 years, Geo. E., son of the late Rev. Dr. Potts and Matilda Potts, of New York.

Departed this life Saturday, 25th Feb., 1871, in Yazoo City, Miss., Sarah Littleton Stuart Wilson, aged 87 years. She came to Yazoo Co., Miss., about 1833, and has long survived her family. She was born in Maryland 1784; attained womanhood in Delaware, was married in 1808, and widowed in 1830. She was the mother of six children. Five grand-children survive her. She was raised by an aunt who was a strict Methodist. She did not until late in life (aged 58) unite with the Presbyterian Church of which she was a member for 29 years. She was one of the few historic persons who yet linger with us and serve to keep alive reminiscences of our golden age. She was born one year after the recognition of our national existence; and was contemporary with Washington, being 15 years old at his death. She was married during Jefferson's Presidency and had children 2 or 3 years old at the time of the last war with England; and came to Mississippi about the time of the removal of the Indians westward. She passed through two epidemics of yellow-fever in this place. She was solaced in her latter years by the affectionate attention of her own kindred, by the honorable consideration of a large circle of personal friends, and by the assiduous devotion of the faithful Charlotte who had been her constant attendant for sixty years. Charlotte's is the fourth marked instant of dignified personal and household attachment which has come to our notice in this city within a few years.

Death of Bishop Andrew, of the Southern Methodist Church. The venerable servant of God, died at Mobile, March 1st 1871. James Osgood Andrew was born in Wilkes Co., Ga., on the third of May 1792. His father, John Andrew, was a native of Georgia; and itinerant and

afterward a local preacher, and, for many years supported his family by teaching a country school. His mother's maiden name was Cosby. He was converted about the age of twelve. He was licensed to preach after being an assistant class leader for one year. In 1840, he presided in the General Conference assembled in Baltimore. He was in the midst of elements, which already indicated the greater tempest of 1844. Children and grandchildren are mentioned.

Death of The Rev. Thomas H. Benton. The sad intelligence has reached us, in letter from the Rev. Allen Wright and Mr. E. W. Folsom, that Rev. Thomas H. Benton died at his home in the Choctaw Nation about a month ago. He had been in feeble health for some time. He was a faithful and devoted laborer among the Choctaws. He preached as a licentiate for a number of years; and a little more than two years ago, he was ordained to the full work of the ministry. Thus again and again has the Choctaw Mission been bereaved. Since the close of the war it has lost six missionaries by death, two of the venerable founders of the Mission, Byington and Kingsbury; two others who had many years labored with them, Hotchkin and Copeland; and two efficient native ministers, Fiske and Benton. Of all the ordained ministers laboring among the Choctaws in 1866, the Rev. Allen Wright remains.

REV. E. B. INSLEE, CLOSING DAY OF HIS LIFE, DEATH AND BURIAL. He was overtaken with the extremity of disease at the residence of the undersigned, and died on the 8 inst.(April 1871). He arrived from China in December last, and remained a few months in Louisville, Ky., under the care of Dr. Wilson, son of Professor Wilson of Union Seminary, until it was deemed necessary to seek a milder climate. He and his family were provided with a temporary

home, to be permanent, if his strength should revive, in the Seminary building of the Bethany Church, Amite Co., Miss. His disease was dropsy. He also suffered extremely from cold and fatigue upon his journey across the mountains of San Francisco. Just before leaving Bethany, he was attacked, in the dead of night, with a chill, brought on by a change of temperature. Immediately after his restoration from the attack, he proceeded to New Orleans, in hopes of reaching Sour Lake in E. Texas, whose waters had been recommended. He arrived at my residence April 1st, almost helpless. Dr. Alfred C. Holt was his attending physician, and Dr. Jacob F. Joor also waited upon him as an assistant. We carried him, as he requested, to the churchyard at the Grosse Tete Church, within the walls he had first professed his love to that Savior. He was born in New Jersey, lived in his earliest manhood in Alabama. At twenty six years of age, he began, in Louisiana, the education which resulted in more than ordinary scholarship. He graduated at Oakland College, and at the Theological Seminary of the Free Church in Scotland; was ordained an Evangelist to the Heathen, by the Mississippi Presbytery, sent out by the "Board of old school Mission" of the Presbyterian subsequently, by our own " Committee of Foreign Mission." He was our pioneer in China, and died in the midst of commanding usefulness, after fourteen years of extraordinary labors' at the age of forty eight. proper to mention that the most gratifying tributes of respect were shown to the body of Inslee by the officers and men of the steamboat "Bart Able, "and of the Grosse Tete Railroad. He left a wife and children. J. E. C. Doremus (NOTE by abstractor: A fund was set up for the support of his widow and children. Reports regarding the INSLEE FUND appear from time to time in later issues concerning the collections and those donating to the fund.)

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE PRESBYTERY OF MISSISSIPPI TO PREPARE AN OBITUARY OF THE REV. B. CHASE. [Only a brief abstract made from this 2½ column obituary. Obituary gave much information pertaining to his personal life as well as his ministry.] Rev. Benjamin Chase, D.D., was born in the Township of Litchfield, N. H., on the 20th of Nov., 1789. His ancestors came from England as early as 1635. There is satisfactory evidence that about that year Thomas, William and Aquila Chase, immediate descendants of Sir Robert Chase of Cornwall, emigrated to this country and settled, two of them, Thomas and Aquila at Hampton, New Hampshire and the third, William, at Yarmouth, Mass. The father of Dr. Chase was Simeon Chase, the great great grandson of this Aquila Chase. His mother was Mary Bartlett of New-town, N.H., which was also the birthplace of his father. Of this marriage, seven children were the issue, four sons and three daughters. Benjamin was the second child and the oldest son. His father and two brothers settled at Litchfield, prior to the Revolution of 1776. They lived contiguous to each other, each possessing a good farm and owning jointly a sawmill and a grist mill.

The rudiments of his education were acquired at the District school. In his nineteenth year , having formed the purpose to acquire a classical education, he entered the Academy of Salisbury, N.H. in Aug. 1811 was admitted to the Sophomore class in Middleburg College, Vermont. roommate at this institution was Reuben Post, afterwards Rev. Dr. Post of Charleston, S. C. Also mentions Sylvester Larned, afterwards the first pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, New Orleans. Mr. Chase graduated in August, 1814. After the death of his wife, he yielded to the conviction that his proper calling was the Gospel ministry; and commenced a course of Theological study, under the direction of his friend, Mr. Larned; at the same time making a support for himself by teaching school , first in New Orleans and subsequently at St. Francisville, La. He was licensed to preach by the Presbytery of Miss., on the 19th of Nov., 1820 He returned to the East and was ordained on the 17th Aug., 1824 by "the Association of the Western Dist., of New Haven Co., Conn." In the same year, he arrived in Natchez in the latter part of Dec. and established himself at Pinckneyville. In 1828 he was married to Anna W. Smith, daughter of the late John Henderson of Natchez and she died in 1845. Mrs. Smith was the owner of a residence and plantation in the Second Creek neighborhood, 10 miles south of Natchez known as "Mantua." In 1830 he enlisted zealously in the work of supplying the destitute regions of the Southwest with the Holy Scriptures. As an agent of the Mississippi Bible Society, he traversed one half of Adams County. The interest awakened in his mind by the facts disclosed by this excursion led him to devote himself to the work of circulating the Scriptures on a larger scale; and for the next ten years under commissions from the American Bible Society or the State Societies of Louisiana Mississippi, he was engaged in a series of labors involving an immense exposure and toil, by means of which the whole territory of Mississippi, Louisiana and such parts of Arkansas and Texas as were accessible was visited and supplied with copies of the Bible. During the latter part of the year 1851, after the death of Rev. Jeremiah Chamberlain, President of Oakland College, he was its acting president until the inauguration of Rev. R. S. Stanton. Another expression of his interest in the cause education appears in the fact that in 1851 he gratuitously conveyed to the Trustees of Austin College, Texas, through the Rev. Daniel Baker, D. D., then president of that institution, a tract of land in Texas of which he was possessed, consisting of 5000 acres. In the year 1846 in order to obtain better facilities for the education of his children, then consisting of two daughters and three sons, he removed from his home at Mantua to a residence in Natchez. His death occurred on the 11th of Oct., 1870 at Mantua. The funeral service was held in the Presbyterian Church at Natchez on the 13th, and his body laid to rest in the family lot in the Natchez Cemetery. Submit committee: J. B. Stratton, Geo. MEMORIAL OF REV. ELIJAH GRAVES ADOPTED BY THE PRESBYTERY OF WESTERN TEXAS. Goliad, 31st March 1871. Rev. Elijah Graves was a native of Granville Co. N. C., born in 1791. At the age of 14, he made a profession of religion. He adorned his Christian profession by a peculiarly pious life of 78 years. He received his literary education at Chapel Hill, N/ C.; and was ordained by Orange Presbytery, Synod of N. C. He exercised his ministry first in Orange Co., where he continued until 1838. He then moved to Indiana, and labored in the field about ten years. In 1848 moved to Missouri, and settled near Lexington. In 1854 he moved to San Antonio, Texas, and became a member of the Presbytery of Western Texas. From disease and the infirmities of age, he was unable to preach regularly after his connection with us; and did not take charge of any congregation. Wielding the pen of a ready writer, his last years, of feebleness and bodily suffering, were spent in labors to do good through the press. He left many historical papers which, no doubt will be of great service to the church and the country. They were committed to his daughter, Mrs. Thompson of Chapel Hill, N. C. On the 7th of May, 1869, in a good old age, having nearly attained his four score years; he was called from earth and its sorrows, to the kingdom of God Above. A TERRIBLE DISASTER. We copy from the Southern Presbyterian the following letter from the Rev. W. J. McCormick of Florida. Micanopy, Fla., June 16, 1871. [Abstract of letter only] We were all at a Sabbath School celebration enjoying ourselves with the dear children at Orange Lake. Some of the young people proposed a sail in a large boat. About thirty went on board. When about three miles off, a sudden gust of wind upset the boat and all were thrown into the water. Rowboats were sent out to their rescue. Dr. Lucius Montgomery, the superintendent of our school, lost his wife; Jacob Wineoff lost a daughter; Mr. John H. Simonton lost his eldest son; Mr. James Simonton, his eldest daughter; and Mr. Wm. T. Shuford, his eldest daughter. A colored man was also drowned. Elder John Fleming's youngest daughter, Ida, was rescued , but it is feared she will not recover. Elder Montgomery's wife was her sister.

EXCERPTS FROM THE LEDGER OF JAMES FRANKLIN HEAD Transcribed and edited for spelling and form

by Jan McFarland

INTRODUCTION

James Franklin Head was a Baptist minister who served many churches in southern Illinois and northern Texas. He kept a ledger, starting in 1872, in which he listed the marriages, baptisms and funerals that he performed; churches and protracted meetings that he organized or served; ministers and deacons that he helped ordain. In this same ledger, he also kept a personal journal from January 27, 1878 to November 1900, which deals with day to day life in north Texas. Finally, in the same volume he has set down his family record (starting with his grandfather) giving dates and places and further information on many family members.

Jan McFarland, who serves on the Board of the Dallas Genealogical Society as Publications Director is the second great granddaughter of James Franklin Head. Jan owns the original ledger which she has transcribed and corrected for ease of reading. It is her intention to publish the ledger in its entirety; in The Dallas Quarterly, we will publish the lists of marriages, baptisms, and funerals plus some excerpts from other parts of the journal. In this issue, are the lists from southern Illinois, and in future issues we will publish the lists from north Texas.

From the LEDGER OF JAMES FRANKLIN HEAD

Decatur, Wise County, Texas

January 27, 1878

James F. Head was born in Choctaw County, Mississippi, November 10, the Year of our Lord, A.D. 1843; went to Union County, Illinois, landing there July 11, A.D. 1863 and was married to Lucinda Keller November 13, A.D. 1864. Left Illinois September 11, A.D. 1877, traveled by land with wagons and mules. Crossed the Mississippi River ar Cape Girardeau, Missouri. From thence to Poplar Bluff on the Black River; from thence to the Current River, thence to Eleven Point River, Arkansas, then to Spring River near Old Jackson, Missouri, then to the Strawberry River at a mill, then to the White River at Batesville, Arkansas, then to Hozier River, Arkansas, Little Red River near Searcy; Arkansas River at Little Rock at the railroad bridge. Crossed the Ouachita River at Arkadelphia, the Antoine River near Antoine Town, Red River at Fulton, coming by way of Cape Girardeau, Dutchtown, Allenville, Lakeville, Castorville Crossroads,

St. Francisville, Doniphan Crossroads, Old Jackson [all in Missouri], Smithville, Calamine, Batesville, Fairview, Searcy, Austin, Little Rock, Benton, Rockport to Arkadelphia to Spoonville to Antoine, Washington to Fulton [all in Arkansas] to [New] Boston to DeKalb to Clarksville, Texas to Robinville to Staksville to Ben Franklin to Ladonia to White Rock [Hunt County] to Farmersville to McKinney to Hilltown to Lewisville to Decatur, Wise County, Texas.

There [Decatur] rented land, took a trip on west to look at the country. Went into Jack County and looked at it. Returned home, planted my crop, then took another trip in April A.D. 1878, in Clay County. Liked fine, but there was too many stock for my few to go there. So I made my crop and then went to the southwest corner of Wise County, there bought land and went to the fort in July and bought lumber and hauled it out 40 miles on my land and then went home and moved in August.

Set our tent in grass waist high and went to work. Built me a house and dug a cellar, and in January 1879, hauled rock 3 miles and built a chimney. Mr Ivens done the stonework. On the 1st of February hired Mr James Dood, 2 months, and Mr James Peney, 6 months, at \$13.00. Cleared 52 acres and broke it and seeded it and fenced 140 acres the same spring and dug a well. And in August and September helped haul lumber and paid \$54.00 and helped build Grand View Church house. Commenced preaching at the Oxford Water, July the 2nd Sunday in 1879, the first preaching ever done there.

[Reminiscences of the Civil War]

April 22, 1890

I was in the war in the 31st Mississippi Regiment, Infantry until there was a law passed to release or discharge anyone and let them go home who had 20 negroes. I left the army at Abbeville, Mississippi and went home, and there we were arrested and put in prison and lay for nine days charged with treason against the southern Confederacy. We sued out a writ of habeas corpus and had a trial before Civil Court and came clear, eight of us. We gave \$800 dollars to our lawyers. In Spring of '63, I and Brother John, Doctor Freeman and Anderson Hutto took our rations and left one Wednesday evening afoot and hoodesed it day and night, sleeping but a few little naps, until Monday evening, passing through Vandors Cavalry 140 thrangen until near Booneville, Mississippi, where a company of men got after us with a negro dog. And we scattered, and I and Doctor Freeman went together, and I caught the dog and we hung him with hickory bark. They caught Brother John and Hutto and took them back, and they got away. I and **Doctor** got through to the Union Army at Cap Danig 8 miles below Corinth, and I cooked a month in the army and washed for money to go to Illinois.

[In 1876 James Head moved to Wise County, TX: in 1885 he returned to Union County to visit family and preach at Friendship Church.] In his journal, he says:

I was called to Illinois to hold a meeting in Union County at Friendship Church. I started there on the 4th of November 1885 and got there on the seventh and on the 8th I commenced my meeting at the church where I professed a hope in Christ 20 years ago and where I was licensed and ordained....My meeting went on 3 weeks; 55 professed a hope in Christ, and I baptized 6 on the third Sunday, and on the 4th Sunday I baptized 42 in 27½ minutes, and on the 5th Sunday I baptized 4. And on Tuesday the first day of December I started home. Got to Weatherford Thursday night. My trip cost me \$36.00; they gave me \$45.20. I got home on Friday.



BOOK REVIEWS

Any Book donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society relating to family history or genealogy which is currently in print and available for sale will be reviewed in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY. McJUNKIN: A FAMILY OF MEMORIES. Martha McJunkin Rhyne. 1989. Soft cover, $8\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11", vii plus 188 pages. The book is not indexed. \$27.50 plus \$2.50 P&H. Order from the author, Box 634, Central, SC 29630.

Mrs. Rhyne has written a narrative about two centuries of the McJunkin family beginning with Samuel, a South Carolina state legislator in the 1780's. The story is organized in seven "books" or chapters: The Colonial Period, The Revolution, Family Events in the Revolution, The New American Government, Spreading Across the Continent, Civil War, and the Nineteenth Century. Over 100 photographs appear in the Family Album section, while the final chapter, The Family Tree is full of charts connecting those mentioned in the story with the original Samuel McJunkin.

The book has many interesting stories and anecdotes, and is liberally illustrated with copies of original letters and records. It appears to be well documented. However, I did find the narrative style made it difficult to keep track of individuals and see the lack of an index as a serious omission.

TIPTONS IN THE UNITED STATES CENSUS, 1790 TO 1850. Charles D. Tipton and Estella Morrison. 1989. Soft cover, $8\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11", vi plus 271 pages. \$20.00, postpaid. Order from Charles D. Tipton, 2009 West Shore, Garland, TX 75043.

The full essence of this work is captured in the title. It lists in alphabetical order all Tiptons in each United States Census from 1790 to 1850, giving the state, county, and page where each individual can be found. But since it also contains the complete enumeration information to be found in the original records, there's not much need to look for them. What a windfall for Tipton descendants!

When ordering, P&H is \$2.50 for the first book (or video tape) and \$1.00 for each additional book or tape.

PREPARE TO PUBLISH! Prepared by Gateway Press, Inc. VHS video tape. 28 minutes. \$49.95.

This isn't a book, it's a video tape! It's a pleasant, well narrated presentation on publishing. It talks about designing your book, preparing the text, organizing the manuscript, arranging photos and charts, and the mechanical process of printing a book. It's quite well done, and full of good information. But somehow laying out almost \$2.00 a minute to watch this doesn't seem like too good a deal to me. A handbook on publishing would be much easier to use as a reference, and would probably cost less than half as much.

SEVENTEENTH CENTURY COLONIAL ANCESTORS of Members of the NATIONAL SOCIETY OF COLONIAL DAMES. SUPPLEMENT NUMBER ONE 1975-1979. Compiled by Mary Louise Marshall Hutton. 1981 76 pages. SUPPLEMENT NUMBER TWO 1979-1988. Compiled by Nydia Reynolds Bott. 1988. 75 pages. Both books are paperback, 6" x 9", and each is \$8.00.

The original lineage record listings of members of the National Society of Colonial Dames (a book which is still available from Genealogical Publishing) contained 8,000 seventeenth-century ancestors from whom descent had been proven. It covered everybody joining the Society between 1915 and 1975. Now we have two supplements which make available an additional 5,000 alphabetized names from members coming in since 1975. Each entry gives the ancestor's name, his vital dates, colony of residence, wife's name and his occupation. So now we are nearly upto-date on all the ancestors from whom the Colonial Dames are descended.

IN SEARCH OF YOUR CANADIAN ROOTS. Angus Baxter. 1989. Softback, $5\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ", 350 pages. \$14.95.

Here's a "how to" text on Canadian records—census returns, church registers, civil registration, land and homestead records, cemetery inscriptions, voter's lists, newspaper indexes, and LDS files. It includes a province—by — province listing of where these records can be found. Enough historical background is provided to clarify the many unique features of Canadian genealogy. This would be an exceptionally helpful tool for anyone doing research north of the border.

TOPOGRAPHICAL DICTIONARY OF SCOTLAND. Samuel Lewis. 2nd edition, 2 vols. 1851, reprinted 1989. Hardbound, 6" x 9", 1233 pages. \$75.00.

All the place names (village, parish, town, etc) listed in this work are arranged alphabetically. This dictionary gives a description of all the Scottish localities existing in 1851. The references show where a village was located in relation to its parish or the nearest town, where a parish was located within its district and the name of the villages situated within it, the number of inhabitants of a given locality, the principal landowners, and the chief topographical features.

The importance of this work is that it enables you to place a given locality in a particular parish, which leads to the identification of the parish records for the locality. Modern gazetteers will not make this connection. If you are going to do a lot of Scottish research, these two volumes could be very useful. Warning-- if you use this book, get out your best reading glasses. The print is minute--about 23 characters per inch.

MAYFLOWER INCREASINGS. Susan E. Roser. 1989. Soft cover, 7" x 10", ix plus 159 pages. \$18.95.

Ah, here's another Mayflower episode. One would think it brought more people to America than the Queen Mary! This present work attempts to provide an accurate summary of the first three Mayflower generations in America. It is organized by each of the original 27 families, beginning with John Alden and ending with Edward Winslow. There's not much meat on the bare bones of names, dates, and places but the information is quite complete and thoroughly documented. A Spouse Index is included, covering those who married children and grandchildren of the Mayflower passengers.

LISTS OF INHABITANTS OF COLONIAL NEW YORK. Edmund Bailey O'Callaghan. Indexed by Rosanne Conway. 1849-1851, reprinted 1989. Hardback, $5\frac{1}{2}$ " x 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 351 pages. Indexed. \$20.00.

All sorts of lists are included in this work, which is reprinted from an earlier scholarly, but unindexed, four volume history. Examples include: Assessment Rolls from King's County, 1676; Male Inhabitants of Ulster County, 1689; Army List, 1700; Censuses of various counties in years such as 1698, 1702, and 1714; Inhabitants of several towns in the early 1700's; Lists of Moravians and Quakers, 1755-1756; etc. This reprint has all of the genealogical records of the original, and a complete index of names. Warning: have your newest glasses handy if you pick up this book; part of the print, such as in the index, is some kind of small!

METRO PAST - DALLAS MORNING NEWS

19 May 1886

Justice Kendall held an inquest yesterday on the remains of Mr. A. Schaeffer, who was found dead in his bed yesterday morning at his residence at the corner of Preston and Cabell streets. Dr. Parsons testified that he had attended for three months the deceased for a gun shot wound in the lungs, received during the war. Death, he said, might have resulted at any time from hemorrhage. The jury returned a verdict that the deceased had come to his death by a gunshot wound in the lungs. Mr. Schaeffer left a wife and two children all of whom are sick with the measles.

22 May 1886

Mr. Robert B. Cockrell died yesterday afternoon of consumption. He will be interred tomorrow at the family burial place near the Masonic Cemetery.

31 August, 1887

Mrs. Mathilda Bennett, who fractured both her legs last Saturday in jumping from a buggy the horse attached to which was running away, is reported to be getting along as well as could be expected under the circumstances.

17 October 1887

The Dallas Light Guards, commanded by Captain McMillan, will appear on dress parade next Thursday. The company includes several new and undrilled men, but by strict attention to duty it expects to make the mark in time.
