PRODUCTS OF INDUSTRY SCHEDULE

In 1850, in addition to the Population Schedule, Mortality, Agricultural and Industrial Schedules were taken by the federal government. While most genealogists are familiar with both the Population and Mortality Schedules, the Agricultural and Industrial schedules are less used. These schedules do not give any vital statistics, but are helpful giving an idea of the economic and social status of the family, and collectively give a picture of the county during that census year.

In the previous issue, March 1991, Volume XXXVII, Number 1, *Dallas Quarterly*, the Agricultural Census for Dallas County 1850 was abstracted. In 1850 although there were 178 farms listed in Dallas County only one business had an annual product of over \$500 and qualified to be on the Products of Industry Schedule. In 1850, Dallas County had only been in existence for 4 years and was still agrarian; however, by 1860, there were actually 13 businesses which qualified for the Product of Industry Schedule.

INTRODUCTION

These abstracts are from obituaries, death and marriage notices, biographical sketches and some miscellaneous items published in *The Texas Presbyterian* for the dates given herein (1892.)

Presbyterian newspapers have a long history in Texas. The *Texas Presbyterian* was the first of the major denominational newspapers to be published in Texas. In 1846, Reverend Andrew Jackson McGown established the *Texas Presbyterian* at Victoria, Texas. Facing financial and supply problems in Victoria, McGown moved the paper to Houston and in 1851 the paper was published in Huntsville. At the height of its influence, the circulation reached 1500 copies weekly. Mailed statewide the paper filled a real need for the church and its members. McGown ceased publishing in 1856. [TEXAS PRESBYTERIAN ABSTRACTS 1846-1856 by Helen Lu will be published on microfiche by the Dallas Genealogical Society later this year. Watch for publication announcement.]

Presbyterians in Texas were without a newspaper for several years, until *The Southwestern Presbyterian* in New Orleans began publication February 25, 1869 and continued through December 30, 1908. Texas Presbyterians relied on this paper during the years that there was no local presbyterian paper. [SOUTHWESTERN PRESBYTERIAN NEWSPAPER ABSTRACTS, VOLUMES I THROUGH V by Helen Lu, have been serialized in The Dallas Quarterly; Volume XXXV, #3 & #4; Volume XXXVI, #1 - #3; Volume XXXVII, #1 & #2.]

In 1892 a *Texas Presbyterian* began publication in Houston, Texas; however, located copies are few and far between. The few that the researcher has been able to find are on microfilm in the Stitt Library, Austin Theological Seminary, Austin, Texas.

FURNEAUX CEMETERY (CEMETERY HILL) Denton County

Furneaux Cemetery is in Carrollton, in south west Denton County about a mile and a half north of the Dallas County line, on Cemetery Hill Road between Rosemeade Parkway and Sandy Ridge Road. A Historical Marker dated 1984 gives the following information:

William Furneaux, a native of England, came to Texas in 1857, married Fannie Jackson (died 1917) whose family had come to Texas in 1848 as part of the Peters Colony. This cemetery was established in 1884, when Furneaux died and was buried on a section of his farm he had indicated should become a public graveyard. Seven year old Peter Husky died soon after and was buried near Furneaux. Although three graves bear earlier dates, they were moved here from other cemeteries.

With establishment of the cemetery, Peter Husky's father William donated part of his land for use as a church site. A public meeting was then held to discuss plans for laying out plots and building a sanctuary. A Cemetery Association was chartered in 1888 and the graveyard officially came known as Furneaux Cemetery. Charter Directors chosen were Joseph Morgan, W. R. Dudley, John Jackson, Jr., V. S. Dudley and J. H. Furneaux.

Originally surrounded by extensive farmland, the church and cemetery became known as Cemetery Hill. When a 1924 tornado destroyed the frame church building, the Cemetery Association acquired the land. The Furneaux Cemetery is a burial place for many area pioneers and their descendants.

This cemetery was inventoried during May 1991 by Helen Mason Lu and Adrienne B. Jamieson. It is an interesting, small, well kept cemetery that is still in active use after 107 years. Apparently it is laid out in plots, rather than rows and we have tried to record it plot by plot. The Furneaux plot is well marked and bordered by stone so we have identified that plot. Since the other plots were not as well defined, they are not specifically identified. We endeavored to record the stones in each plot together but the boundaries of the plots were not always obvious, so some of the groupings are quite arbitrary.

INTRODUCTION

These abstracts are from obituaries, death notices, marriages and biographical sketches published in the *Southwestern Presbyterian*, New Orleans, Louisiana, for the dates given herein.

The Southwestern Presbyterian began publication February 25, 1869 and continued through December 30, 1908, after which time it merged with The Central Presbyterian and The Southern Presbyterian to form The Presbyterian of the South.

Published weekly, these papers were four pages each. The marriages and obituaries were usually on page three, but not always. Biographical sketches, memorials and tributes were likely to be found on almost any page.

Although only a few, if any, obituaries and marriages were published in each issue, they were from a large area. Most were from Louisiana, Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Arkansas and Texas, with a few from Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri, South Carolina and elsewhere. While the majority of individuals, in the abstracts, were Presbyterian, some were of other denominations.

The microfilm used for these abstracts was filmed for the American Theological Library Association, Board of Microtex Project, 1971. Microfilm copies were obtained through the Historical Foundation of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, Montreat, North Carolina. Microfilm used for these abstracts have been donated to the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, Dallas.

We copy from *The Presbyterian and Index* an obituary notice. The wife of Rev. Edward Palmer, Pastor of the Walterboro church, S.C., died unexpectedly. Rev. Palmer is in his 85th year. Mentions Rev. Palmer of New Orleans and Rev. E. P. Palmer of Mobile, step-sons of the deceased.

Married by the Rev. Wm. Flinn at the house of the bride's father, Oct. 16th, 1873, Mr. G. W. Smith and Miss Felicity Pomet.

Died on the 15th of Oct. 1873, Mrs. Laura Eagan, wife of Hon. James C. Eagan. She united with the Presbyterian church at Homer in 1870.

Died suddenly and unexpectedly, at her residence in Walterboro, S.C., on the 13th instant, Mrs. Frances Palmer, wife of Rev. Edward Palmer.

Stranger than fiction. A North German newspaper advertises for the American heirs of the fortune of a widow lady of Amsterdam as follows: "The following heirs of Catherine Speling and her daughter Dorothy, both of whom died a violent death in 1852, at Amsterdam, are requested to send their addresses immediately to the Royal Probate Court of Amsterdam; Sophia Behrensburg, Otto Kellenaer, Anna Derfling, Joseph Derfling, all of whom emigrated to the United States in 1864." The story of the death of the two women in 1852, and finding their murderer twenty years after, is a revelation of occurrences which are as terribly tragic as may be found within the lids of a romance. The widow and her daughter were joint possessors of diamonds, money, and bonds worth \$150,000 and occupied a house by themselves on Harlan Street, Amsterdam. In July last the house was torn down, and in its destruction came to light a circumstance equalling in horror the discovery of the assassination of the two lone women. Between the house taken down and the adjoining one was a space of about a foot, and confined in this narrow cell was found the skeleton of a man, caught midway between top and bottom, and on the ground underneath him were found the diamonds, the bonds and the money of the two murdered women. The assassin, in attempting to escape had missed his footing, fallen between the houses, and with a strip of blue sky visible above the walls of his living tomb, had starved to death.

Rev. Charles S. Dod was born in Elizabeth, N.J., May 15th 1814. He was a brother of Albert C. Dod, the distinguished professor of Princeton College. Having graduated from this institution in 1833, he went southward and was licensed by the Presbytery of Georgia and ordained pastor of the 1st Presbyterian Church in Augusta. He was associated with the University of Georgia and Darien academy, and professor of mathematics in Jefferson College, Pa. He had a brief pastorate in Holly Springs, Miss., and a year evangelistic labor in Louisiana. From Jackson, Tenn. where he resided as president of West Tennessee College, he removed to Plaquemine, La. In 1869 he removed to Shreveport, La. He died in the town of Centerville, St. Mary's Parish, La., Nov. 23rd, 1872.

Rev. Wallace H. Stratton was of New Jersey parentage, the eldest of five sons of Rev. James Stratton, pastor of the church of Jackson, La. He was born at Eufala, Ala., April 25th, 1839. His structure was dwarfed by an accident in early childhood affecting his spine. He graduated from Oakland College, Miss. He pursued his theological training at the seminary in Columbia, S. C. Was licensed and ordained pastor of the church at Anderson Court House in that state. He went south and assumed the charge of the church at Pass Christian on the Mississippi Sound and removed to Baton Rouge, La., where in Oct 1872, he was installed as pastor of the church and whence Aug. 21st, 1873, he entered his rest.

Died in the city of Austin, Oct. 23d, 1873, Edward Frederick Milton, youngest child of the late E. and Mrs. C. Beatrice Gaylord, late of Victoria, and grandchild of N. A. Milton, Esq. He was referred to as little Freddy.

13 November 1873, Vol. V, No. 39

The South is called to mourn the loss of the gallant General Hardee. He was buried last week at Salem, Ala., with great lamentations.

Our southern church has also to place the name of Rev. S. H. Commins of Tennessee on the list of honored dead.

Died of diphtheria on the 26th of Oct., at Ridgeway, S.C., Mary Logan Porter, aged 6 years, the youngest child of the late Rev. A. A. Porter, D.D., of Texas.

20 November 1873, Vol. V, No. 40

Death of Bismark's wife. The death of his wife Princess Bismark, is a bereavement that will fall very heavily upon the great chancellor of Germany. In their married life of twenty-six years, they had remained lovers. Bismark married Johanna von Putkammer in 1847; Bismark then being thirty-two years old and Johanna, nine years younger than himself. [NOTE by abstractor: Much interesting information given in this long article.]

27 November 1873, Vol. V, No. 41

Dr. Robert Smith Candlish was the son of Mr. James Candlish, a teacher of medicine in Edinburgh, his mother being one of the "Mauchline belles" celebrated by Robert Burns. He was born on 23d March 1807. In 1828, he received from the Presbytery of Glasgow license to preach. This long article gave much about his career.



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BOOK REVIEWS

Any book donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society relating to family history or genealogy which is currently in print and available for sale will be reviewed in THE DALLAS QUARTERLY. The book will be placed in the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library of the Dallas Public Library System. All publications to be reviewed should be sent to the Dallas Genealogical Society together with price and complete ordering information.

Who writes genealogical books anyway? Is it some eccentric unknown, puttering around in a distant and dusty library? Not so at all, according to the publications received by the Society in the current quarter, Two of our authors are active, red blooded D.G.S. members; another is a Dallasite living in our midst; and the last is a very good friend of several Society members. Here is what they have to offer.

THE JOSIAH O. & ELIZABETH ANN (RAINER) BLACK FAMILY. Joseph Nelson Black, Sr. 1991. Softback, 8 ½" x 11", 45 pages. Name indexed. \$5.00, postpaid and tax included. Order from the author, 2618 Jim Loftin Road, Dallas, TX 75224.

Joe Black, a D.G.S.member, has done a nice job on what he calls a newsletter. It contains all the information he has on the descendants of his Black grandparents. This issue was dated March 1991, but an update is planned for July 1991. New information received from family members by July 1 will be included.

Josiah and Elizabeth Ann Black, the title subjects, were both born in Alabama in the 1840's. By 1886, they had moved to Coryell County, Texas, where they lived out the rest of their years. Each of their four children head one of the sections, or "branches" of the BLACK FAMILY TREE. The author, who is Josiah's grandson, has covered what little he knows of his surnames's origin, and the impressive amount available so far on Josiah and Elizabeth Ann's descendants. The index contains 871 names, which includes in-laws as well as direct family descent. Other surnames which appear frequently are CARROLL, FARMER, GALLAWAY, HOLDEN, RAINER, PUCKETT, SHELTON, WARE AND WATTS. Without a numbering system or charts, however, its a little hard to keep the names straight as you read the story.

INDEX TO THE DISPATCHES AND TO THE NAMES OF THE UNITED STATES SOLDIERS WHO FOUGHT IN THE FINAL BATTLES OF THE MEXICAN WAR. Mary Emily Smith Witt. 1991. Softback, 8½" x 11", 33 pages. \$5.00 postpaid and tax included. Order from MEW Publishing, P. O. Box 8352, Dallas, TX 75205.

The author, who is a D.G.S. member, has a copy of 113 War Department dispatches, dated from June to October 1847, in which commanding officers describe the last few engagements of the Mexican War. They give the names and exploits of individuals who were involved, and include some of the casualty lists of killed and wounded. Mrs. Witt provides a brief description of each dispatch, covering who it was from, to whom written, the date, the subject, and how many pages are entailed.

Then comes the bonanza!! All of the 1400 names mentioned in the dispatches are alphabetized and have appended the number of the dispatch in which the name appears. An order form at the end of the booklet is available for ordering copies of dispatches in which you have an interest. I didn't find any surnames I am researching, but I did spot 2nd Lt. U. S. Grant and Captain R. E. Lee.

Nova A. Lemons, 12206 Brisbane Avenue, Dallas, TX 75234, has produced three softbound cemetery indexes covering five cemeteries, all in Marshall County, Oklahoma. Each is 8 ½" x 11", has a locator map, a listing of tombstone inscriptions from east to west and row by row, and an index of surnames. The booklets are:

The southern border of Marshall County, Oklahoma is formed by Lake Texoma. Madill is the county seat, but all five of these cemeteries lie well to the west and south of there. The oldest grave (1885) is in Keel Cemetery, reflecting the fact that this area was part of the Chickasaw Nation, and was inhabited almost exclusively by Indians until the 1880's. All of the sites are still in use, so just over 100 years of interments are presented.

Mrs. Lemons has done a meticulous job of recording every detail of these burial grounds. If you need help in locating a lost Sooner relative, these indexes may be the answer.

The following two compilations are by Weynette Parks Haun, 243 Argonne Drive, Durham NC 27704:

Pasquotank County is in he extreme northeastern corner of North Carolina. Elizabeth City, the county sear, is fifty miles south of Norfolk, Virginia. It has some very old records, and Weynette Haun has done a marvelous job transcribing Court Minutes for the period 1747 through 1753. In many cases she had to consult other contemporaneous records to decipher faded ink, illegible writing, incomplete entries, or disintegrated paper, so that an accurate transcription could be made.

About 2,00 names appear in the index, and each is referenced to a page number in the original document. (At least two pages of the original material appear on a single page of this book--nobody gets more words on a piece of paper than Weynette!) This reduces search time, since you only need to scan at most half a page to find an indexed name.

NORTH CAROLINA REVOLUTIONARY ARMY ACCOUNTS--SECRETARY OF STATE, TREASURER'S & COMPTROLLER'S PAPERS, VOLUME I, VOLUME II, PART II. 1990. Softbound, 8½ " X 11", 150 pages. Name indexed. \$20.00 postpaid.

North Carolina soldiers and citizens who had a claim against the State for service or supplies furnished during the Revolutionary War were issued specie certificates in settlement of these claims. Redemption and settlement of the certificates was duly recorded in the Revolutionary Army Accounts. Mrs. Haun has done her usual thorough job of copying these records as best she could, and has prepared a name index with over 6000 listings. In this case each listing is referenced to a page in the current book which may contain a 100 lines. I liked the indexing method used in the Pasquotank Court Minutes better.

There really isn't much information to go with each of these certificate entries, but perhaps what little is there might help someone find proof of an ancestor's Revolutionary War service.
