22 November 1878, Vol. 3, No. 39

The Late Rev. F. M. Howell. Rev. Eugene Daniel, pastor of the 1st church in Memphis, Tenn., and himself a convalescent from the Yellow Fever, announces to the *Southern Presbyterian* the death of his beloved friend, one of the last victims of the expiring epidemic. The news renders me very sad, but does not surprise me. In some respects he occupied the most trying position of us all, for he was denied communication with the world outside of Somerville, for a long dreary season, having no opportunity of sending or receiving either telegrams or letters. Yet he rallied (not clear on microfilm) around him a few noble young men, and, assisted by these, he nursed the sick and administered the consolations of the gospel to the dying, until he died. He leaves a wife and two little children.

29 November 1878, Vol. 3, No. 40

Christian R. Robert, the founder of Robert College, Constantinople, died in Paris last week, aged seventy-seven years. For a number of years he took charge of the education of several young men in different theological seminaries, notably at Auburn and Beloit institutions, which he endowed very largely. The seminary at Lookout Mountain, Tenn., he founded and entirely supported until his larger work at Constantinople took his attention. Tribute of Respect made concerning the death of Mr. Milton B. Keesee who died Nov. the 12th 1878, esteemed friend and Sunday-school student. Copy to be furnished to *Texas Presbyterian* and Marlin Ball, with request to publish. Submitted by J. C. Peoples, Prairie View Church, Nov. 17, 1878. [Resolutions published]. He was a grand-son of Col. L. H. Bennett, and acted faithfully as a marshal during the Camp meeting in Falls Co., last summer. At the time of his death, he was the only relative living with the Colonel, his wife being called to her reward a short time after the meeting closed. [Notice, p. 5]

Rev. J. E. C. Doremus, D.D. With profound sorrow, we have received intelligence of the death of our esteemed friend and brother, J. E. C. Doremus, D.D. He died at his residence, Vienna, La., on Saturday morning, Nov. 16th, of pneumonia. He was a native of New York, but for many years has been identified with the Church in the Southwest. We are informed he represented the Presbytery of Louisiana in the General Assembly of 1853. During the palmy days of Oakland College, he was Professor of Greek and Latin; later, he was President of Aranama College, TX; he was pastor of the church at Grosse Tete, La.; agent of the South-Western Bible Society; and at the time of his death was actively employed supplying the Vienna, Vernon and Alabama church, in the Presbytery of Red River. Rev. M. W. Trawick. At a meeting of the congregation of the Canal Street Presbyterian, held Sunday, Nov. 24, 1878, resolutions adopted concerning the death of Rev. Trawick. He began his ministerial work among us on the 1st day of March, 1874, and died of yellow fever on the 8th day of Oct., 1874. Resolutions published. [NOTE: Above underscored date as published. See obituary in issue of 18 Oct. 1878, Vol. 3, No. 34].

Married on the 28th ult., at the residence of the bride's father, Milford, Texas, by Rev. J. M. Lockett, Mr. J. K. McDaniel and Miss Katie Morrell.

Died at Gatesville, Coryell Co., suddenly, on the 19th of Nov., 1878, at 10 1/2 o'clock P.M., of congestion of the brain, Charles Halley, son of W. L. and L. N. Morrison, aged 5 years, 5 months and 2 days.

20 December 1878, Vol. 3, No. 43

Communion silver was presented to the Weatherford Presbyterian Church by Captain Phil. T. Molloy as a memorial to his mother, Mrs. L. A. Molloy. The recent death of this most estimable lady has left a void in our community which is especially felt in the little church of which she was a member, "there will always be, in the minds of those who loved her so well, a mournful pleasure in the association of her last gift with the commemoration of the death of Him who said to his sorrowing disciples, "This do in remembrance of me." [Other information about the church and its growth given].....There has been only one death in the membership [apparently within the last thirteen months?], and two among the children: Mrs. L. A. Molloy, Jimmie Sutherland, and Charley McLin. One marriage has been solemnized among the members, that of Miss Mabel Creel. [Progress article, p. 4]

Married at the residence of Rev. A. P. Smith, Dec. 12th, 1878, Mr. H. McDonald Hinckley, and Miss Elizabeth C. Norton, both of Dallas.

Married at Salem church (B.R.) Nov. 27th, 1878, by Rev. Dr. Plumer, Rev. Wilson James McKay and Miss Sallie K., daughter of the late Hamilton G. Witherspoon, of Sumter Co., S.C.

Married at the residence of the bride's father, W. E. Young, Esq., Coryelle Co., Texas, Dec. 4th, by Rev. L. Tenney, D. W. Freeland and Miss Lizzie C. Young.

Married in Covington, Ky., Dec. 3rd, by Rev. George Summey, Mr. John K. Durr and Miss Sallie J. Gibson, both of Kenton Co., Ky.

Died at the residence of her brother-in-law, Major J. C. Griffis, in Dallas, Texas, Dec. 6th, 1878, Miss Almedia Barrie. She was the youngest daughter of Gen. John Barrie and Jane Hamilton, of Abbeville, S.C. She was born in Dayton, Marengo Co., Ala., and at about seven years of age, removed with her parents to Decatur, Georgia, where she was educated in the school of Dr. John S. Wilson. Early in life, whilst Dr. James Patterson was her pastor, she united with the Presbyterian church at Decatur. Though since then she has lived at Marietta, and Rome, Georgia, and Dallas, Texas, she has ever been the same quiet, but earnest and exemplary Christian. Died in Palestine, Texas, on Tuesday morning the 12th of Nov. Mrs. Mary Hallam, relict of the late R. G. Hallam, in the 38th year of her age. Less than two years before her death, she was left "desolate" by the death of her husband, and was called to take the heavy responsibility of rearing and educating her seven children, the oldest of whom was not at that time more than about 14 years of age. Pastor Ruga, who for ten years past has directed the Presbyterian Mission at Calatrara, Spain, died Nov. 18th. A telegram says that he was followed to the grave by about five hundred Protestants. [Religious Items column]

The last of the original angels placed in charge of the Irvingite churches is dead. The Rev. F. H. Layton, who was appointed to one of the seven churches of London in the time of Edward Irving, died in that city Oct. 21st. [Religious Items column]

Mr. Thomas H. Powers, who died in Philadelphia on the 20th of Nov., was noted not only as a man who had accumulated a fortune of ten million dollars in business, but as an unostentatious philanthropist who delighted in aiding deserving charities and doing good by stealth. He built several churches and gave them to needy congregations; one of these cost fifty thousand dollars. One of his last gifts was twenty-five thousand dollars to the Philadelphia Young Men's Christian Association. [Religious Items column]

George Henry Lewes, one of the most prolific and brilliant writers of this century, died at his home near London, Dec. 2, aged 61 years. [General Items column]

The Rev. Thomas A. Ogden, a member of the Presbytery of Mississippi, died in Trenton, New Jersey, on Sunday, the 8th of Dec., in the seventy-seventh year of his age. He was for many years a minister to the slaves in Mississippi and Louisiana, and did his work faithfully and well.

3 January 1879, Vol. 3, No. 45

The Duke of Cumberland and Princess Thyra were married with great pomp at the Chapel of the Christianborg Castle on Saturday evening the 21st inst. [Notice p. 2]

Married in the First Presbyterian church, Galveston, by Rev. Dr. Bunting, on Dec. 21st, Henry E. [or E, print very dark] Sproule and Miss Fanny G. Trueheart, both of Galveston.

Married on the 17th inst., at the bride's residence, at Milford, Texas, by Rev. Rev. S. M. Luckett, Mr. Albert C. Wilson and Mrs. Mollie Goodman.

Died at the residence of her brother-in-law, Major J. C. Griffis, in Dallas, Texas, Dec. 7th, 1878, Miss Almeda Bowie. She was the youngest daughter of Gen. John and Jane Hamilton, of Abbeville, South Carolina. She was in Dayton, Marengo Co., Ala., at about seven years of age, removed with her parents to Decatur, Georgia, where she was educated in the school of Dr. John S. Wilson. Early in life she united with the Presbyterian church in Decatur. Though since then she has lived at Marietta and Rome, Georgia, and Dallas, Texas. [See article on 20 December 1879, Vol.3, No. 43; underlined date and name differ from information given in that article]

3 January 1879, Vol. 3, No. 45 (cont.)

Died at Austin, Texas, after a brief illness, at 2 o'clock A.M., Dec. 4th, Robert Aull, formerly of Lexington and St. Louis, aged 71 years. He was born in New Castle Co., Delaware, in 1807. The family consisted of John, who died in 1842, and is buried in Machpelah cemetery; James who was murdered by Mexicans in Chihuahua, 1876, being one of the founders of Lexington and of the O. S. Presbyterian church here; Joseph, a sea-fearing man, who died in Philadelphia in 1847; William, who died in Ohio; Elizabeth who founded the Elizabeth Aull Seminary here, and who died in 1858; Marie Pomeroy, widow of the late E. W. Pomeroy and the only survivor of the generation of the family. Mr. Aull came to Missouri in 1826, and soon after married Matilda Donahoe, of Glasgow, the aunt of M. F. Royle, of this city. After her death he married, in 1840, Miss Mary Wilson, daughter of Peter Wilson, receiver of public moneys for the United States in Stebbenville, Ohio, and sister of Gen. Wilson, Esq., of this city. Mr. Aull resided in Liberty, Clay Co., and Independence, Jackson Co., previous to coming to Lexington. Here he engaged in merchandising on Old Broadway in 1839. He built the bank on the corner of Main and Broadway in 1849, and carried on the pioneer banking business of Western Missouri. Whilst he and his brothers were merchandising it was their custom to buy goods in Europe and shipment to Chihulhua, Mexico, paying the duties of the New York custom house and having them refunded by the government at Independence after they were across the line. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Aull and five children, as follows: James Aull, of Grant & Aull, bankers and brokers of Philadelphia; Mary F. Aull, of Austin, Texas; Maria Aull Collier, wife of the Rev. F. J. Collier, of Downington, Pa.; Robert Aull, Jr., and Wilson Aull, of Austin. Mr. Aull was a good and charitable man, large-hearted, generous and affectionate. Even after his slaves had deserted him and gone to Kansas, he privately sent means to them through others when he learned they were in distress. He spent nearly fifty years in Missouri, and saw it grow from a wilderness to a powerful commonwealth. The funeral took place at 3 o'clock Sunday, the 8th inst., from the residence of his sister, Mrs. Pomeroy, on South St., to Machpelah cemetery, of which he was one of the originators many years since, and where his mother and family rest. W. --*Lexington Intelligencer*.

Gen. Williams, M. C. for Michigan, died on the 21st, and Beverly B. Douglas, M. C. for Virginia, died on the 22d, both at Washington. Five members of the House of Representatives have died this year. [Current News column]

The funeral of the late Bayard Taylor took place at Berlin on the 22nd, and it was largely attended by official dignitaries, foreign ambassadors, and literary celebrities. The remains will be brought to the United States for final interment. [Current News column]

10 January 1879, Vol. 3, No. 46

Samuel B. Wells, known as the "missionary policeman," died in New York. He had been a member of the police force for sixteen years, and served nearly all the time in the worst districts of the city, improving his opportunities to admonish and advise the degraded characters with whom he came in contact. In early life he was a Methodist preacher. [Religious Items column]

Married at the residence of the bride's father, Jan. 1, 1879, by Rev. W. S. Johnson, Mr. B. F. Finklea and Miss Lizzie T. Allen, both of Ennis, Texas.

Married on Dec. 17th, 1878, near Ladonia, Texas, by Rev. W. N. Dickey, Mr. W. W. Long and Miss Nellie Gilliam.

Married at the residence of Mr. W. H. Poole, in Milam Co., Texas, Dec. 26th, 1878, by Rev. A. J. Loughridge, Mr. Walter H. Frierson, and Miss Mollie Wharton, (late of Mississippi.)

Married in Houston, Texas, Dec. 29th, 1878, by Rev. J. H. McNeilly, Rev. G. T. Storey, of Mississippi, to Miss S. L. Beasley, of Galveston Co., Texas.

Married at the residence of Mrs. Geo. Smith, Dec. 24th, 1878, by Rev. W. S. Johnson, Mr. Wm. J. McDuffie and Miss Danie Henderson.

Married at the residence of the bride's father, Houston, Texas, on Tuesday, Dec. 4th, by Rev. D. McGregor, Mr. Moritz Kattman to Miss Clara Loebnitz.

Married Dec. 26th, 1878, by Rev. T. D. Witherspoon, D.D., at the residence of the bride's brother, in Petersburg, Va., Rev. A. S. Doak, of Coryell Co., Texas, and Miss Emma R. Smith.

Married on Dec. 24th, 1878, by Rev. Jno. F. Cowan, Mr. Albert Hite Wren and Miss Malvina Martin, all of Callaway Co., Mo.

Married in the Henderson church, by Rev. D. O. Davies, Dec. 4th, 1878, John W. Price, of Lebanon, Tenn., and Miss Violet H. Baird, of Henderson, Ky.

Married in St. Louis, Dec. 19th, by Rev. A. Shotwell, George Hibler and Miss Gracie Vanskike, all of St. Louis Co.

Married at Arkadelphia, Ark., Dec. 14th, by Rev. W. T. Howison, Mr. Garland Cook and Miss Luella McDonald, both of Arkadelphia.

Died on the 19th day of Dec., 1878, at the home of her son-in-law, R. F. McElroy, near to Lebanon, Ky., Mrs. Mary A. McElroy. She was born Oct. 20th, 1812, in the true line of covenant descent. Her father, Isaac Tate, was for very many years an active and well known Elder of the Presbyterian Church in what was then known as the "Green River country." She married Dr. S. D. McElroy, who from active Church work here, being an honored ruling Elder, preceded her by more than thirty years. Thus was Mrs. McElroy, while in early life, a widow, and in charge of a young, and dependent family.

17 January 1879, Vol. 3, No. 47 [NOTE: First page of this issue dated Jan. 1; other pages dated Jan 17, the correct date]

Mr. Balch was dismissed to the Presbytery of Red River, 1858, and died in Minden, Louisiana, in the winter of 1861-2. Mr. Alexander having supplied the church in McLennan County, after the death of Mr. Taylor,

besides performing considerable missionary labor, removed to Oak Island, and was installed pastor of that church in Oct., 1858, in which position he continued till his death, in March, 1864. [Historical Notes column (part 4)]

Rev. Wiley Burgess died at his residence in Brookhaven, on the 26th of Dec., of pneumonia. He was, at his decease, within a few days of completing his seventy-first year. His illness extended through a period of nine days, and was attended with extreme suffering. --S. W. *Presbyterian* [Our Church column]

Married at the residence of the bride "Glenwood," near Boston, Texas, on Jan. 2nd, by Rev. W. T. Howison, Mr. M. D. McLean and Mrs. S. C. Runnels.

Married in Covington, Ky., Dec. 24th, 1878, by Rev. George Summey, Mr. John F. Wortsell and Miss Emma Jones.

Married in Henderson, Ky., by Rev. D. O. Davies, Dec. 31st, 1878, at the residence of the bride's father, Mr. Wm. H. Fisher and Miss Fannie M. Lett.

Married in Sedalia, Dec. 24th, 1878, at the residence of the bride's parents, on Fourth St., by Rev. W. G. Wallace, Mr. Wm. B. Chilton, of Harrisonville, Mo., to Miss Sallie Kipps, of Sedalia.

Died at her home near Sutherland Springs, Texas, Dec. 19, 1878, of typhoid pneumonia, after a illness of twenty-two days, Mrs. Elizabeth Ely Waldo, wife of Capt. Wm. Waldo, formerly of Mo., and Cal., and daughter of Rev. Wm. Fowley and Mrs. Asenath Selden_ [not clear of microfilm] Veill, early missionary among the Osage Indians, in Arkansas Ter. She became a Christian in early life, and was connected at different times with the Presbyterian church in several States, uniting first with the Little Osage, Mo., congregation and some years later with that of Osceola, Mo., was, at the time of her death, a member of the Presbyterian church of San Antonio, Texas, which city was for a number of years her home.

A Faithful Laborer Called Home. Edward Downey of Brownsville, Texas, was born in the City of Dublin, Ireland, Dec., 1818, and hence was in his sixtieth year at his death, which occurred Sept., 1878, at Saratoga Springs, whither he had gone two months before for medical treatment. He had located in Brownsville, about thirty years ago. He held many important positions of trust, both in civil and commercial affairs, during his

life on the Rio Grande. [Details of his accomplishments given.] He leaves a wife. A. T. G. *Central Presbyterian* and *Christian Observer* please copy.

Prince Henry, of Netherlands, brother of King William, III, died at the Hague, on the 13th. He was commander-in-chief of the Navy of Holland and Governor of the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg. [Notice p. 1]

Rev. John S. Watt, was called to rest on Saturday the 4th inst., at 3 o'clock A.M. He had been for several weeks sojourning with Mr. Richard F. Taylor, a former pupil, at "Spring Garden" his country residence near Petersburg. On Dec. 28th his illness was followed by a stroke of paralysis so severe as to deprive him entirely of the use of his right side, and of the faculty of speech. His mind was at first entirely clear, so that he evidently recognized those about him in the room. The paralysis being caused however by suffusion of the brain, his faculties became more and more confused and his mind more torpid, until at length he sank into a quiet slumber from which he never awakened. His remains were brought on Monday morning to Richmond and taken to the Second Presbyterian church, where appropriate funeral services were held. He was at the time of his death the oldest member of East Hanover Presbytery, having been born in Richmond, in Jan., 1801, wanting only a few days of being 78 years of age.

Death in High Places. Scarcely have the impressive funeral services of Congressman Hartridge, of Georgia, been closed in the halls of the National Capitol, when death is again knocking at their doors. This time the affliction has fallen on our own State, in the person of the Hon. Gustave Schleicher, of Western Texas, who died in the midst of his Congressional duties, Jan. 10th, at Washington. He was born at Darmstadt, Germany, in 1823, and soon after graduated from the University of Geissen; he emigrated to Texas, landing at Indianola, in 1845. He has since that time been identified with the growth and development of Western Texas.

E. H. Cushing. Early on Thursday morning of last week the wires flashed the mournful intelligence through the State that E. H. Cushing was dead. He was a Ruling Elder and the Superintendent of the Sabbath school of the Presbyterian church of Houston. From *The Houston Daily Telegram*, of Thursday morning, Jan. 16th: Last night at twelve o'clock passed away from this mortal life one of Houston's best citizens and one of the truest sons of Texas. Edward Hopkins Cushing was born at Royalton, Vermont, June 11, 1829, graduated at Dartmouth College, New Hampshire, June 1850, and almost immediately after his collegiate course was finished, came to Texas. Death of Rev. A. F. Dickson. Announcement of his death in the *Southwestern Presbyterian*, of last week. He has been filling for some two years an important position in our Assembly's Tuskaloosa (Ala.) Institute for training colored young men for the ministry. Letter dated Tuskaloosa, Ala., Jan. 9, 1879 gave the following: He died yesterday after a severe illness of ten days; first pleurisy, then catarrhal fever, and finally quinsy. He leaves a widow and nine children, several of them quite young. He died at 5 o'clock A.M.

We are pained to learn that the Rev. S. S. Gaillard is no more. He died at his home in Griffin, Ga., on Tuesday, Dec. 31st. He has been in been in very feeble health for several years. --*Southern Presbyterian* [Our Church column]

About the age of 13 years he was received into its fellowship by the Session of Concord church on the 4th day of Dec., 1870. "Mr. Campbell was a member of the Presbytery of New Orleans, although he contemplated connecting himself with the Presbytery of Red River. He was raised a Presbyterian, but joined the Southern Methodist Church, and became a minister of that denomination, where he was much respected. He was received by us not quite two years ago, and had his life been spared, it would have been, no doubt, a very useful one. He had but fairly commenced his work with us, when he was taken away." The congregation came to the rescue nobly after his decease, and the community also volunteered their assistance, so that the widow and her family will have an ample sum settled upon them against the contingencies of the future. It is said the minister had not made known his extreme destitution, so sensitive was he

in regard to it, and the people did not realize his misery. But the congregation must have known it was not paying him his salary, and that nothing but misery could result from such criminal carelessness. --*United Presbyterian*.

It is important to note that the dates given are **NOT** the **DEATH** dates, but rather are the dates the articles appeared in the newspaper. There may be more than one listing, either in one issue or several issues. The page and column number are listed to help find the specific article.

While most of the deaths mentioned took place in Dallas or neighboring counties, the geographic scope of the coverage is amazing and many of the listed deaths took place outside Texas.

The Dallas Morning News, published in Dallas, Texas, by A. H. Belo Publishers has been in existence since 1885 and is still published daily. It has been microfilmed and is available in the Texas/Dallas Collection of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, Dallas Public Library System.

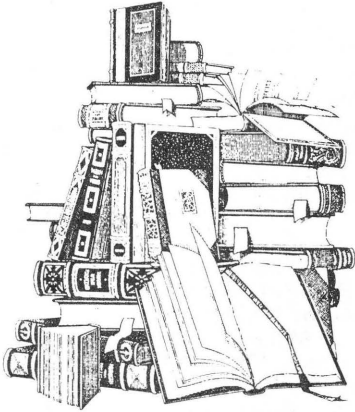

BOOK REVIEWS

Any book donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society relating to family history or genealogy which is currently in print and available for sale will be reviewed in **THE DALLAS QUARTERLY**. The Dallas Genealogical Society is pleased to present reviews of the winning entries in the 1993 Book Awards Competition. The following two books were judged best in the categories of *Local History* and *Family History or Genealogy*:



TOOL CEMETERY HENDERSON CO., TEXAS GRAVE REGISTRY. 1992. Jim Monaghan. Hardback, 8½" x 11", vii + 53 pages. Full name indexed. \$15.00 (sales tax included) + \$2.00 P&H. Order from the author, 11227 Dumbarton Drive, Dallas, Tex. 75228.

The Tool Cemetery is located about sixty-five miles southeast of Dallas on the west side of Cedar Creek Lake. Mr. Monaghan has done a superb job inventorying this graveyard and presenting his findings. A location guide provides precise directions on how to get to the cemetery adjoining the Providence Baptist Church. Finding any burial plot should be easy using the detailed Schematic Diagram which shows their arrangement. The Registry is organized by Plot Number, but the full name of each person interred appears in the index. Other Registry information includes birth and death dates, any inscriptions, plot number, and stone type. There are about eight hundred plots in Tool Cemetery, over ninety percent of which have been used.

While looking for the earliest burial date (late 1890's), I was intrigued by three entries for Plot 272. J. K. HUMPHRIES (51) and his two sons, J. S. (32) and G. W. (27), are shown buried on the same day. I wonder what happened--there's bound to be a real human interest story there. The cemetery is still in use, so some dates are as recent as August of 1992 when the survey was made.

Jim Monaghan has done a great service for those with relatives in northwestern Henderson County around the turn of the century. His book is also a good model for others to consider when recording cemetery records.

Charles C. STIBBENS, great-great-grandfather of the author, was born in Maryland in 1810. He arrived in Texas with a company of volunteers which he had organized and financed himself to support the Republic of Texas, serving from 1835 to 1837. As a veteran of the Battle of San Jacinto, he received bounty land in Anderson County near present-day Palestine. A first wife died after only one year of marriage, but his second marriage to Elizabeth CREEKMAN in 1849 lasted until his death in 1879 and produced twelve children. When Magnolia, the Anderson County community in which they lived, was bypassed by the railroad and withered, the STIBBENS family moved to Collin County in 1870, and it is there that succeeding generations are centered.

A thirty page prologue tells the reader about the author, gives extensive acknowledgments, covers the origin and history of the STIBBENS name, and sets the stage with a brief summary of how the Republic of Texas came into being. After that, each of the thirteen chapters is devoted to Charles, or one of his children, and their descendants. The Henry numbering system is used to keep tabs on the one thousand plus names which appear in the Index. The book has wonderful large print and is written in an interesting, entertaining fashion. As a matter of fact, it's very easy to get lost in the narrative after starting out just searching for information! Anyone with southeast Collin County antecedents should by all means take note of this resource.



D.G.S. appreciates the work of Jim Monaghan and Brenda Kellow in the above two publications. As the title implies, this is really two books in one. The first part consists of abstracts of 1791 - 1868 wills recorded in Mecklenburg County Will Books A - J, as well as unrecorded wills of the same period filed with the N. C. Archives in Raleigh. The second part of the book contains transcriptions of tax lists of the five earliest years for which these records are complete. The two record groups complement each other quite well, since the wills reflect the more affluent population, while the tax collector attempted to list every taxable person.

The Index, which covers both Will Abstracts and Tax Lists, contains over 10,000 names and is conveniently organized. The abstractions are numbered consecutively 1 through 1,305, and names are referenced to the abstract number. This procedure is very helpful since anywhere from five to ten wills appear on each page.

Mr. Ferguson does an excellent job abstracting legal documents. In March 1991 his Mecklenburg County deed abstracts were reviewed in *THE DALLAS QUARTERLY* with considerable favor, and his latest effort is equally impressive. Researchers interested in the Charlotte area are indebted to him.

This is another in a continuing series of compilations of genealogical information on the PERKINS surname. The author accepts contributions from anyone who has something they want to submit, and periodically publishes the collection since the last volume. Material is presented under the headings Birth & Death Records, Marriage Records, Probate Records, Miscellaneous Records, Branches & Twigs, Here & There, and Queries. Each volume contains a name index.

While some spouse surnames do appear, a PERKINS connection is a requirement for inclusion. Therefore, usefulness is limited to those with a PERKINS interest. Previous volumes are available in the Genealogy Section of the Dallas Public Library.
