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22 February 1878, Vol. 3, No. 1

At Rest. Feb. 1, 1878, Mrs. Lida Robinson fell asleep in Jesus, in her 49th year. At the early age of 14 years she gave her heart to the Savior. In 1871, she was married, when a widow, to Mr. Jno. Robinson, of Robinsonville, and came with him from Alabama to Texas. C. H. Dobbs. (NOTE: Place of death not given.) (Article p.1)

Dr. Duff. The telegraph brings the announcement of the death of Dr. Duff, the veteran Scotch missionary to India. A few years ago this apostolic man made a brief tour through our county, electrifying immense audiences with his tumultuous eloquence in behalf of missionary effort among the heathen. Broken down by long service in India, Dr. Duff spent his last days in his native land. (Notice, p.2)

Col. John D. Logan. We record with profound sorrow the death of our old and valued friend Col. John D. Logan, formerly of San Antonio. He departed this life at the residence of his brother-in-law, Col. Bennet, near Reagan, Falls Co., on the 11th inst. He was widely known as a Texas journalist, having founded the *Victoria Advocate* thirty years ago. He started the *San Antonio Herald* over twenty one years ago, and by his industry, energy and ability, the paper soon became the leading weekly of Western Texas. He was both an honor to his profession and to his State. (Article, p.4)

22 February 1878, Vol. 3, No. 1

Death of Mrs. W. H. Wharton. Mrs. Sarah A. Wharton, aged 68, widow of Hon. William H. Wharton, a prominent patriot and statesman of the days of the revolution and Republic of Texas, died yesterday, at the residence of Hon. John W. Harris, in Galveston, after a short illness. She was the daughter of Col. Jared Groce, the proprietor of the old hacienda on the Brazos, known as Groce's Retreat; a sister of Leonard and Jared Groce, Jr., now both deceased, and the mother of Gen. John A. Wharton, of the Confederate army, who was killed during the late civil war. Surviving the vicissitudes of the early settlement of Texas by Americans and the war which separated the country from Mexico; with a husband famous for talent, character and influence; with wealth and all that could add charms to life, she was soon called on to mourn the loss of her idolized husband, as well as that of his brother, the orator, statesman and soldier, Col. John A. Wharton, Sr., who was Adjutant General at the battle of San Jacinto, and died in 1838. Her husband had been minister from Texas to the United States in 1839. --*Galveston Daily News* of Feb. 13th.

Mrs. Angia Oneta died on the 12th of Jan., at Cincinnati, aged one hundred and nine years and one day. She married at twenty, and had eight children, all of whom are living, the youngest, a man of fifty-one, residing in Cincinnati. At eighty-six she married a second husband, whom she survived many years. (General Items column, p.5)

Augusta, Ga. - Judge Lindsay Warren, a noble man and benevolent member of the Augusta church, died of heart disease, on Jan. 25th. (Our Church column, p.5)

Rev. Dr. John C. Smith, pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian Church, Washington, D.C., who died on the 23d ult., after an illness of almost a year, in the eighty-third year of his age, was the oldest settled minister in that city, having been the pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian Church for over thirty-eight years, and during the seven years before over the Presbyterian Church in Georgetown. (Religious Items column, p.5)

Rev. Peter John Gulick, a missionary, and the father of missionaries, died early last December, at Kobe, Japan, where he was living with one of his sons, Rev. O. H. Gulick. The father was a missionary of the American Board for fifty years, and went to the Sandwich Islands in 1827, the year in which he graduated from Princeton Seminary. He remained there till 1874. With a single exception, all his children, consisting of one daughter and six sons, followed their father into missionary service. Two of the sons are in Spain, and three in Japan, four of them laboring under the auspices of the Board. (Religious Items column, p.5)

Rev. Dr. Binney, an eminent Baptist missionary, died on the steamer Amaraopora, in the Indian Ocean, on his return to Bermuda. He was within five days of completing his 75th year. Since 1846 he had been the molding and controlling spirit of the Karen theological Seminary at Rangoon. Thirty-five years ago he was a pastor over a Baptist church in Savannah. He leaves only a widow. (Religious Items column, p.5)

Thomas Roark died Jan. 22nd, 1878, being nearly 75, was born June 1st, 1803. He had long been a member of the Presbyterian Church. He leaves a wife, three sons and two daughters. His death is an irreparable loss to his family and the New Port church.

Died at her residence in Brownsville, Tenn., Jan. 27th, 1878, Mrs. Sarah E. Bain, wife of Rev. John R. Bain, in her 77th year. She was the daughter of Col. Saml. Crockett, elder of the Presbyterian Church in Williamson Co., Tenn. In 1829 she was married to Rev. Bain as his second wife, by O. Jennings, of the First Presbyterian Church, Nashville. She was the mother of eight children, six of whom survive her. Her husband died

After his death the widow and two daughters removed to Brownsville to be near a patrimony left them by her father Col. Crockett. She was an invalid for twenty-five years. In 1843 he took charge of the Frankfort church, but the following year removed to Louisville to edit the *Presbyterian Herald*. Thence, 1874, he came to Fulton, having been chosen President of Synodical Female College. Last year he removed to Sherman, Texas, where he began to build up a school, and was ministering to two churches, when, having completed on the 2d Sabbath of March, 1878, a ministry of forty years, he was on the following Tuesday stricken with paralysis. Thus incapacitated for work, he returned to Fulton with part of his family, intending after a while to visit Kentucky. Continuing to fail, his absent children were summoned from Texas, and in the midst of his loved ones and of friends whose kindness deeply impressed him, he passed away. The funeral services were conducted last Friday by Rev. W. H. Marquess, the pastor of the church, Rev. G. W. Penn, of the M. E. Church, South, and Dr. B. T. Lacy, of Mexico.

The Dallas Morning News, published in Dallas, Texas, by A. H. Belo Publishers has been in existence since 1885 and is still published daily. It has been microfilmed and is available in the Texas/Dallas Collection of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, Dallas Public Library System.

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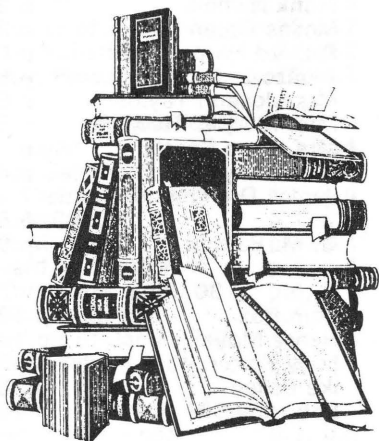
In the June issue of *The Dallas Quarterly*, we were introduced to **GRIER OF SAN FRANCISCO**, the author's father, who lived a life of epic proportions at the turn of this century. Now we are treated to GRIER ancestry going back three more generations to their roots in Scotland. The foundation for this study is James GRIER (1818-1892), who emigrated from Northern Ireland to Ontario in the late 1830's.

Both of Mr. Grier's books are basically biography, but they have much to offer genealogists researching the GRIER name. This one is interestingly written and copiously illustrated. It is an attractive volume which is easy to use. Any GRIER should not leave home without one!

When William Kenedy was twelve, his family pulled up stakes in Illinois and lit out for Oregon. Nearly sixty years later he committed his recollection of that experience to paper. Now May Williams has published what Kenedy wrote eighty years ago. It makes interesting reading about life on the Oregon trail, but there are only 63 names listed in the index, so it is of limited use to family researchers.



BOOK REVIEWS

RESEARCH IN TEXAS (NGS Special Publication No. 70). 1992. Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck. Paperback, 7" x 10", 36 pages. \$6.50 (\$5.20 to NGS members) plus \$1.50 P&H. Order from NGS Special Publications, 4527 17th Street North, Arlington, Va. 22207.

The National Genealogical Society is in the process of publishing a series of brief, comprehensive, and inexpensive guides to genealogical research in the states. For Texas, no one is better suited to author such a composition than Lloyd Bockstruck. Within these few pages he has produced the consummate guide for genealogy and family history researchers in the Lone Star State.

RESEARCH IN TEXAS begins with a concise but thorough history of Texas settlement. Next there is a discussion of Archives, Libraries, and Societies throughout the state. Under Major Resources, the following topics are covered: Maps and Gazetteers; Vital, Cemetery, Census, Church, Court, Land, Military, Immigration and Naturalization, and Probate Records; Newspapers; Registrations; and Tax Lists. The 125 references in this scholarly survey fill six pages, with a final page devoted to selective bibliography.

In a booklet of this size, it is not possible to list every single library, archive, society, etc. However, each type of resource is fully discussed, and reference is made to where the reader can find a complete listing. Lloyd's writing is as informative and entertaining as is his speaking, and no one doing research in Texas should be without this superb aid.

To date, guides to five other states have been completed (Indiana, Minnesota, Oregon, South Carolina, and District of Columbia) and are available from NGS. But I'm willing to bet that none of them will top **RESEARCH IN TEXAS!**



THE MAIDEN FAMILY OF VIRGINIA AND ALLIED FAMILIES 1623-1991. 1991. Sarah Finch Maiden Rollins. Hardback, 8½" x 11", xv + 807 pages. Name indexed. \$50.00, including P&H. Order from the author, 12715 Cobblestone, Houston, TX 77024.

As the title implies, this remarkable compilation of genealogy and family history is by no means limited to the MAIDEN surname. The "**ALLIED FAMILIES**" include AKER, ALBURTIS, BICKLEY, BIEMESDERFER, BUTT, CARTER, DALE, DAY, DAVISON, FADELY, FULKERSON, GRUBB, HAGY, HEUSSLER, KING, LANDIS, LEE, MANJE, SCUDDER, STEWART, UNDERWOOD, VAN LIEW, VIGNE and WILLIAMSON. All of these appear in the author's pedigree, which she has documented for at least seven generations (up to thirteen on some lines). Over 3000 individual names are listed in the index.

This book is the ultimate testimony to what can be accomplished through diligent research and polished publication. Starting with the belief that her forebears emigrated from England to Virginia (certainly true for the MAIDENS), Mrs. Rollins has determined that she also has ancestors that came from Norway, The Netherlands, Belgium, France, Germany, Switzerland and Italy. In addition to Virginia, they came to Massachusetts, New Amsterdam-New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware. What is so astounding is that she was able to gather such a tremendous quantity of material and get it organized into an exceptional volume of outstanding quality *in only five years!*

Although there is no numbering system, the extensive use of charts makes one unnecessary. A master 13-generation pedigree chart in the beginning of the book ties all lines together, and 3-generation diagrams begin almost every chapter. There are lots of excellent maps and every document which has been copied is completely legible. Photographs, though modest in number, contribute significantly through their relevance and aesthetic placement. Documentation appears to be meticulous and comprehensive.

It takes much more than vital statistics to fill up 800 pages, even for thirteen generations. What the author uses are well-written dissertations on the social, economic and political events that influenced the lives of her progenitors. She dedicates this scholarly but easily used and thoroughly enjoyable book to her father, Hicks Carr Maiden, who taught in the Dallas Public Schools for forty years. I feel sure his academic spirit approves.
