AGRICULTURAL SCHEDULE

In 1850, every farm with an annual produce worth \$100 or more for the year ending June 1, was enumerated on a special form, SCHEDULE 4. The only specifically genealogical information given on this nonpopulation schedule is the name of the owner, agent or manager of the farm. However; since the amount and value of land, the number and type of animals, the type and amount of various crops grown are listed, a rather accurate view of a specific family farm emerges. Read as a whole, the Agricultural Schedule for Dallas County, 1850 gives an interesting picture of the community.

Ben Merrell was the enumerator and swore before A. Harwood, on the 8th of March 1851, that the 5 double pages of Schedule #4 were made by him in strict accordance with his oath and instructions. The pages were numbered at later date and it is obvious from the dates at the top of each page that the pages are not in the order in which they were originally recorded. If the pages are put in date order, they match the population schedule and apparently were done at the same time.

Agricultural censuses survive from 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1880. On the 1850 schedule there were 46 columns with the following headings.

Note from the editor:

The form used was the same for the whole country, so some of the categories did not apply to Dallas County. Thirteen of the 46 columns had no entries at all; no orchard crops or wine were listed. Rice, barley, hops market garden produce, hemp (dew rotted and water rotted) were not mentioned. Clover and grass seeds, maple sugar. molasses and silk cocoons did not appear on the returns.

Some of the other crops were not widely grown in the county, the 50 pounds of tobacco grown by John Langley was unique. Of the 178 farms listed, only 6 grew any flax. William B. Miller and Silas B. Runion were the only farmers growing Irish potatoes. Wheat, rye and buckwheat were grown by relatively few farmers, while corn appeared on every return for Dallas County.

INTRODUCTION

These abstracts are from obituaries, death notices, marriages and biographical sketches published in the *Southwestern Presbyterian*, New Orleans, Louisiana, for the dates given herein.

The Southwestern Presbyterian began publication February 25, 1869 and continued through December 30, 1908, after which time it merged with The Central Presbyterian and The Southern Presbyterian to form The Presbyterian of the South.

Published weekly, these papers were four pages each. The marriages and obituaries were usually on page three, but not always. Biographical sketches, memorials and tributes were likely to be found on almost any page.

Although only a few, if any, obituaries and marriages were published in each issue, they were from a large area. Most were from Louisiana, Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Arkansas and Texas, with a few from Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri, South Carolina and elsewhere. While the majority of individuals, in the abstracts, were Presbyterian, some were of other denominations.

The microfilm used for these abstracts was filmed for the American Theological Library Association, Board of Microtex Project, 1971. Microfilm copies were obtained through the Historical Foundation of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, Montreat, North Carolina. Microfilm used for these abstracts have been donated to the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, Dallas.



He was born in Eufala, Ala., on the 26th April 1839. In the fifth year of his age, he met with accident which injured his spine, and in consequence of which his structure was dwarfed. He pursued his collegiate course at Oakland College. He became pastor of the church at Anderson, S.C., in 1865, where he remained about five years. Upon his return to his parents in Louisiana he accepted an invitation to supply the church in Pass Christian on the Mississippi Sound. His next and last charge was Baton Rouge. He died on the 21st of Aug. 1873.

[From the *Southern Presbyterian*]. Rev. Thomas Smyth, D.D., was born in Belfast, Ireland, on the 14th of June 1808, of Scotch and English ancestry, and his father having participated in what is called "the Rebellion of 1798," and suffered a long and painful imprisonment. He was the youngest of six sons. In 1827 he entered Belfast college. He was married to the eldest daughter of Mr. James Adger, and she died after a happy wedded life of over forty years. (Note by abstractor: This extremely long article gives much pertaining to his life and career).

Died in New Orleans on Wednesday, morning, Sept. 10th, 1873, at 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, Mary V. Spooner aged 18 years and 4 months. She was referred to as Molly.

BOOK REVIEWS

WHY ARE THERE NO TALL GRANDMA'S? A Guide to Assist You in Researching Your Family History. Scott B. Chase. 1990. Softback, 6" x 9", 121 pages. \$12.95 plus \$1.90 P&H.

Following a brief but lucid introduction, and a similarly helpful section on Getting Started, the author has chosen to organize the rest of his treatise in specific time periods-- researching back to 1910, 1910 to 1790, 1790 to 1700, and 1700 to 1620. The text is written in a simplistic, light hearted vein, with a few cutesy cartoons thrown in for good measure. There is a four page Bibliography and a two and a half page Index. I never did understand the significance of the intriguing title, however.

Scott Chase, an engineer at Eastman Kodak in Rochester, has attempted to apply engineering research techniques to researching his family history. This little manual is the result of his work. It definitely is different from most introductions to genealogy. Several of his innovations are uniquely illuminating, but others turn out to be disconcerting. Example: his pedigree charts have the mother of a female on the top line of her bracket where the father is usually seen. However, since this book is aimed strictly at a beginner audience, such originality shouldn't be too much of a problem. All in all , what we have here is a listing of much that a novice genealogist should know, but without going into too much detail describing it.

IMMIGRANTS IN MADISON COUNTY, NEW YORK 1815-1860. Isabel Bracy. 1990 Softback, 6" x 9", 120 pages. \$10.00 plus \$2.00 P&H.

Eighty-two pages of this book contain an alpha listing of over 3,000 immigrant surnames. Each entry includes an immigrant's given name, township of residence, year of immigration, the country of origin, and occupation. At least, I think it is the year of immigration; there is no legend or explanation, whatsoever. The remainder of the book contains a somewhat bizarre Madison County miscellany. Included are items about the Erie Canal, types of employment, county newspapers, kinds of agriculture, stage coaches, entertainment, women's rights movement, and (I'm really telling the truth!) home remedies. What all this has to do with immigrants isn't clear, but it is interesting and fun to read.

HOW TO WRITE AND PUBLISH YOUR FAMILY HISTORY USING WORDPERFECT. For Versions 4.1, 4.2 or 5.0 on MS-DOS Computers. Stanley R. Ames. 1988. Softback, 6" x 9", 158 pages. \$17.95 plus \$1.25 P&H.

Everything the title promises is covered in this book, and then some. In addition to keystroke-by-keystroke instructions on using WordPerfect for genealogical writing, there is a wealth of general information on preparing a family history. Chapter titles include: Collecting and Managing Information, Writing Text, Editing the Book, Layout, Pictures and Graphics, Final Touches, The Index, Printing and Binding, and Marketing.

You don't have to be a user of WordPerfect to benefit from features in this book like the brief but well-done discussions of numbering systems, methods of binding, or advice on what type of printing to use. this would be a handy reference for any one involved in preparing a family history, but for WordPerfect users, surely it's a must.

GENEALOGICAL DEED ABSTRACTS, MECKLENBURG COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, BOOKS 10-14. Herman W. Ferguson. 1990. Softback, 8 ½" x 11", 250 pages. Fully name and place indexed. \$25.00 postpaid. Order from the compiler, 600 Chad Drive, Rocky Mount, NC 27803.

Mecklenburg County lies on the boundary between North and South Carolina. Charlotte, the largest city in the state, is the county seat. Deed Book 10 begins with deeds recorded in 1778 and Book 14 ends with 1794 recordings. Most of the instruments recorded are land grants in the immediate area, but some lie as far away as what is now Tennessee. [Books 1 - 9 were abstracted in 1978 by Brent Holcomb.]

Mr. Ferguson has abstracted 2,323 deeds concisely but in understandable form. The abstracts are numbered consecutively, and the Index refers the reader to an abstract number, rather than the page number in the book. A

unique feature of the index is the boldface abstract number following the names of the principals (e.g., grantors, grantees, former owners, executors, etc.). Less important names, such as witnesses, have lightface abstract numbers. It's very easy to check for a person or place of interest in a matter of minutes. The Index contains over 4,700 personal and place name entries.

Two other features contribute significantly to this work. A six page Foreword contains thorough explanation of the contents, period covered, organization, abbreviations, spelling, unique deeds, and signatures. There is also an exceptionally legible map the compiler has created of Mecklenburg County, circa 1790.

This is one of the best abstractions I have seen. In addition to those researching Mecklenburg County, I highly recommend the book as a model for anyone just getting started on an abstracting job of their own.
