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TEXAS PRESBYTERIAN NEWSPAPER ABSTRACTS

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Married in the First Presbyterian church, Shelbyville, Ky., on the 6th of Aug., 1878, by Rev. S. M. Neel, Mr. John P. Allen, Jr., and Miss Florence Stuart, daughter of the late Rev. D. T. Stuart.

Married on Thursday Aug. 15th, in Memphis, Tenn., by Rev. E. M. Richardson, Joseph M. Venable, of Montana, and Mary E. Richardson, daughter of the officiating minister.

Rev. M. J. Wallace. He was converted in the autumn of 1833, on the Monday of a communion season, in Poplar Tent church, a sermon preached by Rev. R. H. Morrison. Years roll by, and this young man has taken a commercial degree and engaged in business in Memphis. He gave up a lucrative business, and entered upon a laborious ten years' course of study. He took up the Latin grammar, and let no dust collect on its lids. He was prepared, mainly by Dr. Holmes, for the Sophomore class in Nassau Hall, and at the end of the first year there his scholastic standing was 97. During his six years sojourn at Princeton, he spent his vacations as a colporteur [peddler of religious books]; and much of the time on foot with a parcel of books on his back, he traversed eleven states in the union. In 1852 he left the Seminary and once more visited his native place in Carolina. He went with his Commission from our Domestic Board to a sparsely settled region of Texas, where he labored until called to his late field in Arkansas, and was for many years both the Stated Clerk and Treasurer of his Presbytery. On August 13, Mrs. Elizabeth Prentiss, wife of Rev. Geo. L. Prentiss, D.D., of Union Theological Seminary, N.Y., and author of that very excellent and charming book, *Stepping Heavenward*, passed into heaven from the path that she had been so long following, and over which her writings have helped to guide others. Mrs. Prentiss was the daughter of Dr. Edward Payson, of sainted memory. She was a woman of remarkable talents and of fine culture. Her books for children are among the very best of their class; and, such volumes as, *Stepping Heavenward*, *The Home at Greylock*, and others, have been helpful to older persons. It is very seldom that highly spiritual character, literary talents, and the domestic virtues are combined as they were in this rare woman. *Illus. Ch. Weekly*. [Notice, p.1]

Married in the Presbyterian church, at Brunswick, Mo., Aug. 27th, 1878, by Rev. I. S. McElroy; Mr. Wm. A. Dupuy, of New Glasgow, Va., and Miss Mary Beebe, of Brunswick, Mo.

Died near Coryelle, Texas, Aug. 26, Mrs. E. D. Tenney, wife of Rev. L. Tenney.

Died suddenly at the residence of her grandfather in Brazoria Co., Julia Catherine, only daughter of Erin E. and Nannie F. Bryan, aged 1 year, 1 month and 28 days, breathed her last, quarter to 2 o'clock on Saturday, Aug. 17th, 1878. Mentions her little cousins.

In memory of little Maggie, the only child of H. C. and S. S. Traylor, who departed this life, near Victoria, Texas, Sunday, Aug. 18th, of congestion after an illness of three days, aged 10 months and 9 days.

Death of Rev. Dr. John McCampbell. Among the faithful pastors who have stood their posts, at the peril of their lives, in this day of pestilence, our excellent brother at Grenada (whose death is announced by telegram) is a noble example. His beautiful life has been usefully spent amongst us in the ministry of the Gospel. To the loving hearts of his former flock at Bethesda, Lebanon, Lexington and Monroe churches, all in the bounds of our Synod, among whom he has labored for a quarter century, his memory will ever be precious. --S. W. *Presbyterian*. [Notice. Also see next abstract, both p.1]

Notes of the Fever. The epidemic is spreading. The mortality here has regularly increased from seven deaths in the week ending July 21st, to 411 deaths in the week ending Sept. 1st. At the present daily average, the number of deaths during the current week will be larger than during the week of greatest mortality in 1867--which was 489. [Other information about the epidemic given.] Before us is a letter of August 27, referring to one of our most diligent ministers. Our good brother, McCampbell, has been sustained and blessed at Grenada. Up to the 22d he and his wife and son all well and untouched. Bro. McC., from early morn till night, constantly at work, visiting the sick and dying and burying the dead. His elder, Mr. Irwin, always with the sick. Mr. Kuykendall, another elder--one of the leading workers--also well." Before these lines came to hand we have the mournful intelligence of brother McCampbell's death. Butler P. Anderson has also yielded up his life in the same cause, and the same

place. These men died, not merely through breathing an infected atmosphere--they took their lives in their hands and offered them up, deliberately, upon the altar of Christian philanthropy. In Memphis, Dr. Goggs is hard at work. Rev. Eugene Daniel is down with the fever, but at last accounts was improving. In New Orleans, our ministers, whether acclimated or unacclimated, are busy at work.....We are glad to say that till this time their health, and that of their families, have been preserved, with the exception of the family of Rev. A. J. Witherspoon. Nine persons in his family had the fever, but all are recovering. Rev. Mr. Hanson, of the Methodist Church, got better, but relapsed. Rev. Dr. Wilson, of the Baptist Church, his wife and five children, are down with the fever, but are doing well. --*Southwestern Presbyterian*. [Article, p.1]

Married August 24th, 1878, at the residence of J. R. Boldridge, in Philadelphia, Mo., by Rev. E. M. Palmer, Mr. Eugene Gibson and Miss Katie Boldridge, all of Marion Co., Mo.

Married on the 25th inst., in Callaway Co., Mo., by Rev. J. F. Cowan, Mr. Millard F. English and Miss Elizabeth F. McIninch.

Married on August 27th, 1878, by Rev. W. T. Howison, Mr. Armstead A. Moore, of Cook Co., Texas, and Miss Anna Lee Holliday, in Callaway Co., Mo.

Cyrus Johnson, for more than thirty years, a well-known citizen of Memphis, and a beloved and honored Elder of the Presbyterian church, passed gently away on Tuesday, 27th of August, at 7 o'clock, a.m. He was in the 76th year of his age and died of congestion. He loved the Bible, and in the work of the Memphis and Shelby county Bible Society, his labors were assiduous as an officer. On the 31st of Aug., 1827, he was united in marriage to Ann Alleta Sehenk, and after a long and happy union he was preceded to the land of glory some years since by his beloved wife. Four children and a number of grand-children survive. J. N. W. [NOTE: Also see announcement of his death, p.4]

Rev. John McCampbell, D.D., a devoted minister, and Stated Supply of the church in Grenada, Miss., fell at the post of duty, Sept. 1st, from prevailing scourge. He had been at Grenada three or four years. [Announcement, p.4]

Dr. John H. Rice, has fallen. Our entire Southern Church will learn with profound sorrow that he is dead. He died on the 7th inst., of Yellow Fever, at his home in Mason, Tenn. He was the son of the late Benjamin H. Rice, D.D., and nephew of the celebrated Rev. Dr. Jno. H. Rice, of Virginia. At the time of his death, he was an Evangelist within the bounds of the Presbytery of Memphis [Article, p.4]

The South Western Presbyterian learns that Rev. Geo. Hall, a venerable Presbyterian minister of about seventy-three years, died at Port Gibson, Sept., 4th, a victim of the epidemic. Mr. Hall had labored in New York, Tennessee and Mississippi. [Article, p.4]

On August 13, Mrs. Elizabeth Prentiss, died. -*Illus. Ch. Weekly*. [Article, p.4] [NOTE: See Notice, 6 September 1878.]

Death of Judge Jno. A. Inglis. Resolutions published concerning the death of Mr. Inglis. Place or date or his death not given. Copy of resolutions to be sent to his family. [Article, p.5]

[Died] in Weatherford, Texas, June 10th, 1878, Charles B. McLinn, son of George and Lydia McLinn, aged 11 months. [NOTE: This was in the Married column]

[Died] in Weatherford, Texas, July 25th, 1878, James H., son of Mrs. Gertrude Southerland at the age of 7 years, 5 months and 2 weeks. [NOTE: This was in the Married column]

Died New Bremond, Texas., Aug. 16, 1878, Malcolm McBride, Esq., aged 70 years. He was a native of Robertson Co., N.C.; one of seven brothers; four of whom were ruling elders. About 1819, he united with the Presbyterian church at Charaw, S.C. In 1838 he was elected ruling elder of the Bethel church, N.C. In 1860 he moved to Texas and served the church at Washington as elder, until he came to this place. H. B. B.

Aug. 18th, our town was thrown into a state of surprise and sorrow by the unexpected announcement that death was hovering over one of our households, soon to claim a favored one for his victim. Hosts of weeping friends soon gathered around the bedside of Mrs. Lydia A. Malloy. After twenty-four hours of acute suffering, she sank into a state of quiet, and at about 4 P.M. she peacefully fell asleep. Her son Capt. Phil. T. Molloy, and her daughter, Mrs. Edgar, were with her. She was born, reared and married in Baltimore, Md., after which she removed to St. Louis, Mo., where she reared a family of six children, four daughters and two sons, five of whom live to mourn her loss. For a few years past she had made a home in Texas, for herself and family. She had been for half a century a member of the Presbyterian Church. She united with the Presbyterian church of Weatherford immediately upon her arrival here. J. H., Weatherford, Texas, Aug. 26, 1878.

Notes of The Epidemic. The mortuary report of the past week gives 501 deaths from yellow fever, a decrease of forty seven from the week previous. This is the first time that there has been any decrease reported, and it is to be hoped that the decrease will continue. Meantime in other cities the fever is on the increase. The highest mortality here in any one day was 90. Last Monday; the number of deaths in Memphis was 111. The population of that city is not one fourth as great as that of New Orleans. [Other information above the epidemic given]. We have these deaths to reported: Rev. E. Eyrich, pastor of St. John's German Lutheran church, in Algiers, died of the fever on the 3d. Rev. J. J. Gosweiler, who was preaching in the Seaman's Bethel to the French Protestants, died on the 5th. His wife and two children died within three days afterward. Rev. G. Bauman, past of St. John's German Lutheran church in this city, died on the 17th. His wife died last week. A telegram received Tuesday from

Mayor Doyle, of Providence, R.I., in which the latter states that Rev. Mr. Marx Moses, formerly of the Jackson street synagogue in New Orleans, is very anxious to hear from his family in New Orleans, if any are dead, or how many are left, as his telegrams have not been answered. May Pilsbury had to telegraph that the whole family, with the exception of one little girl, have died, all almost in one week, the wife, twenty-one and ten year old sons, and a twenty year old daughter. -*S. W. Presbyterian, Sept. 19.*

A memorial of the life and labors of Rev. R. C. Graham, who died March 3, 1878, was read by Rev. J. D. Thomas. [Presbytery of Abingdon column, p. 2]

Death of Rev. Dr. A. N. Cunningham. Died suddenly in Franklin, Thursday of last week (September 5th). One year ago he brought the remains of his good wife from Aberdeen, Mississippi, where he had charge of the Presbyterian church, and where she, after a short illness, had died, to Franklin, Tennessee; and now he comes to visit his only remaining daughter and his grandchildren, and to water with his tears the graves of his loved dead. By a strange and mysterious providence, just as he enters the town where he had spent all the vigor of his manhood, and where he had buried so many bright hopes; walking leisurely, and doubtless thinking over the past scenes of joy and sorrow, suddenly he falls, and life is extinct, without a struggle or a groan. Mr. Thompson, pastor of the Presbyterian church in Franklin, and Rev. Mr. Burr, of the Methodist church, performed the last sad rites. His remains now rest in the old cemetery at Franklin. -*Columbia, (Tenn.) Herald.*

Married on the 4th inst., by Rev. W. W. Trimble, Dr. J. Thomas Sharp, of Shelbina, Mo., and Miss Laura W. Scott, daughter of Mrs. Susan Scott, of Concord, Mo.

Died in Tuscumbia, Ala., on Friday, the 6th inst., at the residence of Fountain Armistead, Jr., Miss Arabella Dobbin, after a lingering illness of four weeks.

Died in Marshall, Mo., Sept. 6, Mrs. Emma Poague.

Died, the infant child of Mrs. Poage, Tuesday, and was laid to rest beside its mother. [NOTE: See notice above]

Died Sept. 1st, at his residence near Salem, Fauquier Co., Va., John Baker. He was perfectly well when he rose that morning, led the family prayers as usual, at his breakfast, had his horse saddled to go to church, and then before starting took a short walk. A blood-vessel was ruptured, and he got back to the house only to be carried in to breathe his last. For many years he was ruling elder in the Salem church. J. A. Scott.

Died Sept. 6th, 1878, at his late residence in Mason, Tipton Co., Tenn., Rev. John H. Rice, D.D., after a brief illness of yellow fever, in the 60th year of his age. This tribute made by the Session of Kerrville Presbyterian church. For a few days prior to his death, he had been preaching in Colyervill, where the yellow fever had made its appearance. Having gone through two visitations of the dreadful disease, one in New Orleans, and the other in Mobile, he did not hesitate to visit the sick. Resolutions published; copy to be sent to his family and one to the St. Louis Presbyterian. Chamberlayne Jones, W. T. Nelson.

27 September 1878, Vol. 3, No.31 (cont.)

Died of congestion, Sept. 10th, 1878, at Raleigh, Shelby Co., Tenn., Mr. S. M. Allen, in the 74th year of his age. Early in life he united with the Rocky River church, Mecklenburg, N.C., and in 1835 he removed to Raleigh, where his family still reside. D. L.

Died in Memphis, Tenn., on the 9th of Sep., 1878, of yellow fever, Mr. Joseph Venable, a member, and Ruling Elder in the Alabama street Presbyterian church. He was the father of a large household. A native of Kentucky, he moved to Missouri many years ago. During the pastorate of the writer in St. Joseph, he was a faithful co-laborer. For a number of years previous to his death, he resided in Memphis, Tenn. His age could not have been less than sixty years. We are without the particulars of his death. J. G. F., Sherman, Texas.

4 October 1878, Vol. 3, No. 32

Cyrus Johnson - Our obituary column of last week recorded the death of this excellent man, and also of his daughter, Mrs. Ellen Chapman, both of Memphis, Tennessee. He was the father of Rev. W. S. Johnson, Waxahachie, now the Evangelist of the Presbytery of Central Texas. Cyrus Johnson was one of our purest and best men, of long and faithful service in the Church he loved. He made generous benefactions during his life to the cause of Publication and other benevolent enterprises. -*Central Presbyterian*. [Article, p.2]

Rev. John H. Rice, D.D. We are inexpressibly saddened to read of the unexpected death of the this beloved brother. He was a brother-in-law to our corresponding editor, Rev. J. W. Neil, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of San Antonio. His death occurred at his home at Mason Depot, not far from Memphis, Tenn., on Monday, Sept. 8th. The following extracts from a private letter of his sister, Mrs. Dr. Lacy, of Raleigh, N.C., contains the only particulars received concerning the melancholy event: "He went to Collierstown and preached the Sabbath previous; got home on Tuesday, had a chill on Wednesday morning and died on Saturday. They supposed he had bilious fever at first, until black vomit came on." There was no one to minister to him but his faithful wife. "She sent her girls out of the room, and sat by her dying husband alone until the last moment" A friend, a lady, then came who helped to prepare him for burial. Then a few men nerved themselves and came in and carried him out to the garden and buried him under a tree. There was not one to carry him to the cemetery. Just as the moon was rising, Mrs. Rice and her four girls followed him to his resting place. Mr. Neil (meaning, as we suppose, Rev. William Neil, the father of Mrs. Rice) made a prayer at the grave." He was the oldest son of the late Rev. Benjamin H. Rice, D.D., so well known in Virginia, and over the Church generally. He bore the name of his venerated uncle, John Holt Rice. He was for a number of years pastor of the church at Charlotte Court House, Va., and then of the Walnut Street church, Louisville, Ky. Next he was pastor of the church in Mobile, Ala., where he also filled the place of editor of the *Presbyterian Index*. His next place of service was in Franklin, Tenn., but for some years past his home has been at the place where he ended this mortal life. [Article, p.4]

A Christian Hero's Death and Burial. Special dispatch to the Courier Journal, from Vicksburg, September 26. William Rockwood, President of the Howard Association, died this morning at 5 o'clock. He was ex-Chief of the Fire Department and a leading pillar of the Presbyterian Church. [This long article contains much information about his community and church involvement].

Of the ministers of our Church who have died of yellow fever during the present epidemic, none was more widely known than John H. Rice, D.D. He was a man of great natural abilities, extensive reading, fine literary culture, and much experience in the ministry and in our Church courts. Dr. Rice, also was unusually gifted in social qualities. He was a fine talker, a most genial companion, and a man of the kindest feelings. The last General Assembly reports exhibit him as one of the conspicuous debaters and independent thinkers of that occasion. He has been equally prominent in other Assemblies. His fine mental endowments, learning and experience made him one of the ablest of our ecclesiastics. Dr. Rice, at the time of his death, was acting as evangelist in the bounds of the Presbytery of Memphis, of which he was a member. He died at his home in Mason, Tenn, on Sept. 7th. His family are left, to a large extent dependent on the care of the Church of which he has been so long a minister. And we shall be glad if these lines shall serve to turn the thoughts of some of our wealthier members to the good that may be done, by sending them some token of sympathy in their distress. [Article: Notes of the Epidemic, p. 5]

Since our last report, another of the German ministers has died - Rev. C. J. Wiemers, pastor of the Southern Methodist German church in Carrollton, one of the suburbs of the city. He was a valuable man and was cut down while busy ministering to the sick. Our other pastors are doing well; yesterday morning, Brother Trawick lost his youngest child; it was about one year old. [Article: Notes of the Epidemic, p. 5]

We have lost a number of very valuable men this year - none of them more regretted than Edward J. Gay, Jr., who died Sept. 18th. He was a member of the Methodist Church, a young man of fine promise, who was widely esteemed and loved. Such losses are felt through a wide circle, and tell upon the entire community. [Article: Notes of the Epidemic, p. 5]

A Mother in Israel Gone. Wife of Col. H. L. Bennett, died on Saturday, Aug. 24th, at the family residence in Falls county, and was buried on Sunday morning at the Prairie View church. She was born in Lincoln Co., Ky., in June 1807, was married to Col. H. L. Bennett in 1829, and soon afterwards moved with him to Arkansas, where in 1836 in a little pine log cabin, she gave her heart to the Savior, and ever afterwards maintained a calm and unwavering faith in Christ as her Savior. Having been reared in the Presbyterian faith, her life was mostly spent with other denominations. Two years ago, when the Prairie View church was organized at the camp meeting, she remarked, that she was now, in her old age, coming home to spend her latter days. Husband, children and grandchildren mentioned. [NOTE: Neither given name nor maiden name of the subject is given. Article, p.5]

Rev. J. A. Smylie, late pastor of Milford church, died at his residence, near Milford, on Monday, Sept. 24th, 1878, of a sudden and severe attack of black jaundice. He was sick about two days. [Notice, p. 5]

11 October 1878, Vol. 3, No. 33

Rev. J. A. Smylie. We have, as yet, heard nothing of the particulars of the death of this useful and beloved brother, late the pastor of the Milford church, beyond the short obituary in last week's paper. He was suddenly called away. Some months ago he had a stroke of paralysis, whilst writing at his desk, which entirely disabled him from work. His life was then despaired of for a time, but he seemed to have passed the crisis, and was steadily improving until the sudden and severe attack of black jaundice, which terminated his life in two days.

Notes of the Epidemic. [Excerpts only] Mentions the fever has made its appearance in a violent form at Morgan City, where Rev. C. M. Atkinson is stationed. His wife and daughter, Anna, have been down with fever; and yesterday, we buried his daughter Lillie, aged 13 years. Lillie died at 6 o'clock on Sunday morning.

Married at the residence of the bride's father, J. H. Ardinger, Esq., in Bonham, Texas, Oct. 3rd, 1878, by Rev. H. B. Boude, President of Austin College, Mr. A. B. Scarborough, Esq., and Miss Sallie B. Ardinger, both of Bonham.

Married on Sept. 24th, 1878, near Hillsborough at the residence of the bride's father, by Rev. S. M. Lockett, Mr. R. E. Wilson, of Milford, and Miss Flora E. Pierce, of Hill Co., Texas.

Died in Louisville, Ky., at the residence of his father, Sept. 7th, 1878, Jefferson Davis Bradshaw, in the 18th year of his age.

Died in Lamar, Aransas Co., Texas, Sept. 17th, 1878, Mrs. Lydia Ann D. Wells, wife of Capt. Jas. B. Wells, aged about 60 years. She was a native of Woodville, Miss. Her parents were from the State of Connecticut. Her maiden name was Hull. Her first marriage was with a Mr. Toy, who lived only a short time. Her second marriage was in 1844 to Jas. B. Wells, Lieutenant of the Navy of the Republic of Texas. She received a good Spanish education while living in Matamoras with her step father, Major Smith, American Consul to Mexico. Afterward her education was continued in French and English by a 5 year course of study under Dr. White & wife in N. Y. During these school girl days, she dedicated her life to Christ, and united with the Presbyterian church in N.Y. When the church in Lamar was organized she became a member of its communion by letter. The Rev. N. W. Wilson, D.D., pastor of the Colosseum Baptist church at New Orleans, died lately of yellow fever. [Religious Items column, p. 8]

The Rev. H. T. Haddick, pastor of the Baptist church at Grenada, Miss., was absent when the fever broke out, but returned, and died at his post. [Religious Items column, p. 8]

Rev. A. J. Loughridge writes from Lexington, Texas, Sept. 26th, informing us of Bro. Conoley's death. [Notice p. 4. Also see below]

Rev. M. C. Conoley. Death has again invaded our ranks and Bro. Conoley has gone to his rest. He died at his residence in Milam Co., on the 21st of Sep., 1878, in the seventy-first year of his age. He has been in feeble health for about a year past, for several months of that time confined to his room. He was more than a quarter of century ago, a Pastor in Brazoria Co.. Afterwards he lived for some years at Brenham, then removed to the region where his last days were spent.

The Late Rev. J. A. Smylie. At a meeting of the officers of the Milford Presbyterian church, resolutions made concerning the death of Rev. John A. Smylie. were adopted regarding his death. Resolutions published. Submitted by: Rev. S. M. Lockett, Chairman; J. C. Wilson, N. S. Couchman, N. J. Bouie, G. C. Orr, W. H. Hudson, Elders; H. L. Caldwell, J. R. Hudson, P. H. Carter, J. P. It is reported that Rev. John A. Reilly, living near Clinton, is dead. Rev. Trawick's funeral was announced to take place from the church at nine o'clock Wednesday morning, postponed till one o'clock, in order that the remains of his beloved wife might be interred at the same time. Mrs. Trawick was not aware that her husband had preceded her. [Excerpts from article: Notes of the Epidemic, p. 8]

Death of Rev. A. Baker. The Sunday School Convention of Fayetteville Presbytery, as previously announced, was in session at Floral College on Tuesday Oct. 1st, and Rev. Mr. Baker had partly ascended the pulpit stairs and was addressing the audience, when suddenly he appeared to be falling and was caught in the arms of Rev. J. P. McPherson, who was near. He never spoke a word after the attack. -North Carolina Presbyterian.

Rev. M. W. Trawick. It is with exceeding sorrow that we take up our pen to record the death of the pastor of the Canal Street Presbyterian church, Rev. M. W. Trawick, of the prevailing epidemic. He was stricken down on the previous Tuesday evening. He died just before two o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, at the age of forty years and three months. He came to his present pastoral charge from the Presbytery of Mississippi.

Rev. John Archibald Smylie died at his residence near Milford, Texas, Sept. 23rd, 1878, aged nearly sixty-six years. His grandfather, James Smylie, was a Ruling Elder of the Presbyterian Church; emigrated before the Revolutionary War from Scotland to Richmond Co., N.C., and in 1809 to Amite Co., in the Territory of Mississippi, where he lived to an advanced age. He always held family worship in the Gaelic language. He had four sons and three daughters. His second son was Rev. James Smylie, who was the first Presbyterian minister that permanently settled in the South-west. He was born in Richmond Co., N.C., in 1780; educated at Guilford, by Rev. David Caldwell; licensed by the Presbytery at Orange in 1804, and in company with Rev. David Brown, under the commission from the Synod of Carolinas, bearing date December, 1803, came as a missionary to the Territory of Mississippi, arriving in the early part of 1805. He settled at

Washington, Capital of the Territory, and subsequently in Amite Co., in consequence of which his father, mother, and their family moved to that section. His three brothers, John, Nathaniel and Matthew, were Ruling Elders in the Presbyterian Church. One of the sisters, Mrs. Bolls, was the grandmother of Rev. M. B. Shaw, the present pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Clinton, Louisiana. Rev. John A. Smylie was the son of John Smylie, who was a Ruling Elder of Bethany Church, and for many years Judge of the Probate Court of Amite Co., Miss. He was born in Amite Co., Nov. 6, 1812. In 1830 he entered Oakland College. In 1832 he presented himself before the Session of the Presbyterian Church in Port Gibson, under the ministry of Rev. Zebulon Butler. He graduated with honor April 4th, 1835. From College he returned to his father's house, and entered upon the study of Theology privately, under the direction of his uncle, Rev. James Smylie. The next year, in connection with his theological studies, he taught in the College of Louisiana, at Jackson; at which time a State Institution. In April 1837, he returned to Oakland College, and entered the theological department, which at that time was opened in connection with that institution. September 19th, 1838, John A. Smylie was licensed to the Mississippi Presbytery, convened in the city of Natchez. [Other stations given.] The Presbytery of Central Texas at their Spring meeting of 1878 elected him Commissioner to the General Assembly. On July 15th, 1846, he was married to Miss Nancy Isadore Jackson, daughter of Mr. W. Jackson, a leading citizen and planter of Amite Co., Miss., who, in 1815 was one of the defenders of New Orleans, under General Andrew Jackson. She died Jun 24th, 1866. They had twelve children. Six sons and two daughters survive him. [NOTE: This three column obituary gave much information about his church activities, etc.]

Died near Horn Lake Depot, DeSoto Co., Miss., Oct. 4th, 1878, Mrs. Mary J. Reid, wife of Rev. S. I. Reid, after four days suffering with the yellow fever, in the fifty-sixth year of her age. She was the second daughter of Benjamin Williams, Esq., of Washington Co., Pennsylvania. She was educated in the Washington Female College, under the care of Mrs. Hannah, and was the Valedictorian of her class. She was married in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania, by Dr. A. Brown, of Jefferson College, to Rev. S. I. Reid, of Mississippi. In the town of Hernando, where her home has been ever since the war, she had greatly endeared herself to all classes, all denominations.

The death of Rev. S. R. Bertron, living near Port Gibson, has been reported. The affliction of the family of Rev. J. A. Reilly, already noticed by us, is indeed severe. He and his daughters, Amy and Mary, have fallen victims to the pestilence. George, the only son at home, is now down. One daughter as yet has been untouched. Mrs. Reilly is at present in New Jersey among relatives. How sad her return will be to the desolated home. We desire to tend our respectful sympathy to the venerable ex-President Davis, whose son, Jefferson, died of the fever, near Memphis, last week. He was an only son. Rev Albert Barthe, the German minister, we just learn has died. He was laboring in Jefferson City, one of the suburbs of New Orleans. He was thirty-eight years of age. This was his first Summer here. -S. W. *Presbyterian*. [Article: Notes of the Epidemic, p. 1]

The death is announced in England of George Parker Bidder, a well known civil engineer, but better known, many years since, as the celebrated calculating boy. Old George II and Queen Charlotte had him at court, and were delighted with his precocious skill. [Notice p. 5]

Married in the City of Galveston, Oct. 17th, by Rev. R. F. Bunting, D.D., Mr. John J. Readdy and Miss Nellie M. Dunham.

Married at the residence of Mr. Quick, 1347 Dotler (or Doller/Dotier, not clear on microfilm) Street, St. Louis, Oct. 7, 1878 by Rev. E. M. Bounds, Dr. E. N. McAllay, of Texas, and Mrs. Kate E. Cather.

Married Oct. 16, 1878 by Rev. J. P. Foreman, Mr. John A. Ritchie, of DeKalb Co., Mo., and Miss Clara M. Parker, of Alton, Ill., at the residence of the bride's brother-in-law, Mr. D. J. Ireland, in Stewartsville, Mo.

Married on the evening of Oct. 16th, 1878, near Bowling Green, Ky., by Rev. J. L. Caldwell, Mr. Jas. W. Patteson and Miss Lilla T. Donaldson, all of Warren Co.

Died at Corsicana, Texas, Sept. 30th (not clear on microfilm), Miss M. Emma Gulick, who was a child of the Covenant from infancy, and for more than thirty years a communicating member of the Presbyterian Church. *North Carolina Presbyterian* please copy.

Died at Yorktown, DeWitt Co., Texas, on the 10th day of June, 1878, Elisha Alexander Wallace. He was born Aug. 6th, 1801, in Chester Dist., S.C. After his marriage, he removed to Texas. Since the death of his wife, he has lived with his son, an Elder in the Live Oak church in this county. *Southern Presbyterian* please copy.

Died near Pass Christian, Miss., Oct. 10, 1878, Prof. Jno. S. B. Jeffries, aged 54 years and 2 months. Died near Pass Christian, Miss., Oct. 12th, 1878, Baford Lamar Jeffries, age about 4 years. Died near Pass Christian, Miss., Oct. 15th, 1878, Miss Mary R. Jeffries, age 18 years. Such is the sad record of death, in a family, from the terrible scourge now falling in our Southern country. Father, son and daughter all taken within a week. Mr. Jeffries was a native of Virginia, a graduate of Hampden Sidney College, and a member of the Presbyterian church. His daughter was born in Mississippi and his son in Missouri.

Rev. R. R. McKie (colored), licentiate of Memphis Presbytery, died, Sept. 21, 1878, in the vicinity of Byhalia, Miss. On the Sunday preceding he was thrown from his buggy and fractured his ankle bone. Monday evening he was seized with brain fever. He was 2 years at Tuskalooza, having finished his course there last spring. At the time of his death he was laboring in the bounds of North Mississippi Presbytery, at Fairview church, doing good work. E. E. Bigger, Byhalia, Miss., Oct. 12, 1878.

Rev. Nehemiah Adams, D. D., one of the oldest Congregationalist ministers of Boston, and the father of the Rev. W. H. Adams, of the Presbytery of Charleston, died Oct. 6th, aged seventy three years. [Notice, p. 7]

Rev. John H. Gray, D.D. was born in February, 1805, in Abbeville Dist., S.C., in that part of the district known as "Calhoun Settlement," in the bounds of Hopewell church, of which his parents were prominent members, and his father a devoted and revered ruling elder, long known throughout the region of the country as "Elder John Gray." Dr. Gray was the last surviving member of a large family of pious children of this well known Christian patriarch, of which two (viz: Rev. D. L. Gray and himself) were long known and venerated ministers of the gospel, and all the remaining children were either elders or private members of the Church. In November, 1828, he was married in Abbeville Dist., S.C., to Miss Jane Brownlee Robertson, second daughter of Major George Robertson, a retired merchant from the city of Charleston, S.C. Eleven children (of whom only two survive) were the fruit of the union, and nine of them, together with the beloved wife and mother had preceded the husband and father. After coming to Texas, the yellow fever having made its appearance in LaGrange, his devoted family resolved at once to remove him to a place of safety. They selected as a suitable retreat the neighborhood of Middleton, a station on the Memphis and Charleston railroad, exempt from the pestilence. He died the 22d of September. He was buried near the spot where he breathed his last, in the graveyard of the Ebenezer church. Here his remains will lie until a suitable time in the ensuing winter, when they will be removed to his family lot in Elmwood Cemetery, and laid beside the dear departed ones who have preceded him. [This three column obituary gave much personal information, his church involvement, etc.]

Autobiographical Sketch, Part 1, by the late Rev. David Coulter, D.D. [Only brief excerpts have been taken from this two column sketch which was written in first person]. He was born November 8th, 1808, Delaware, Sussex County, about ten miles east of Georgetown, the county seat, and seven miles west of Lewestown, whose outlook is the Bay of Delaware, where it widens out between Cape Henlopea and Cape May into the broad Atlantic. The home of his parents, Jesse and Elizabeth Coulter, was a comfortable farm house, about one mile south of Cool Spring Presbyterian Church, of which his parents were members, and where, in his infancy, he as a child of the covenant was baptized. His father died before David Coulter completed his fourth year. His early training, and that of his younger sister, was almost wholly the work of his mother. The Rev. Joseph Copes, of blessed memory, was pastor of the Cool Springs Church, and gave much attention to catechetical instruction of the children. Rev. Copes' remains were interred a little east of the south door of the church. [This autobiographical sketch continued in twelve parts, usually published weekly, but skipped a week occasionally.]

After the adjournment of the Synod of the Northern Church at Austin last month, the first meeting they have held in the State, one of the members died suddenly. On Monday nearly all the Synod started for home. The Rev. James D. Caldwell desired to do so, but was persuaded to remain a day longer, as he was not feeling well. The same evening he as seized with convulsions, and in two hours life was extinct. He had come three hundred and seventy miles. His remains were sent to his old home in Elizabeth, Pa. Mr. Caldwell came to Texas in 1875 and at once began work in Clay Co., on the Red River. The funeral service at Austin, on Tuesday, proved that, though he had no kindred in Texas, he had warm friends and honest mourners. [Article, p. 4]

Rev. Valentine Down. The Petersburg correspondent of the *Richmond Dispatch* reported the death of Mr. Down, at his home near Stony Creek, on the 25th inst. He was a native of England and became a member of East Hanover Presbytery about a year ago, his connection immediately before this having been, we believe, with the Presbytery of Utica, N.Y. He was rendering service as a minister, to the Presbyterian church at Stony Creek, Sussex Co., and at Chester, Dinwiddie Co. He leaves a family. [Notice, p. 5]

The eldest daughter of Dr. Adam Clarke, the commentator, Mrs. Anna Rowly, died recently at Clevedon, aged eighty-five years. She was the only surviving child. [Notice, General Items column]

Died at his residence, near Overton, Rusk Co., Texas, Sept. 25th, 1878, C. G. Cunningham, M.D., of paralysis, in the 57th years of his age. He was a native of Jackson Co., Ga., removed to Talladega, Ala., in the year 1839; graduated in the Medical College in Louisville, Ky, in 1842. After attending one course also in the University of Pa., in Philadelphia, he returned to Talladega and commenced the practice of medicine which he continued without interruption till the year 1869 when he removed to Rusk Co., Texas. In January 1874, he had an attack of erysipelas of the brain from the effects of which he never fully recovered. In 1876 he had an attack of paralysis, which terminated in his death. He had been a member of the Presbyterian Church about 12 years; and was one of the original members of the organization of the Overton Presbyterian church. He leaves a family of two sons and three daughters, all members of the church. Overton, Texas, Oct. 24, 1878. *Southern Presbyterian*, please copy.

Died at the residence of Mrs. E. R. Wilson, her daughter, near Lexington, Texas, on the 10th day of Oct., 1878, Mrs. Deborah Ann Loughridge, widow of James Loughridge, Esq., deceased, in the 91st year of her age. She was born in Fairfield Dist., S.C., and was the only daughter of Robert and Elizabeth McGill. At the age of 19 she married James Loughridge, Esq., at Laurensville, S.C. He was of Scotch descent, having emigrated from the north of Ireland a few years previously. In 1823, they moved to St. Clair Co., Ala., where Mr. L. and his boys were engaged in farming until 1831, when they moved to Greene Co., Ala., for the purpose of educating their children. In 1838, Mrs. Loughridge was left a widow, Mr. L. having died, while on a journey in Texas. Afterwards she moved to Mississippi, where she remained a few years, and then came to Texas, where she spent the remainder of her days. She was the mother of twelve children, ten sons and two daughters; of whom only four sons and one daughter survive her. In early life she joined the Presbyterian Church. R. M. L.

Rev. Mr. Foster, pastor of the Moreau Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South, died Oct. 23rd. He was a native of Louisiana, 28 years of age. He had been in the city only nine months. Another able minister of the gospel, Rev. Albert Bathe, died on the 22nd inst., aged 28 years. He was born in Brandenburg, and was educated at Barmen, Prussia, and was an Evangelical Lutheran minister, came to the United States eleven years

ago. His first charge was St. Marysville, Kansas, thence he removed to St. Charles, Mo., thence to New Orleans, eighteen months ago to the church on Milam and Camp Streets, where he was eminently successful and greatly beloved and was building up the Church rapidly, when he was cut off in the epidemic, and his lovely wife with him. The only child two years old, "little Otto," recovered. Mrs. Bathe died Sept. 24th.

We regret to learn that Mrs. C. P. Rice, widow of the late Rev. N. L. Rice, D.D., died at her home in Fulton, last Thursday, Oct. 24th. She was the daughter of the late Rev. J. K. Burch. Five children survive: Mrs. Dr. E. S. Lemoine, and Mrs. T. B. Taylor, of St. Louis, Mrs. Henderson, Miss Rice and John J. Rice, Esq., of Fulton.

This is a guide to deaths mentioned in the *Dallas Morning News* in the year 1889. It is important to note that the dates given are **NOT** the **DEATH** dates, but rather are the dates the articles appeared in the newspaper. There may be more than one listing, either in one issue or several issues. The page and column number are listed to help find the specific article.

While most of the deaths mentioned took place in Dallas or neighboring counties, the geographic scope of the coverage is amazing and many of the listed deaths took place outside Texas.

The Dallas Morning News, published in Dallas, Texas, by A. H. Belo Publishers has been in existence since 1885 and is still published daily. It has been microfilmed and is available in the Texas/Dallas Collection of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, Dallas Public Library System.

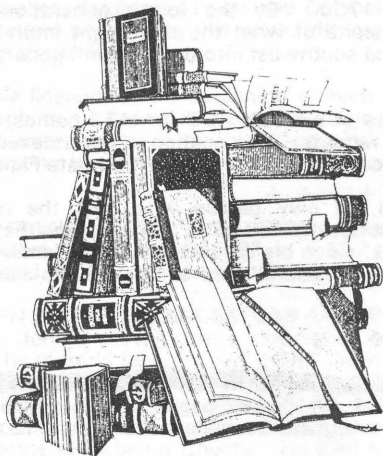

BOOK REVIEWS

Any book donated to the Dallas Genealogical Society relating to family history or genealogy which is currently in print and available for sale will be reviewed in **THE DALLAS QUARTERLY**. The book will be placed in the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library of the Dallas Public Library System. All publications to be reviewed should be sent by the author or publisher to the Dallas Genealogical Society with price and complete ordering information.

ISAAC B. DANIEL OF RANDOLPH COUNTY ALABAMA, AND HIS DESCENDENTS. 1992. Dorothy Million Ketter. Hardback, 8½" x 11", 284 pages. Name indexed. \$50.00 postpaid. Order from GREEN DOG PRESS, 1311 Candlelight Avenue, Duncanville, Texas 75137.

Isaac B. Daniel, the central figure in Mrs. Ketter's account (and her great-great-grandfather), was born in Georgia in 1814. By age 24 he had married Elizabeth Lovvorn and moved to Randolph County, Alabama, where he died in 1884. Isaac and Elizabeth had ten children, and it is the stories of their progeny that fill the pages of this book. Up to eight generations are covered and over two thousand names are indexed. In addition to the title surname, others that appear most often are: FLANARY, GOSDIN, JENKINS, LOVVORN, MITCHELL, MORMAN, SEARS, SMITH, SPRADLIN, and WHITLEY.

I was impressed that information has been gathered for descendants of all of Isaac's children who had issue (nine in number). But the biographies are quite brief, and leave many unanswered questions. Example: what is the story of Isaac's daughter, Bathsheba? Her five children carried the Daniel surname, and her only marriage date is sixteen years later than the birth date of her youngest child.

Documentation has been relegated to two-thirds of a page of bibliography. So many photos, maps, documents, certificates, and charts have been included that the volume has a bit of a cluttered look in places. A form of the Henry numbering system has been used, which, when coupled with a very fine index, makes this an easy reference to use.

HISTORY OF THE SHUMATE FAMILY, KENTUCKY PIONEERS. 1992. Robert S. Riley. Hardback, 7" x 10", xii + 797 pages. Partially indexed. \$45.00 plus \$4.50 P&H. Order from McDowell Publications, 11129 Pleasant Ridge Road, Utica, Kentucky 42376.

Part I, including a 64 page index, takes up less than half of this book describing SHUMATE history in France, Virginia, and Kentucky. The immigrant and initial reference point for subsequent family members is Jean de la Chaumette, who came to Virginia from France circa 1720. By the fourth generation his descendants were in Kentucky, but in spite of what the title might imply, the author follows them across the south and southwest into the eleventh generation and up to a present day time period.

Part II contains over five hundred pages of extracts of SHUMATE names from French, English, Virginia and Kentucky records. This section is not indexed. It is described as "Documentation in Support of the History of the Shumate Family".

Col. Riley has deliberately chosen to list only people who bear the name SHUMATE. Daughters are recorded, but not their offspring. This means that the author does not appear in his own book, since his connection to the family is a maternal one. It also means the book is useful only to those who have a SHUMATE interest.

Vera McDowell has been writing letters of advice to a fictitious novice genealogist named "Bette" for over ten years. These letters have been printed serially in *SOUTHERN ECHOES*, the monthly newsletter of the Augusta Genealogical Society. They have been so popular that AGS has edited and published 120 of them in this phenomenal volume. The writing, editing, art work and printing are all truly outstanding.

Each letter is about one page long and deals with a piece of information that all genealogists need to know to get on with their research. There are explanations, references, facts, examples, pointers, tips, suggestions—all intended to simplify the practice of genealogy and family history. The letters accomplish their purpose in remarkable fashion; they are thorough and clear, but always entertaining and fun to read.

The topics range from *Abstracting Records* through *Zip Codes*, and a simple subject index makes it easy to find what you're looking for. Can't remember whether MI stands for Mississippi, Missouri, Minnesota or Michigan? Well, here's a handy list of those stupid two-letter state abbreviations. Confused by the *Library of Congress Classification System*? Ms. McDowell makes it crystal clear. *Ahnentafel Charts*, *Soundex Coding*, *National Archives*, *PERSI*, and *Finding Maiden Names* are just a sampling of what is available for your edification or reference.

Every beginning genealogist should have a copy of this book, and since over a period of ten years, "Bette" has become a pretty accomplished researcher, there is plenty here for intermediates as well. The Augusta Genealogical Society has provided a great service in making *GENEALOGICAL HOW-TO LETTERS* available to the public. They will provide an additional service if the next edition is in a more durable binding than the first one is.

DICKEY RACKLEY ETC. ETC. - A HISTORY OF PIONEER FAMILIES. 1991. Cleo Dickey Greiner. Hardback, 8½" x 11", 284 pages (printed on one side only). \$25.00 plus \$3.00 P&H. Order from the author, 2935 Hillglenn Road, Dallas, Texas 75228.

In addition to twelve DICKEY generations, this book contains genealogical data on the collateral lines BELL, BERDAN, CRANFORD, GIBSON, HAMILTON, JOYCE, NORTH, PARKER, PURVIS, RACKLEY, RUSSELL and STONE. The families follow a typical migration pattern from Scotland and Ireland to Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma. A generous assortment of photos and letters personalize this work, although poor printing quality renders much of the material illegible. *Jan*

Simple lineages at the beginning of each chapter help some in making ones way through this information, but the absence of an index and any sort of unified numbering system is terribly disappointing. There is much that appears to be interesting here, but it's hard to locate and use.

"JOHN EDENS, HIS ANCESTORS AND HIS ODYSSEY" is the title of Part I of this text. John's odyssey began in Virginia in 1783 and ended in Texas. Along the way he married Lavinia LANGFORD, who bore nine of his children--four in South Carolina, one in Tennessee, three in Illinois, and one in Arkansas. A second marriage produced two more children, and John's arrival in Texas in 1831 led to other adventures, including a massacre of family members by Indians in 1838 at his home in Houston County. He died in that area in 1857.

Part II covers the descendants of John's eleven children. Arthur Hall, the principal compiler, is a third great-grandson. There are over 1000 listings in the index, but since those are surnames only, it is impossible to even guess how many individuals that represents. A unique numbering system which alternates numbers and letters to distinguish generations and birth order is imposed on a variation of the Register System format; the result is confusing at first, but manageable. Extensive footnotes on each page provide excellent documentation. All in all, the Edens Family Association has a very valuable chronicle.

Fulton County is in extreme northern Arkansas; in fact, the Missouri state line forms its northern boundary. Claudette Wakefield has copied its marriage records for the period 1887 to 1925, using microfilm obtained from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City.

About 4500 marriages have been transcribed. They are grouped in five year intervals and within those groupings they have been alphabetized by the first letter of the groom's surname. Each record shows the groom, his age, the bride, her age, the date of the ceremony, and the page in the marriage book where it is recorded. An index of brides for the entire thirty-nine year period is included.

Ms. Wakefield says that the older marriage record books in the Fulton County court house are too fragile to allow public access. However, if a researcher wants a copy of a license for a marriage found in her book, she will provide it from microfilm. The fee is \$1.00, plus SASE.
